"MY TURN"

WE DON'T HATE RUSSIA any more. In fact, with the US economy in bad shape, we feel a lot of empathy with the Russian people who are going through hardships while their country is in the re-structuring process. Today, when things go wrong, we no longer say its a "Communist plot to destroy America!"

There must be some significance to the fact that we no sooner became friendly with Russia, than we suddenly got this big "Hate Japan" thing going. Various Japanese leaders have lately said tacky things about American workers such as "uncouth, pampered, lazy, uneducated, etc." This just adds fuel to the fire of American patriotism and now "Buy American" has become the battle cry!

Buying American is not quite as easy as it sounds. Every country on the globe today has some input in world trade and manufacture, as consumer products have become increasingly internationalized. The world has indeed become a smaller place. Many products which are labeled "Made in America" actually contain components which were made elsewhere. Plus in some cases, American made goods are shipped to other countries for assembly and US companies have large plants based elsewhere.

For instance, the Dodge Caravan is built in Canada and the Ford Festiva and Pontiac LeMans are assembled in South Korea. RCA televisions and Bic pens are made by companies based in France. Zenith TVs are made by a US based plant in Mexico. Burger King, Green Giant vegetables and Haagen-Dazs ice cream are made by British companies. Some GM cars are assembled in a California plant which is half-owned by Toyota.

While checking into some of these products, I was surprised to find that Tropicana orange juice is owned by a company in Canada, where there's nary a tropical orange tree in sight. For the most part, good old American blue jeans, are still "Made in America," as are most of the grooming products which we use everyday such as toothpaste, hair spray, shaving cream, etc. Some Caribbean countries assemble products with US raw materials for export back to the US. The Caribbean companies receive a break on import duties under US trade laws.

In order to remain competitive with Europe, the time is near when we will need to establish a North American common market with one monetary system for the US, Canada and Mexico. I'm glad to see that we are working toward a free trade agreement with Mexico as a step in that direction. Such an agreement would create a market estimated at 360 million consumers.

Yes, the Japanese are pretty good at making their little cars but we can do without them. We have become a "throw-away" society by depending on cheaply made junk from Japan, and this has had devastating effects on our environment. The attitude has been, "So what if it breaks. I'll just throw it away and buy another one." Remember those expensive toys you bought the kids for Christmas and they fell apart ten minutes after they were unwrapped? Most likely made in Japan.

Now that we are facing economic hard times, each item bought should be thought of as an investment in the future, something you'll pass on to your children someday. We can no longer afford to buy things that won't last or can't be repaired.

The USA has a few items which could be exported to Japan. Why don't we send them some of our finest labor leaders to form unions for improving difficult working conditions there? Since we seem to have more lawyers than we need, how about sending some of those to Japan along with some civil rights leaders. We also have some politicians who could probably solve all their internal problems. How about sending them Kennedy, Biden, Metzenbaum and company!

Friona High School graduate Michael James Murphy is kicking off a month of concert appearances during the month of March, which includes one in Friona on Monday, March 2.

The concert will be held at the Friona High School Auditorium, beginning at 7 p.m. Monday. Admission of \$2 will be charged.

Prior to Friona, Murphy had a concert in Dallas, along with record co-producer Gary Chapman, and was to perform at Indiana Avenue Baptist Church on Sunday, March 1.

Following Friona, he has appearances in Lufkin, and on the campuses of Stephen F. Austin University and Mary Hardin-Baylor University.

A resident of Nashville, Tennessee, for the past four years, Murphy joined Reunion Records last fall, and the company just this week released a new album for the Friona native, entitled, "Shoulder to the Wind."

His concert this week in Dallas was to co-incide with the release of the new album, and was in conjunction with a full band.

His wife, Laura, and daughter, Brittany, nine, are expected to accompany Michael on the first portion of his concert tour.

His current tour will include 12 to 15 dates and performances.

Murphy, who was active in football, speech and UIL events at FHS, says that the Reunion company plans to release another album for him in June, and it will be geared more toward the country music field.

Reunion Records plans to mold Michael into more of a country musician (which he says is the music he grew up with), much as they have another of their artists--Grammy award-winner Amy Grant.

The top single from his current album, entitled "Throne of Grace," is already on the top ten chart for Contemporary Christian music, and Murphy says "We're excited about that."

Murphy's father, Rev. C.H. Murphy, who is a former pastor of Friona's First Baptist Church, currently is pastoring First Baptist Church of Irving, and his mother, Nita, teaches English at an Irving junior high school.

Murphy has two brothers, both younger. Mark, the middle brother, is a plant manager for Trinity Industries at Beaumont, and builds railroad tanker cars.

His youngest brother, Ken, is a senior at Baylor University, and will attend Southwestern Baptist Seminary this fall, with an eye toward the pastoral field.


"I'm looking forward to being in Friona on Monday, as we have some fond memories of our days there," the young recording artist said.


The menu will consist of fried chicken, potatoes, gravy, green beans, salad, dessert, iced tea and coffee.

