"MY TURN"

MANY TEXAS WORKERS don't earn as much as \$18,000 per year but that's what we spend in a year to keep one convicted criminal in prison, or \$30,000 per year for a criminal on death row.

It cost the people of Texas two million dollars for the nine years that it took to get through the appeals process and finally do away with Garret, the young hoodlum who got his kicks by raping and murdering an elderly nun.

I thought it was significant that, even at the end, he never expressed any sorrow or remorse for what he had done. What a contrast, when you compare the Garrets of the world with the fine, wholesome, dedicated young people who were competing in the Olympic events in the Franch Alps this past week.

Our criminal justice system is full of flaws which badly need corrected. Once guilt is admitted and/or proven, the sentence should be carried out soon, not dragged out on legal technicalities year after year. There was no question about guilt in the Garret case.

Of course, anyone would have to be crazy to kill another human being. That doesn't make it okay! If you suffered from really bad abuse as a child, that doesn't make killing okay either. What about the people who overcome a bad childhood and are stronger in spite of it?

All of us need to be more aware of the abuse going on around us and make sure these things are brought to the attention of proper authorities. But there is a limit to blaming good old mom and dad for the way you turned out.

Sixty percent of the criminals in prison have less than a seventhgrade education. Teachers and counselors in the early grades are probably in a better position to see signs of physical or psychological abuse than, say, neighbors or friends. This puts a pretty heavy burden on our already overworked teachers, but perhaps the school systems could work more closely with social agencies in trying early to solve some of the problems which cause children to turn to a life of crime.

Even then, we won't be able to save every child. There is such a thing as "bad seed." If the parents had bad genes and their parents had bad genes, chances are little Johnny is going to get bad genes, too, and probably end up on death row.

Someone said that we in the Panhandle area have a penchant for executing our teenage criminals; more so than in other parts of the state and country. I think we are simply sending a message to the young thugs out there that we will not tolerate their preying on the helpless and the elderly here like they do in the big cities farther


downstate. What is a justice system that says if you kill a person in state A you'll get the death penalty but if you kill a person in state B you'll only get 20 years, with parole in four. Is it less wrong to kill in

state B than it is to kill in state A? The sentences handed down in our courts are just window dressing. Seldom does anyone serve the actual amount of time which was named in his or her sentence. If a person is going to get out in four years, then this should be brought out in trial, so the jurors can recommend a stiffer penalty.

I'm also sick of hearing that this or that bit of evidence was not allowed in the trial. If a person has been previously convicted on a similar charge, the jury needs to know about it. We've bent over backwards to be fair for so long, that criminals now have the entire justice system in a stranglehold.

I hope we never again spend two million dollars keeping a convicted sub-human butcher alive while there are poor, sick, hungry, homeless citizens who could certainly put that two million to better use.



team downed defending state champion Tulia, both boys and girls' teams still were in the running as the teams hosted Dimmitt Friday in their regular season-ending games.


The Squaws had the best chance--with the ability to control their own destiny as concerns bi-district.



# Friona Flashbacks

65 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 18, 1927 At least one local farmer and stock raiser, Mr. Floyd T. Schlenker, whose farm is 14 miles west of Friona, has met with success in his efforts to grow sweet clover on the Plains. Mr. Schlenker wished to grow some pasture for his registered spotted hogs, so he sowed his clover broadcast, and then planted it to oats with a disc drill. The oats came up first, then offered some protection for the clover, which followed. The hogs grazed the oats, and by the time they were all gone, the clover was large enough to furnish grazing for the rest of the season.

60 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 26, 1932 The street and highway committee of the Friona Chamber of Commerce was busy with a force of men, a tractor and grader Monday, relieving Main Street and a few of the other most used streets of the many bumps and chuck holes that had reappeared in them since they were last worked on.

In this issue of the Friona Star, will be seen the announcements by Clyde V. Goodwine of Friona and David W. Ray of Black, as candidates for the office of County Judge and Ex-officio Superintendent of the Schools of Parmer County.

50 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 20, 1942 American farmers are being asked to come to the nation's rescue in its need for scrap materials for war weapons, and the farmers of the Friona territory will have full opportunity to do their part. To meet this challenge, the farmers and businessmen of Friona have announced that they will operate in Friona a scrap collection depot to which farmers may bring all the scrap iron they can find on their farms. The metal brought to this depot will be sent as quickly as possible to factories and foundries to turn out tanks, guns and other war supplies.

45 Years Ago (Entire 1947 issue missing from Star files.)

40 Yrs. Ago--March 6, 1952 Construction is expected soon on the Farm-to-Market road extending from Oklahoma Lane 17.2 miles north through Bovina to the "cross roads" corner, with Bell, Braden, Barker and Gilvin, Amarillo construction firm, being awarded the contract. The firm's successful bid was in the amount of \$144,139. The job will include grading, all structures, bases and surfacing.

