Star Lites By



WE DISCUSSED in our last column how the Texas Tech Lady Raiders, who won their first-ever Southwest Conference Championship, and advanced to the West Regional playoffs in Seattle, were basically a home-grown team, paced by players from this area.

The team's head coach, Marsha Sharp, is a native of nearby Tulia. Tech's assistant women's coaches are also local products. Linden Weese coached at Floydada and Stratford prior to coming to Raiderland, and Roger Reding coached at Whitharral and South Plains College.

This Tech women's roster reminded Ye Editor a lot of the makeup of the Tech men's team, back when he enrolled at the Lubbock campus during the fabulous

Two players from tiny Sudan--Leon "Podd" Hill, and Charley Lynch, both were starters for the Tech freshman team that year. Hill and Lynch had led the Sudan Hornets to the state tournament their senior years. Bovina fans no doubt remember this Sudan team-we watched the Mustangs, paced by Darrell Read, compete in the state tournament in 1955, the same year Sudan made it to the state meet.

Joining the Sudan duo on the Tech freshman team that winter was floor leader Gerald Myers, who made quite a name for himself as a starter for the Tech varsity later on, then led Monterey High School to a state title prior to becoming the alltime winning head coach of the Red Raiders in a 20-year career.

Then there was Gene Arrington, who had led a newly-formed school in Amarillo, named Palo Duro, to the state meet as a senior. If the three-point rule had been in effect in the 1950s, Arrington, who scored a lot of points as it was--would have had almost 50% more than he did for his career.

Rounding out the starting five was Wade Wolf, who had been the big inside star for Lubbock High School prior to coming to Tech.

Five starters--all from the Panhandle-South Plains area. The top substitute was Robert Echols, a teammate of Arrington's at Palo Duro.

We had seen virtually all of these guys play high school basketball, so it was like having a hand-picked all-star team move up to the Red Raiders.

This particular group almost won the Southwest Conference basketball title as juniors, the very first year Tech competed in the SWC.

Things have changed in the basketball recruiting department, and these days it's unusual when the Tech men's team even has a starter from the area, and more's the pity.

Exceptions have been the careers lately of Clovis' Bubba Jennings, and Paducah's Will Flemons. A member of the current Tech team, Flemons was chosen as the SWC's Most Valuable Player for the 1991-92 season. Not bad, coming from a high school with less than 100 enrollment.

Maybe if Tech had more Panhandle-South Plains grads back on its roster, it would help them to once again fill up the Coliseum for their home games. It seems to have worked for the women's team. And you sure can't fault their record, either.

Daylight Time To Debut On Sunday

If you have been enjoying the longer days on these spring mornings, we have to tell you that it is coming to an end.

Daylight Savings Time will begin its run on Sunday, April 5, this year, instead of the last Sunday in April as it has been in the past and some had hoped it would be returned this year, but

At 2 a.m. local time Sunday, residents will observe the "spring forward, fall back" rule, which will give everyone except residents of Arizona, Hawaii, most of Indiana and Puerto Rico an extra hour of daylight in the evening, but in order to get the same amount of sleep Saturday night, you will have to retire earlier.

Daylight Savings Time has been virtually a national phenomenon since 1966, when Congress passed a law setting Daylight Savings Time from the last Sunday in April to the last

Sunday in October. Prior to 1966, Daylight Savings Time had been invoked in some localities during the summer months, beginning as early as 1920. This made it a bit confusing, however, as to what time of day it was in various locations.

Congress tried to first pass the Daylight Savings Time back in 1918 legislation but it was repealed a year later.

Between 1920 and World War II, various states and cities passed their own Daylight Savings Time rules, and the practice continued after the war. During World War II, DST was observed nationally, and during the 1974 and 1975 energy Fire Station on Wednesday, April 8 crunch, Daylight Savings Time was instituted earlier in the year, although it was debatable how much energy was saved, due to businesses and schools having to start up in darkness in some parts of the country.