Star Beats Odds On "February 29"

Today's date on the Friona Star--February 29--will probably not be repeated until the year 2020. At least, that's the next time that "Leap Day" will fall on a Saturday.

For a weekly newspaper, the odds of having its issue published on February 29 is 28-1, or .0357 per cent of the time.

However, the Friona Star and publisher Bill Ellis beat the odds somewhat.

This is the third time for the Star to carry the unusual February 29th dateline in the past 24 years.

Ordinarily, it would take 84 years for a weekly newspaper to have its turn at three "Leap Day" dates of February 29, and the publisher would have to have had excellent health and a long run at the helm to accomplish the feat.

But the fact that the Friona Star has changed its publication date a couple of times in the past 19 years increased its odds, and allowed publisher Ellis the chance to edit three editions with the unusual date. And if you count the fact that he also publishes the Bovina Blade, which also carries the February 29 date today--that makes four.

After going almost 43 years from its inception without a February 29 dateline, the Star had its first one during the leap year of 1968. That was Ellis' eighth year at the helm.

In 1973, after Ellis purchased the Bovina Blade, the Star's dateline was changed to Sunday, and on February 29, 1976--the Bicentennial Year--the Star celebrated its second "Leap Day" publication date within an eight-year period. Normally, these dates would be 28 years apart--if the publication day remained the same.

A few years later, it was decided to change the Star's dateline to Saturday, since that's when all the local readers have their papers, and as a result, today's issue and February 29th dateline sprang up, 12 years earlier than if the Sunday date had been retained.

The Friona Star began publication on July 25, 1925, and for the first 25 years or so, its editions bore a Friday dateline. Then, in August of 1950, the dateline was changed to Thursday. That change postponed the newspaper's first-ever February 29 edition, which would have occurred in 1952, to the 1968 edition.

So--happy Leap Year to our readers! And to our weekly advertisers--don't panic. Your bill for February will be about 25% higher than it is most Februaries. But it won't happen again until 2020--the year, not the program.

Early Voting Set For City

Early voting by personal appearance for the March 10 primary elections will be made possible at the County Clerk's Office in Farwell through March 6 during office hours.

A special early voting booth will be held in Friona at the Friona Credit Union, during their office hours, 9 a.m.-4 p.m. on March 4 and at the Bovina City Hall on March 3.

Voters may also request a ballot by mail by writing to County Clerk Bonnie Warren in Farwell.

He married Bertha Shebbhate October 3, 1967, in Hereford.


Lloyd worked as a custodian for the Friona School system for 38 years before his retirement. He was a member of Calvary Baptist Church.

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

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
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Frionan's Album Draws From Family Background



MICHAEL JAMES

Texas-bred Michael James is as comfortable behind a plow as he is centerstage. On his debut Reunion release, **SHOULDER TO THE WIND**, he draws upon his experiences sowing cotton, herding cattle and watching his dad and grandfather take the seeds of truth they learned out on the field and translate them into nuggets of wisdom from the pulpit.

"Hand to the Plow" is one of the most autobiographical songs on the album. "It talks about how my granddad poured the things of life, like plowing a cotton field, into teaching my dad to keep his 'hand to the plow' and his eyes out in front of him," says Michael. "He said your rows would get crooked and messed up if you looked behind you. The things that my dad learned as a child carried over to his ministry to farmers and ranchers going through hard times."

Two generations later, Michael's heritage of faith is reflected in his songs of encouragement to the families of the 90s. The man in the cowboy hat with the easygoing manner and slow Texas drawl proves that the truest art comes from the fabric of everyday life in **SHOULDER TO THE WIND**, a country-flavored acoustic pop release that addresses the real-life experience of a family man.

"Every song on this record is something I had to walk through," says Michael, who has also written

songs recorded by aware-winning country acts Lee Greenwood ("Love Lying Next To Me") and Highway 101 ("Storm of Love.") "I believe the reality of Christ is the reality of our lives. As believers, just as Jesus hung with people and spent time with them, sharing a piece of our lives with people is the best way to share Christ with them."

Born March 5, 1959 in Matador, Texas, which he quotes *Texas Monthly* as calling "one of the last remaining truly Western towns," Michael says the place where he was born actually resembled Doc Adam's upstairs office in *Gunsmoke*. The entire birth cost his parents a mere \$15. Two days later, he miraculously survived a near fatal bout with pneumonia.

By third grade, music had gotten its hold on Michael. He began taking piano lessons and picked up the guitar in sixth grade. By high school, he was singing in church youth choir when he wasn't playing football or riding a tractor. He also began writing songs, often revising the music of the songs in his church hymnal into an acoustic/pop sound resembling that of his favorite group, the Eagles.

During his senior year in high school, Michael met a gospel singing group on a ski retreat and was offered a summer job as their guitarist. He returned to school in the fall to attend Hardin-Simmons

University in Abilene on a vocal scholarship and met two of the most important people in his life: his wife, Laura, and his college roommate and frequent songwriting partner, Bobby Price. He and Bobby wrote their first song together on the day they met and also began performing together. They have since collaborated on most of the songs Michael has recorded.

