# Bani-Sadr offers to take control of U.S. hostages

Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr offered today to take control of the American hostages if the U.S. government pledged to abstain from all hostile acts and propaganda against Iran until the hostages' fate is decided by the new Parliament. There were conflicting reports about how the militants holding the hostages reacted

NBC quoted the militants as saving that, in accordance with Avatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's line, they would not surrender control of the captives until the new Iranian Parliament meets. Canadian Press said a spokesman for the militants denied the NBC report but refused to say what the militants would do.

President Carter responded to Bani-Sadr's offer by deferring imposition of further sanctions against Iran.

But Khomeini said today, before the Bani-Sadr statement, that Carter was "following the wrong path" in his efforts to free the hostages and "must realize...his support for the ousted shah...does not leave room for an honorable solution of the issue.'

Angry shouts and boos from a throng of 200,000 Iranians greeted Bani-Sadr's announcement of the transfer offer, made at rally in Tehran celebrating the first anniversary of the Islamic Iranian republic. But Bani-Sadr tried to calm the crowd by saying: "I emphasize to you that the hostages will not be freed

An Iranian offer to transfer the hostages had been expected in Washington, and President Carter had been holding an announcement of new sanctions against Iran in abeyance. Carter told reporters in the Oval Office this morning that Bani-Sadr's announcement was a "positive development" and confirmed "we were considering additional sanctions against Iran" had the announcement not been forthcoming. He did not elaborate, but added:

until the shah is extradited

We would like to see this positive development continued and our foremost consideration will be devoted to the earliest possible release of the hostages.'

The Iranian president, after speaking about domestic matters for nearly an hour and a half, reviewed recent developments in the hostage crisis and said:

"The night before last the Revolutionary Council decided that if America issues an official statement that until such time as the Majlis (Parliament) is formed and the proper decision is taken, America refrains from all propaganda or any claim or statement or any provocation, the Revolutionary Council agrees to take the hostages under its care and custody.

"This is as far as we have gone so far."

In Cairo, meanwhile, one of the Egyptian doctors who assisted in the removal of the deposed shah's spleen four days ago reported that his lymph cancer has spread to his liver.

## Cosden, union reach agreement

The approval by union members came after a previously tendered contract was voted down on March 25. The IUOE had the right to strike at

Both sides in the Cosden talks said they were pleased with the contract settlement that affects some 500 at the American Petrofina

"It is an excellent agreement," Kenneth Howell, head of the IUOE, medical coverage for employees. said. "There was almost unanimous

agreement by the membership."

Hood Barnwell of Cosden Oil said, "It was a good package. It is good for the employees, and it's good for the

The new contract calls for a 43-cent an-hour wage increase, retroactive to Jan. 8. This boost comes on top of a 6 percent wage increase previously

Howell added, "We can open for wages on Dec. 1, 1980." The union with this provision can negotiate a wage

One area that had caused rejection of the earlier contract was the Of the previous medical offer by

management, J.D. Fortenberry, a business representative with IUOE, said, "It is short of money. The terms of the contract are unacceptable to the

Howell said of the new medical coverage, "The new contract has a very superior group health plan."

The medical coverage has a \$25 deductible. The next \$1500 for hospitalization is paid at 100 percent by the company's insurance.

This coverage extends for major co-insurance coverage, which operates until the employee pays \$500. At this point Cosden's insurance pays at 100 percent the hospital charges up to \$1 million.

Howell said this coverage is designed to avert a union member from having to pay exorbitant costs due to

"There is a lot of cancer and heart illness in this industry," Howell said.

The contract provides for a dental plan to take effect July 1. The plan calls for a company contribution of \$15.50 toward the dental bills of a union member and his family

Lastly, the contract gives an additional week of vacation for 30-yearsor-more e es. This means th workers will be given six-weeks of vacation yearly.

"There are over 100 that will qualify," Howell added.

Suspension of licenses issue

### Deferred adjudication may allow judges to sidestep DWI policy

Recently revised state law 42.13 mandates suspension of licenses of drivers probated for DWI; however a clause allowing deferred adjudication may allow county judges to sidestep

Licenses will be suspended in DWI cases where probations were given before Aug. 31, said Department of Public Safety Lt. John Cofer.

DPS troopers are awaiting an opinion from Attorney General Mark White to determine if probations ordered since Aug. 31 will result in suspended licenses, said Cofer.

