He was on the Rhea school board when it consolidated with Friona, then served on the Friona School board until 1967. She is very active in the United Methodist Church, where she teaches Sunday School classes, sings in the choir and has served on several boards. cates that 23 newspapers and 35 radio stations have closed down.

Sometimes it seems that the small-town weekly is there mainly for historical purposes since the grapevine is strong and the phone lines are active. Most folks know about the really "big" happenings long before the local paper hits the news stands. Actually, the paper's function is supporting the people who make up the community. . . their births and deaths and all the events that happen in between.

The newspaper supports your local clubs and their fund raisers, tells about your church events, sponsors your Little League Ball teams, donates to your local charities, gives info on your local elections, tells the world when your children get married, when your grandbabies are born, goes to bat for you against unjust tax hikes, and fights for local improvements such as better roads, needed bond issues and industrial expansion, as well as providing an advertising medium which does not go directly from the customer's mail box into the trash can.

These are things that network TV doesn't do for you, and those pretty colored sales circulars send some money out of the community.

The old pioneer, Uncle John White, who started The Friona Star in 1925 and stayed on as editor for the next 25 years, went through some bad times during the great depression. At times he took no salary from the business in order to keep it running. He felt so strongly that the community needed a local paper that he accepted vegetables and eggs from people in payment for their ads and subscriptions. Now that's dedication!

Bill came to Friona as the editor 30 years ago and said "This is the place where I want to settle down and raise my family." After we'd been here for a short time, he had some lucrative newspaper offers from Canyon and Amarillo and some other towns down state, but he turned them down because he liked the good Christian family atmosphere here in Friona.





Land Bank **Reps** Attend Meeting

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Representatives of the Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA) of Muleshoe were among more than 500 attendees at the Farm Credit Bank of Texas 1992 Annual Meeting for FLBAs, according to Association President William C. Liles.

The annual stockholders event, held in Austin, commemorated FLBA's 75th anniversary of making long-term agricultural land and rural housing loans.

Local FLBA directors and staff who attended were James Glaze of Muleshoe, Jimmie Pitcock of Muleshoe, Don McDonald of Muleshoe, Billy D. Baxter of Friona, and Donald Christian of Oklahoma Lane.

Highlights of the year included interest rate reductions to variable rate stockholders, bringing the rate from 9.75 per cent at the beginning of the year to 8.95 per cent currently; development of a lending division geared specifically to the needs of agribusiness; and introduction of an adjustable rate loan program, with rates tied to a Treasury index.

In addition, the district bank returned \$14 million in patronage refunds to district FLBAs last year to help them build financial strength.

The FLBA of Muleshoe has \$25 million in long-term agricultural loans to farmers in two counties. The office is located in Muleshoe, Texas.

The Tenth Farm Credit District has approximately \$3.6 billion in loans outstanding to nearly 60,000 borrowers.

The Squaws likewise were good hosts, scoring 55 points in the girls division.







Doctor's Day Set Locally March 30

BY ANNE SPRING

March 30th is Doctor's Day and more and more we realize how lucky we are to have our local doctors and hospital available in times of need.

Honoring physicians on a special day each year was the idea of Eudora B. Almond. As a child she was impressed by the gentle kindness of her family doctor in the small village of Fort Lamar, Georgia.

Later she married a physician, and as she worked alongside her husband, she became convinced that medicine was the greatest profession on earth.

Mrs. Almond presented the idea of having a day on which to honor doctors. This was accepted nationally in November 1955.

March 30th was selected in honor of Dr. Cawford W. Long, 1815-1878, discoverer of the anesthetic powers of ether in surgery. Dr. Long worked in New York hospitals where he witnessed great suffering in surgical operations without successful efforts to relieve pain.

"Laughing Gas" parties were popular at that time,-early 1800sand Dr. Long noticed that as people inhaled ether for its exhilarating effects, they could receive falls and blows yet feel no pain.

