## 1992 Sale Totals Are Down Slightly <br> The auction sale totals for the 1992 Parme

 County Jr. Livestock Show came to $\$ 73,653.14$, it was announced this week.The total was down somewhat from that of 1991, according to show official Dale Schueler. The 1991 total was $\$ 77,761.02$, which included money paid by "floor" buyers.
Deducting the floor from the 1991 figures reduced last year's actual premiums paid to the youngsters to $\$ 76,027.47$. This year's totals were down by $\$ 2,374$ or three per cent.

The swine sale actually showed a gain, from $\$ 48,918$ to $\$ 50,891$; and the lambs also increased, from $\$ 14,734$ to $\$ 15,319$.

The steer sale showed the decrease, from $\$ 4,543$ in 1991 to $\$ 4,171$. However, there were fewer steers in the 1992 show and sale.