Section 3d of recently revised state law 42.13 provides a way for county taking away his license. The method is called deferred adjudication.

Howard County attorney Harvey Hooser said deferred adjudication is "a form of probation. It's not probation as such." Under deferred adjudication the offender doesn't lose his license because it is not considered a final conviction and there is no finding of guilt. The difference between deferred

adjudication and normal probation is that in deferred adjudication, judgment is put off or "deferred" for a period of time set by the judge.

The offender pays probation fees and another cost that normally would

be called a fine. After the period of time set by the county judge the charge is dismissed if the conditions of the probation have been met. If the conditions are not met the

offender is subject to the full range of punishment available to the judge, said Hooser "It gives the judge a lot more lati-tude in assessing punishment if they violate the terms of their probation,"

Punishment ranges from the maximum of six months in jail and \$2,000 fine to the minimum of three days in jail and \$50 fine. "We don't even talk to them for less than \$200 anymore,'

He said deferred adjudication is offered to those who haven't had a prior conviction or those who need their driver's license to make their

said Hooser

"If an old boy drives a truck he's out in the cold without his driver's license." said Hooser. "There has to be some effort on his part. We're not going to bend over and give him every break in the world."

Hooser talks with the defendant's lawyer to determine if he will recommend deferred adjudication to

the county judge. Hooser is not fond of the new deferred adjudication clause. He said it gave back to the county judge the same power that the revision pretended to take away; the ability to probate an offender without giving him final conviction.

Howard County Judge Bill Tune declined to comment.

Deadline for voting absentee in the city election is 5 p.m. today. Mailed ballots, however, will be accepted until 10 p.m. Thursday.

Those wishing to vote absentee should contact Tom Ferguson, city secretary, in his office in City Hall. Last day to register to vote in May 3 state primary is Thursday, April 3.

### Kennedy revival tested at two state polls today

MILWAUKEE (AP) - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's campaign revival was tested at the polls in Wisconsin and Kansas today in primary elections that matched him against President Carter amid White House signals of possible progress in the Iranian hostage situation. California Gov. Edmund G. Brown

Jr. said Wisconsin was his best chance to break through as a rival to the president and the senator.

Ronald Reagan bid for a new crop of Republican nominating votes to add to his runsway lead over George Bush and Rep. John B. Anderson.

The election-eve hint of a possible break in the long hostage stalemate, and controversy over administration messages to Iran, put new items on the agenda as voters in the two midwestern states marked their presidential choices.

Vice President Walter F. Mondale. campaigning for Carter in Milwaukee, said "we hope at this point that there may be progress" toward release of the 53 Americans

Kennedy switched strategy to make a campaign stand in Wisconsin after a pair of Democratic upsets over Carter last Tuesday. "I'm hopeful that the voters will send a clear message to Washington and to the American people that they're just fed up," the Massachusetts senator said, press as always, his criticism of ad-

ministration economic policies. He had planned to let today's primaries go with no more than a token campaign, but changed his mind after defeating the president in New York and Connecticut a week

ago.

The late challenge led the Carter camp to intensify its effort, and Mondale campaigned in the president's name until election eve.

Wisconsin Democrats were apportioning 75 votes for their presidential nomination, and 37 were at stake in Kansas. The Republican competition was for 34 delegates in Wisconsin, 32 in Kansas. Delegate votes were apportioned in line with the popular vote.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — State health officials say a Globe mobile home park cleaned of asbestos contamination is safer than it was. But, says Dr. Alex Kelter, "the safest place to be is somewhere

Nearly all of the 150 residents evacuated for the two-month cleanup have returned to their homes in the subdivision east of Phoenix. Some say they can't afford to move because their investment collapsed with word that the area was contaminated by the carcinogen from an abandoned mill.

WINCHESTER, Va. (AP) - Todd Towlen, who received more than \$1 million in overpayments on a life insurance policy, says he agreed to a settlement because "I was losing sleep over it."

Equitable Life Assurance Co. vice president Werner Weinstock said Towlen signed the out-ofcourt settlement Thursday. He said Towlen will return the \$1,059,546, and Towlen said he would receive an unspecified amount of interest.

Equitable had filed suit contending Towlen received monthly payments of \$32,000 instead of \$32 on his late grandfather's policy. Towlen said he called the company about the matter and "I waited 21/2 years for them to call me back.



