## TEXAS CAN BE DIVIDED INTO FIVE REGULAR STATES

INTERESTING FACTS THAT FEW CITIZENS OF THE STATE ARE ACQUAINTED WITH

Division of Texas into two States. ne to be known as the State of West Texas, can be brought about under he treaty provisions under which Texas was admitted to the Federal Union, but the process will be long and tedious in performance. It also will aught with many constitutional ques ions, and will even involve internation: law, inasmuch as the treaty of 1845, under which Texas came into the United States of America as a state, is a treaty duly executed between two independent republics-the United States of Amerca and the Republic of Texas.

It is upon the basis oft his treaty hat the people of West Texas would ndeavor to get stathood.

Treaty of 1845 Although the treaty was not writen by diplomats sitting in conference, it is known as the treatry under which the Republic of Texas became a state in the American Union. The treaty is a point resolution adopted by the Constitution of the United Atates February 28, 1845, and it was approved by President Polk, whose election came after a campaign in which the annexation of Texas was one of the principal issues and during which Polk advocated annexation, on March 1. The terms of the treaty were areed to by the Congress of Texas June 18, and by a convention at Austin on July 4. Thus, the American Independence Day has a dual meaning to Texas.

Division of Texas is discussed in Section Third, of Article Two of that resolution. That section follows:

"Third-New states of convenient size, not exceeding four in number, in addition to said State of Texas, and having sufficient population, may hereafter, by consent of said state, e formed out of the territory theror, which shall be entitled toadmission under the provisions of the Federal Constitution. And such states as may be formed out of that portion of said territory lying south of thirty-sir degrees thifty minutes northlatitude, commonly known as the Missouri compromise line, shall be admitted into the Union with or without slavery. as the people of the state asking adnission may desire. And in such state or states as shall be formed out of said territory north of said Missouri compromise line, slavery, or in- extent of slave territory, Texas hav- be optional in states formed south of voluntary servitude, (except for crime), shall be prohibited."

Two Issues Presented

The outstanding issues presented this article, in regard to the divin of Texas, are two: First, that he division of Texas may be brought about only by the consent of the state and second that the division of the state and the admission of the new stat into the Union, must be "under the provisions of the Federal Consti-

"By the consent of said State" is a broad term, and it involves either legislative or suffrage consent. Either a joint resolution, adopted by both branches of the Texas Legislature, authorizing the state, or a vote of the people for the division of the state, will be necessary.

Admission of states into the Fedral Union is discussed in the Federal Constitution in the following lan-

Admission and formation of new states: New states may be admitted by Congress into the Union; but no new states shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state; nor any other state be formed by the jurisdiction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislature of the states concerned as well as of the

Clause May Prohibit

The clause "but no new state shall e formed within the jurisdiction of any other state" stands separate and to itself as a part of the section quoted. The semicolon is important, and in any legal controversry which may result from any sort of a division is sue the semicolon will play probably determining part. Inasmuch as the semicolon makes the clause just quoted a separate one, and by its terms an inhibitive provision of the Constitition, rather than one of a number of qualifying clauses to the first clause of the section, it may be construed to mean that once a state is admitted into the Union its boundaries are invioable and that in fact, "no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any state."

The fact remains, however, that Texas was an independent republic and gave up its absolute soveriegnty, submitting to that of the United treaty provides for such division The reaty provides for such division. The question of whether the Constitution can be amended by treaty is beside the point. If the treaty is valid and Texas actually a part of the Union in law as well as in fact, the provis-

ion for division is valid.

The question ofw hether the phrase is separate or is to read in relation to phrase "without the consent of the legislaturee of the states concerned as well as congress," is really of no practical importance so far as the necessity of obtaining the consent ty. There is hardily a congressman of the lgislature and of congress is concerned. It is the prevailing competent opinion that, whether the phrase stands alone or not, it would





## WEST TEXAS ROBBED THRU STATESTAXING SYSTEM

THE STAR-TELEGRAM GATHERS FACTS TO SHOW HOW STATE TAXES ARE PAID

"The present high State tax should Most people now admit that Gov. and doubtless will, call attention of Neff is a great and good governor the taxpayers of Texac to the urgent -for the people of East and South need of a more equitable distribution of the burden of conducting the State government", says a pamphlet issued by the secretary of the State Tax Assessor's Association. "Under our present system, however, 154 counties of the state are being taxed for approximately one-half million dollars per annum over over and above their rightful share, while ninety-four counties are escaping approximately three and one-fourth millions of the taxes they rightfully should pay." The pamphlet might have added

that if one would draw a line along the east boundary of Wichita county and continue it down the map to a ublic meeting indorsed the veto of point just north of San Antonio, 112 of the 154 counties that are paying this excess of taxation would be found west of that line, including the Panhandle. The great bulk of the counties which, through ridiculously low assessments, have been dodging taxes for years, are in East Texas. When it is considered that all of the counties in which there are cities of any size are among the 154 paying the excess, it will be seen that the counties in East Texas which pay a just share of the taxes are few and car between. Incidentally, Brazos county, where the Texas Agriculutral and Mechanical College is located. is ne of the taxdodging counties.

