"MY TURN"

STETSONS OFF to our neighbor city of Muleshoe for landing Governor Ann Richards as the keynote speaker at their annual Chamber of Commerce banquet last Friday evening. What a coup!

This was probably the only time that the Governor will make a scheduled public appearance in a city smaller than 5,000 except for possibly some quick stops on a campaign tour for re-election.

Muleshoe's pioneer businessman, Harvey Bass, as chairman of Muleshoe Activities Committee, was one of the civic leaders who was instrumental in bringing the Governor to this part of the state. Harvey, by the way, is an uncle of Friona's own Bernie Gowens.

Bailey County Commissioner Bennie Claunch grew up in the Hill Country of Texas and is a personal friend of the Governor's family. He also played a large part in convincing the Governor to come to Muleshoe.

Dignitaries from around the state were among the 1,200 folks who crowded into the Muleshoe Community Center for the affair. Former Governor Preston Smith, Senators Teel Bivens and John Montford were there, as were U.S. Representative Bill Sarpalus, and State Rep. Pete Laney, who missed seeing his son in a regional basketball playoff game to attend the banquet. By the way, Hale Center won the game that Laney missed, but lost out in their bid for the state tourney on Saturday.

County officials came from as far away as Post. Our Parmer County elected officials were noticeable mainly by their absence, though I did see District Judge Jack Young and District Attorney Johnny Atkinson among the crowd.

Members of "The Press" were invited to come early for a sort of informal press conference, in which we would get to ask the Governor a few questions prior to the banquet. We all stood around on one foot for about two hours with cameras focused on the door. Well, of course, she got there really late and then stopped off at Joe's Boot Shop to buy some boots for her pal, Railroad Commission member Lena Guerrero.

Anyway when the Governor finally arrived, very late, there was only time for her to sign the guest register, answer about two questions, make a mad dash to the ladies' room (I thought the television people were going right on in there with her) and then she was rushed into the banquet scene. I, being a pushy old broad myself, elbowed my way up close to the front when she first came in and she shook my hand and told me how glad she was to be there. I guess she naturally assumed that I was one of the welcoming committee. I was pretty tickled about that.

She is a warm, friendly "folksy" person with a magnetic personality and said she would come see us in the Panhandle more often if it didn't take so long to get here and back. (Approximately 475 miles from here to Austin.) She is a good speaker and really held the attention of the audience, starting out with some amusing stories about how she got started in the political scene as a county commissioner. Regarding our current economic woes, she passed the buck on to the federal government's tangled web of policies and regulations. And we all know what she thinks of President George!

My friend Doyle Cummings says "The only reason we have a president is so that we can have somebody to blame things on when they go wrong."

Regional columnist David Stevens who writes "Plain Spoken" for the Sunday Amarillo News-Globe, was speculating in his March 1 column as to whether Governor Ann would attend the banquet dressed in Muleshoe's black and white or would she wear her usual Friona Chieftain red. Well, guess what! She wore red. I was pretty tickled about that, too.

LARGE CROWD ATTENDS

Governor Richards Is Big Hit At Muleshoe Banquet

Governor Ann Richards assured the capacity crowd attending the "Biggest Little Banquet in Texas" last Friday at Muleshoe that although they live a long way from Austin, that they still have some political clout with her.

"I know you feel that you don't have much clout here in West Texas, but you do. I hear the same thing at El Paso, Brownsville and Texarkana," the governor said. "But I would come out here more often, if it just didn't take so long to get here," she added.

Having grown up in a small community herself--Lakeview, which has been swallowed up by Waco, she said "Deep down in my soul, I'm still just a good 'ole girl from Lakeview. And the action may be in Austin, but the heart and soul of Texas is where it's always been--in places like Muleshoe," Richards proclaimed.

Governor Richards praised the work of the area's lawmakers, most of whom were in attendance, such as state representatives Pete Laney of Hale Center and Delwin Jones of

Candidate applications for board places may be picked up at Parmer County Community Hospital business office between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday of each week.

Any person wishing to have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate for director must file an application with the secretary of the board of directors not later than Tuesday, March 31 at 5 p.m.

To be eligible as a candidate for director, the person must be a resident of the district and a qualified voter. An employee of the district may not serve as a director.

