Killing Freeze Latest In Years

THE OLD double standard...I grew up on it. Back then, women who worked outside the home were not paid very much but men tipped their hats and opened doors for them. That was before equality got to be the really big thing in every issue. In those days I think we called it fairness.

But in the real world, fairness OR equality are hard to find anywhere and the old double standard is still hard at work.

Do you know that nuclear energy is the cleanest, safest and cheapest way to get the needed utilities to run our homes, businesses, farms and factories? We are paying through our pores for gas and electricity in the Panhandle area of Texas while people in other states are using nuclear energy and paying what amounts to a small fraction of our utility costs.

Well, it appears that the government has decided to dump wastes from that nuclear energy into our backyard (Deaf Smith County) whether anyone wants it or not. So we are going to be faced with the hazards of storing nuclear wastes from other states: Arkansas, Missouri, Indiana, Maine, etc. without ever having been able to receive any benefits (lower utility rates) from those nuclear products. The old double standard is alive and well and in full force in the Texas Panhandle.

I don't know a lot about geology (remember, genealogy is my field) but it certainly seems that a better place for a nuclear waste dump would be in some desert where it wouldn't bother anything except cactus, a few lizards and some scorpions. Putting the thing in the middle of a large agricultural area just doesn't make any sense. Of course the Great Plains was, at one time, considered a desert but that was before irrigation came about in the early 1900s. So it appears that the DOE people have been looking at topographical reports of this area dating about 1890.

The state of Nevada doesn't want the dump either, and their state government is doing some pretty underhanded things to make sure it doesn't get dumped into their desert.

Nuclear energy is the second leading source of electricity in the U.S. with over a hundred operating plants. This nuclear-generated electricity may be our best defense against another oil crisis. But I still have a lot of misgivings about planting nuclear waste under a corn field north of Hereford. See, the double standard, in that respect, doesn't bother me a bit.

Texas Governor Clements took a step in the right direction a few weeks ago when he went to Washington with a proposal to establish a committee for investigating alternate energy sources (other than oil). We don't know yet what the outcome of that proposal will be but it is worth watching.

The most plausible alternate energy source available for automotive use is, as most of us know, ethanol. This alcohol grain product has been the only fuel used in race cars at the Indianapolis speedway for the past decade, according to news columnist Paul Harvey. Vice President George Bush and Sen. Robert Dole are among the legislators who are interested in getting a mandate for the use of ethanol blends of gasoline in high pollution areas of the country.

We have had the "know-how" to make price-competitive alcohol fuels from farm grain products for over 30 years. The result of widespread use of ethanol in the U.S. would be: less dependency on foreign oil, less trade deficit, less agricultural surplus, less air pollution.

I don't know why it is taking so long to get this alternate energy industry off and running, but there is obviously a wrench in the works somewhere. The double standard, translated as \$\$\$\$ is at work here also.

UNCLE AUSTIN SAYS: All progress stems from change, but all change is not necessarily progress.

One of the latest killing freezes in a number of years finally called a halt to the growing season locally on Tuesday morning, when the mercury dropped to a low of 18 degrees.

The temperature fell below the freezing mark again on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, falling to 23 degrees on Thursday.

Farmers in the area have been well pleased with the later killing freeze, although most maize farmers could not begin harvesting their crop until the freeze killed the plants.

The area's cotton crop has been tremendously helped by the "Indian Summer" weather that the region enjoyed for the past month. Cotton has continued to mature and now the freeze will get the crop ready for machine harvest.

One farmer who has between 600 and 700 acres of cotton, said this had been the best growing season for cotton in almost 20 years. Even the cotton that had to be re-planted in June will make a good crop.

It is felt that the cotton may average a bale and one-half per acre, which is a good average for the northern edge of the cotton country.

Harvesting should be able to get underway in about a week, most people think, although the ones who make modules may wait even longer.

In addition to having a better than average growing season for cotton, the price for that commodity is somewhat better than it has been for many years, so things are looking up for the cotton farmers for 1987.

