## Cordova Featured

A Friona High School graduate, Isidore (Izzy) Cordova, was featured in a recent article in "Skyliner," a news monthly published by the Austin Chamber of Commerce.

Cordova, a 15-year veteran with Southwestern Bell in Austin, took part in a program where companies "loan" their executives to the Austin Chamber to assist full-time in economic development and education work.

Southwestern Bell was one of two companies who loaned executives full-time for the special chamber of commerce work.

Cordova, an area manager for Bell, has devoted several months to the Chamber researching and compiling data for the Target Market Program's Commercial Information Committee, Insurance Committee and Electronics Committee.

Cordova gathered for each committee information on companies already doing business in Austin and companies in those three areas (commercial information, insurance and electronics) who are good candidates for moving to Austin from headquarters elsewhere. He reported back to his company late in 1987 after his stint with the Chamber.

"We're setting a new direction for Austin," said Cordova. "I've been able to uncover a lot of eye-opening information about companies here that proves this city is conducive to attracting quality companies."

Serving will be held from 5-8 p.m. at the high school cafeteria. Chili or stew will be on the menu, along with pie and drinks.

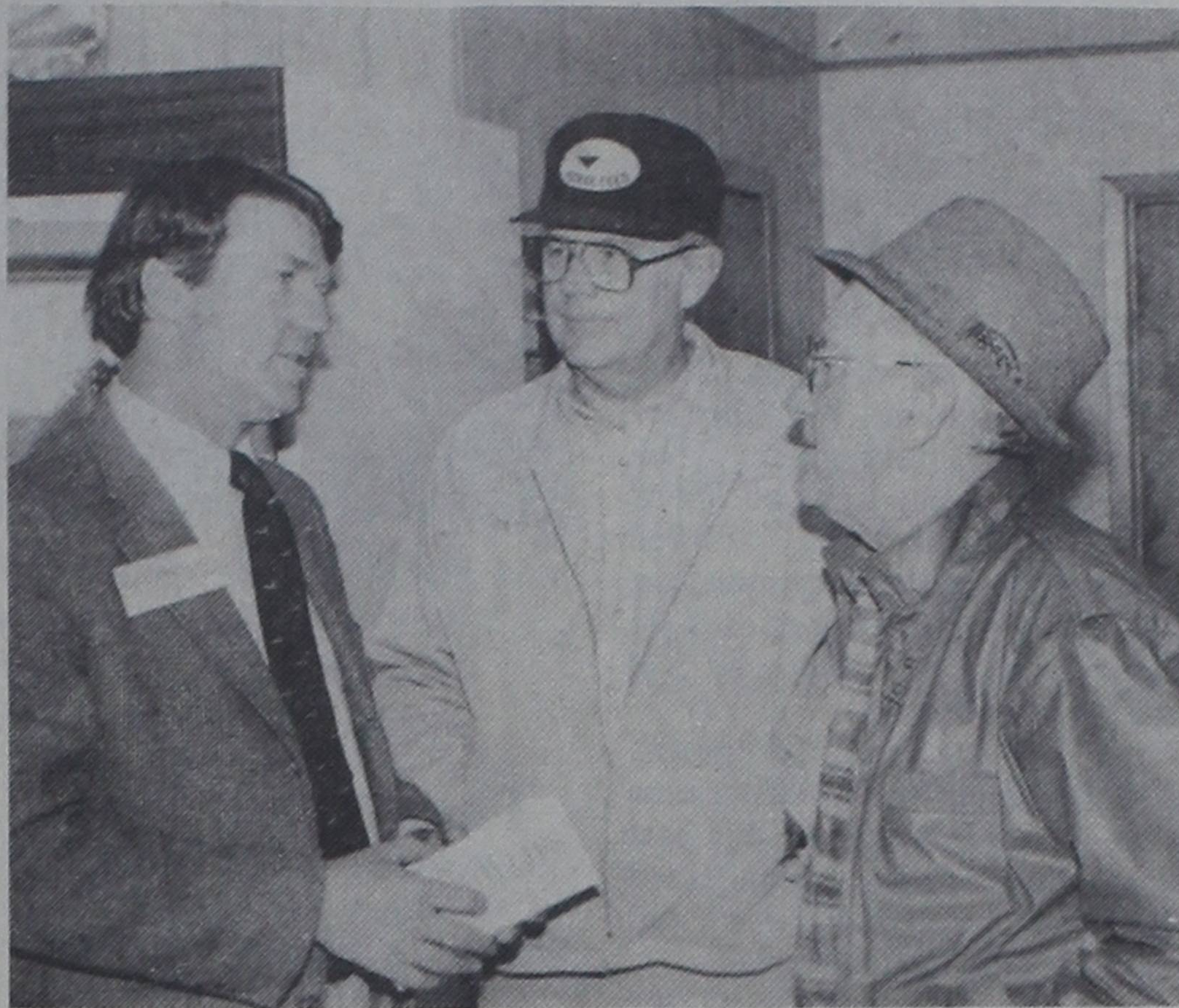

## Mel Phillips In Campaign Visit

State senatorial candidate Mel Phillips of Amarillo brought his campaign to Friona on Thursday, making a quick coffee stop to visit with local residents.

Phillips has filed for the state senate seat being vacated by Sen. Bill Sarpalus, who has announced for the U.S. Congressional seat.

Phillips reminded those he met that it's only 48 days until the "Super Monday" primary election, and pointed out the problems the early primary brings. He is campaigning in 26 counties during the short period, and was finishing up a two-day, six-city swing in Friona on Thursday.

He is a longtime Democratic worker on the county, state and national level, and says he has absolutely no interest in going farther than state politics. "This office is as much as I would ever want. I spent three years in Washington and discovered that that is a completely different lifestyle," Phillips said.

The senate candidate, 44, is the father of three children, Abby, 13, Catherine, three and Lauren, one. He says that with the state senate meeting for six months every other year, he could take his family with him.

He is a native of Amarillo, where he is a real estate developer

and has farming operations. "I understand the plight of the farmers, and if elected, I want to hear from the residents of the Friona area, to know what they want me to try to accomplish. I will always be beholden to my constituents as to their wishes, if I am elected," Phillips said.

Phillips decried the low return that the Panhandle area gets on its state taxes, citing a survey which showed that this district receives only one dollar in services for every seven dollars it spends in taxes.