And both Robert Gough, chief forecaster for Data Resources Inc. in Lexington, Mass., and Lawrence Chimerine, chairman of Chase Econometrics in Bala Cynwyd, Pa., said Carter's latest inflation forecast of 12.8 percent for this year was at least a percentage point too low. "Energy prices and mortgage rates just aren't

going to come down that much," said Gough. Added Chimerine: "The president is too op-

timistic. He has added some (to inflation) with his new gas tax...and we're going to see some acceleration in wage rates now that he has eased up on the wage guidelines."

Reaction from the stock market was equally

"I don't think Carter has any credibility on Wall Street, so I don't think whatever he says will have an effect," said Alan C. Poole, an analyst at the investment house of Laidlaw, Adams & Peck.

Carter formally unveiled on Monday his new "restrained and austere" budget proposal for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1. It came less than two months after he had issued a fiscal 1981 spending blueprint that he termed "prudent and

The revision was prompted in good part by the speed-up in inflation to an annual rate of 18 percent in the first two months this year, Carter

advisers have said. Carter's latest budget proposal slashes \$17.2 billion in planned government spending as part of an effort to "produce a significant decline in inflation as the year progresses.

Coupled with planned increases in revenues from the president's new energy import taxes and other tax-raising measures, the cuts would leave a budget surplus of \$16.5 billion.

That would be the largest budget surplus in the nation's history, surpassing the \$12 billion surplus in 1948. And it would mark the first year since 1969 that the government did not spend more than it collected in revenues.

Because deficit spending is considered in-flationary, balancing the budget should help slow the price spiral. In addition, Carter has imposed credit controls to slow consumer spending and stepped up his voluntary wage and price guidelines program.

But outside economists point out the president's goals won't be realized if the conomic assumptions underlying the new budget are incorrect, as the analysts believe.

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### Spider mites build-up in the home landscape

Spiders have been observed in home landscapes in the area. With weather conditions such as they have been in recent weeks, spider mites are beginning to make their presence known. There are numerous mite species which attack home lawns and ornamental plants, and they can become extremely destructive. Mites are not insects but are frequently referred to as insect-like pests. Mites are classified with spiders, belonging to the Class Arachnida, Order Acarina, and have eight legs in the adult stage. These pests are small in size (approximately one-eighteenth of an inch in length) and round in shape. They are barely visible to the naked eye. When viewed with a magnifying glass, they appear to be sparsely covered with long rigid

Mite populations initially by spider mites develop a poisoning of small children develop on the undersides of reproductive potential of mites is extremely high, and in periods of hot, dry weather mites can complete a life cycle from egg to egg in approximately 5 days. required for mites to complete a life cycle. Mite eggs are usually oval in shape and may vary from a cream color to orange or bright red. The eggs usually hatch in 2 to 4 days and will hatch more readily during warmer periods. Mites usually overwinter in the egg stage, however some remain active throughout the year. Eggs deposited in late fall will hatch in early spring to initiate the first generation.

After mite eggs hatch, the larval stage appears, which is characterized by having only three pairs of legs. The females molt three times in the course of their growth, and the males molt only twice. In the adult stage mites have eight legs and are approximately one-sixtieth to one-eightieth of an inch in length. Most adults spin small threads of silk during their feeding activities, which aid in securing the eggs to the leaf.

### Contagious disease kills Baylor coed

WACO, Texas (AP) - A Baylor University student died Monday, apparently of a rare brain disease described as contagious to those in close contact with it.


Mary Patterson, 19, a freshman from Amarillo, became nauseous and was admitted to the Baylor Health Center Sunday evening, said Keith Hankins, administrative director of the center.

When she did not respond to treatment, she was transferred to Hillcrest Hospital, said Medical Director Cecil

He said Miss Patterson went into septic shock and died at 5 p.m. of "an overwhelming infection" that "looks like meningococcal infection." Details would not be available until test results are in Wednesday, he adde.

Edwards said Miss Patterson did not have meningitis, although same organism was in her bloodstream.

Dr. Gary K. Barbin, Waco internist, said eningozoccemia usually gins by infecting the brain and its lining. If not treated immediately, the infection could invade the bloodstream and cause death? he



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### Senior citizens need most protection

The public is regularly warned that there is an army of unscrupulous people who are ready to take advantage of those who can be charmed by 'pie in the sky' offers. The victims, more often than not, are the elderly.