Lubbock Entrant Wins Second Time

In a week in which the slate of contest games was shattered by upsets and tie games, the scores nosedived, in the ninth week of the Friona Star's annual grid game guessing contest.

Riding the tide of upsets was John Seright of Lubbock, winning the weekly contest for the second time this season, took first place with a score of 15.

Seright was the only contestant entering the weekly event to correctly pick 15 games.

(The Nazareth-Happy and Washington vs Arizona games ended in ties, so were automatically counted wrong, since it technically is possible to pick a tie in the contest.)

In addition to the tie games, Seright missed the Littlefield-Tulia, Perryton-Dalhart, Estacado-Hereford, ENMU-Texas A&I and Denver-Buffalo games.

Second place went to Mark Neill, who was likewise the only contestant to correctly pick 13 games. (No one had 14 games right).

Three contestants correctly picked 12 games, and of these, Jo Blackwell claimed third place after missing the Friona-Floydada

tiebreaker score by only a point. She picked the Chiefs to win, 7-6, thinking the Whirlwinds would surely try for the win on their conversion.

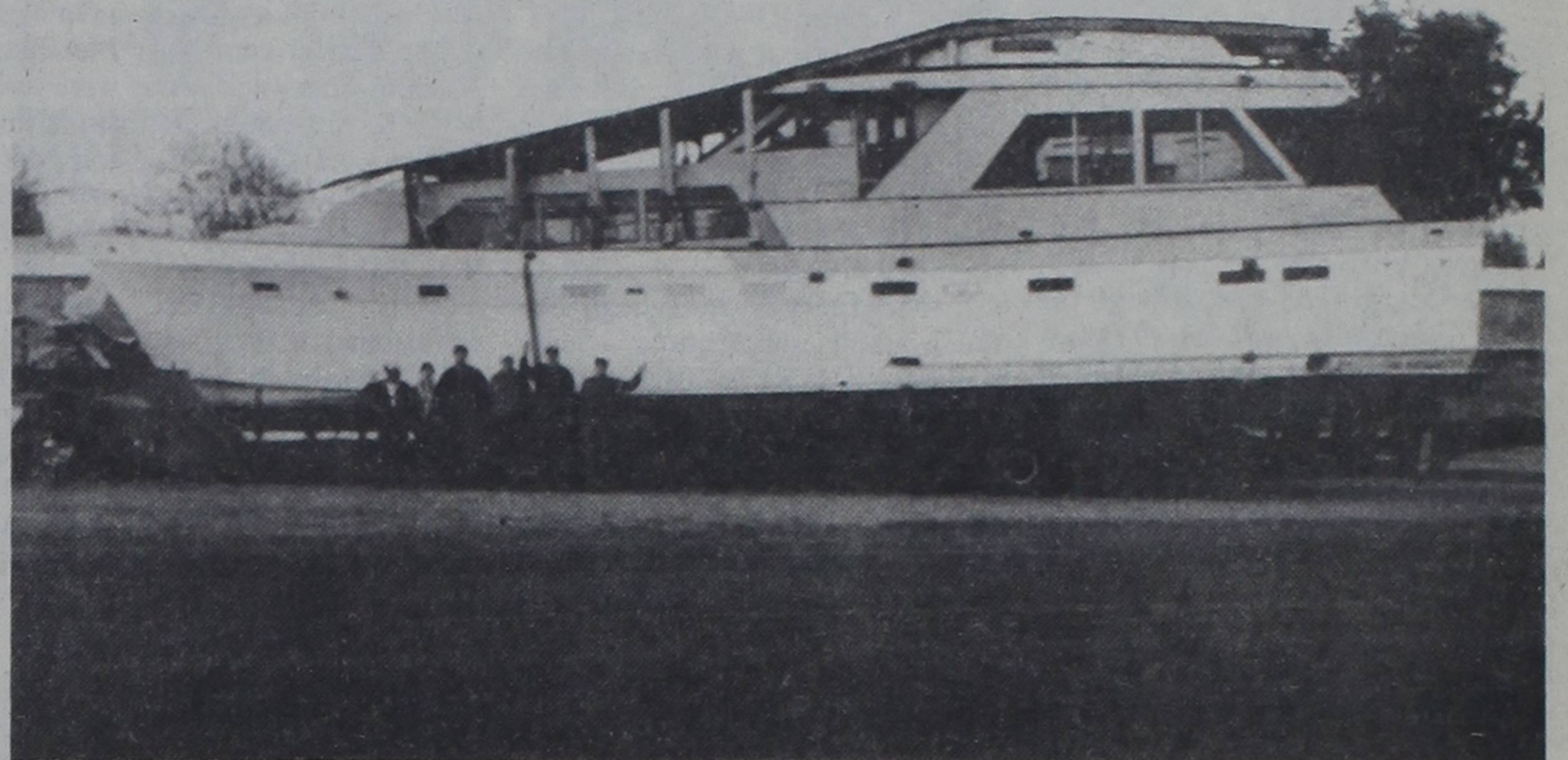
Mrs. Blackwell missed ENMU-Texas A&I, LSU-Alabama, Denver-Buffalo, Houston-San Francisco, Colts-Chargers and Redskins-Philadelphia games.