"I don't see how they have the guts to send us back this little in taxes. Plus, you have the school reform program, mandating certain things, but leaving it up to the school districts to provide the financing. This just isn't fair," Phillips said.

Phillips also spoke against the threat to end or curtail funding on vocational programs in the state, which includes such things as vocational agriculture in high schools.

Phillips' wife is the former Becky Bentsen, and is the niece of Senator Lloyd Bentsen. Phillips was accompanied to Friona by his brother-in-law, Don Bentsen.

He served as Randall County Democratic Chairman from 1980 to 1984, and was elected president of the Texas Democratic County Chairmen's Assn. He was on the state Democratic Executive Committee in 1982-84. A former Navy pilot, he also serves on the

## New Chief Is Elected

When election of officers for the Friona Fire Department was held at the department's first meeting of 1988, a changing of the guard was held for the first time in 28 years.

Ralph Shirley, who has served as Friona's Fire Chief since 1960, is stepping down from the chief's position. Jim Taylor will serve as the new chief.

Other officers elected were Glenn Reeve, Jr., assistant chief; Bobby Jordan, secretary-treasurer; Danny Campbell, captain, Company 1; Lee Campbell, captain, Company 2; John Taylor, lieutenant, Company 1; Randy Richards, lieutenant, Company 2; and Alan Clark, reporter.

Steve Jones will serve as training officer. Larry Martin will be assistant training officer. Alan Wood will serve as whistle blower and Landon Martin will be the department's mascot.

Two members of the department, Porter Roberts and Ruben Taylor, are retiring after a number of years of service on the force.

## Cotton Yield Best In Years

According to a survey of Parmer County gins on Monday, a total of 48,392 bales of cotton had been ginned in Parmer County as of Monday, January 18.

Ginners indicate that if they could get a week of good weather they could be all but through with ginning the 1987 crop. The large snows received in December slowed the ginning process, although most of the crop had been harvested and was in the form of modules. Muddy fields made it difficult to pick up the modules for a time.

The latest survey indicates that the 1987 yield in Parmer County is virtually certain to top the 50,000-bale mark, which is the most bales produced in Parmer County in a number of years.

One ginner said that most of the growers had produced two bales of cotton per acre, and all of his customers had made at least 800 pounds of lint per acre.

The ginner at Lazbuddie County gins on Monday, a total of 48,392 bales of cotton had been ginned in Parmer County as of Monday, January 18. The ginner commented that farmers in that area had missed most of the bad weather for the past three years and had made good crops each of those years. "The farmers are good farmers and know how to raise the crop. But the 'man upstairs' made the difference," the ginner said, in regard to the past year's crop.

After some cotton farmers got somewhat of a late start with their crop, the weather cooperated in late fall with a beautiful "Indian Summer" and a late first freeze, which was the key to the good yields.

Also helping matters has been a better than average price for the cotton. So, the cotton farmers are thanking their lucky stars for this unusual set of circumstances—a good growing year combined with good crop prices.

The Friona community junior livestock show, for local 4-H and FFA students, will be held on Saturday, January 23 at the Friona Community Center-Showbarn.

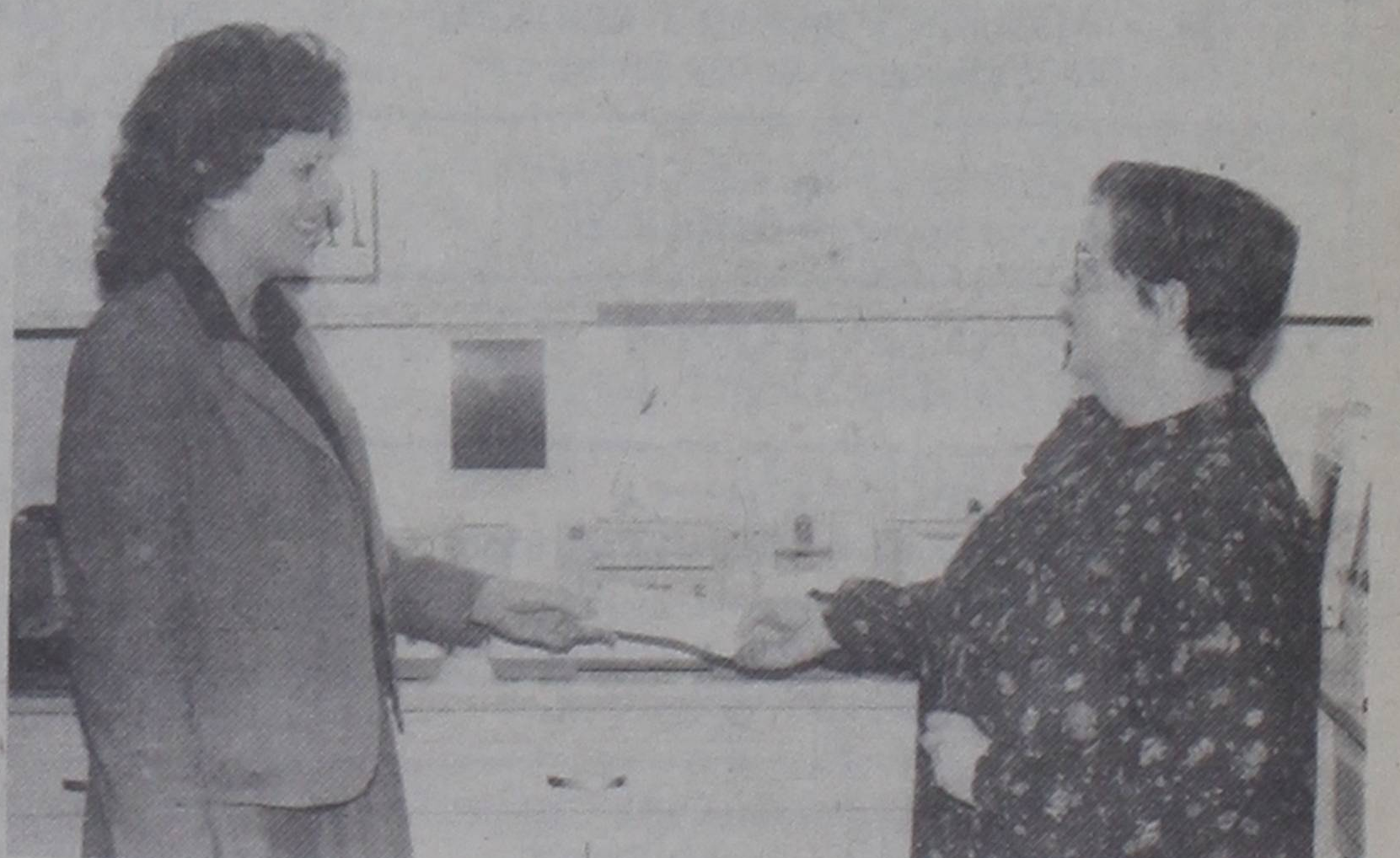
Judging will begin at 9 a.m. with the barrow division. Barrow judging will be followed by sheep, and then steers and heifers.

