Can you look at it and see how nice it's going to be with landscaping, lamp posts and park benches? Pretend that the contrasting trim has been painted, the molding replaced, the roof repaired and the inside is full of interesting antiques and art works. Many exciting items have already been donated for the "museum" but they cannot be placed in their new home until the interior renovation is completed.

Perhaps it would have been simpler to erect a statue in the park to honor our pioneers. We would just all donate some money to have it built and then sit back and forget about it. But that is not the purpose of a monument. This particular monument is going to require a little more thought, effort, energy and money than that. In return, we will have a meeting place in the park for parties, game nights, or just a nice place to take our out-of-town guests and tour them through the place.

Community Heritage Society is struggling along with a few active members attempting to accomplish a very large feat. This is something that everyone in Friona should get involved with to help make the Depot a source of civic pride. If you can help scrape paint, or donate some lumber, or help with moneyraising activities, please offer to do so. If you can do no more than talk to your friends and neighbors about the Depot and get their interest up, then that, too, will be helpful.




