
fellows are not fond of tinted windows for sure. It is dangerous for them to stop a car for a traffic infraction and then have to walk up to a window which is so dark that they

So, for that reason, I suppose it's nice to have the privacy of tinted windows. But I, for one, still think they are unsafe.

He made sure the spare tire was always aired up and he kept a box of tools in the trunk of the car, plus some spark plugs, a fan belt, a can of oil and a jug of water. I don't think that would do the trick these days. # Packing Plant Announcement 25 Years Ago

This week, the Friona community will observe an anniversary that turned out to be very vital for the economy of

It was on April 28, 1967--25 years ago on Tuesday--that Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., the forerunners of the Excel Corp., announced plans to expand from its original plant in Missouri and build a second plant in Friona.

In a special "Extra" edition, the Friona Star announced that the Chamber of Commerce, through its Industrial Committee, had reached an agreement whereby the community would donate the landsite to MBP in exchange for the location of the plant near Friona, which was in the running with several other area cities to land the plant.

The projected cost of the original plant was \$3 million. (Compare that to the recent addition by Excel, which cost over

Expected to employ over 250 people, and add over \$1,000,000 annually in payrolls alone to the economy of the Friona area, the plant will be located on a 197-acre plot three and one-half miles southwest of Friona," the Friona Star article stated.

The plant announcement came on the heels of announcements to build two new cattle-feeding operations in the county. One was to be located west of Friona and have a capacity of 50,000 and the other near Bovina and would feed 30,000 head of cattle.

The announcement article stated that MBP, in its first year of operation, would expect to slaughter over 400,000 head of cattle. This would be four times as many cattle as were slaughtered by the largest packing plant in Texas at the time-Neuhoff of Dallas, making MBP in its first year the largest plant in the state.

The Chamber's Industrial Committee was spearheaded by Dr. Loyd Shackelford, A.L. Black, Andy Hurst, Frank Spring and Jack Carrothers.

After a full year of construction, MBP held dedication ceremonies and an Open House for the public during the last weekend in April, 1968, and opened its doors for operation on May 6, 1968. So the plant will observe its 25th anniversary in





Help For Dealing Divorce

This is the second article in a series regarding divorce: Flashbacks may occur. They are reminders of the past relationship. Some of them may be good. However, during the first part of the divorce, they will probably be bad. Any good ones may surface later after the anger has been worked through. Flashback can even pop-up in the next relationship. That can cause some interesting situations. These can be detrimental unless they're properly identified and dealt with.

One thing to remember, emotions are functioning in a survival type made--at an all-time low. One may do and say things they would not normally do or say. Attitudes may be more calloused. Actions may include habits that are not normally becoming or their character. Don't be too quick to judge that person. Here are some quick hints that will help in the long run: (1) Don't make a big decision by yourself; enlist the help of someone you trust; (2) When things seem overwhelming, take one thing at a

time, get organized, prioritize; (3) Having the feelings of being onthe-go may not be all bad. It helps keep the sanity. Be wise though. It's expensive. You may notice a vocabulary change from "ours" to "mine" or from "us" to "I"--plural to singular.

### S.D. Baize Is **Indicted For** Wife's Death

Olton School Board President S.D. Baize, 45, has been indicted for arson and the murder of his wife, Joan Baize, 43, in connection with a house fire on March 16.

He was indicted by the Lamb County Grand Jury last Thursday.

Baize turned himself in to authorities Friday morning, and he was arraigned on charges of murder and arson by District Judge Pat Boone, Jr.

Baize was released after posting bail on bonds totaling \$10,000.

Mrs. Baize suffered burns to 80 per cent of her body in a fire at their home the afternoon of March 16. She was found in the master bedroom, where the fire started, and her husband was found unconscious in a hallway.

An autopsy revealed that Mrs. Baize died from traumatic arrest, as a result of severe burns and smoke inhalation. The autopsy also revealed "multiple lacerations to the head, as well as a fractured nose."



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
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# Town Talk



# **ASCS Makes Announcements** To Parmer County Farmers

tive director Curt Miller this week made a number of announcements which should prove of interest to county farmers:

Certification/Measurement Service: May 15, 1992 is the final date to certify small grains (wheat, rye, barley, oats, triticale), regard-less of their use (harvest, ACR cover, CU cover etc.). If you do not already have an appointment PLEASE call (481-3311) and make an appointment as soon as possible. This is also the final date to certify to zero acreage planted if the farm has a base for that commodity.

Measurement service will be offered on small grains until May 15, 1992. Regardless of the use of the small grain it is suggested that you take advantage of this low cost service if you are unsure of any acreage. Measuring service rates are \$20.00 plus \$.03 per acre for each acre over 25. If you haven't already done so, PLEASE call and make an appointment. Remember, there is no tolerance on measurement ser-

Small Grains Left Standing: If you have wheat or other small grains on ACR or CU that will be left standing and not substantially destroyed by May 15, 1992, you must file a request to leave the small grain standing and pay a

Payment Limitation/Joint Operations: If you signed up for the 1992 ARP Program and did not complete payment limit forms, you need to check back with this office. No payments shall be made until payment limit forms are completed or an update is signed.

Payment limitation rules for joint operations including husband and wife joint operations require that all their farming business be carried in the name of the joint operation at the enterprises they are doing business with. This includes gins, elevators, lending institutions, electric and gas companies etc. Doing business any other way could cause the joint operation to be combined as one person for payment limitation purposes.

Tolerance of Corn and Sorghum: Changes have been made in the tolerance calculation for participating corn and grain sorghum on the combined corn and grain sorghum permitted acreage. Tolerance shall be calculated as 5% of the TOTAL reported corn and grain sorghum acreage (not to exceed 10 acres). Acreage of corn and grain sorghum will be determined separately. The difference between the reported and determined acreage

total of the differences of the two crops may not exceed the 5% tolerance (not to exceed 10 acres) of the total reported acres.

Compliance Procedures for 1992: Producers are required to report all cropland acreage, including zero acreage reports, on ASCS-578 when the farm is participating in the 1992 price support and production adjustment program. Producers on nonparticipating farms requesting P&CP credit for zero acreage reports are also required to report all cropland on the farm.

For 1992, all payment reductions due to failure to fully comply shall be considered farm rather than crop specific. If a producer is penalized due to one crop being out of compliance and the penalty exceeds the payment for that crop, the penalty will carry over to other and Non-grazing Period.

For 1992 and future years, if a producer does not request, or the COC does not determine good faith for any crop, all participating program crops shall be ineligible for nay benefits, all advance payments shall be refunded and liquidated damages shall apply to all participating program crops, all crops shall be ineligible for price support benefits, and all other crops shall be ineligible for disaster benefits, if available.

Dates to Remember: May 1--Final date to accept owners signatures on ARP contracts; May15--Final date to report small grains; May 25--County Office will be closed for Memorial Day; June 1--Final loan date (corn, cotton, grain sorghum, soybean minor oil seeds); June 1- October 31--Non-haying