"We encourage the younger kids who haven't shown animals to come out. We can take some time with them and help them gain showing experience," said Benny Pryor,

Friona High School FFA instructor.

Larry Gray, vocational agriculture instructor at Springlake-Earth High School, will judge all divisions of the show.

It was estimated that approximately 50 barrows, 70 lambs and five steers would be entered in the local show.

**30 YEARS AGO--JAN. 23, 1958**

Parmer County Community Hospital now has a new staff member. He is Dr. Ansel McDowell, Jr., who recently received his discharge from the United States Navy. He will be doing general medical and obstetrical practice at the hospital.

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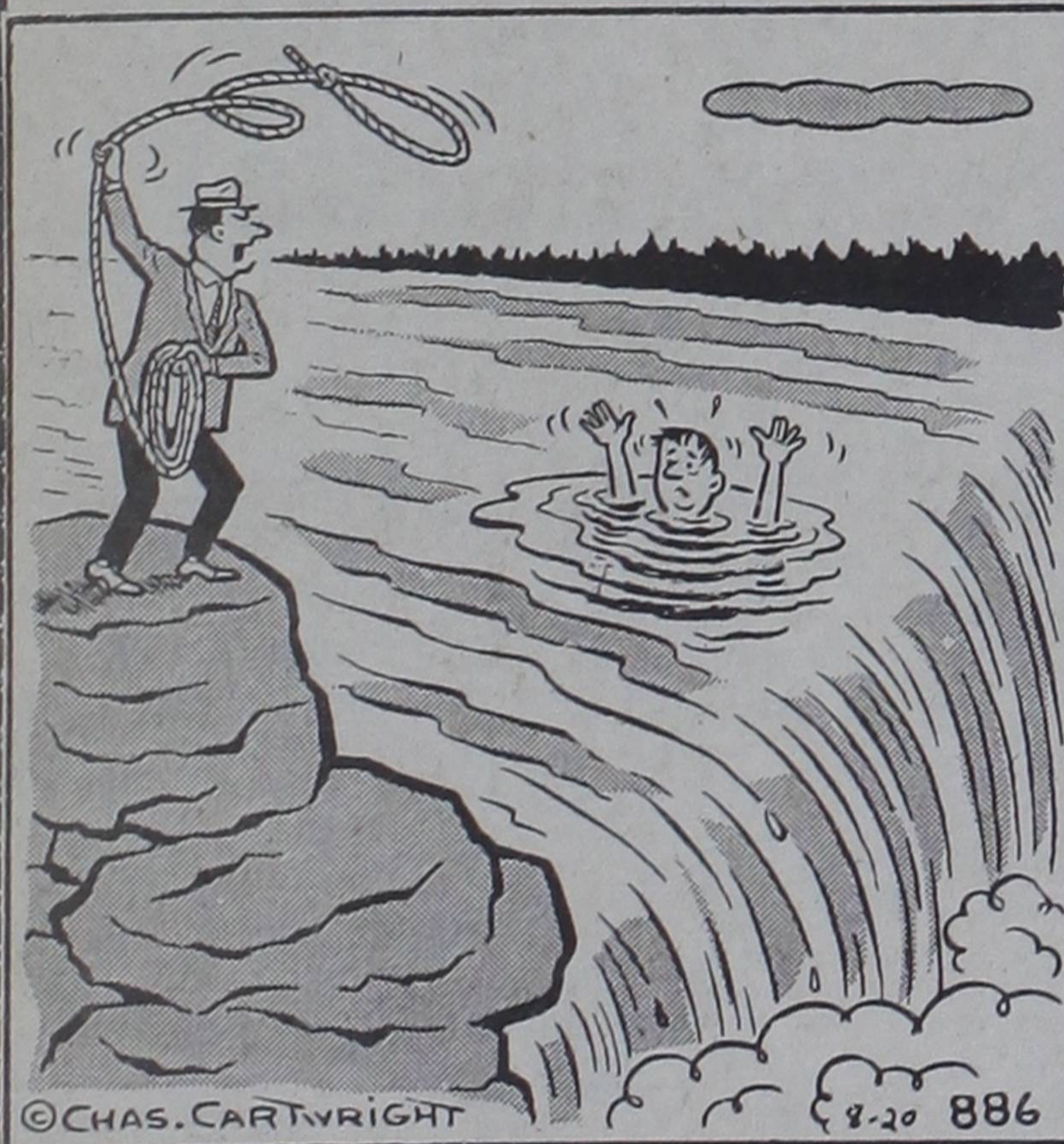

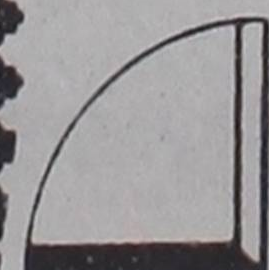

# Longhorns Dominate Six Man All-Area Selections

The Christmas Eve edition of the *Lubbock Avalanche Journal* ran an article entitled: "Longhorns Dominate Six-Man Honor Team After Brilliant Season." So begins a long write-up about Lazbuddie's head football coach, C.W. Williams, quarterback Tim Lust, and tailback Omar Sanchez.

Coach Williams received the prestigious Coach of the Year award. Tim Lust was named Player of the Year and All-South Plains quarterback of the year. Omar Sanchez also made All-South Plains, offensive back.

The article praised Coach Williams' ability to lead the Longhorns through the transition from an 11-man program to a six-man squad competing as an independent. Coach Williams said that he knew it wasn't going to be easy, especially on the Longhorns themselves. He didn't promise the Longhorns anything but hard work. Coach Williams told the *A-J* reporter that he spoke with the team members about what needed to be done to bring Lazbuddie back into a strong football program. "There were certain things I thought were extremely important, that without them, we weren't going to win. I told them it may work out where we don't win anyway."

