DAIRYING ON THE PLAINS WOULD BRING RICHES

Minnesota Farmers Quit Wheat After Failure, and Are Prospering With Dairies

Lakeville, Minn., Aug. 30. Dear Editor. I arrived home from Plainview a few days ago and found my Minnesota people very much interested in the Plains country, so much so that I have arranged to take with me on my return a delegation of representation business men and farmers to show that Northwest Texas is everything I claim it to be for agricultural and dairy farming.

I want every man interested in dairy farming to meet my delegation on my arrival there Sept. 15. They will tell you what the dairy cow done for Minnesota when her wheat crops failed. Yes, Minnesota has forged from third place in the union as a cow and butter producing state within a few years. Now far in the lead having made last year 142 million pounds of butter with her nearest competition making only 87 million pounds. It was the early wheat crop failures that caused us to change and that will come to the Plains country as it has all others. We wore a sour, sorrowful look twenty years ago when forced to face the cow as a last resort to keep body and soul together. What is the result? After a few years of cheap experience our lands have jumped from \$50 to \$250 per acre. The dairy cow, milking machine and home labor done it all. Today the farmer, dairy maid, dons coveralls, adjusts her milking machine, touches the electric button and sings while the milk flows. When the song is sung, she hoves to her automobile and off to the creamery with her milk or cream and back again with her money, all done in a few hours. You white faced Texas steers, can you show me where the profiteer has anything on our Minnesota dairy maids?

Meet my delegation at Plainview, Spt. 15 to 18 and they will tell you more.

Profitable Plains Hog Raising

The first sale of registered Poland China hogs in Floyd county was held this week by Walter Denny at his place 10 miles north of Lockney. The sale was a success in the point of prices and the numbers in attendance from within and without the county.

Mr. Denny in his converter sale offered 21 head of thoroughbred Poland Chinas. The 21 head averaged \$194.25. The 21 head brought around \$4,000. Four of these hogs were four months old pigs and one was five months old. One gilt sold for \$1,000 and was bought by Joe Mason, who lives east of Lockney in Floyd county. Denny's Long Orange brought \$660 and was bought by Ludwig Irlbeck of Happy.

The fourth day of last December Mr. Denny bought a gilt at Childress and paid \$200 for her. In this sale she and her three months old pigs brought \$1300. Can any investment beat this?—Lockney Beacon.

Frank Faytinger of Linwood, Neb., will leave today for his home, after spending some days looking after his half-section farm near Ellen. Mr. Sikes lives on the place. Mr. Faytinger bought the land about twelve years ago at \$20 an acre; he has made good interest on the investment from the crops, and the land has increased in value and is now worth \$65 an acre. Because of the intolerance and arrogance of organized labor, and its Bolshevick tendency hundreds of thousands of Americans will not vote for any candidate who is endorsed by or receives the support of union labor.

Editor Loomis of the Canadian Record has been nominated by the republicans of this district for congress. While, of all republicans in the district, Loomis would be our choice, yet we feel that he has made a mistake in permitting the nomination. Texas is rockribbed democratic; for a republican editor to parade the fact is calculated to injure his influence in local affairs and militate against him in a business way.

Mr. Neff is pledged to the people of West and Northwest Texas to use his strongest influence toward having the state re-districted, congressionally, senatorally and legislatively. He will be called upon to redeem this pledge when the legislature meets in January. This senatorial district was created twenty years ago, and for the past ten years has had three times as many people as some East Texas districts.

That is an indictment we would not make against the Bailey men, for we believe as they are democrats, and honor bound to support the nominees of the party they will do so. Luther Nickels, state campaign manager of the Bailey forces, also suggests that the Bailey men will stay away from the polls in the November election. He is simply disgruntled just now. The Irish and their sympathizers are using their influence to have President Wilson to ask Great Britain to save the life of MsSweeney, who is on a hunger strike in an Irish jail, by turning him out of jail. It seems to us that the best plan would be to urge MsSweeney to quit his hunger strike. He is trying to play the martyr, for Irish freedom. In the old days martyrdom was possible glorious, but these days people look upon such men as MsSweeney as fanatical fools, and such acts as his do no good. A live patriot is of much more benefit than a dead one, is the way we look at it. It is a cinch that the British government is as stubborn as MsSweeney, and unless he begins eating within the next day or so he is going to die from hunger.

THE FARMER PAYS

Prior to August 20th the freight on a car of wheat from Plainview to Galveston was about \$240, which was seemingly too much.

The new freight rates are an increase of 35 per cent, hence it now costs about \$325, an increase of \$85 a car.

Local grain men inform us that the price of wheat f. o. b. Plainview has been reduced this amount in order to care for this increase in the freight.

Hence, the farmer has to stand the loss. There is still approximately 400 cars of wheat in the hands of Hale county farmers, thus they will have to foot a loss of \$34,000 on wheat alone because of the freight increase.

This increase in freight rates is a hold-up of the farmers in order principally to give the railroad men increased wages. It isn't fair.