Scott Houston and Ky Graham also picked 12 games correctly, but each missed the tie-breaker score by 13 points, both pegging Friona to win, 14-13.

Twenty contestants had scores of 11 for the week, not usually a great score, but this week just lacking one point having a shot at a cash prize.

His good weekly score enabled Mark Neill to pull into a three-way tie for the lead in the overall standings with Jim Beard and Jerry Hinkle. The three contestants each have scores of 121.

Tommy Moss, like Hinkle a former contest winner, is in second place with a score of 120. Donnie McDonald and Eddie Mann have scores of 119. Seright pulled into a tie with Bobby Wied at 118.

Hospital Service Detailed

The Parmer County Community Hospital has a service it was asked for several years ago, and has provided, but with which many people are not familiar.

Many times a patient does not meet the criteria established by Medicare for admission, but the patient can be admitted under custodial care. The patient, or the patient's representative, must sign a form prior to admission that they realize the stay will not be covered under Medicare and will assume responsibility for the payment of the charges.

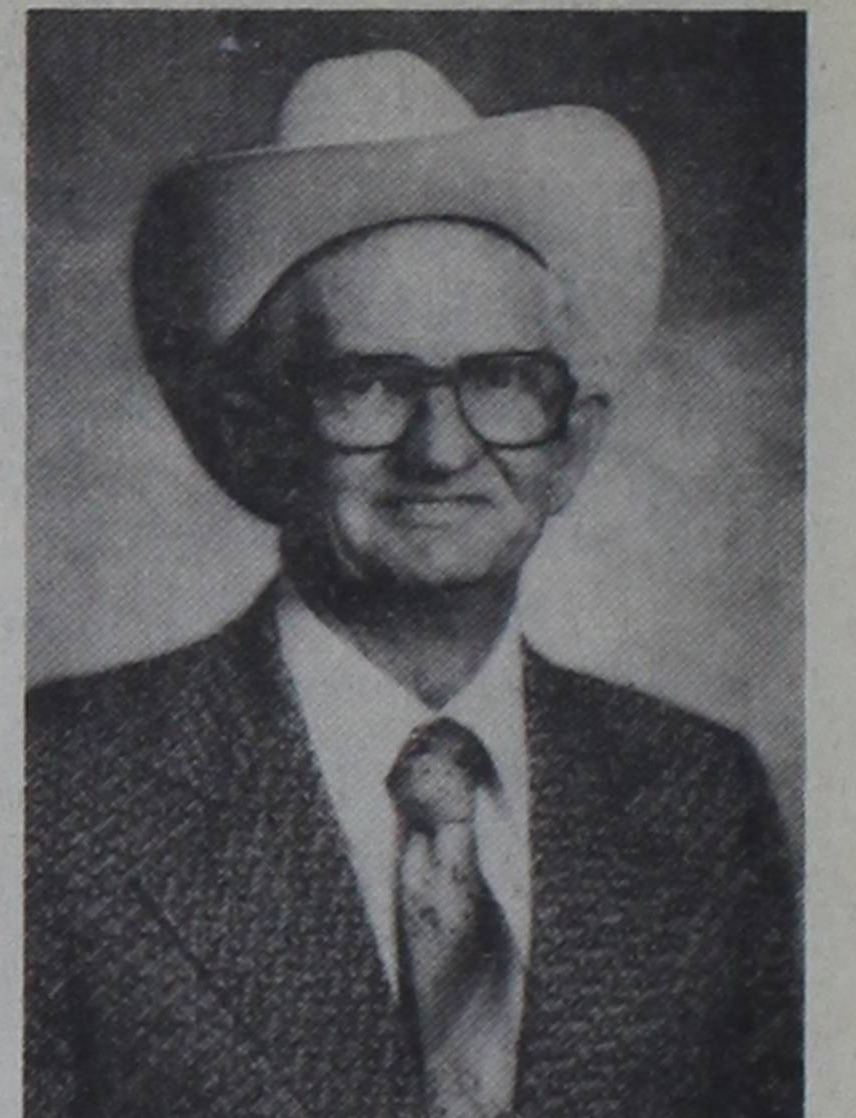
People have utilized this service when the patient needs to