RECENT STUDIES have shown that senior citizens have more consumer problems than the rest of the population — for a number of reasons. With less education and poorer reading skills, they are less able to take advantage of disclosures and are prone to rely on salespersons for information. Also, aching joints and other infirmities make it difficult for them to shop around.

In addition, hearing and vision impairment makes it more difficult for the elderly to bargain, and a higher rate of mental health problems affects their shopping skills and judgment. A fear of loneliness and aging renders them more susceptible to 'come-ons' from ingratiating salespersons. Poor self-images about their competance prompt them to be more

easily influenced by younger people.
It should be as easy to avoid unscrupulous schemes as it is to fall into Whenever the doorbell rings, people should stop and investigate before signing anything. Other rules which should be followed include:

- Check a contractor's reliability and performance with the Better Business Bureau or the nearest consumer protection agency.

Since plumbers, electricians,

carpenters and general contractors are usually licensed by state boards, ask to see their licenses, unless you know them.

- If home repairs need to be done, get written estimates from two or three reliable contractors to deter-

mine the costs. Review a contract carefully before signing.

 Beware of people who want full payment before doing a job. If the contractor fails to do a job or does it improperly, the recourse of withholding full payment will be lost.

- Be aware of high pressure techniques from door-to-door sales-

THE FEDERAL TRADE Com-

mission has a regulation that imposes a 'cooling off' period for door-to-door sales. This rule requires that the salesperson (1) inform consumers of their right to cancel the contract; (2) give consumers a dated receipt or contract that shows the name and address of the seller.

If the consumer decides to cancel the purchase, one copy of the form must be signed and mailed to the address given anytime before mid-night of the third day after the contract date.

#### Food thieves

WASHINGTON - The suffering of the Cambodian population that survived Pol Pot's murderous role is continuing under the hostile regime kept in power by the Vietnamese military, according to confidential cables received by the State Depart-

messages from U.S. Ambassador Morton Abramowitz in Thailand tell of murder, rape and theft of international food supplies by the occupying Vietnamese troops. Their harsh treatment has so alienated the native Khmer population that the puppet Heng Samrin government can keep its tenuous hold on the country only by the naked military force of its Vietnamese masters.

FROM REPORTS OF interviewers dispatched to refugee camps on the Thai-Cambodian border, Abramowitz has advised Secretary of State Cyrus Vance that "rape and robbery by PAVN (Vietnamese) soldiers are uniformly reported ... from all parts

Even officials of the Quisling government have been fleeing their homeland in droves, Abramowitz reports. "Their decision to escape (for) eventual resettlement in (other) countries is based on the common perception that life under the Vietnamese is intolerable." states one cable. It cites the twin motivating factors as "dread of a repressive Communist regime" and the

'ubiquitous threat of starvation.' As historic ethnic enemies of the Cambodians, the Vietnamese have no qualms about stealing food from the starving natives. One man in bloodstained trousers described to an interviewer how the Vietnamese had ambushed him and his friends. "He still had some rice only because the Vietnamese already had stolen more than they could carry from his murdered companions," one cable

According to the refugees, the Vietnamese distribute relief supplies of rice by day "in the presence of international workers, then confiscate (it) after the workers depart the scene," or replace it with corn. Some Soviet-supplied corn "is still clogging one warehouse ... but is so unap-pealing that only the most hungry will eat it," the cable reports.

ABRAMOWITZ HAS also provided evidence to support continued claims that the Vietnamese are actually shipping foreign rice supplies intended for Cambodia back to their own country.

A militiaman was quoted in one cable: "He saw two cargo barges arrive from Vietnam with corn. After unloading, one of the barges was filled with rice, which he claimed headed for Vietnam."

Other witnesses included a woman who "said she had twice seen Vietnamese load rice on barges at night, then head for Vietnam," and former history professor (who) claimed that he saw two trucks loaded with rice head...toward Vietnam."

An American scholar, Stephen Heder, was quoted at length by the ambassador, who described his observations as a "solid, penetrating look" at Cambodia. Heder wrote:

"Well-organized teams of Vietnamese troops ... consumed some of (Cambodia's home-grown) rice themselves, provided some of it to their closest collaborators, sold some of it on the black markets in the urban centers, and sent some of it back to Vietnam, officially or unofficially."

pounds of edible rice a month, but ordinary peasants often get only red corn or "small, broken rice from Vietnam which they said made them vomit," one cable reports.