Y'Win Some, Y'Lose Some --- Election Results Told

Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector Doris Herington defeated Bob Stafford in the first defense of her office, but longtime Friona Commissioner Ernest Anthony lost out to first-time challenger John Mars in somewhat of an upset, during Tuesday's Democratic Primary.

Mrs. Herington received 617 votes, to 450 for Stafford. Stafford won just two precincts--Bovina's 201, with 142 votes to 66, and Friona's precinct 202, with 33 votes to Herington's 31. Herington won Friona's precinct 101, 188-100, and Farwell's 301 (courthouse), 152-65.

Mars downed Anthony, who is serving his fourth term as commissioner, 175-162. He won Tuesday's vote, all conducted at Friona 101 precinct, 158-152, and led the early voting, 17-10.

County voters went overwhelmingly for Bill Clinton in the Democratic presidential primary with 627 votes. Paul Tsongas finished a distant second with 209 votes.

In the Railroad Commission race, Lena Guerrero led the voting with 359 votes to 295 for David Young. Mrs. Guerrero was appointed to the position by Governor Richards, and is making her first statewide race.

Morris Overstreet of Amarillo was favored in the Place 2 Court of Criminal Appeals race, 630-282 over Gene Kelly, and Charlie Baird

was favored in the Place 1 race by county voters, 517-231 over Sam Paxson.

In the Republican primary, challenger Pat Buchanan received 39 per cent of the vote, and won the vote at Farwell, 27-26 and at Lazbuddie, 17-16. Bush won the county vote, 139-95, winning at Friona 64-40 and at Bovina, 19-9.

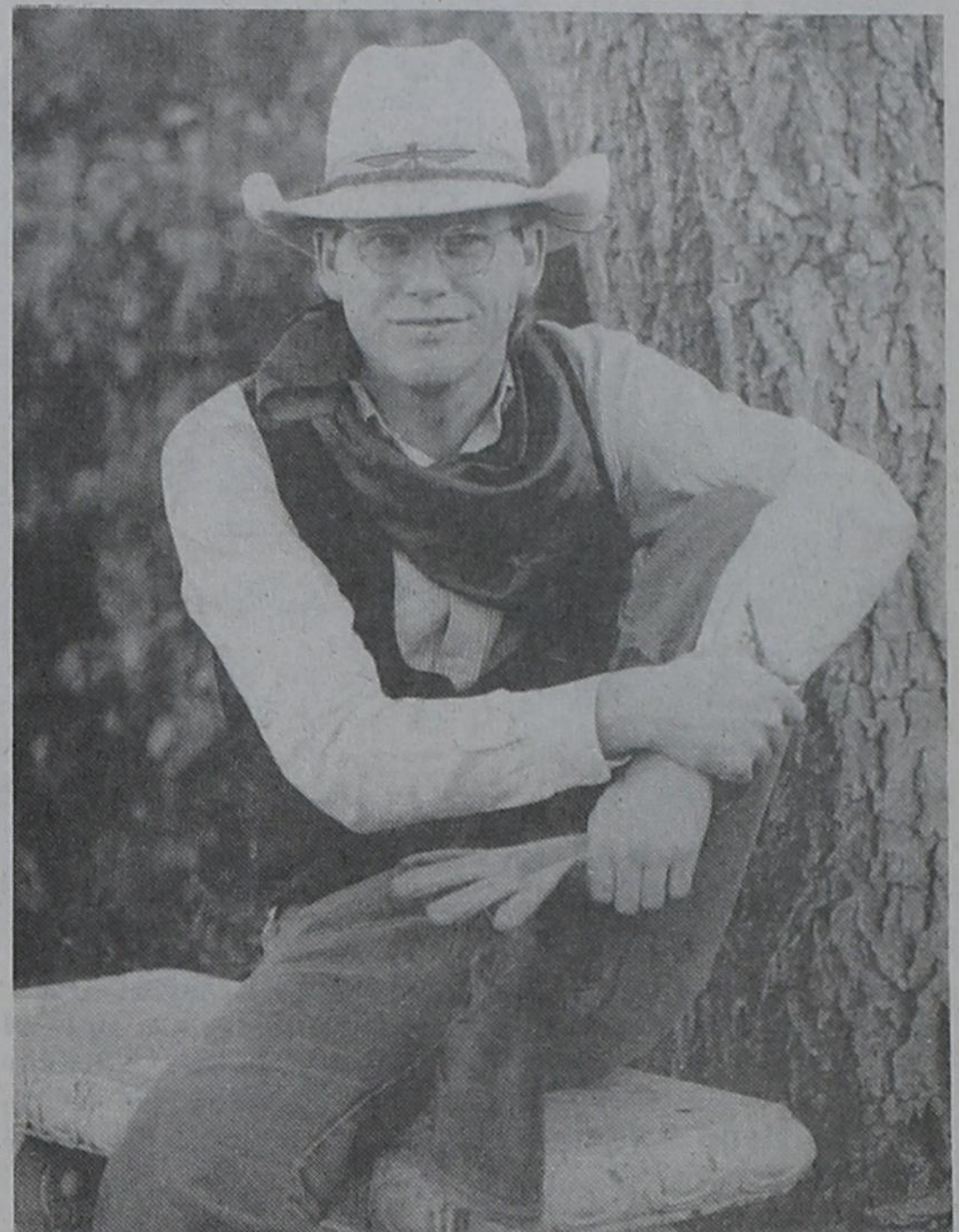
County Republicans favored Barry Williamson in the Railroad Commission race, 123-64 over Carole Rylander.

