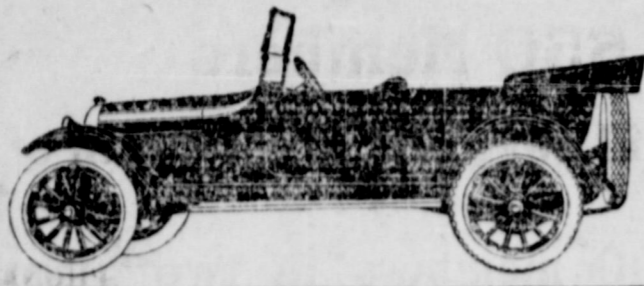

### HOLT CATERPILLAR TRACTORS HAVE ARRIVED—SEE THEM

The Government Used Holt Caterpillars to Haul Big Guns in France

Two of the well known Holt "Caterpillar" Tractors have arrived in Plainview, and will be demonstrated to the farmers of the Plains country.

Mr. F. G. Hinckley, agent for the Holt company, is here to have charge of the demonstration, and to sell the Holt tractors.

The Holt Caterpillar is a powerful tractor, and it was these machines that the government used to haul its big guns and other heavy supplies on the battle front in France.

The Holt will handle from eight to twelve mold board plows on the average ground, and plow sixty acres of land in a day, which is indeed a wonderful record, and should appeal to the wheat farmer who desires to put in a large acreage in the least possible time.

It is possible to plow from one to two weeks earlier with a "caterpillar" because it does not pack the ground having but 5 1-2 lbs to the square inch on the surface of the ground. The average pressure of a man's heel on the surface of the ground is from 35 to 40 lbs. to the square inch.

Mr. Hinckley, who is stopping at the Wayland Hotel, is the representative for this territory and expects to sell a number of the tractors. His headquarters will be at the Knight garage, where the tractors can be seen.

#### A Memorial Tribute

Saturday morning, Jan. 10th, the Prince of Peace came to one of the wards of a sanitarium in Lubbock and took away with Him the spirit of Sister Weise, leaving behind Him to greet the nurse only the lifeless form.

Sister Weise was the wife of Herman Weise, a prosperous and highly respected citizen of Petersburg, Texas. Of all her family and friends, perhaps the husband alone realized the nearness of her going, for though a sufferer for many months from an incurable disease, yet she bore it all so cheerfully and uncomplainingly that they were deceived. The husband seemed to realize that the sweetheart of his youth was soon to be taken from him and he endeavored in many ways to stop her going but in vain. Her body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Petersburg, and in spite of the inclement weather a large concourse of people bore silent tribute to the esteem in which she was held in the community.

Sister Weise was a faithful wife, a loving and unselfish mother, and the friend of all that was good and uplifting to the community. She could be counted upon to have her part in every good work and benevolent enterprise. So she lived for others that she had interwoven her life with the religious life of the community, and it seemed so fitting that her Sunday school class should pass by the silent form of their teacher and each pupil place upon her bosom a carnation in token of love and appreciation. Sister Weise so lived that her going is a distinct loss to all. We shall miss her presence and cheerful smile but her influence lives on, and we can but wish that her prayers which so often ascended a throne of grace for others may be answered in their lives. The entire community enters into sympathy with the bereaved and sorrowing husband and family and may it be that the God of the sorrowing shall part the dark clouds and reveal the hope of a reunion in the land of a cloudless day. May the husband as he sits in the twilight of the past remember these lines:

"Sometimes when the day is ended  
And the duties He gave me are done,

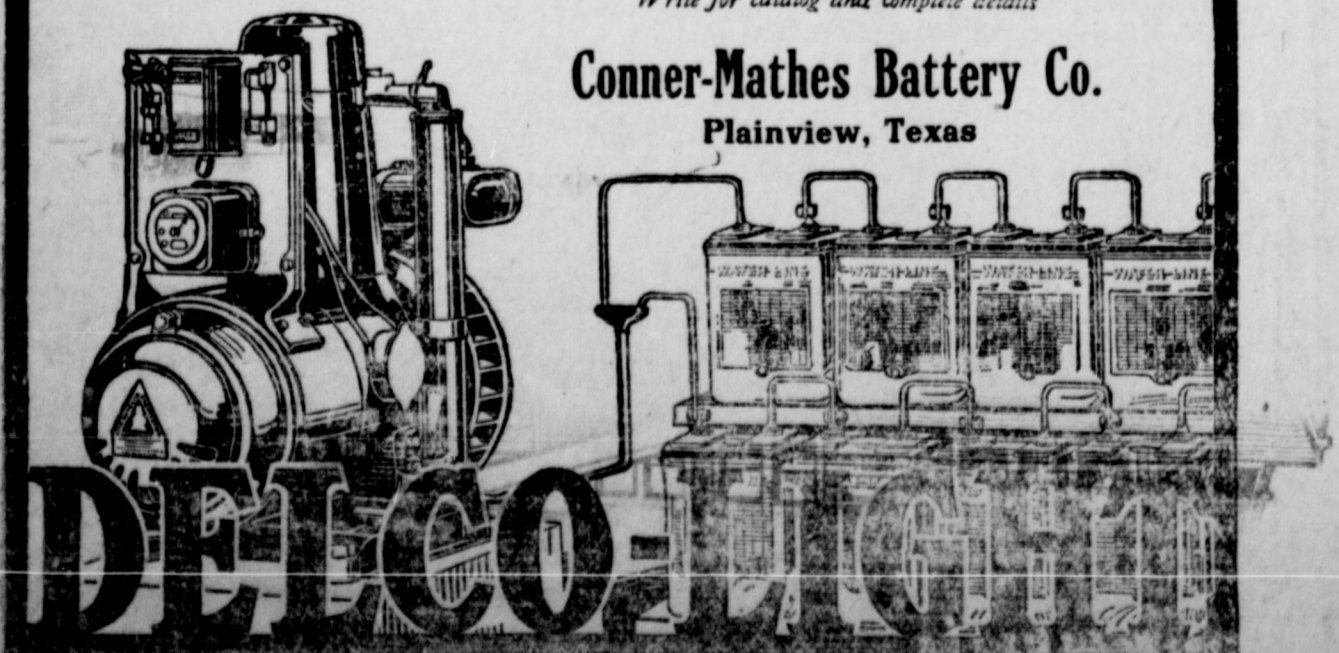