The *A-J* reporter wrote, "Williams was right about most everything, except the last part. The Longhorns took Williams' words to heart and forged an impressive 9-0 record, writing the biggest success story in six-man football in 1987. Williams, who hasn't coached a losing game in the last two seasons, earned Coach of the Year honors for his part in the Longhorns' resurgence."

Coach Williams credited assistant coaches, Richard Luscombe and Mark Scisson, for their help and support throughout the season. He also praised Tim Lust, saying, "He was a great leader. He took everything real well. He always complimented the other players and receivers and blockers. He really made things work."

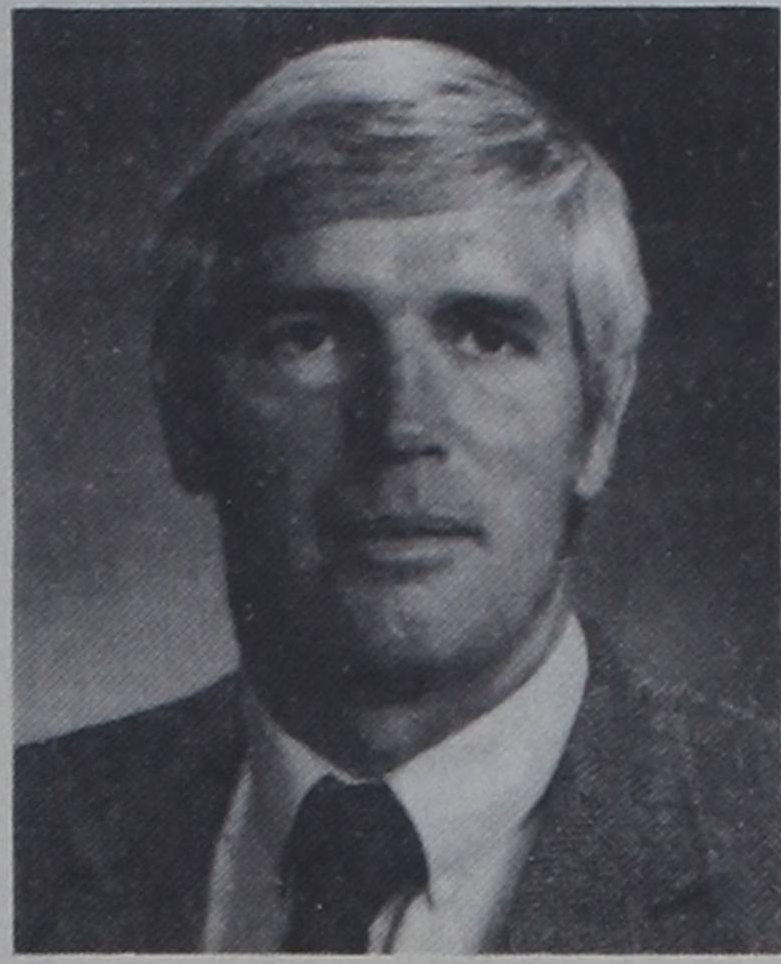
In his comments to the *Amarillo Globe News*, Coach Williams said of Lust, "We based our whole offense around the spread formation, and you have to have a good quarterback to make that go. Without him, our offense wouldn't have been nearly as good as it was."

The *Avalanche Journal's* article highlighted Tim's outstanding statistics, stating, "In the Longhorns' last full season of 11-man football, Lust passed for 1,644 yards and 11 touchdowns and was the Class 1A All-South Plains quarterback. In nine games this season, Lust totaled 31 touchdowns and 1,529 yards."

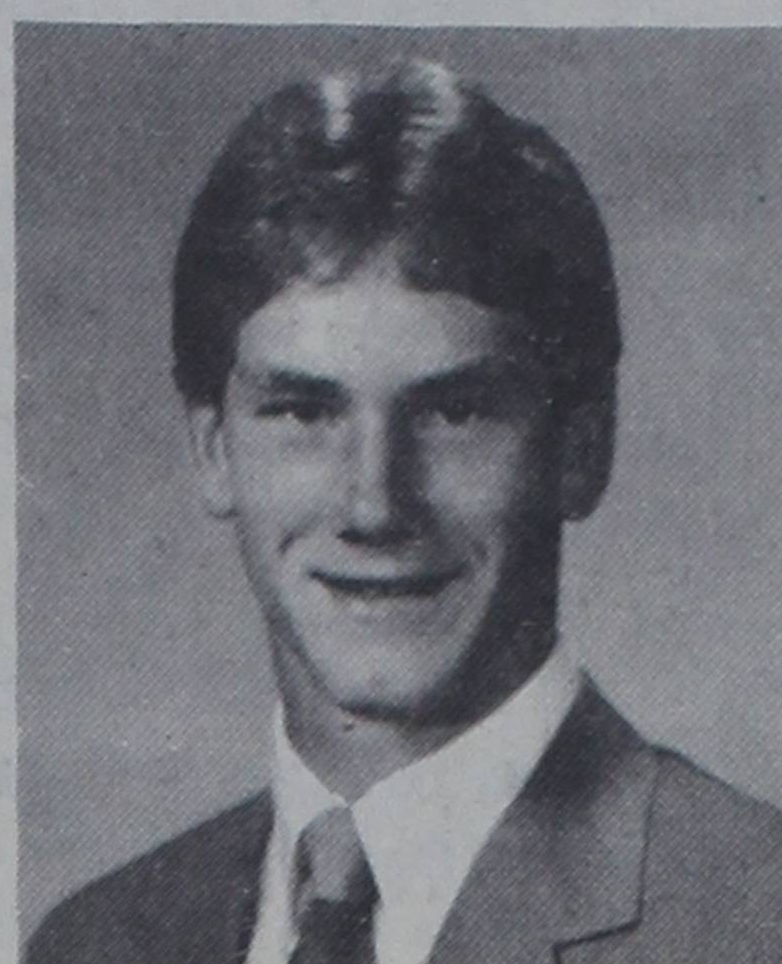
The *Globe-News* said of Tim, "The 6-3 senior keyed the Longhorns' unbeaten record in their first season on the six-man level. Lust's outstanding two-way play earned him *Globe-News* six-man Player of the Year honors. He completed 78 of 123 passes (63.4 per cent). Lust, who was the *G-N* sophomore of the year two seasons ago, also was the team's second leading tackler from his safety position."