In the Supreme Court justice race, Place 3, John D. Montgomery polled 106 votes to George Barbary's 52.

In the Court of Criminal Appeals Race, Place 1, Joseph Devaney received 111 votes, Lagarde 89 and Jim Vollers 50.

In the Supreme Court justice, Place 1, Craig Enoch received 91 votes to 89 for Charles Ben Howell.

A total of 1,034 voted in the Democratic primary, to 238 in the Republican primary. Democratic turnout was as follows: Precinct 101--313; 201--214; 202--65; 203--32; 301--222; 302--63; 303--24; 401--53; 402--53; Early votes--48. Total--1034. Republican turnout was: Friona 105; Bovina 30; Farwell 53; Lazbuddie 33; Early, 17; Total--238.

Ex-Resident Publishes Genealogical History

Former Friona resident Omer Edward Hyde has published a book, "Some Hyde American Pioneers," which emphasizes the Christian roots of the Hyde family through ten generations.

Hyde, born March 14, 1920 in Walters, Oklahoma, to Homer A. and Mae Hyde, graduated as salutatorian of Friona High School in 1937, and was valedictorian of his class at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, in 1941. He also received the Julius Olsen Medal of Honor from H-SU.

Omer received his ThM from Southwestern Baptist Seminary, Fort Worth. He was ordained by First Baptist Church, Friona, at age 17. He pastored churches in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Vancouver, B.C., Canada and Oregon before becoming area missionary serving Washington and Oregon.

The four children of the H.A. Hydies grew up in Friona, attended Friona schools, and were members of First Baptist Church. They are Omer, Maxine Bolding, Eva Dean Kimbrough and Truell Wayne Hyde. Mr. and Mrs. Hyde became charter members of Calvary Baptist Church, which was founded in 1961.

Omer Hyde donated copies of his book to the libraries at First Baptist Church and Calvary Baptist Church, in memory of his parents. Omer and his wife Neva live in Eugene, Oregon.