35 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 21, 1957 Kenneth Thompson of Dove Creek, Colorado, and a former resident of Parmer County, has been named the new manager of Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, according to G.B. "Pete" Buske, president of the hospital board. Buske made the announcement this week, and the change will become effective March 1. Thompson is to replace Jimmy Baxter, who has been manager for over four years, but is resigning to go into

"Bill" Millen, candidate for state representative, and Andy Rogers, state senator, were also present at the meeting. Although several of the men present had worked to secure passage of gas legislation during the past session, a considerable amount of discussion was devoted to the

25 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 23, 1967 The Floydada High School Whirlettes failed to be overwhelmed by a tremendous Friona opening quarter, and came back with three steady quarters to earn a 62-49 win over the Squaws and with it, the District 3-AA championship.

The strike against Missouri Beef Packers by the local Amalgamated Meat Cutters union was in its third week this week, although killing operations are continuing at the plant. A shooting incident near the gate to the plant late last Wednesday caused some emotion, but no further trouble has evolved.

"We will also add another shift at the plant, which will allow us to slaughter an additional 800-1,000 cattle per day," said MBPXL Corporation president Dave LaFleur.



### **Breast Screening** Here March 24-25

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination every month; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Tuesday, March 24 from 10 a.m. to 4:40 p.m. and Wednesday, March 25 from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital. Exams are done by appointment only. The clinic







# Chiefs, Squaws Take Wins Over Muleshoe

The F.H.S. Squaws kept their post-season playoff hopes in per-spective, and the surprising Chieftains rallied to keep their playoff hopes alive, as Friona scored a pair of district wins at Muleshoe Tuesday night.

The Squaws, possibly looking ahead to their confrontation on Friday with league-leading Dimmitt, held off the Mulettes, 40-34, although the game was much closer than the final score.

The Chieftains parlayed a perfect third quarter into a 73-55 win, to keep their second half mark at 3-1, after going 0-5 in the first half of district play.

The Squaws didn't play one of their better games, and with some eyebrow-raising calls, teamed to keep the game hairline close until the last 25 seconds of play.

Friona never trailed in the game, but enjoyed a comfortable lead only for a short time.

Renee' Downey's three pointer gave the Squaws their first lead 2:14 into the fray, and after Muleshoe scored for a 3-2 game, Alicia Widner sank a pair of free throws for a 5-2 Friona lead with 2:23 to play in the quarter, and Miss Downey's second bomb, which she banked in, made it 8-2.

Friona stole the ball and Mendi Milner drove for a layup and a 10-2 lead. The Squaws led 13-4 at the end of the quarter.

Misses Milner and Widner scored to keep Friona's nine point lead, and when Gena Willard made a layup off Miss Downey's assist, Friona had its longest lead at 20-10 with 1:36 left in the half.

But Muleshoe rallied on the shooting of Misty Davenport to trim Friona's lead to just five points, 20-15, at the half.

The Mulettes then scored the first five points of the third quarter, as Angie King canned a threepointer and Monica Clemmons tied the score at 20-all with 1:25 gone in the second half.

But Miss Widner, whose inside game was shut down much of the night, made a layup for a 22-20 Friona lead with 4:44 left in the quarter. The score would never be tied again, although the Squaws would never have much breathing

Littlefield rallied to trail by just two, 43-41, but Chad Hamilton's layup turned into a three-pointer and Friona had a 46-41 lead after three


Fouls began to get the Chieftains in trouble, as Littlefield came back to knot the score at 53all after Snead and Hamilton fouled out of the game.



We've continued to emphasize environmental preservation throughout our 25 years, and will devote even more resources in the future to helping cattle feeders preserve and protect our environment."





For the calendar year, Friona has now received a total of \$22,674.25 in sales tax rebates, up from the total of \$22,256.04 in two payments for the same period in 1991. This was a modest increase of 1.88 per

The month's sales tax rebates includes taxes collected by yearly, quarterly and monthly taxpayers.

"Texas' retail sales were better than the nation's as a whole during 1991, but the year was sluggish and the Christmas season just brought us more of the same," said State Comptroller John Sharp.


Checks to 1,066 Texas cities that collect the extra tax totaled \$163.4 million, an overall 1.8 per cent increase from last February, Sharp said.

This month's payments include taxes collected on December sales and reported in January by businesses filing monthly returns. February's rebates also reflect taxes reported by businesses filing quarterly returns for sales made in October, November and December.

#### Heart Month Theme: "What Every Generation Needs To Know"

Prevention is the best weapon against heart disease. February is American Heart Month and the American Heart Association. Parmer Division theme is, "What every generation needs to know." And the most potent prevention is knowing the risk.

"Diseases of the heart and blood vessels, including heart attack and stroke, are the leading causes of death in Texas," says Homer Lindeman, President. "Over 50,000 Texans each year die due to heart and blood vessel diseases."