Complimenting the passing game for Lazbuddie was a strong running game led by Omar Sanchez. Coach Williams stated that teams were never able to load up against the passing attack because of Omar's ability to come up with running yardage that kept pressure off Lust. "Sanchez was also an integral part of the passing game, catching 8 passes for touchdowns. As captain, his leadership was an important part of a successful season," said the Lazbuddie coach.

Of Omar Sanchez, the following statistics were reported in the *Avalanche Journal*: Sanchez finished with an unspectacular 987 yards rushing, but both he and Lust suffered statistically from the Longhorns' dominance of the opposition. Lazbuddie outscored its foes 501-99, with many games ending at halftime and Lust and Sanchez often sitting down after a quarter or so. Nevertheless, Sanchez did lead the South Plains in scoring with 33 touchdowns and 260 total points." In fact,

Lazbuddie ended 8 of 9 games at halftime because of 45-point leads by the Longhorns, and Omar actually scored 269 points.

In comments to the *A-J* reporter concerning Lazbuddie's surprising turn-around this season and his winning Coach of the Year, Coach Williams said, "The thing was, they were tired of losing. Anybody could have come in and done a good job. They were ready."

Lazbuddie football fans and players are quick to justify Williams' Coach of the Year award. He was the catalyst that brought it all together for the Longhorns. The team had suffered from disillusionment after the previous season's ill-fated injuries, losses, and abandonment of the program early in the season. The disillusionment might have continued under the weight of the unfamiliar six-man program and the independent schedule.

However, the team came together under the leadership of Coach Williams, Tim Lust, Omar Sanchez and other key players and worked hard to achieve victories for the school, "Most Valuable Player" and All-South Plains awards for individuals, and perhaps most importantly of all, respect for themselves, the school, and the football program at Lazbuddie.

and fall of Jim and Tammy Bakker and its effect on the religious evangelical television movement. This documentary will air on KENW, Public TV, Channel 3, Tuesday, January 26 at 8 p.m. (9 p.m. CST) and will be repeated at 11 p.m. (12 midnight, CST).

"Shakedown in Santa Fe," scheduled for February 23, is another documentary of special interest to New Mexicans. It investigates the state of what is termed one of the nation's most dangerous prisons eight years after the violent prisoner uprising in 1980.

Other Frontline programs in February include "Operation Urgent Fury" on February 2--a look at the invasion of Granada by the United States Military as documented by Pulitzer Prize-

winning reporter Seymour Hersh; "The Man Who Shot John Lennon," on February 9; and "Your Fight is Cancelled," which probes the problems of the airline industry since deregulation and air traffic controllers were fired on February 16.

Judy Woodruff continues to be the host for Frontline, which is in its sixth season on PBS. An award-winning documentary series, it is acclaimed for its hard-hitting investigative reports that explore current world issues.

KENW, Public TV, Channel 3, serves viewers from the Broadcast Center at Eastern New Mexico University, Portales. Viewers may contact local cable companies to find out the channel where KENW can be found.

## Roberts Reflects On Fire-Fighting

Porter Roberts, a member of the Friona Fire Department since 1965, is retiring as a member of the department as of the first of 1988. Roberts said that Friona's was the third fire department on which he had served, but turned out to be the first one to have two-way radios for communication.

Roberts, who most recently served as secretary for the department, gave an example of how the two-way radios have benefitted local emergency services.

He recalled one incident that happened several years ago when the fire alarm sounded. "I remember thinking to myself 'I need to be anywhere today besides fighting a fire,'" but he answered the alarm anyway.

Roberts and another fireman ended up fighting a haystack fire for the rest of the day.

He explained that the firemen who came to the fire station after he and his teammate left went to a different fire, and didn't realize that the two of them were by themselves trying to contain the haystack fire.

Although the department's first radios were basically C.B. radios, the department now has good two-way communication between the vehicles and the fire-police dispatcher.

Although grass fires, wheat field fires and fires away from available water are difficult to fight, Roberts lists the fire at the Ford dealership about 20 years ago, or the one at the grade school about 15 years ago, as among the biggest ones he has helped fight.

He admits that "We are risking our lives out there in the community" when we, as firemen, answer the alarm siren.

"I may be an oddball in a lot of ways, because one thing I've always had a fear of is dying by fire--but I love to fight fires," Roberts says.

Roberts praised the local community for their response down through the years in helping the fire department raise money

for new equipment. Among the things that the fire department members have done to raise money for equipment are hanging the banners during Maize Days celebrations; raffling off prizes, and negotiating with city officials.

Friona appreciates the many years of service and hard work you've done on the fire department. Thanks, Porter!

Texas Aeronautics Commission, and has been responsible for allocating thousands of dollars for municipally-owned airports in this area.

"If I am elected senator, I definitely will not vote for a state income tax," Phillips said. The candidate indicated that government needs to be more efficient.

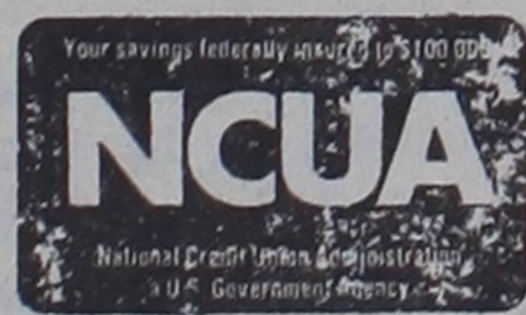

Farwell and John R. Cook and Robert Gallman, both of Friona.

