

1942 News Events Reviewed From Friona Star Headlines

One of the more enjoyable ways we have of looking back at what was happening 50 years ago is to browse through the files of the Friona Star. A member of the Star staff usually does this each year at this time, and shares their discoveries from this "time capsule" with our readers of today.

In January of 1942, Uncle John White, the first editor and publisher of the Star, was still serving as editor. The Star of that year consisted basically of four pages per week, with virtually no local pictures. White's column was entitled "Cogitations and Aphorisms of Jodok." Another regular column was written by F.W. Reeve, entitled "Farmer John Sees Things.'

The January 2 issue told about Friona's fourth annual Homecoming banquet, held December 26, for ex-students of Friona schools. Nelson Welch was chairman. Floy Goodwine was named chairman for the 1942 banquet, with Harlan O'Rear and Charlene McFarland as vicechairmen.

In the January 9 issue, an article reminded all farmers who did not have a cotton allotment for 1942 and expected to plant cotton, to request an allotment prior to February 1.

H. B. (Harry) Whitley of the Lakeview had been appointed cattle inspector for the counties of Parmer and Bailey, and has taken his headquarters at Farwell.

The January 16th issue announced that the office of the Friona Star had been moved from the W.H. Warren building on Sixth Street west of Main to the Glenn Weir building on East Sixth Street.

With America getting involved in World War II, a weekly series of politically-motivated cartoons or illustrations appeared on Page 1 of the Star. January 16th issue contained an advertisement to buy War Bonds, with the illustration familiar to many of that time, the Minute Man, on the U.S. Savings

The January 23rd issue contained

representing Precinct 1.

"Price Brookfield, son of Mr. and Mrs. F.P. Brookfield of Friona, is riding to fame on the strength of his part in the winning record of the mighty Buffalo basketball team of West Texas State.

"An Amarillo news story of this week stated that 'Brookie' is the spark plug of the team and continues to describe his exploits:

"Not the tallest of the Tall Texans, but a rare piece of basketball machinery, is All-American Price Brookfield, 6-4-1/2 forward, who has scored 264 points in 17 games this year. His team won 16 of the games, as West Texas swept into the national spotlight.

"Brookfield is a 195pound cowboy from Friona...he learned basketball there because the school was too small to do much with football.'

On January 30, O.M. Jennings of the Lazbuddy community authorized the Star to announce his candidacy for re-election to the office of county commissioner, Precinct 4.

Taking the lead early, the Friona Chiefs defeated the Muleshoe Yellow Jackets, 38-16, to bring their season's record to 14 victories and only two defeats. John Weis was high point man with 14 points while Dale Treider scored 13.

For their 17th straight win (without a loss), the Friona Squaws defeated the Muleshoe Yellow Jackets, 34-33, in their closest game of the year. Massey led the scoring with 16 points.

The February 6, 1942, issue of the Star stated: "Editor John W. White was ill this week and readers of the Star can thank Mr. W.L. Edelmon and 18 members of his high school journalism class for getting the paper out.

"So, we are expressing our thanks to Mr. Edelmon and to June Maurer, Bobby Blackwell, Truitt Johnson, Mary Jo Anderson,



All sales of sugar in the U.S. was to be halted at midnight April 27 for approximately one week, after which ban, a rationing program on the commodity was to go into effect.

It had not been determined if the weekly sugar ration for each individual would be one-half or three-fourths of a pound. Plans for registration of families also are to be worked out, so that each family may receive a ration book with stamps.

The April 10, 1942, issue of the Star announced that J.A. Blackwell was elected mayor of Friona in a quiet city election, receiving 65 votes to defeat the present mayor, F.W. Reeve, who received 31 votes. F.A. Spring and Carl Maurer were re-elected as commissioners, and Logan Sympson was re-elected as city clerk.

The Legion Hall at Friona will be the registration place for all men required to sign up in the fourth selective service registration, it was announced. Other registration places are at Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddy. Men between the ages of 45 and 65 were to sign up on the April 27 date. According to national S.S. leaders, men signed up in the fourth registration will not be liable for military service, but may be used in civilian roles to carry out the nation's war program.



Just because the weather's turned cooler doesn't mean you have to scratch salads off your menus. Add hot salads to your list that includes stew, chili, soup and other avocados and cherry tomatoes on tummy-warming foods.

The term salad generally brings to mind visions of a bed of lettuce greens topped with fresh tomatoes, cucumbers, green onions, radishes, minutes; sprinkle with salt. mushrooms, etc. However, if you replace the summer vegetables with autumn and winter vegetables, meat and hot dressing, salads become a hearty entree.

Consider the following salad toppers:

*Leftover turkey, shredded and heated: *Sweet potatoes or winter squash, cooked and chopped into bite-sized pieces; *Heated Italian or oil and vinegar dressing; *Chunks of cooked pork or chicken; *Toasted almonds; *Boiled eggs; *Broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, brussel sprouts, etc., cooked just until tender; *Spicy pinto beans.

Mix and match those toppings and others with your favorite salad greens or try the following recipes: BAKED CHEESE-

POTATO SALAD Dressing:

2 tablespoons white vinegar 1 teaspoon celery seeds

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

1/8 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon pepper

1/4 cup minced onion

1/4 cup chopped parsley 3/4 cup mayonnaise

4 cups diced cooked potatoes, warm 6 ounces (1-1/2 cups) cheddar

cheese, diced 4 ounces (6 thin slices) bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled 1/4 cup pecans, chopped

Grease a shallow 1-1/2 quart baking dish. Mix all dressing ingredients in a large bowl. Add potatoes and cheese; toss to mix. Turn mixture into prepared baking dish; sprinkle with bacon and pecans. Bake for 30 minutes at 325 degrees. Makes 4 servings.

Sending Christmas cards has been a part of American holiday tradition for generations, but the practice originated in Victorian England, where personal "visiting cards" were embellished with the seasonal designs for Christmas and New Year's.

The first Christmas card was created in 1843, when Sir Henry Cole commissioned artist, John Horsley, to design illustrated holiday postcards for conveying seasonal greetings to his many acquaintances.

Apparently the idea was warmly embraced; approximately 1,000 of the newly-designed postcards were sold for one schilling each.

> "Participants get a better understanding of addiction and how it affects relationships," she said.

Through treatment, the The activities preferred by compulsive gambler can gain the tools needed to build satisfying dog races, cards, casinos, sports relationships and begin gradual debt repayment.

"Research in this area is limited," Pate said. "But we do know that more men seek treatment than women. While the problem often begins in the mid-twenties, treatment is seldom sought until age 40 or 50."