His initial recording success was bittersweet. Michael toured with established contemporary Christian artists and even scored a #2 hit with "Believers" on Christian radio. Yet he felt the musical style was too contemporary and he longed to record an album of songs that reflected the country and acoustic pop music he'd grown up listening to.

The next few years were full of highs and lows. The birth of a daughter, Brittany, in the face of doctors saying children were not a possibility for the couple, came hand in hand with Michael putting his growing career in the hands of a trusted friend and finding himself in the depths of financial ruin. All of this shaped the scope of Michael's character and gave him the courage to return to his own musical roots.

"I began to realize it was important for me to sing honestly about what was going on in my life--the bad as well as the good," relates Michael. "The hard times helped me to see God as a healer and a Father. It felt like He was telling me to be myself rather than an imitation of something I wasn't. I started crying out to God that I wanted to be real before Him. I asked him to make me the kind of husband and father he wanted me to be...to truly love my wife, to understand the power of prayer and to be a spiritual blessing to my children."

His songs began to reflect the lessons he'd learned and the music became what he'd wanted it to be all along. "It was as if God was say-

Rains Put Damper On Texas Forest Fires During 1991

Excessive rain caused its share of trouble in 1991, but frequent downpours also put a damper on forest fires.

Soaked with almost 74 inches of rain last year, forests in East Texas suffered the fewest fires in almost two decades.

The Texas Forest Service, which has tallied fire reports since 1925, counted 998 fires in 1991, down from 1,522 the previous year. The record number of forest fires for the state was more than 7,800 in 1936.

"The light year for forest fires has a lot to do with the rainfall pattern," said Bruce Miles, Texas Forest Service director. "Normally, we have 2,500-3,000 fires a year."

The forest fire report includes some 22 million protected acres, about one-half of which is forested, Miles said.

Though the number of fires decreased, Miles noted, the average fire claimed 19.5 acres for a total loss of more than 19,000 acres. And the two major causes for fire remain the same: burning debris and arson.

"Probably 70 per cent of the fires each year stem from these two causes," he said. Indeed, more than 500 of the year's forest fires were attributed to burning debris and 300 involved arson.

"Debris burning usually is the number one cause," Miles said. "That includes everything from burning trash behind a house to burning off a garden spot or spreading fireplace ashes."

"Arson is often associated with land-use disputes in hunting situations," he said.

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
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Gossip Is Tricky!

SEEING SIDEWAYS

There are two parts to vision: central vision, with which you look directly at objects and peripheral vision, which enables you to be aware of what exists on either side. People are more aware of central vision; we use it consciously to read a book, say, or watch TV. But peripheral vision is important to locate us in our surroundings. Without it, it would be difficult to walk down stairs, hazardous to drive a car. In a professional eye examination, your optometrist will check both your central and peripheral vision. Loss of either type of vision that is uncorrectable is generally an indication of disease. Peripheral vision is damaged by uncontrolled glaucoma, which is yet another reason for regular glaucoma testing after age 55, to spot the disease while it can be contained. Central vision is affected by degeneration of the macula, the central part of the retina. Other diseases affect the eyes, too.

An Estate Plan Protects Your Heirs From Unnecessary Taxes

Each year thousands of people who have worked hard and invested wisely lose half or more of their estates to various state and local taxes. Unfortunately, the tragedy of poor estate planning is not limited only to the uninformed. William H. Myers, Jr., a Naples, Fla., attorney writing for the *Wall Street Journal*, found that 65 per cent of executives questioned in a nationwide survey have no estate plan. Why?

Misunderstanding of what makes an estate plan could be a major reason. "Many executives think a will is sufficient," says Myers. "Others naively claim they have plenty of life insurance." Wills and life insurance are part of an estate plan, but they are not the entire plan. The purpose of an estate plan is simply to distribute your assets after death to the people and organizations you designated. How you do this constitutes your estate plan.

Myers suggests that an effective estate plan must answer three questions: "Whom or what do you want to benefit? What are the best means to pass your assets to your beneficiaries? And, what are the tax consequences of your actions, and how can you minimize them?"

Tax laws frequently change, so it is recommended that you find an at-

torney who specializes in estate planning. If you intend to change your state of residence after you retire, your attorney should be familiar with that state's probate, income, gift and estate tax laws in addition to the federal laws.

Once you select an attorney, it is necessary to list all your assets. Your bank or financial adviser can help you prepare this financial statement. It should include real estate, securities, bank accounts, retirement funds, insurance and all other assets of value. To this list add your liabilities, debts and obligations. Finally, write down how you want all these assets divided. Be specific as to names, organizations, amounts and anything else you wish to add. Remember, the purpose of this plan is to distribute your wealth as you wish and not leave it to the discretion of the state.

With this information, your estate attorney can put your wishes into proper legal language and advise you if there are any problems. A knowledgeable attorney working with you and your financial adviser can be invaluable in protecting your estate from unnecessary tax liabilities.

For many people, estate planning is a project often put off until tomorrow. The problem with procrastinating, however, is that half your estate could be lost to federal estate taxes.

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
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