Relief medical supplies are also peddled on the black maret, their foreign origin clearly identifiable, Abramowitz reported. Officials of the puppet regime are believed to be pro-fiteering on the international relief PLUSH

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Footnote: The cables, though detailing the diversion of foreign aid, confirm that many of the supplies do find their way to the Cambodian populace. Abramowitz told Vance that the relief effort must continue if famine is to be averted. And sources told my associate Les Whitten that Cambodian aid will survive President Carter's budget cuts.



They figure if they don't tell us the truth about how they're going to vote it could screw up the 1980 presidential election, which they're not too thrilled about to start

I was shocked to hear the news. "All of us in this country were brought up to respect the Flag, love our country and tell the truth when a stranger with a clipboard asks us who we are going to vote for. Have we lost our moral compass?

Harris replied, "It appears that way. I guess you could blame it on the generation. In the past Americans considered it their duty to tell a pollster the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth. They were aware that their responses affected the lives of candidates, campaign managers, the media and the public. The American system cannot operate if its leaders don't know what the public will do.

"Today when you stop a man on the street and ask him who he's going to vote for, you're likely to be told, 'It's none of your damn business.' It's gotten so bad that people don't even know who's going to win a primary until all the ballots have been count-

"That's terrible," I said. "It not only makes you people look like fools, but it keeps everyone in suspense. It's no fun to follow a primary and not know who is going to win until Election Day.'

"WELL, THAT'S what's happening. People now prefer to be kept in suspense, and they know the best way to do it is by not leveling with the pollsters. I'm aware of several cases in New York where registered Democrats told me they didn't know who they were going to vote for, and then went into the booth and pulled the lever for Kennedy.

"That's tantamount to perjury What can you people do about it?" I "Pass a law that if you lie to a

certified pollster in the street or on the phone, your ballot doesn't count.' 'That's a good idea, but how would you find out that they weren't telling

the truth?' "We'd poll their neighbors and relatives to find out how they really voted.

"Won't that cost money?" "Perhaps. But if we keep going the way we are, we'll be out of business anyway. What you have to understand is that those of us in the polling business are not just involved in politics. We make our big money working for private firms which are test-marketing new products. If a woman is going to lie to us about which candidate she is going to vote for, what is to prevent her from giving us a cock-and-bull story about the type of soapflakes she uses to wash her pantyhose?"

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

### Rhinitis: Check medicine chest

Dear Dr. Donohue: Would you explain in your column something about vasomotor rhinitis? I have been under medication for a long time, but am no better. - I.A.

Vasomotor rhinitis is a chronic nasal congestion with varying degrees of nasal dripping. Sneezing and itching are not common symptoms, as they are in allergic rhinitis. The congestion is a response of the nasal membranes to such things as cold weather, spicy food, strong odors, etc. Why some people have these

exaggerated responses is not clear. The sufferer must realize that it is a chronic condition and must avoid the conditions that irritate the nose. Decongestants like pseudoephedrine may bring relief, and physicians have tried freezing a portion of the lower inner nose. This helps some patients, not all.

Certain drugs are known to contribute to nasal congestion, for example some of the blood pressure medicines. Birth control pills may be responsible. Even pregnancy can lead to it.

It's well to investigate any drugs you may be taking and consult with your doctor about the possibility of using alternate ones as a trial to see if the rhinitis subsides.

Dear Dr. Donohue: Could you tell me the symptoms of a perforated colon? How would this be taken care of? — Worried.

A perforated colon is an emergency. Severe, crampy abdominal pain results from the spillage of intestinal contents into the abdominal cavity through the perforation (break). Immediate surgery to repair the colon is the treatment. You'll find the colon discussed in depth in the booklet "Colitis and Kindred Complaints." Bowen's disease is a cancer of the skin that is limited to the skin itself. It is called carcinoma "in situ" place. The good news is that surgically removing the cancer, which presumably was done in your case, should result in a cure. It is not a highly-malignant form of cancer.

Dear Dr. Donohue: What is Judwig's angina? — B.H.

is inflammation of the submaxillary gland, one of the major salivary glands in the mouth. This causes the inflammation and pain in the jawbone. The usual cause is the strep germ. It has nothing whatever to do with angina pectoris, which is a heart-related pain felt in the side and arm. Angina means "pain."