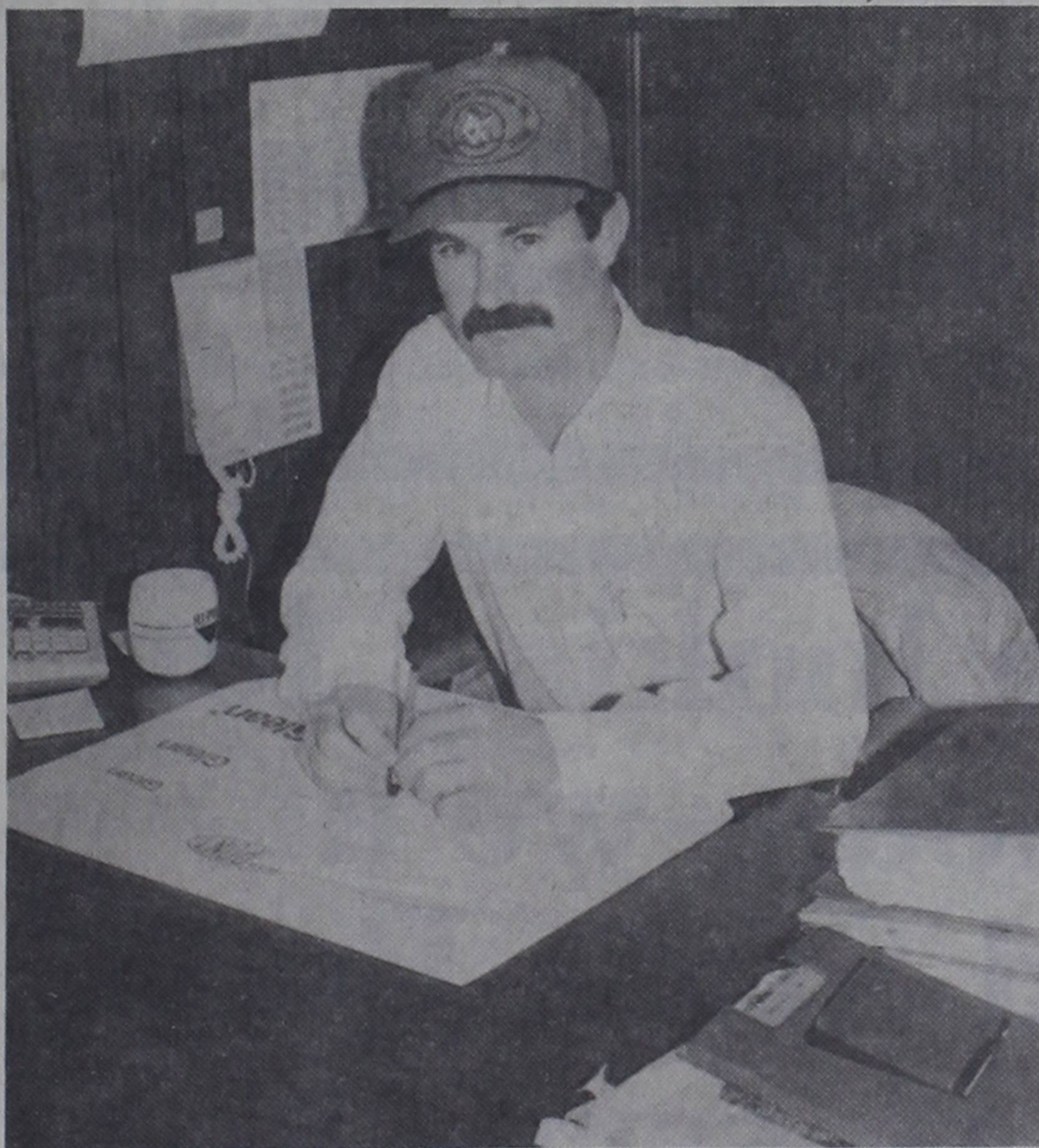
Board members oversee all Water District activities, including legal, financial and business matters. They set long-range goals and direct the Water District's staff through the District manager.



# Tulia Holds On For Pair Of Close District Wins

Tulia High School made off with a pair of close district wins here Tuesday night. The Hornets edged the Squaws, 39-36 in the girls game, and the Hornets held on for a 39-37 win over the Chieftains.

Friona's coldness to outscore the Squaws, 9-1 during the next 5:30 of clock time to take an 18-7 lead.

Miss Preston broke Friona's long scoreless spell with a free throw, but Tulia managed three baskets in the last minute before half-time, one coming with just a second left, as Tulia opened up a 24-8 halftime lead.

The Squaws' defense did its job in the third quarter, and Friona outscored the Hornets, 9-2 for 7:59 of the quarter. But once again Tulia launched a last-second shot, and this one, by Tara Irlbeck, was a three-pointer, that gave the visitors a 29-17 lead at the end of the quarter.

The Squaws tried several rallies in the final quarter, but each time Tulia would respond. Friona began pressing the Hornets, causing a number of turnovers.

Bena Bronniman's jump shot with 1:40 left to play cut Tulia's

margin to five, 37-32. Then Miss Wied clicked on a jump shot, and Miss Preston stole the ball and drove for a layup to cut Tulia's margin to two, 38-36, with just eight seconds left.

But the clock ran out on the Squaws, who had to commit a foul to stop the clock and Tulia made a free throw with three seconds left for the final margin.

Miss Reeve was high-pointer for Friona with ten points. She fouled out of the game midway through the fourth quarter, to hurt Friona's offensive punch. Miss Preston had nine points in the backup role.

The Chieftains and Hornets, playing to stay out of the district's "basement," had a knock-down drag-out before they were through.

Five free throws, by Cody Burney, Glenn Trimmell and Matt Brogden, gave Friona a 5-3 lead at the end of a cold-shooting first quarter.

Tulia got some baskets to fall and forged a 19-14 halftime lead. Cody Burney finally got a field goal for the Chiefs, and hit another one before the quarter ended, to keep Friona close.

But Tulia outscored the Chieftains, 11-4 to take a 12-point lead, and the Chieftains, already in trouble with high-scoring Daniel Echols and Stephen Thornton out due to sickness found themselves in foul trouble as well.

Sophomore Shannon Cochran, elevated to the varsity due to the illness bug, came in to sink a pair of free throws, and this sparked a five-point rally by the Chiefs to get back in the game at 30-23 as the third quarter ended.

Brent Riethmayer hit a pair of free throws and a layup, and then Cochran hit a 15-foot jump shot to trim the visitors' lead to just one, 30-29 at the 6:46 mark. Friona had run off 11 unanswered points.

But the visitors answered, with five points of their own for a 35-31 lead with 4:52 to play, and Friona

hit one of their cold spells.

It was 39-32 with 1:18 left, and many fans thought the Chiefs were out of it. But Rusty Rainey made a three-point play at 1:09 and Trimmell made good on a follow shot for a 39-37 deficit with 32 seconds left.