PEANUT POLITICAL ISSUES

In nearly every heated political campaign a lot of peanut "issues" are brought in.

In the recent campaign the matter of Mr. Neff's age, nor of Mr. Bailey's age or why he changed his name, should never have been mentioned, much less enlarged upon as they were.

When politicians brings such things into a campaign it shows they look upon the common voters as a herd of ignoramuses who can be easily stampeded. But, people are reading the newspapers more, are well informed and are capable of making up their own minds.

The day of the scheming professional politician is past. The people are reading and thinking for themselves. The women are also voting, and women are not to be herded by politicians.

The anti-suffragists of Tennessee have a broad yellow streak through their bodies. They are not good sports. The national amendment was ratified by the legislature, but while a motion to reconsider was pending enough of the anti left the state to break a quorum in the lower house, thus delaying a vote. 

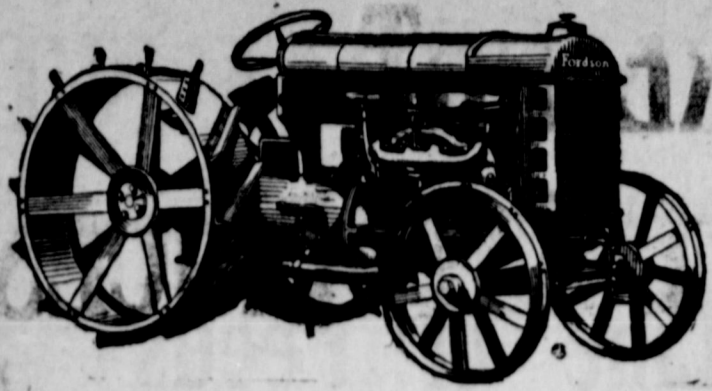

POOR WAY TO WOOL SLEEP

Man Who Experimented Pronounces Insomnia "Cure" to Be at Least of Doubtful Value.

A new cure for insomnia, we read, is to "list the first names of all your friends and acquaintances, taking each letter of the alphabet in order."

Of course this is only a variant of the old device of counting imaginary sheep jumping over a wall. Personally we never found that to work at all. We counted between 11,000 and 12,000 of these alleged soporific sheep one night, and then the alarm clock went off and it was time to get up, which we did with a groan, a headache and a pair of astigmatic eyes.

Making an alphabetical catalogue of your friends' first names is an even more stimulating and nerve-exciting process. We would be willing to wager that no normal persons could get further than the N's before being interrupted by the first call for breakfast.

It is doubtful, at least, if the night contains enough time to go through with the whole list from Alfred to Zorilla. We should say that this might be the surest way to banish sleep altogether.

The best way to wool slumber, we have been told, is to go into the silence, relax all muscles and nerves, and then in a mental way, pull all the edges of the mind into a dead mental center and fold them in. It is hard to say just how this is done, but it sounds plausible. Frequently, of course, there are some difficulties merely in going into a silence. Somewhere on the premises, perhaps in an adjacent apartment, there may be someone who has gone to sleep without going into the silence. This interferes materially with the working of all anti-insomnia devices.

If there is no neighboring obstacle of this sort it is a much easier matter.

And yet, even after the silence is arranged, the mind is apt to go on providing its own disturbance. Arithmetical and alphabetical diversions only accentuate the tumult. The only thing to do is to regard the very center of the mind as a hypothetical hole, or vacuum, contract the mind until it is all pulled into this hole, and then pull the hole in after it. And there you are. Of course if there is a certain degree of reality in this imagined condition, one does not have to exercise the hypothesis, and that makes it so much easier.—F. H. Young in Providence Journal.

Lithuania and Its People.

Lithuania is situated in the basin of the Niemen and Dvina rivers on the southeastern coast of the Baltic sea. The capital is Vilna. Its area is approximately 80,000 square miles, the population about 9,000,000, of whom 7,000,000 are Lithuanians, 3,500,000 Lithuanians proper, 1,500,000 using Slavic dialects and 2,000,000 Letts. The country also contains a third of a million Poles. The rest of the population consists of Jews, White Russians, Germans and Mongols. It is said that there is no trace in the world's history of any other people having lived in these regions. Although situated between the Slavs and the Teutons, the Lithuanians are in no way related to them. They claim that their language is one of the oldest now spoken in the world. It is said strikingly to resemble ancient Sanskrit.

Many Tyrants.

He was a high school pupil, and was imbibing many bits of philosophy. At home he watched the women folk and the ways they devised for doing as they pleased and for getting every other person to do as they wished them to do. And from these he drew conclusions which he later voiced.

"Times have changed since my history was written," he told his father one night. "Then the tyrants were the men who used to stamp around and kill and frighten people into submission. Today the tyrants have dropped those weapons and use much more subtle ones—tears. I think a woman who cries in order to get her own way is a bigger tyrant than ever those old fellows of long ago were."

Anyway, it set father to work thinking.

Primrosea of Picardy.