Ludwig's angina is serious if an abscess forms. This can push the tongue upward against the roof of the mouth and obstruct breathing. It is treated with antibiotics. In severe cases surgery may be needed to allow drainage from the infected area.

Dear Dr. Donohue: For the last six months to a year I have been having trouble with my menstrual periods and wonder if it is something that should be checked into. On the first day or two I have pain and cramps, but not the same kind I had when I was a teenager. I am 28 and have had three children. The cramps are lower

and around the vagina and rectum. They are like contractions. The rest of my cycle is OK and seems to be normal. Is this normal for a woman who has had children? - P.K.

No. it's not normal whether or not you have had children, especially if symptoms last two days Endemetriosis, growth of uterus tissue outside the uterus, might be suspected, or you may have fibroids or an infection. You should be checked. When symptoms during menstrual periods cause loss of time from normal activities the woman should be examined

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
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

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - In the 1980s, Dorothy and her pet dog Toto from the 'Wizard of Oz'' could just as well be swept away by a tornado in Washington, D.C., as on the plains of Kansas.

The nation's Tornado Alley is expanding from a stormridden strip of Oklahoma and Kansas to include large areas where no resident can assume safety from a twister, says Dr. T. Fujita, Theodore University of Chicago meteorology professor studying the shifting patterns of tornadoes.

A computer study of tornadoes shows the concentration of activity has moved since 1916, when records sufficient for study were first kept. But in the past 10 years the center has 'exploded all over the said Fujita, country," creator of the Fujita system of rating tornado intensity.

"People cannot think they are immune from tornadoes just because they are not in Oklahoma." he said. Last year, 826 tornadoes

killed 83 people. The worst storm of the decade, in 1974. spawned 146 twisters that killed 301 people in 11 states - all of them east of the Mississippi River.

'The 1970s seem to be very strange," Fujita said. "The centers seem to be just about everywhere.



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

# Union workers cripple largest transit system

NEW YORK (AP) — With transit officials predicting a long strike, New Yorkers were going to work today — by foot, in car pools and even in sailboats — after 35,000 union subway and bus workers crippled the nation's largest mass transit system by walking out in a wage dispute.

Millions of commuters who daily depend on the buses and subways to get to work were shut out of the city's 458 subway stations by New York's first transit strike in 14 years.

Transit Authority, which faces a \$250 million deficit next year and could not meet the union's demands.

Contract talks broke down shortly after 2 a.m. when the Transport Workers Union and Amalgamated Transit Union rejected management's offer of 12 percent over two years. Transit workers now average \$18,000 per year.

"If we can get a decent contract that our members can live with, we'll be happy to go back tomorrow," said Transport Workers Union President John Lawe.

Commuters from the Long Island suburbs also were left without public transportation into New York City today when unions struck the Long Island Railroad, the nation's

largest commuter rail line.
"It's obviously going to be very painful," said Mayor Edward Koch.

The strike was called in violation of a court order and the state's Taylor Law, which bans public employee strikes. Gov. Hugh Carey said the law would be enforced but he had no immediate plans to bring in the National

"The last thing in the world we wanted was a strike," said Richard Ravitch, chairman of the Metropolitan

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Transport Workers Union President John Lawe.

The unions initially demanded 30 percent over 21 months, but reduced their demand late Monday to increases of 15 percent and 10 percent - plus cost-of-living protection.

"They're going to have to come a long, long way down from the top of the mountain" to reach an agreement, said Ravitch, who told reporters he expected a long strike.

The city's subway stations began to close about 2:30 a.m. - about 25 minutes after the walkout began - as city agencies readied emergency plans to deal with traffic jams, health emergencies, and the adverse economic effects of the strike.

MTA employees were directed to complete all

scheduled runs along the system's 706 miles of track before laying up the MTA's 6,424 subway cars and 4,550

Officials estimate the strike could cost New York's economy as much as \$140 million a day. That does not include the authority's revenue losses from the 5.5 million daily 50-cent fares.

The MTA system includes the LIRR. Teamsters Local 808, representing the railroad's trackmen, announced a strike this morning, leaving commuters from Long Island's populous Nassau and Suffolk counties without suburb-to-city transit. The LIRR collects 270,000 fares

Negotiations with the railroad's seven operating labor unions had continued into the early morning hours today. Other unions said they would honor the trackmen's

To add to the confusion, toll takers at bridges linking Manhattan to New Jersey threatened to slow down today's heavy traffic by enforcing all rules to make a point in their

Koch set up a strike center at the city police headquarters, where he planned to meet with key agency directors to iron out problems created by the strike.