The Chiefs were forced to foul, and Tulia somehow missed eight of 11 from the line in the last quarter. But Rainey missed a 1-1 free throw chance, and had a pair of layups roll off the rim in the final minutes, as the Chieftains' luck remained bad.

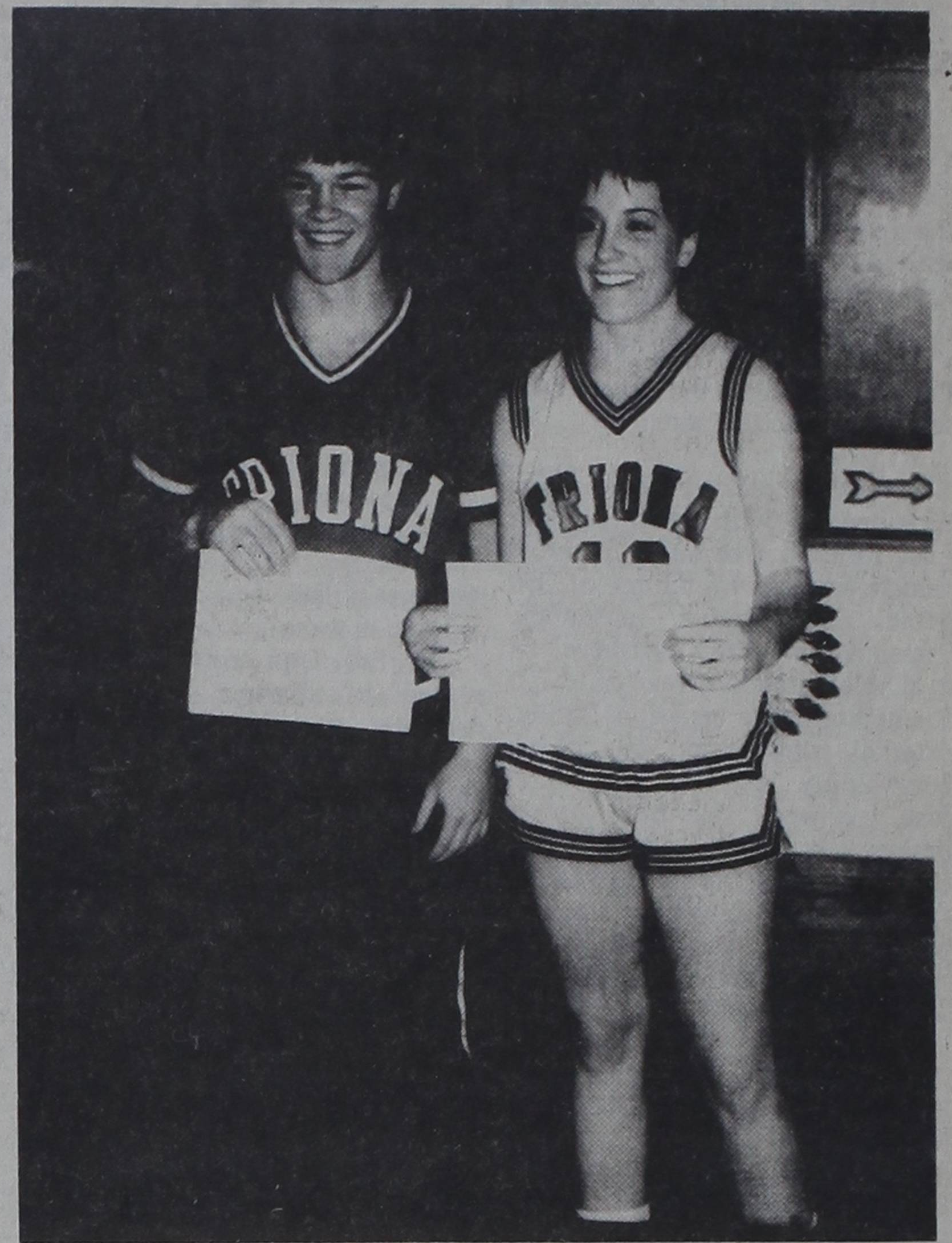

## Organ/Tissue Law Is Now Effective

Under a law passed by the 70th Texas Legislature, hospitals are required to identify potential organ/tissue donors at or near death, inform the family of the option to donate, and document the approach and its disposition. The state law became effective January 1, while a similar federal law took effect November 20, 1987.

A written protocol for conforming with the state law is required of each hospital in the state, and hospitals in the Medicare and Medicaid program must comply with the federal law, according to Matthew T. Wall, staff attorney general with the Texas Hospital Association.

"The protocol must provide for trained individuals to perform the approach to the family of a dying patient and inform them of the option to donate," Wall said.

"Neither the federal or state laws require asking the family for the organs or tissues of their loved one. This is not the intent of these new laws. Rather, they envision the approaching of the family to determine/identify whether the deceased or dying patient was an organ or tissue donor, as evidenced for example by a signed donor card. If not, then the hospital must simply inform the family of their option to donate or decline donation, and document the approach and its disposition," the attorney explained.

Under the new state law, no in-

quiry is required: if the decedent is medically unsuitable for donation, there is actual notice of objections to donation by the decedent or persons authorized to make a donation, or if the hospital has not been notified by a procurement organization as to current medical needs for organs/tissues and the organization's availability for retrieval.

"In considering organ or tissue donation, families should keep in mind that no costs are incurred by the donor family, and that the identity of both the donor and recipient are kept confidential. No visible alteration to the body and no interference with funeral arrangements is anticipated," Wall noted.

"The best time to think about organ or tissue donation is while you are well, and decisions to donate should be shared with family members," noted THA President Terry Townsend. "These laws were drafted in response to a critical shortage of organs and tissues. In complying with these laws which the health care industry supported, hospitals will be sensitive to dying patients and families. Organ and tissue donations from dying patients literally will provide life for others. For donors and their families, it can be a final act of love, a way to make death meaningful. For recipients, it's a chance to live a productive life once again."

Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complaints will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations.