recuperate a few more days from surgery, or the family needs to be out of town for a weekend, or perhaps even on vacation.

This service is available for anyone who needs the care regardless of age, and the patient can stay as long as he desires under private pay. This procedure can also be used for a continued stay if the patient no longer meets the criteria for hospitalization.

The forms must be signed at the time the physician determines hospitalization no longer meets the criteria.

The patients who have utilized this have been well pleased, says hospital administrator Elda Hart.

Parents Warned Of Teen Drug Threat

Over the years we have seen some changes in the drug scene. Due to increased awareness by both children and adults, many kids are not "experimenting" with drugs. But, the education process cannot stop. There are still millions of children drinking alcohol and "doing" drugs. Education is working, but it is an on-going process.

Our nation's future rests in the hands of our youth. However, will they have the capacity to make the decisions necessary to run this country? Unfortunately, thanks to drugs and alcohol, some of our youth will not be prepared to greet the future. Others will never see it. Therefore, the future lies not only in their hands; but in the hands of the adults.

To help determine if there is a teenager in your home who might have an alcohol or drug problem, the following test has been prepared:

1. Has your teenager's type of friends changed? How much do you know about these friends?
2. Does your teenager spend a lot of time alone? When you ask where he or she has been, do you get a vague answer? Are drugs missing from the medicine chest? What about the liquor cabinet?
3. Have you noticed an erratic behavior pattern in your teenager? Does he or she have an extremely negative attitude and low motivation to do things?
4. Have you received reports from school of frequent truancy? Are grades dropping? Has your teenager complained about

mistreatment by school officials or other kids? Has there been a decrease in school activities?

5. Have you observed a change in appearance? Health habits? Eating patterns? Have there been frequent flu-like symptoms like red eyes, coughing, fatigue? Is there a lack of coordination or spontaneous response?

6. Does your teenager have extra money you cannot account for? Is he or she buying more records, clothes, or other items than usual? Are other kids coming to your home but not staying long?

Remember--due to increased awareness, many kids are not experimenting with drugs. However, if you answered "yes" to some of these questions, your teenager may have an alcohol or drug problem. 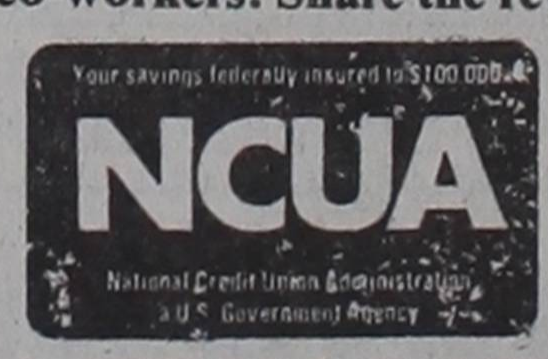