At any rate, change your clocks Saturday night--and grin a little, because in just six months and three weeks, we'll get that hour of sleep back.

Tornado Does

Damage Locally A weather system that dumped roughly 1.3 inches of rain on Friona and the outlying area, also spawned tornado funnels that caused considerable damage in the local area.

Bearing the brunt of the damage in the immediate area was the Wells Feedlot, about 1.5 miles east of the city. A leg for a large grain-drying facility was twisted into the storage compartment.

A tank was blown several hundred yards, across the Santa Fe Railway tracks and U.S. Highway 60, where it was strewn across a wheat field.

Donny Carthel, who was driving east-bound on Highway 60 at about the time the Wells facility was hit, said he saw the dark cloud lower to the ground about 200 yards south of the Wesley Barnett place on Highway 60. But the cloud lifted, and went over the residences on the north side of the

Carthel said a pickup-truck that he was following suddenly was spun completely around and ended up in the ditch, facing north.

"I pulled over, to see what the cloud was going to do. Then I pulled into Mrs. Weatherly's driveway. I was going to borrow her basement, but she wasn't at home," the recently-returned Friona native said. "It was an experience I'd just as soon not have again," he concluded.







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

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Violent Death Of Olton Woman Leaves Community Unsettled

OLTON--The death of Joan on the cause of the blaze, he said. Baize has left a gaping wound in the heart of this farming community, but Olton residents are keeping their eyes on the future as they deal with the tragedy.

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The 43-year-old housewife suffered burns to 80 per cent of her body when a fire broke out the afternoon of March 16 at her adobe home on Avenue I. She died while enroute to Lubbock in a helicopter.

close-knit community, but townspeople were shocked when it was ruled a homicide by Lubbock County Justice of the Peace Jim Hansen.

And despite an intense investigation by lawmen, no suspect has yet been named in the death.

The fire that snuffed out the life of the mother of three children also injured her husband, S.D. The 45year-old Friona native was found unconscious in a hallway outside the couple's bedroom.

S.D. Baize, president of the Olton school board, was taken to University Medical Center in "They (community) are saddened Lubbock for treatment of burns. He was released four days later and is living several miles north of

Olton Police Chief Henry Lopez has declined to comment on the investigation, which is being conducted with the assistance of Texas Ranger Jackie Peoples and the State Fire Marshal's Office.

investigation is continuing and that a suspect has not been identified.

Lamb County Attorney Martha Rose said her office has not been asked to assist in the investigation. "There are a lot of areas that he (Peoples) is looking into," she said.

But the fire, which was largely confined to the bedroom of the house, appears suspicious in origin, said Assistant State Fire Marshal G. Mike Davis of Austin.

"We feel it is definitely classified as suspicious--an incendiary fire," Davis said. "We have pretty much eliminated all accidental causes."

Physical evidence taken from the scene is being analyzed at a State Department of Public Safety laboratory. Test results could be released this week and may shed some light

An autopsy performed by Dr. David Hoblit of Lubbock indicated that Mrs. Baize died from traumatic arrest as the result of severe burns and smoke inhalation.

The autopsy also revealed "multiple lacerations to the head of Mrs. Baize, as well as a fractured nose," according to a report released

Although the details surrounding The death was a blow to the the death remain murky, Olton residents are clear in their admiration for the Baize family.

"I think it's horrible. They were good friends," said Sue Cannon, publisher and editor of the Olton Enterprise. "They were well thought of. They were both great workers in the community."

The two were active in their church--Main Street Church of Christ. Baize also is a member of the Olton Boosters Club.

"In a community the size of Olton, any time a tragedy strikes, it affects everyone. We're all close. We all feel saddened," Wilcox said. "We hurt for them; people are keep-

ing them in their prayers."

Local barber Parley Myers said the Baizes, who moved to Olton in 1984, were an important part of community life.

"They were involved in everything, you name it," Myers said. "I just think they were fine folks."