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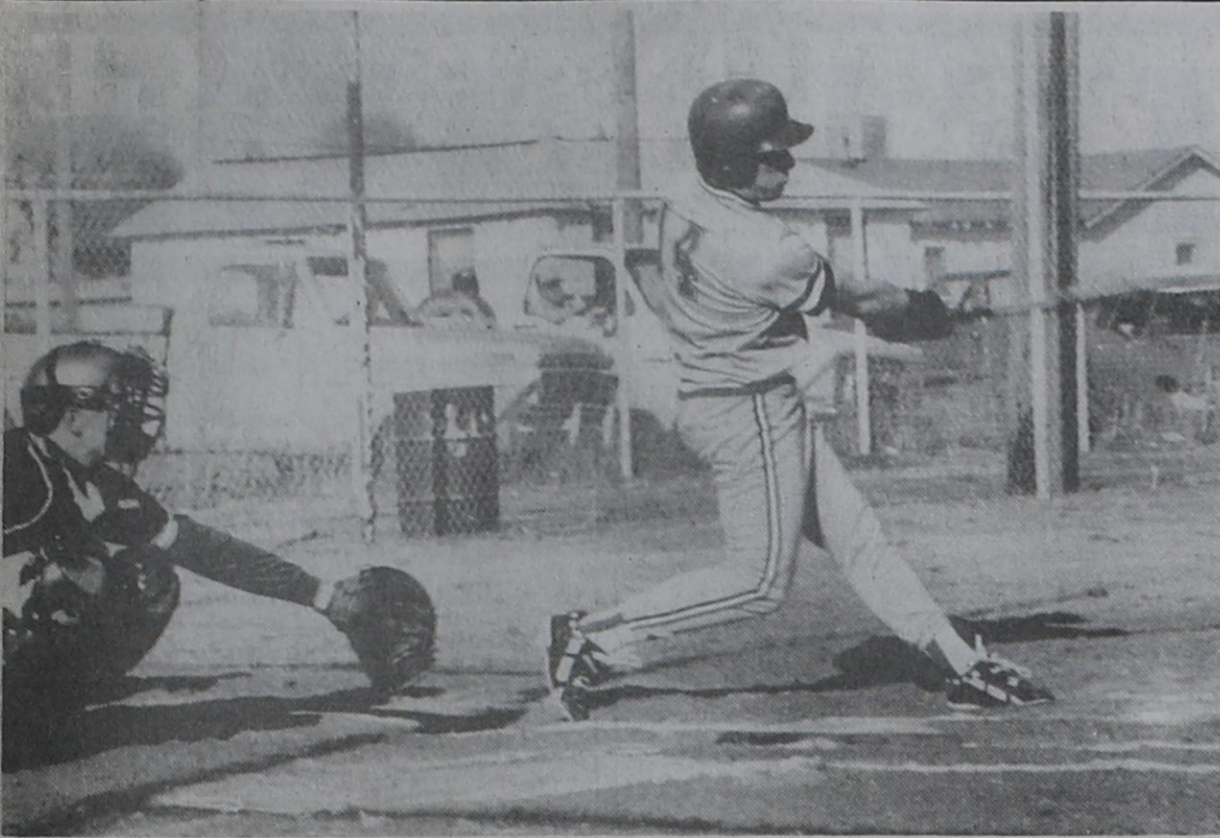