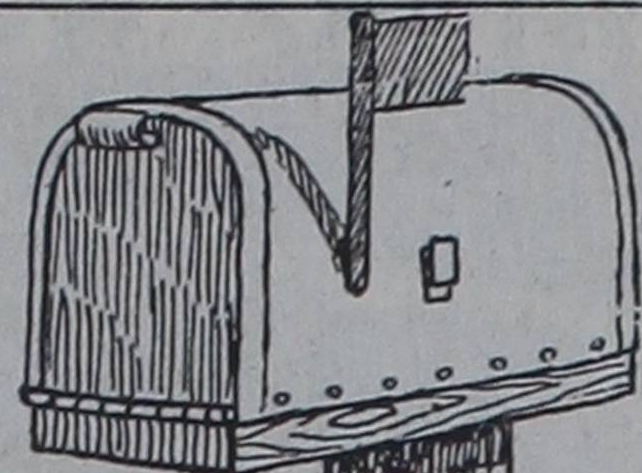

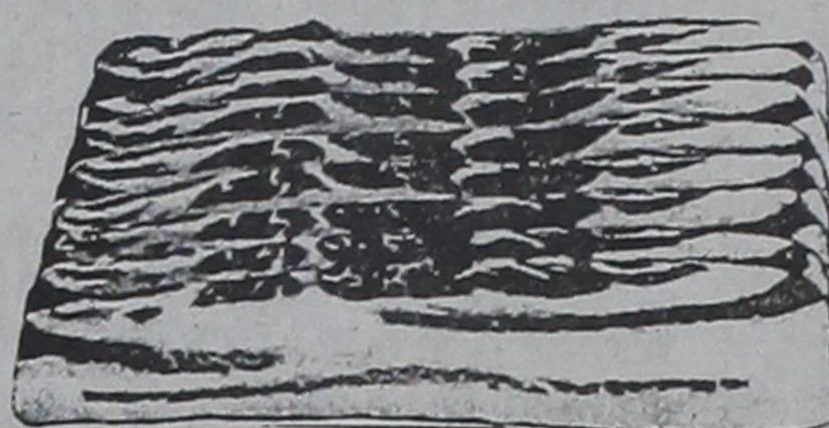

Chieftains Tie Floydada; Knock 'Winds From Race

You might say that the Friona Chieftains took care of a 23-year-old grudge in their 7-7 tie against the potent Floydada Whirlwinds in their season-ending football game last Friday at Chieftain Field.

Since Tulia upset previously unbeaten Littlefield, the tie knocked the Whirlwinds out of the playoffs. Floydada needed a win to have forced a three-way tie for the district title.

With all due respects, the Whirlwinds shouldn't have even had a chance to tie the game, and in that respect, the game resembled the first-ever meeting of the two schools in football, back in 1964.

In that earlier game, Friona went to Floydada with a 4-0 district record, seeking a district title after a long drought. The Chieftains outplayed Floydada up and down the field, but had to settle for a pair of field goals. Just like last Friday, Floydada scored a TD and won the game, 7-6, and took the playoff rights, thanks to the win.

Moss Gives Thoughts On Season

Coach Tommy Moss this week commented on the Friona Chieftain season just ended, where the Chiefs went down to the wire in search of the playoffs for a second straight year.

"The kids played well all year, with the exception of one game. As long as they play hard, you really can't complain," Moss said.

As a sidelight to the Floydada game, Jimmy Madrid, a starter on defense, missed the game when his mother was having a kidney transplant in San Angelo.

In addition, defensive end Brent Riethmayer sustained a knee injury early in the game and had to watch most of the game from the sidelines.

With that in mind, Friona holding the potent Whirlwinds scoreless until the final 18 seconds was quite an accomplishment.

Fullback Ben Osborn was hit in the back during Friona's first scoring threat which ended with a fumble at the goal-line. Osborn had to come out of the game because he was having trouble breathing. His replacement was not used to running from that formation, and this may have contributed to the untimely fumble.

