full of flaws which badly need corfull of flaws which badly need corrected. Once guilt is admitted
and/or proven, the sentence should be carried out soon, not dragged out on legal technicalities year after year. There was no question about guilit in the Garret case.
Of course, anyone would have to
be crazy to kill another human be. ing. That doesn't make it okay! II you suffered from really bad abuse as a child, that doesn' make killing
okay either What abouthe the people okay either. What about the people are stronger in spite of it?
All of us need to be more awa of the abuse going on around us and make sure these things are brough to the attention of proper authorities. But there is a limit to blam-
ing good old mom and dad for the way you turned out.
sison percent of the criminals in prison have less than a seventhgrade education. Teachers and probably in a better position to se signs of physical or psychologica abuse than, say, neighbors o friends. This puts a pretty heavy
burden on our already overworked teachers, but perhaps the school ystems could work more closely
with social agencies in trying early o solve some of the problem life of crime.
Even then, we won't be able to save every child. There is such a thing as "bad seed." If the parents had bad genes and their parents had
bad genes, chances are little Johnny is going to get bad genes, too, and probably end up on death row.
Someone said that we in the Panhandle area have a penchant for executing our teenage criminals; state and country. I think we are simply sending a message to the young thugs out there that we will not tolerate their preying on the helpless and the elderly here like downstate.
What is a justice system that says if you kill a person in state A you'll get the death penalty but if only get 20 years, with parole in only get 20 years, with parole in
four. Is it less wrong to kill in state B than it is to kill in state A? The sentences handed down in our courts are just window dressing Seldom does anyone serve the ac
ual amount of time which wa tual amount of time which was
named in his or her sentence. If a person is going to get out in four years, then this should be brough out in trial, so the jurors
mmend a stiffer penalty.
I'm also sick of hearing that thi or that bit of evidence was not al lowed in the trial. If a person has been previously convicted on a simlar charge, the jury needs to know
about it. We've bent over backabout it. We've bent over back
wards to be fair for so long, that criminals now have the entire justice system in a stranglehold. I hope we never again spend two million dollars keeping a convicted

## Ginning，Harvest Continues On Area 1991 Cotton Crop

Area farmers and ginners are continuing to work on the 1991 cotton crop．Harvest and ginning of the crop has been delayed
considerably due the unusually wet spell of December and January．
＂We＇re probably about 75 per cent through，maybe more than that，＂said Jerry Butman，manager of the Friona Farmers Co－op Gin．Making the ginning process even later is the fact that the 1991 crop may be a record one．Butman said the Co－op had ginned 15,500 bales as of Thursday，February 13，and ould probably gin about 4,000 more．
Butman said he had ginned as late as March，and looking at another two to three weeks for the current crop，that might gain be a possibility． There are still several hundred acres of cotton still in the field and needing stripped．Farmers were able to make some eadway on week of dry，open weather Friday＇s high winds caused the gin to ire hazard with the tremendous amount of burrs piled the high Meanwhile，the cotton prices have dropped drastically since the early part of the harvest．Loan prices，which once were as high as 47 cents，are 27 to 35 cents per pound，Butman said． The cotton farmers are husting to frish their harvest，get their land ready for a new crop year and get their loans secured．