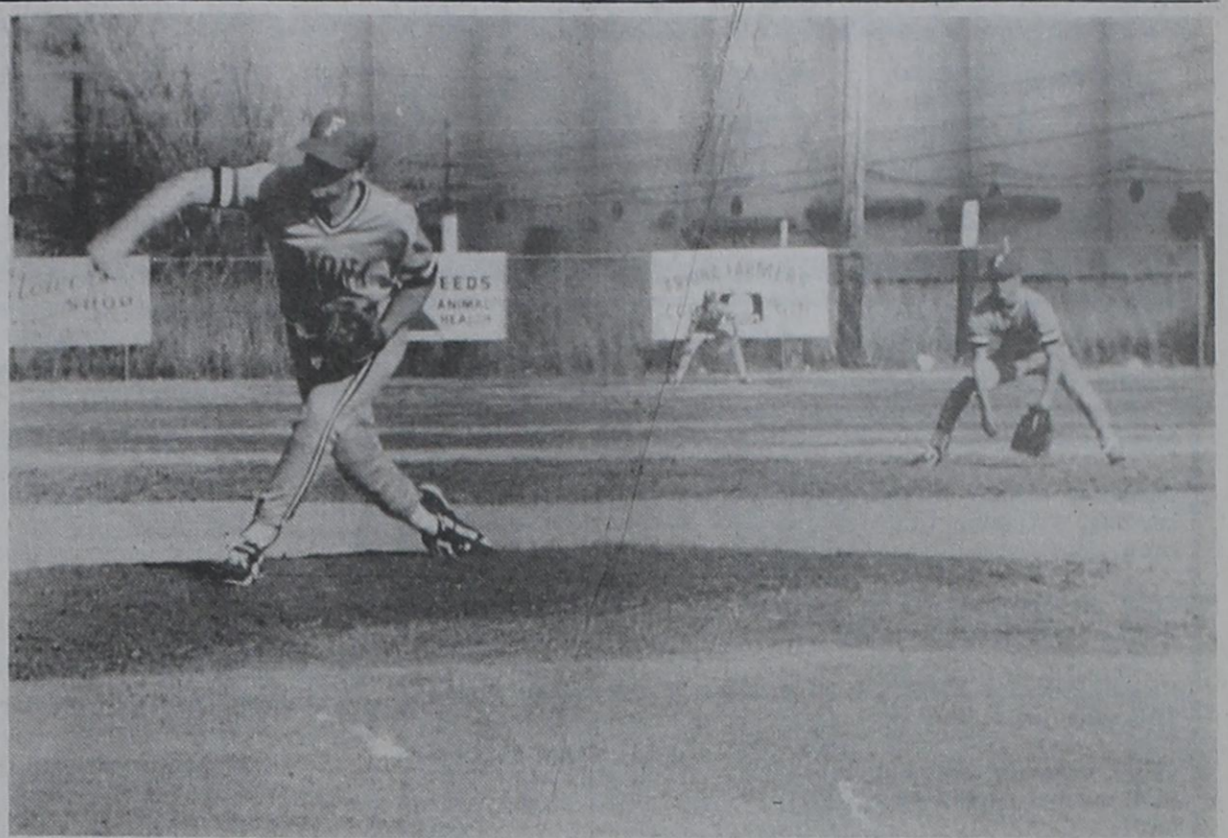

A senior, junior and sophomore led the Friona Squaws major statistical departments this week, in figures compiled by Squaw Coach Shirlene Lilley.

Perhaps by no coincidence, these were the three Friona players selected to the 10-girl All-District team: Alicia Widner, Mendi Milner and Renee Downey.

Miss Widner, the senior mentioned, was the team's leading scorer with 525 points and a 15.9 points-per-game average. She led in two-point goal shooting, hitting 189 of 332 attempts, 57 per cent, and in free throw shooting, with 138 of 191, 72 per cent.

Sophomore Renee Downey led the team in three-point field goal shooting, hitting 38 of 83 attempts, a sizzling 38 per cent. She hit 43 per cent of her two-point goal attempts, for an overall percentage of 40. Miss Downey also led the team in assists (passes leading directly to scores) with 131, and was the only player to top the 100-mark in this category. Gena Willard was next with 95.

Miss Downey scored 404 points, second on the team with a 12.2 point average.

Miss Milner, the junior, was third in scoring with 190 points. She hit 70 per cent from the foul line, 53 of 76, led the team in blocked shots with 48, and was second in rebounds with 128.

Miss Widner also led the team in rebounds, getting 129 on offense and 152 on defense, a total of 281.

Since the Squaws had a "short bench," the playing time category was revealing.

Three players saw over 800 minutes of playing time. Miss Widner led with 968 minutes, averaging about 29.3 minutes per game. That means she only got to sit out an average of 2.7 minutes per game.

Miss Downey played 880 minutes, averaging 26.6 minutes per game, or 5.4 minutes per game on the bench. Miss Milner played 818 minutes, 24.8 minutes per game. The "bench time" could be adjusted slightly, since overtime games' extra clock time are not taken into consideration for the averages.

The Squaws won 21 games and lost 12, and were 8-2 in district play, capturing the runnerup title and a playoff spot for the first time at FHS in five years.

They had the bad luck of drawing eventual state champion Canyon in their bi-district game.

Chieftain Track Team Sees Action

The Friona Chieftain tracksters have seen action in a pair of meets already. The varsity competed at River Road on February 29.

Blair Burney was second in the high jump at 6-4. Curtis Brady placed sixth in the long jump at 19-11.

The 1600-meter relay (Brady, Riethmayer, Harvey Martinez and Paco Reyes) placed fourth in 3:42. Harvey Martinez placed second in the 800 meters in 2:10.

The junior varsity had firsts from the 400 and 1600-meter relay teams. Members of both foursomes were Juan Gamboa, David Gonzales, Steven Ortiz and Juan Rivera). They won the 400 in 46.6 and the mile in 3:48.

Rivera also won the 100-meters in 11.97, and Gonzales placed second in 11.99. Gamboa placed fifth in the 200-meter dash, and Efrain Santiago was second in the 3200 meters with a time of 11:40.

Antonio Rocha placed fourth in the 1600 meters, and Herman Chavez placed fourth in the 3200. Jerrard Lafuente placed third in the 800 meters in 2:26 and third in the high jump at 5-6.

The varsity also competed at Floydada on March 7, and scored 75 points.

Burney got a win in the high jump, again clearing six feet, four inches. The team got 17 points in the high jump event, as Brian Herring placed third at 5-10, and Kelly Jack was sixth at 5-8.