Injuries zapped the team during the year, but the team rebounded and stayed in the playoff chase. "A lot of teams would have just quit if they were hit like we were on injuries, but they kept working. It has been a pleasure to have coached this group of young men," Coach Moss said.

The Chieftain mentor said that the prospects look good for outstanding teams the next couple of years, and on down the line, the current eighth grade team looks to have perhaps the best overall talent in a class in some time.

Moss said he appreciated the fan and community support for the Chieftains this season.

Like we said, the Chieftains SHOULD have had a 14-0 lead in the fourth quarter, but just like the 1964 meeting, they had trouble getting into the Whirlwinds' end zone.

Friona controlled the tempo in the first quarter, after Floydada elected to give Friona the ball and take the prevailing south wind.

The Chieftains had the ball 23 plays to only four for Floydada in the first quarter.

Daniel Echols returned the opening kickoff 34 yards to the Friona 37-yard line, just lacking beating one man having a 96-yard kickoff return. But his nice return did give the Chiefs good field position, which they enjoyed all of the opening quarter.

The second time Friona had the ball, they started a drive at their own 20. Ben Osborn burst through for ten yards, then later eight, both times giving the Chiefs first downs.

But Friona had to punt, and Floydada took over on their own 36-yard line. Stephen Thornton knocked the ball out with a good tackle on first down, and Friona had a big break at the Whirlwind 40.

Osborn ran for 13 yards to the visitors' 27, and on a fourth down try, gave Friona new life with a quick-hitter to the 14.

On the first play of the second quarter, Echols faked to Cody Bracken and swept to the left for ten yards. He was forced out of bounds at the half-yard line. The defensive play loomed large for Floydada on the next down.

The Echols to Bracken handoff on first down was bobbled, and Floydada recovered the loose ball at their three to abort what looked like a sure touchdown drive for Friona.

Floydada drove out of trouble to their 44, before the Chieftain defense forced a punt. Friona couldn't move, however, and punted the ball back.

Friona got the ball back after the wind caught a Floydada punt that went only to the Whirlwind 39.

Echols gained nine yards and Osborn seven to the Floydada 23 as the clock showed two minutes left in the half.

Echols then made ten yards up the middle on the quarterback draw, to the 13. Osborn gained four, and Bracken two as the ball

was advanced to the Floydada seven.

Echols took the ball on a keeper play, and outran defensive man Jason Brown to the end zone with just 46 seconds left on the clock. Echols said after the game: "I knew our guys had everyone else blocked, and I said to myself, 'he's not going to beat me.'"

Cody Burney's kick gave Friona a 7-0 halftime lead, as Friona had doubled Floydada's offense in the opening half.

Early in the third quarter, a bad snap on a punt situation evoked fears of costing Friona a TD, but the defense dug in and forced a Floydada punt.

Booming the kick with the wind, Floydada backed Friona up to its 14, and a penalty further to the nine.

Echols helped the situation with a nifty 27-yard run on the QB draw play, advancing to the 36. But the Chiefs had to punt, and this time Thornton's kick was partially blocked to the Floydada 43.

The Whirlwinds seemed to have a snappy drive going to Friona's 20, when speedy freshman Collins was separated from the ball on a big defensive play by David Bugg and Echols. Friona took over the ball at its own 15.

Friona's defense continued to turn back the Whirlwinds, but the offense couldn't get a drive going.

Finally, late in the quarter, the Chiefs drove from their own ten following a punt. Echols gained 12 on the keeper, and then six to cross midfield as the team swapped ends of the field.

Friona faced fourth and two from the Floydada 32, and tried for the first down. The Whirlwinds showed their defensive talent by stopping Echols a yard behind the line of scrimmage—his first loss of the entire game, to turn back the threat and take the ball.

A pair of back-breaking flags within minutes cost Friona its win. Inside the four-minute mark, Echols was loose on a 20-yard gain, which appeared to give Friona a first down at their own 49. But Friona was flagged for clipping (if they clipped, it wasn't within 20 yards of Echols), and that forced the Chiefs to punt.