Pete Little, an assistant manager at the Allsup's convenience store on U.S. Highway 70, said townspeople are taking a wait-and-see attitude about the death.

"It's hit the community, but there's no rumors flying," Little said. "We'll wait and see what the investigation brings. It's not that we're close-mouthed. We just don't want to see anyone convicted by innuendo."



-- Don't bring in matters that are irrelevant or unimportant. You may have to stop the conversation



The tornado cloud that went over Friday, March 27 raised concern among myself and others I've spoken with. The concern is that there was no warning signal sounded.

The people of Friona have come to depend on this system and I would like to know the specifics as to when a warning signal is to be

I had questions and took them to Friona's acting city manager, Paula Wilson, for some answers. I was told that unless a tornado was spotted in Friona, the warning signal would not be sounded.

I was also told it was ultimately the responsibility of the police and fire departments to make the final decision of when to sound the warning. She stated they had spotters out Friday night and it was not deemed necessary to sound a warn-

I'm thankful no one was hurt in this storm, but, at the same time, feel a warning signal should have been sounded.

At the time of this severe storm, there were events going on at the Junior High Gym, the Elementary Gym and the High School track. Should a turn of events taken place, there were several people gathered in one area with no warning and the results could have been disastrous.

I thank our God in Heaven for taking care of Friona. I'd like to see a change in the decision process of when a warning is sounded. Please take into consideration the sounding of a warning so the people of Friona would have a choice to take cover or not.

The people of Friona are depending on a warning signal in our town--we can't depend on Amarillo television or radio stations to provide timely warnings in the potentially life-threatening event of a tornado.

I'm not meaning to be unnecessarily critical. I appreciate the efforts on behalf of firemen and the police department, but feel that a policy change would be in order.



Begin A College Fund While There's Still Time

One of the largest and most important expenses families face is putting a child through college. Some families benefit from assistance programs, student loans or part-time employment. Nevertheless, most still have to dig deep into their own pockets. The numbers are staggering, and the expense can be a strain on even the healthiest budgets.

The following chart shows the projected costs of a college education based on a six per cent annual rate of inflation applied to the average total expenses reported by the College Board for the 1990-91 school year. These costs totaled \$4,970 for one year at a four-year public college and \$13,544 for one year at a four-year private institution. For example, if your child were to enter a public college in five years, you would need \$29,095 to pay for the four-year education.

reach your goal, the smaller your current investments need be.


Another important consideration is the expected return on your investments. Depending on the rates of return, there is a wide difference in the amount of money required to reach specific goals. For example, over a five-year period, \$21,742 invested at six per cent would grow to \$29,095. Increase that return to 12 per cent, and your necessary deposit drops to \$16,509, a sizeable differ-

Remember, though, that an unusually high return generally means added risk. The return you expect should be reasonable based on the risk you are willing to assume.

The chart uses three hypothetical returns--six per cent, nine per cent and 12 per cent--over three time periods. This can serve as a guide to help you determine how much you need to put away in order to reach a specific goal.

A college education is regarded more as an investment in your child's future. Regardless, someone has to pay the bill. If you think a large part of that cost will be yours, now is the time to begin preparing-



YOUR EYES



CONJUNCTIVITIS

Conjunctivitis, old-fashioned "pink eye," has two basic causes: ordinary irritation or bacterial infection. Your optometrist can help you clear up either kind. Ordinary, non-contagious conjunctivitis is

usually traced to a chemical or allergic reaction. Swimmers' eyes may be irritated by the chlorine in a pool. Allergies to pollens, smoke or dust may make the eyes swell, water, sting, itch and look red. Rest and eye drops are usually enough to take care of this problem. But bacterial conjunctivitis is more serious and, without professional care, may linger for a long time. The first symptoms may be awakening with one or both eyelids stuck together; there may be discharge and extra-sensitivity to light. Cure usually requires prescription-strength eye drops. In addition, bacterial conjunctivitis is highly contagious; it can be spread through shared face towels and eye make-up.

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