Curtis Brady placed fourth in the long jump at 20-1. Michael Cole was third in the 200-meter dash in 23.7, and fourth in the 100 in 11.5. Friona's 1600-meter relay team (Brady, Corbin Riethmayer, Ismael Rocha and Martinez), were third.

Martinez placed second in the 800-meter run in 2:12, and Rocha was fifth in the 100 at 11.6 and fourth in the 200 in a time of 23.9.

The Chiefs see action at Muleshoe this Saturday, before hosting their own meet March 21.

Chieftain Baseball Team Tops 'Cats, Eagles, Indians

The Friona Chieftain baseball team, after dropping their first two games of the season to the Clovis Junior Varsity, have won three games in a row during the past week to post a 3-2 season record.

The team had lost, 3-1, and 7-6 to the Wildcat JV in their first two games. A four-run third inning by the Wildcats staked them to a 5-2 lead in the second game of the series, and they held on for the one-run win.

Britt Conklin had a pair of hits for the Chiefs; Cory Hamilton, Julian Colunga, Roy Hendley and Scott Houston each had hits.

The Chieftains hosted River Road last Friday evening. The team was holding onto a 5-3 lead when they batted in the fifth inning. The Chiefs scored three more runs in the fifth, to salt away the win, 8-3.

Julian Colunga went two for four for the Chieftain batters. Scott Houston socked a home run. Scott Houston, Blue Field, and Seth Houston had the runs-batted-in.

The team went to Morton on Monday, March 9 and came home with a 16-2 win over the Indians. Friona batted around in the first inning, scoring seven runs. Colunga, Seth

Houston, and Chad Hamilton all rapped out three hits apiece. Field and Junior Trevino had two apiece.

Field had a pair of doubles and three RBIs. Seth Houston had four RBIs. Cody Simmons and Roy Hendley had the other RBIs. The game was called due to the 10-run rule.