Extensive studies have identified several factors that increase the risk of heart attack and stroke. No single risk factor causes heart disease. But the more risk factors you have, the greater your chances of developing it.

Some risk factors cannot be changed. For example, heart disease can be hereditary. African-Americans tend to develop heart and blood vessel diseases related to their increased risk of high blood pressure. And older people have a greater tendency toward heart disease.

But other risk factors can be changed. So focus on these:

\* Cigarette smoking--It's the most preventable cause of death and the most significant risk factor for heart attack. Cigarette smoking puts extra strain on and causes temporary changes to your heart. It also causes a shortage of oxygen to

your heart. So if you don't smoke, don't start. Quit if you do.

\* High blood pressure--Blood pressure is the force exerted by the heart when it pumps blood through the arteries. It's too high if you have a series of readings over 140/90. The first number, called systolic, is the pressure while your heart beats or contracts. The second, diastolic, is the pressure in the arteries while your heart is filling and resting between beats. Have your blood pressure checked often. You can help control it by eating a healthful diet, exercising regularly and limiting how much sodium you use. You also may need to take medication.

\* High blood cholesterol--Cholesterol is a fat-like substance found in human and animal tissue. The higher your blood cholesterol level, the more likely that fats and cholesterol will build up in your artery walls. This process is called atherosclerosis. It slows blood flow or blocks off blood vessels completely, causing either a heart attack or stroke. Maintain a cholesterol level set by your doctor. Generally, you should target a level below 200 mg/dl. You can help control your level by reducing cholesterol, total fat and saturated fatty acids in you diet, and by losing weight if necessary. You can reduce saturated fatty acids by eating less animal fat, coconut, palm, and palm kernel oils. And you can reduce cholesterol in your diet by eating less fatty meat, egg yolks and whole-milk dairy products. If you inherit high blood cholesterol, your doctor may prescribe cholesterollowering drugs.

\* Physical inactivity--It can lead to obesity and high blood eholesterol, which are risk factors for heart disease. Exercise alone can't prevent or cure heart attack or stroke. But it can help reduce your risk of developing them, and improve your chance of surviving them. So exercise aerobically 30 to 60 minutes at least three times per

\* Obesity--Even if you have no other risk factors, you're more than likely to develop heart disease and stroke if you're more than 30 percent over your ideal weight. That's because excess weight puts more strain on the heart. See your doctor to find out how much you should weigh. Then maintain your ideal weight by balancing your caloric intake with physical activity.

In addition to these preventable risk factors, the American Heart Association also encourages all generations to know the warning signs of a heart attack. The warning signs are: uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of the chest for more than two minutes; pain that spreads to the shoulders, neck and arms; severe pain, dizziness, fainting, sweating, nausea or shortness of

The American Heart Association works to reduce disability and death from cardiovascular diseases and stroke. The AHA's 3.2 million volunteers across the country are accomplishing that through public and professional education and by supporting vital cardiovascular research.

# Ginning, Harvest Continues On Area 1991 Cotton Crop

Area farmers and ginners are continuing to work on the 1991 cotton crop. Harvest and ginning of the crop has been delayed considerably due the unusually wet spell of December and January.

"We're probably about 75 per cent through, maybe more than that," said Jerry Butman, manager of the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin. Making the ginning process even later is the fact that the 1991 crop may be a record one. Butman said the Co-op had ginned 15,500 bales as of Thursday, February 13, and would probably gin about 4,000 more.

Butman said he had ginned as late as March, and looking at another two to three weeks for the current crop, that might again be a possibility.

There are still several hundred acres of cotton still in the field and needing stripped. Farmers were able to make some headway on the remaining cotton this week, but they need at least another week of dry, open weather.

Friday's high winds caused the gin to stop, due to the high fire hazard with the tremendous amount of burrs piled up.

Meanwhile, the cotton prices have dropped drastically since the early part of the harvest. Loan prices, which once were as high as 47 cents, are 27 to 35 cents per pound, Butman said.

The cotton farmers are hustling to finish their harvest, get their land ready for a new crop year and get their loans secured.



#### COMPUTERS WITHOUT STRAIN

More and more people today use computers for work and for playing games. And many of those people experience eyestrain, along with headaches and burning or itching eyes. This doesn't have to happen if you set up your video display terminal properly and use it with care. First step is to adjust the viewing angles. The top edge of the screen should be no higher than eye level as you sit, the bottom edge no lower than about 40 degrees below eye level. To control on-screen glare, shade nearby windows and direct lamps away from the screen. Screen hoods and antiglare filters will help. Adjust image brightness to avoid too much contrast with the surroundings. Take breaks. Rest your eyes by doing something else for 10 to 15 minutes -- once an hour after strenuous work periods, every two hours otherwise. Consult with your optometrist about glasses fitted with a middle-
