He states that the increased acreage of irrigated wheat around Plainview will help to increase the yield this year.

Although a grain dealer and miller, Hinn is a strong advocate of cotton on the Plains. He is urging Hale county farmers to plant at least twenty-five acres of cotton on each farm this year.



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
