"MY TURN"

AS WE BEGIN the last year of this decade, we might take a moment to ponder the question, "For what will the years of the 80s be remembered in future times?"

We remember the 1940s as the War Years, the 1950s as The Age of Innocence, the 1960s as the Protest Years, and the 1970s as the Computer Age.

Perhaps the Age of Sensationalism would best describe the 1980s. We seem to have done everything to excess in the past few years. Crime, violence and drugs have hit an all-time high. We have seen abuse of laws, abuse of nature, abuse of fellow human beings. Even the weather has gone excess with droughts, earthquakes, forest fires, etc.

I believe, however, that the trends are changing toward a better outlook in the near future. For instance, recent public opinion against smoking has resulted in a ban on smoking in public buildings and airplanes.

This may seem like a very small step toward curing the ills of our country. But remember, smoking was once considered the "in" thing to do. It was glamorized by the movies and by respected public personalities. Today, it is no longer looked upon as either macho or glamorous.

The tide is also slowly turning against the drinking of alcohol. There is a loud public outcry against those who drink and drive, and especially against drunken drivers who are involved in

accidents resulting in deaths. When a group plans to "party" all evening, a designated driver is appointed among group...someone who will abstain from drinking so he or she will be sober to drive the rest of the people home after the party. Many bars offer free soft drinks to designated drivers. Such a thing was unheard

of just a few years ago. Everyone realizes the seriousness of our nation's drug problem. At one time, drugs were also being glamorized by the entertainment industry, luring young people through rock-song lyrics and innuendos made by popular standup comedians. We are seeing less and less of this as we go along. However, there is an underworld drug sub-culture of supply and demand that must be dealt with on an official level. No punishment is too harsh for drug dealers who would destroy the future of our nation.

Getting ahead in the 80s has come to mean "taking it away from someone else." Corporate take-overs, white-collar crimes, law suits for personal gain...such things are common occurrences today.

We must see a rebirth of individual responsibility and accountability in human actions in order to pull ourselves out of this uncivilized mire. Politeness, kindness, honesty, pride of accomplishment, respect for the property of others, respect for the feelings of others...these are the things which lift mankind above the animals. These are not learned instinctivly, but must be taught and practiced from an early age. 

STATEMENT OF NON-DISCRIMINATION JANUARY 14, 1989

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities.

Under the Assurance, this organization is committed not to discriminate against any person on the ground of race, color, or national origin in its policies and practices relating to applications for service or any other policies and practices relating to treatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extension of service, use of any of its facilities, attendance at and participation in any meeting of beneficiaries and participants, and the exercise of any rights of such beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of this organization.

Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals to be subjected by the organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D.C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complaints will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations. "



We are proposing habitat development as opposed to habitat management. Development means creating habitat where either no habitat or marginal habitat had existed before. Thus, practices such as minimum tillage or delayed tillage of stubble are ways to improve wildlife habitat.

There are some other ways to do this, also. Permanent wildlife habitat is one which permits the planting of trees and shrubs as well as herbaceous wildlife cover, thereby providing excellent winter cover in close proximity to other types of habitat. Native plants are preferred over introduced species if seed and nursery stock are available. Multiple rows of trees and shrubs are generally preferred over single rows even as travel lanes.

In Parmer County, we have playa lake bottoms. These depressions provide virtually all -over winter cover, serve as nesting and brooding cover, and supply foods such as barnyard grass and smart weeds. A water supply that is very accessible is one more thing we need to have to enhance wildlife.

Through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District in Friona, there are wildlife packets available that contain several different types of trees that are good food and shelter for quail and pheasant.