About 3,000 of the Police Department's 10,000-member patrol force were placed on 12-hour shirts at a cost of \$500,000 a day.

Traffic Department agents who normally ticket parking violators were assigned to key intersections to keep traffi: flowing, and paramedics on mopeds equipped with saildlebags full of medical equipment were dispatched o

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#### Shooting prompted by desire for revenge

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) - One day after he was mugged in the neighborhood where he had lived for 66 years, Theodore Jodoin confronted three men outside a liquor store. Then, screaming, "Do you recognize me?"

the 77-year-old man opened fire, police say. Stephen F. Harris, 30, was killed and two men were wounded, one critically, in the shooting Monday that police say apparently was prompted by a desire for

Police declined to say whether they believed Jodoin's claim that he had been mugged or that the shooting victims were somehow involved.

Jodoin was charged with one count of murder and two counts of assault and held overnight without bond in Franklin County Jail. He was to be arraigned today in Springfield District Court.

Police Capt. Francis Reilly described Jodoin as "an angry old man.

"He alleged that he was mugged and he went out looking for the parties responsible," Reilly said. According to police, the shooting occurred in a liquor store parking lot as Harris stood talking to two men in a

Harris, recently released from Walpole state prison and a brother-in-law of Springfield state Rep. Ray Jordan, was shot in the face with a .38-caliber handgun. Clifford Curtis, 55, was in critical condition after a bullet

passed through his neck and grazed his spine. Willie Hardy, 46, was in good condition with shoulder wounds.

of volcanic ash. Miller said in a telephone interview from Vancouver, Wash., across the Columbia River from Portland, that geologists still had found no evidence of lava in the eruptions of steam, gas and ash that began March 27.

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

# Higher prices for higher education

The same inflation that is queezing family budgets is boosting the cost of going to college, with prices at some schools nearing the \$10,000-a-year mark for the coming academic season.

The Chronicle of Higher Education recently reported that double-digit increases in prices for tuition, room and board will be common this fall. The average boost will be about 13 percent - about equal to the increase in the Consumer Price Index in

"We've been hit with in-flation like everybody else," said Steve Kezerian of Yale University. "That, and higher energy costs and faculty salary increases."

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

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
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### Murder suspect, symbol for aged

Sympathetic letters from around the country are pouring in to a quiet, lean 68year-old retiree charged with killing a teen-ager he says threw snowballs at his

He has been interviewed by a national magazine and a network television news

charges against The Roman Welzant are serious — in May he will be tried for second-degree murder, assault with intent to commit murder and related firearms counts — yet people are contributing to a defense fund. More than \$1,700 has been collected, in small contributions, many from elderly people.

To many, Welzant has become a symbol of the elderly oppressed, American, living on a fixed income, fearful of assault or robberv

"Apparently from the letters we're getting from all over, people are suffering the same as we did," said

More than 10 years ago, Welzant began having skirmishes with the local teen-agers who hung out behind his rowhouse in this blue-collar Baltimore suburb.

"It was a general day-today thing, a rock coming through a window, an egg splashing against the side of Welzant house,' recalled.

His war, for that is what it became, reached a climax Jan. 4 when he allegedly shot and killed Albert Kahl, 18, and wounded James Willey, His attorney, Russell White, said the teens had thrown snowballs at his then assaulted Welzant when he went outside to identify them.

Welzant chain-smoked as he sat in White's office, recounting what he said were years of constant harassment. He and his 64year-old wife, Genevieve, said they lived in fear of being attacked and of having their house vandalized.

We were always under tension or stress not knowing what the night would bring. You never knew what might happen or what they might he said of the teen-agers who gathered on the grounds School behind his home.

Over the years, Welzants said their house was stoned and battered with snowballs in the winter, eggs at Halloween. They said their lawn and hedge were set on fire, their car was vandalized. Once, they were trapped in their car by youths throwing snowballs. The Welzants say their lives are no better since January

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

#### Success didn't change Staubach's values

DALLAS (AP) - After Dallas beat Miami in Super Bowl VI, Cowboy quarterback Roger Staubach branded himself a hopeless square, an image he has retained to this day.