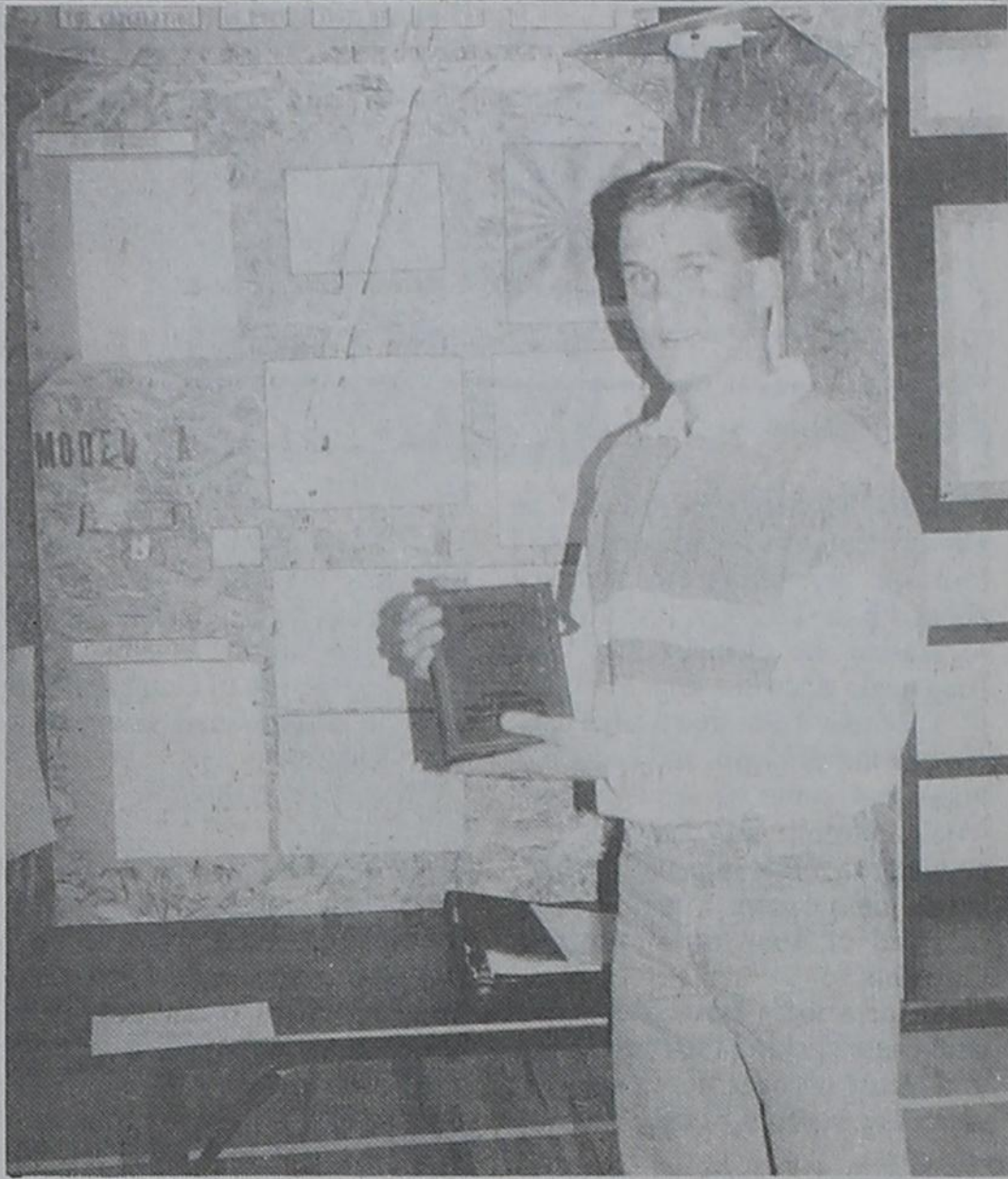

Ann Richards, Del Rio, Mars, Y La Policia

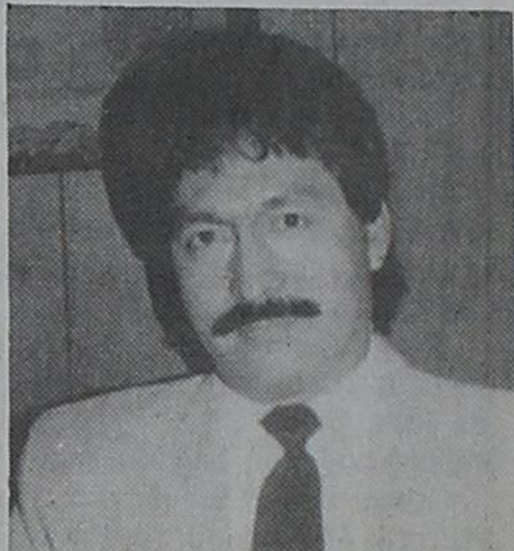

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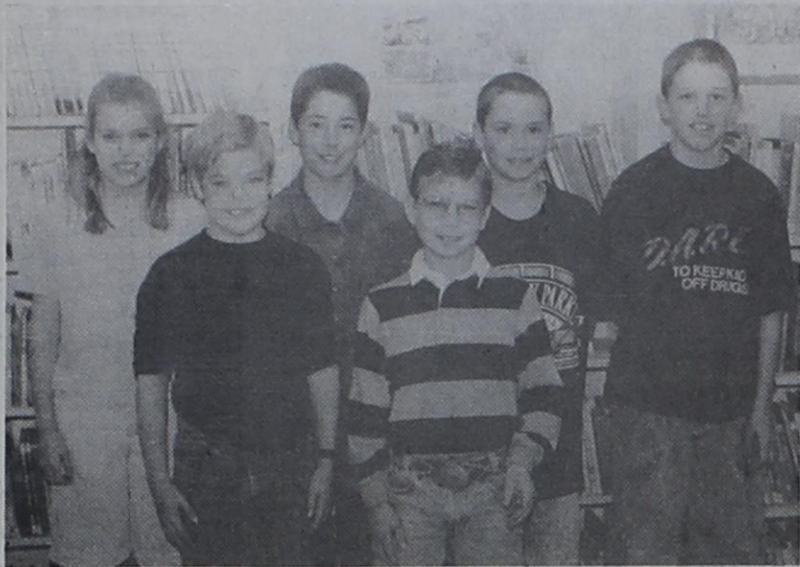