Let us be clearly understood that even if taxes were equalized, sot hat ach county paid a just proportion of the total revenue raised by the state, it would still be true that West Texas recieves very little back for what it pays in taxes. What the situaton discloses is that in spite of the fact that it is the people of East Texas -no receive the greatest amount of enefits from the State institutors and the expending of state revenue he people of that section do not pay just revenue to the state.

ase share of the general revenue, but they do not pay a just share of taxes that go into the State school fund. In many cases they receive a greater share of the school revenue than they contribute, which means that in addition to bearing an unjust share of the general revenue, the people of West l'exas actually contribute to the sup-

#### FARMER OWES MUCH TO MULE

Animal Is Hard and Rugged Worker Almost Indispensable in Many Localities.

The mule, like everybody else, has his place. He is considered a bad actor. Fathers caution their sons about going near any animal with long ears and ropy tail. The sons know what the animal will do because they have been looking over the "funny paper" each Sunday and were delighted in seeing the mule fold up and let loose with a kick that sent through the side of a barn or over the fence. But in spite of this undesirable advertising the mule is with us today on more farms than ever before. He is a hard and rugged worker and is especially adapted to the more hilly farms of our agricultural sections. Even through the Middle West there are some counties that have more mules than horses. In 1867, the mules of the United States numbered 822,000, with an average value of \$66.94. In 1890 the number was 2,321,000, valued at \$78.25. By 1914 the number had increased to 4,123,000, with a value of \$119.84 per head. On January 1, 1920, the number was 4,995,000 and the value per head was \$147.

The mule has gained rapidly in popularity, in many localities taking the place of the horse, and has also prevented the introduction of the tractor in many places. There are not a few mule ranches over the United States, the owners finding it a paying kind of stock to raise. The demand is increasing and those having them for sale cannot supply the market .- Thrift Magazine.

#### CONDEMN TERM "FAIR SEX"

English Women Go on Record as Opposed to Phrase "Belonging to a Bygone Age."

It has been officially declared in England that women, en bloc, are neither 'week" nor "fair." At least the Women's Freedom league, under the leadership of Councilor Margaret Hodge, has put a ban on the terms "fair sex" and "weaker sex." "Spinster" and "mother-in-law" have also been put on the feminine index. Further, it is averred, once and for all time that: Woman's judgment is as good as

Women talk less than men.

Women can keep a secret. "One irritating custom," said Miss. Hodge, "comes from an age when to be fair was woman's first and foremost duty. The only women who counted were for ornament rather than for use. Women may be the weaker sex physically, but certainly not morally. The name mother-in-law is still the standby of farces and comic literature. It is an idea from some bygone age."-London Chronicle.

Chinese Art.

The applicability of Chinese art for interior decoration of any period is being strikingly illustrated in a recent gallery opening in New York. The idea that anything Chinese is gaudy is being gradually displaced. In the carving of gems, the working of metal and in tapestry designs the Chines are without rivals. The owner of the new gallery has fitted up half a score of rooms in period designs-there is the old French and English, the American colonial, the early Italian and the Holland rooms. Fitting snugly into the general tone of the room are marvels of Chinese craftsmanship in the form of hangings, carved woodwork, tapestry and lamps. It is a revelation to many and has a new conception of Chinese craftsmanship .- St. Paul Pioneer Press.

Big Task.

One of the big causes of delay in the movement of freight is the heating of the journal boxes of car axles, commonly called "hot boxes." When one journal box in a train gets seriously hot it is necessary to stop the whole movement of traffic until the condition can be remedied. This makes very timely a series of tests now being carried on at Purdue university, to determine accurately the benefit to be derived by using ventilated lids instead of the solid lids now almost universally used on the axle journals. The tests consist of eight-hour runs with heavy loads at high speed, during which accurate records are kept of the temperature attained in each class of apparatus.


Perfume Hunters.