Nature in her own way is looking after the solitary war graves scattered throughout the shell-shattered Picardy countryside, according to a writer in the London Daily Chronicle. Those that lie in the thrice-fought-over ground between Albert and Comblès are covered with early spring primroses. In Liéramont the daffodils are blooming, and the brambles on the graves in Bernafay wood are green with new leaves. The lonely warriors are to be gathered together in the central cemeteries under the care of the imperial war graves commission. The French government, in compliance to the British soldier, has purchased the necessary land, and has presented it for all time to England.

Hotel Chateau Thierry.

There is said to be a plot on foot for a large American-managed hotel at Chateau Thierry. If it is built a small bet might be placed that the services of a German-speaking clerk will not be required there on the opening day. Their memories of that section will not be so keenly pleasurable that Germans will return there in great numbers.

FINE "GRIDIRON" AT COBLENZ

American Soldiers Stationed There Have Facilities for Almost Every Kind of Sport.

Elaborate preparations were made at Coblenz, Germany, for the football season. Grounds and stadiums which were only partly finished a year ago have been made permanent playing fields, and many of them compare favorably with the best college gridirons in the United States.

The most elaborately finished ground is in Coblenz, known as "Carnival Island." It was on this ground that the Third army championships were decided last season, but the ground at that time was not in as good condition as it is today. Neither were there proper facilities, such as dressing rooms.

At this island there are now two regular baseball fields, two football fields, a golf course of nine holes, a polo ground, a quarter-mile cinder track, with 220 yard straightaway, and outdoor basketball courts. On another part is a ring for horse shows and nine tennis courts.

Suitable bleachers to accommodate 5,000 spectators have been built, and there also are a large number of properly equipped dressing rooms with showers, rubbing tables and store rooms.

Not only at Coblenz are there grounds available for the soldiers; but at Andernach, Montabaur, and Neuwied the old grounds left by the A. E. F. have been taken over by the Y. M. C. A. and enlarged and remade in every particular.

Britons Build Biggest Plane.

The Tarrant Aircraft Construction company of Farnborough, England, has just finished building the biggest airplane in the world. It is a triplane, the middle plane of which is 131 feet wide. Above and below this are two planes, each 98 feet long. All these planes are 15 feet 2 inches deep. The body is 76 feet long (20 feet longer than the biggest biplane), and the height is 37 feet. The pilot's seat juts out 12 feet beyond the line of the planes. The body of the machine resembles a whale in length and girth, with a great blunt-ended nose. Between the planes are six Napier-Lion engines, each developing 500-horsepower. Four of them operate two-bladed tractor propellers; two of them four-bladed "pusher" propellers.

Jap Industry Hard Hit.

During the war the Japanese zinc industry was very prosperous and large profits were made on ore which was imported from Australia and the French Indies. The signing of the armistice, however, has dealt a hard blow to this industry, and it is reported that it costs \$200 a ton to produce Japanese zinc, while the market price is only \$187 a ton. It is expected that this will result in a request for subsidies and import protection, since the deposits of Japanese ore are of such inferior quality that competition with imported ore cannot be met successfully.

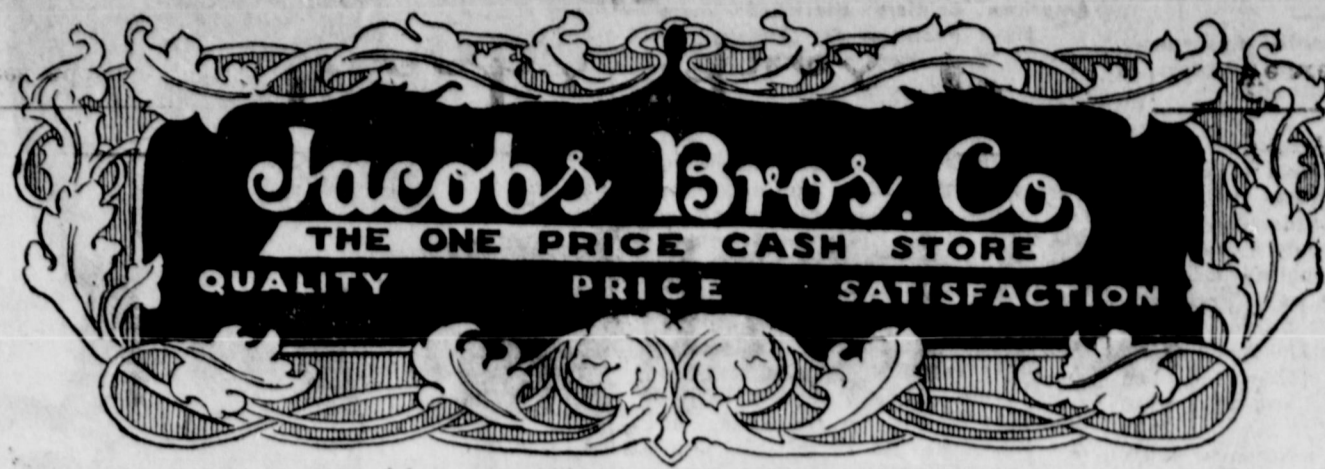