He was voted the game's Most Valuable Player and

won a shiny, new sports car. He expressed his thanks but asked if he could have, instead, a car that was a little more practical for a man with three children.

He traded a Corvette for a station wagon, and the image stayed with him throughout his career. But the image is backed by a considerable amount of

Staubach's personal life is dominated by deep religious convictions, loyalty to his family and his

personal integrity.

He has been a devout, church-going Roman Catholic all his life. When he received the Heisman Trophy after his junior season at the Naval Academy, a writer asked him, "how does it feel to hold the game's greatest award in your hand."

Staubach replied, "Well, it won't help me get to heaven, will it?"

That trophy stays in a back room of his North Dallas home and his daughters used to use it for a hobby horse when they were younger.

A few months after Super Bowl VI, Staubach

rejected an offer to endorse an automobile company

He had already agreed to endorse a local, competing car dealer and said he wanted to meet that obligation, even though the dealer said he would let Staubach out of the agreement for a chance to make more money

"I don't have an agent and I couldn't care less about selling my name in the off-season. That hasn't taken me over ... and I hope it never does," he said.

In 1973, as the Cowboys were fighting for the playoffs, Staubach suffered through the most trying period of his life.

His mother was dying of cancer. "I'd think about her at times during practice and lose concentration," he said, recalling that difficult time. "I cut everything off. We didn't go out. Everything was

Staubach turned down every demand on his time, forfeiting thousands of dollars in personal appearances, to be with his "No. 1 fan" in her last days. Despite the emotional turmoil, he led the team into the NFC Championship game and ranked as the

league's top passer. "He did a great job under conditions I don't believe another man could have handled," said teammate Lee Roy Jordan.

Staubach and his wife, Marianne, have four daughters and a son, ranging from 13 to 2 years old. As a hedge against his football retirment, Staubach owns part of a local real estate agency and a fast-food franchise in Ohio.

He also donates his time to several charitable groups, including the American Diabetes Association, the Salvation Army, Easter Seals and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes

Last June he received the annual Byron "Whizzer" White award for outstanding community service by an

"Today everything is sort of blank for me," said Staubach. "This retirement thing is tough. My 5-year-old son, Jeff, doesn't even understand. He came up to me and said: 'Dad, does this mean we're not going to work out anymore?""

Staubach said deciding to retire had made him a "nervous wreck." It finally got the best of him at his press conference that was televised live by three stations and broadcast in a telephone hookup Washington and St. Louis.

"I wasn't going to do this," said Staubach, dabbing at big tears.

The 38-year-old Staubach, rated the No. 1 career passer in National Football League history, said he did not retire because of five concussions to go in and in one year he had received last year.

"I've never worried about injuries and examinations I underwent showed no brain damage. said Staubach. "One doctor

Wife Marianne later told The Associated Press that Staubach's head injuries "did worry me. After the third one last year I asked him to see a neurologist and he did so about mid-season. was concerned. I just wanted him to see somebody.

Staubach said he retired because "It was a gut feeling....I wanted to spend more time with my family...of course, my concussions were sort of historical....I've had more than my share."

"He was a great twominute quarterback, sort of like Bobby Layne," said Landry, who has been in the NFL 30 years as a coach and player.

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



'any party to a rate proceeding before the governing body of a municipality" - in this case, the San Marcos city council may appeal a rate decision. Appeals in natural cases go to the railroad commission; those about telephone, sewer or electric

rates go to the Public Utility

Commission A second, more specific clause allows citizens to appeal by obtaining signatures of 10 percent, or 20,000, of the city's voters, whichever is less. A San Marcos group started a petition drive but failed.

The potential confusion of consumer appeals section was apparent to the Texas Municipal League soon after the 1975 utility law passed. A TML analysis that

summer said, "Exactly what persons are authorized to initiate an appeal is unclear, because the Act gives no specific indication of who any party to a rate proceeding might be." It concluded a court suit might be necessary to define

On the petition process, the TML report said, "This technique represents a radical departure from present procedures under which utilities, and only utilities, may appeal... The San Marcos case hing-

es on the first, more vague provision since it involves just one party: Lena Green, an elderly, low-income ratepayer. But she represents all residential ratepayers in San Marcos, say her attorneys, Stephen Gardner and Nell Hahn of the Legal Aid Society of Central Texas in Austin.

They received encouragement from Jack Hopper, an Austin economist and utility consultant who lobbied for the 1975 law.