Next, with only 1:23 left in the game, Friona appeared to have the Whirlwinds backed up with a third and ten at the Friona 39, when officials threw a flag for pass interference, giving Floydada a first down at the Friona 26.

Corey Bates ran nine yards on a keeper play on third down from the Friona 22, giving Floydada new life with only 37 seconds left in the game. Echols saved the TD with a tackle at the 13.

The Whirlwinds used all of their timeouts, and on third down from the Friona five, Johnny Taylor went into the end zone to make it

7-6. Not hesitating, the Floydada coach sent Bates in to kick the tying point, not realizing they needed to go for the win.

"I felt at the time that it was the right choice," Floydada coach Earl Overton remarked.

The Chieftains had held Floydada to 86 total yards through the first three quarters of the game, but the Whirlwinds drove 58 yards in less than three minutes of playing time to tie the game.

In four games, Floydada had not scored against the Chieftains since the first quarter of the 1984 contest, until the TD with 38 seconds remaining last Friday.

For the season, Friona finished 7-2-1 (.750). In the past two seasons, the Chiefs have won 16, lost five and tied one, likewise a .750 winning percentage.

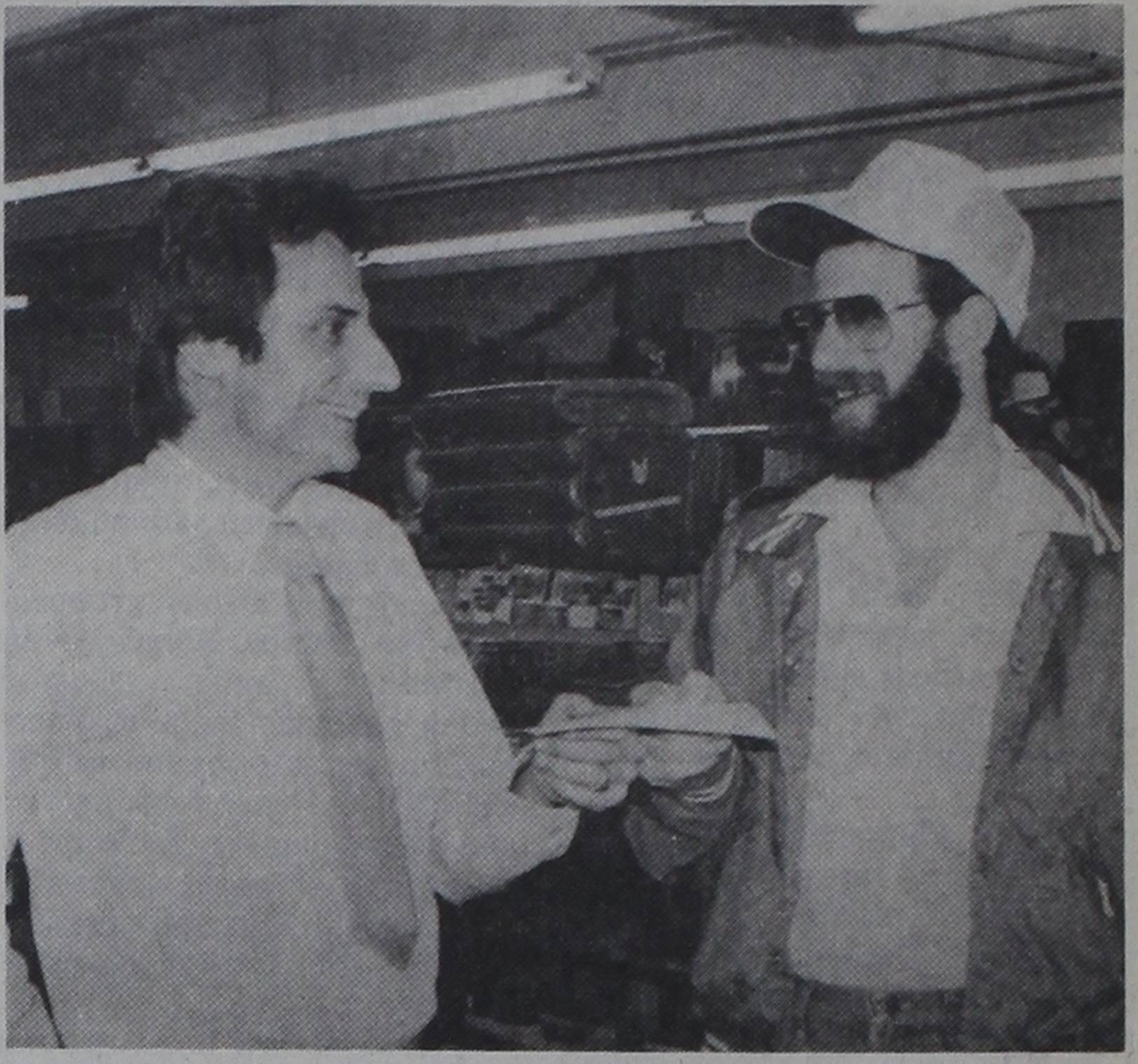

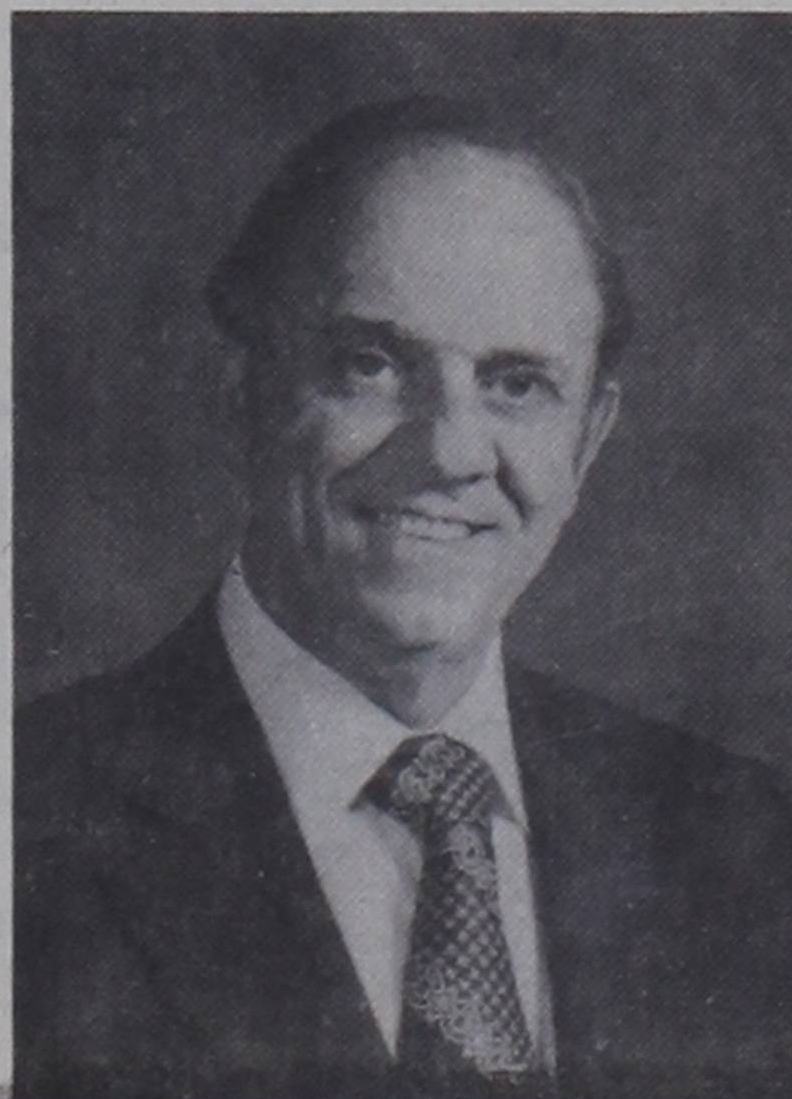
Methodist Revival To Start Sunday