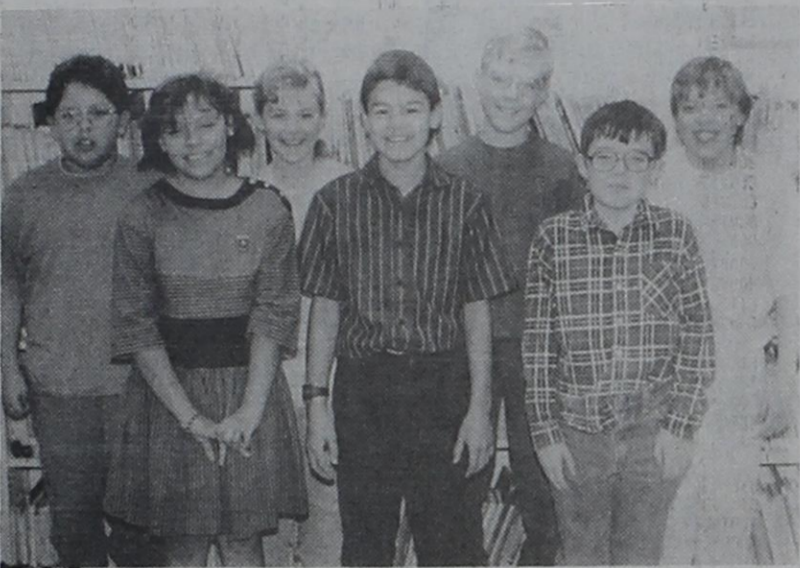

Selecting An Investment Professional

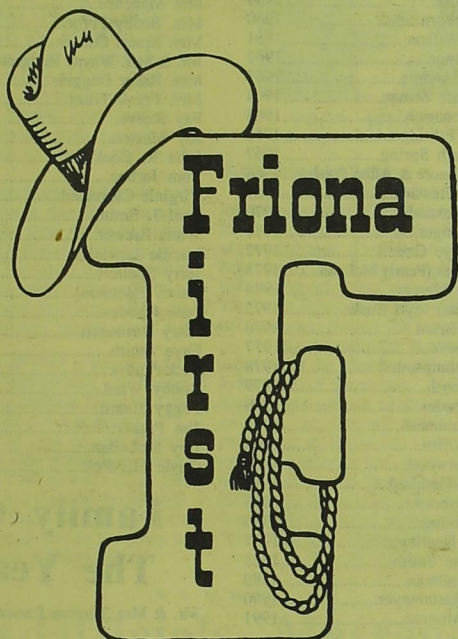

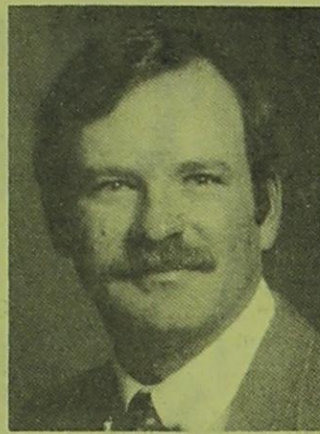
President's Message

Stan Cobb of Spearman, also known as "Cowboy Jack," is the 1992 speaker for the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet.

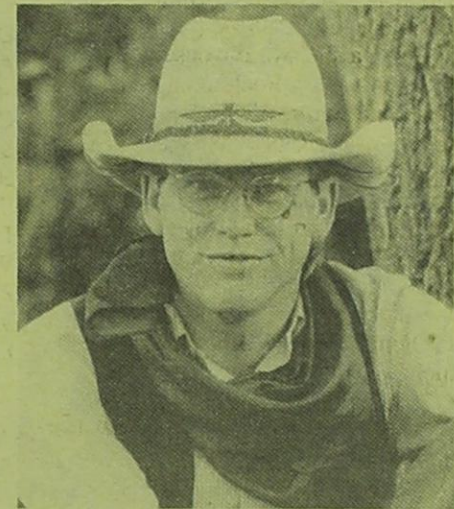
Cobb has been featured on radio, TV, in newspaper and magazine articles, and is active in Cowboy Poetry gatherings.

He served as an emcee and poet at the National Cowboy Poetry Symposium and Celebration. What Does It Do?

The local chamber usually is affiliated with the National Chamber and the State Chamber....and, as such, takes an active part and has a voice in the development of national and state policies.

What Is A Chamber?

Basically, it is the business community at work as the central agency for community development for business, industry, the professions and all civic interests--doing jobs that no individual can do alone--rendering many services that benefit all citizens.

The Chamber of Commerce, as a wholly voluntary institution in the United States, is eight years older than the Declaration of Independence. The New York Chamber, first in America, was organized in 1768, and five years later, the first local Chamber was formed in Charleston, South Carolina.

Chambers of Commerce have steadily developed to a high point of efficiency and have proven vitally important in business and civic development throughout the nation.