On March 30th, 1942, twentysix year old Dr. Crawford Williamson Long, in practice for less than a year, administered sulphuric ether in a surgical operation for the first time in history. A young man had a tumor removed from the back of his neck, inhaling ether throughout the surgery. The patient was later incredulous when shown the half inch diameter cyst, having experienced no pain during its removal. The quiet young country doctor said of his discovery, "It is a divine gift from on high," and after forty years of practicing medicine said, "My only wish is to be known as a benefactor of my race." We each have memories of well-loved doctors who have helped us in our lives. Mine are the two who pulled me through bad cases of diphtheria and appendicitis/peritonitis. Later, in a nursing career, I remember Dr. Winston Turner who, in our small "fever" hospital, first began to cure t.b. meningitis. Then there were the

devoted interns who worked with us around the clock during two bad summers of polio. In later life the best-looking face I every saw was Dr. Robert Geralds as he removed my eye bandages, and Dr. Michael Ryan who is kindness itself as he helps me through some bad times. The latter two both of Amarillo. At home there is Dr. Bob, who sewed up my face and hid the scar among the wrinkles, Dr. Shah who is making her own niche in our community, Dr. Paul, the epitome of old time family doctor and who I am lucky enough to have for a brother-in-law, and of course Dr. Lee-wherever you are.

All of us can give thanks for our local physicians, Dr. Bob and Dr. Shah for their dedication to our community, for working long hours, filling endless forms, having interrupted sleep, and keeping up with what is new in treatment to benefit their Parmer County pa-

tients. If you see Dr. Bob, Dr. Shah or Dr. Paul on their day-March 30th-, don't forget to tell them you are glad that our area has such fine dedicated doctors when so many small towns are without.


Intimacy

Cancer Screening Program Locally

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.


Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are: (1) Learn and

perform breast self-examination every month; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age--35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; and over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Tuesday, April 21 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Wednesday, April 21 from 9:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital. Exams are done by appointment only.



Variable Annuities Could Be A Mainstay of the 1990s Annuity assets currently total more than \$30 billion, up \$7 billion from a year ago, according to the Investment Company Institute, the trade association of the mutual fund industry. Likewise, annuity sales have increased more than 30 per cent in each of the past two years. Why the newfound popularity? It may have something to do with the tax advantages of variable annuities. Rudolph Watz, vice president of insurance products for a major money-management firm, says the tax benefits of variable annuities resemble those of IRAs, but variable annuities can be bought in virtually unlimited dollar amounts. After tax reform, many investors lost their tax deduction for IRAs. Those who didn't can only contribute up to \$2,000 a year. Tax reform eliminated most tax-exempt investments, so the value of any tax break becomes more important. Today's variable annuity has evolved into a very sophisticated investment, and many mutual-fund groups have combined their expertise with that of major insurance companies. The result is the best of both worlds. The mutual funds concentrate on what they do best-managing money. The insurance companies, on the other hand, add the benefits of death protection and tax-sheltering. Although a fund company's variable annuity accounts must be managed separately from the mutual fund's regular accounts, most are clones of conventional funds. There are a growing number of variable annuity fund accounts, however, that have no similarity to

the taxable funds. They are designed and managed specifically as annuity investments. The investment technique, however, is the

same. After assessing the risks and rewards in each market sector, the fund adjusts the proportions invested in different securities, free from taxes. For example, when markets seem to favor fixed-income investments over growth securities, the fund attempts to shift its assets accordingly. The aim, of course, is to maximize returns while limiting risks.

There are some disadvantages to variable annuities, however. Some are much costlier than others. Those run by conservative companies typically charge around 1.75 per cent to 1.90 per cent of an investor's annual holdings. That compares with 1.3 per cent for the average taxable equity mutual fund.

In addition, annuities are longterm investments, and early withdrawal can incur charges from the annuity, plus penalties imposed by the Internal Revenue Service on investors who are not yet 59-1/2 years of age.

Some industry leaders are going so far as to predict that just as mutual funds were an investment mainstay in the 1980s, variable annuities could become a mainstay financial product in the 1990s.