### Three City Students Make List

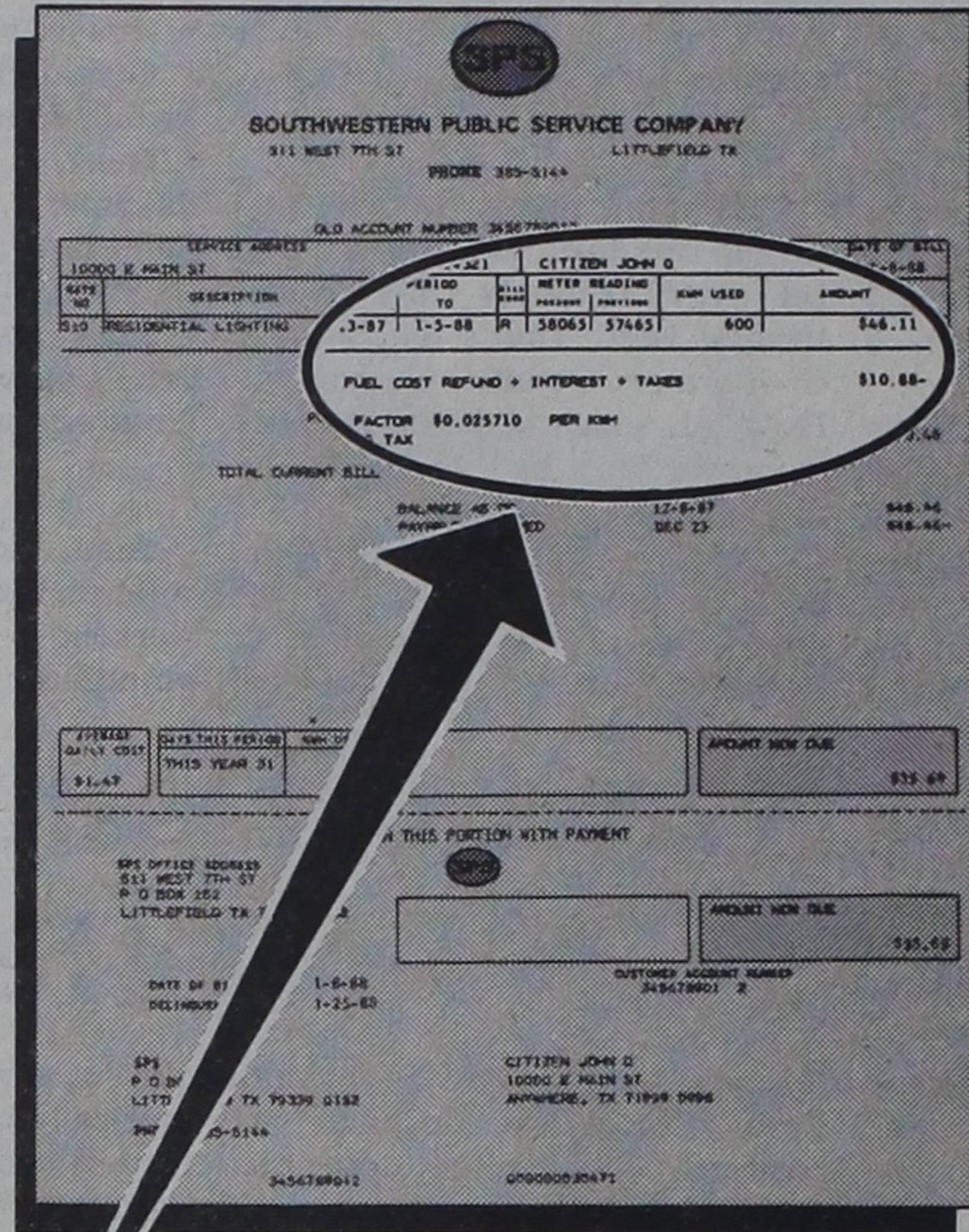
Among the 724 West Texas State University students who were named to the Dean's List for the 1987 fall semester were three students from Friona.

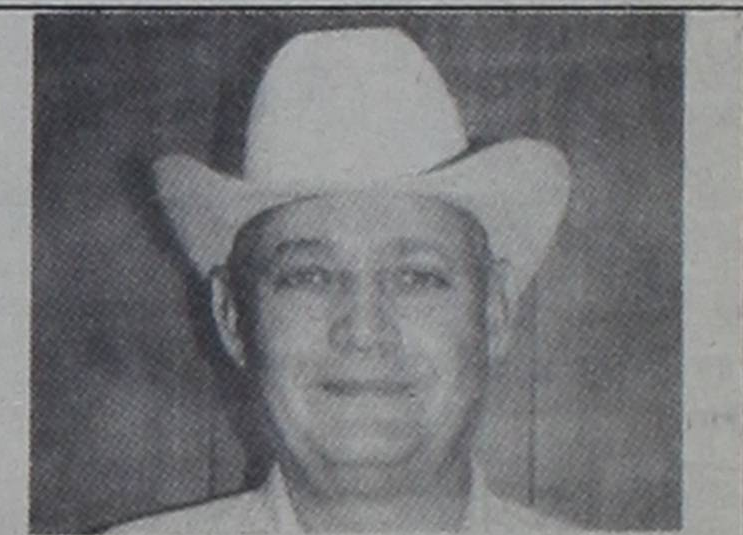

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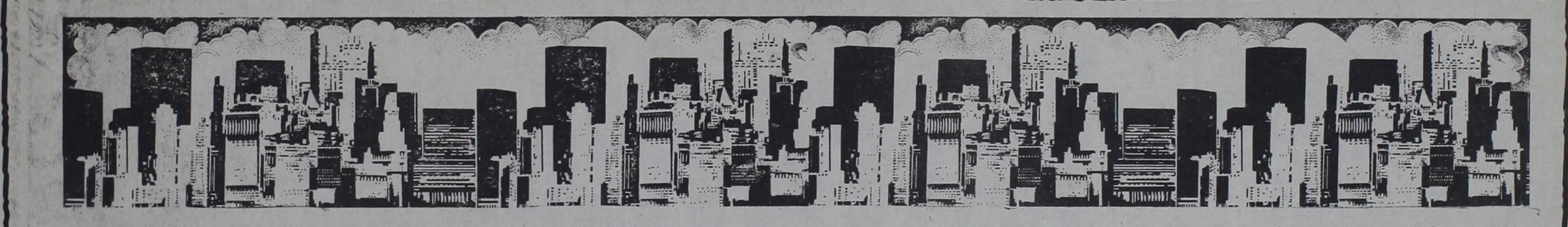
