

## Technology Helps Student's Art Interest

Innovation and modern technology have joined forces to make a dream come true for one Texas Tech student.

Jamie Herring, a sophomore arts and sciences undecided major, was forced to make changes in her lifestyle three years ago when an accident left her confined to a wheelchair. Despite the limitations caused by the inability to use her hands or arms, Herring refused to give up one of her dreams the desire to pursue artistic endeavors.

More than a year ago, James Koerlin, director of the biocybernetics lab in Thompson Hall, began working to make Herring's was culminated during the Christmas straw. independence.

When all the programs are installappeared in a recent issue of The ed, Herring will be able to control her environment with the computer.

Koerlin said she will be able to dim the lights in her room or turn them on or off. The system will control the thermostat in the room and can be programmed to operate any electrical device, including the telephone, he said.

The Macintosh also can turn pages for Herring when she reads and is equipped with a several programs, including a slide show and a music program.

The word processing program, which is linked to a color printer, was written for Herring by Koerlin. He said the program was expanded to include accommodations for other disabilities and now is being distributed nationally.

Herring operates the Macintosh with the use of a headset devised by Koerlin. The headset is equipped with infrared sensors that communicate with the computer. The members decided on classes for the show and decided not to have any roping classes. Two events were added to the show; a trail class and a snaffle bit class.



## Ruben Taylor Tells About His Career As A Fireman

Taylor began serving as a volunteer fireman. He retired from the local fire department recently, after giving over 42 years of volunteer service.

In a recent interview. Taylor told how the department's ability to fight fires has improved.

When he first became a fireman, the fire department kept its equipment at different places in the city. A trailer with fire hoses him the longest to fight. was located at one place. That fire involved haystacks and the truck would be housed at another location. complicated by wind.

washed by hand, hung shoe sent units to the fire outside on a rack to dry, to assist in its control. rolled and loaded on a trailer, again ready for use.

Not long after moving to washer and dryer accomplish Friona in 1945. Ruben this work in far less time than in the old days.

Taylor pointed out that Friona citizens have worked to acquire good equipment for the fire department. "The people of Friona have really supported our moneyraising projects that the fire department has undertaken in order to purchase equipment," Taylor said.

> He names the toughest fire as the one at the old locker plant. Answering the alarm just before midnight, firemen fought the blaze all through the next day.

> The walls of the old plant were thick and made of solid redwood. The weather was bitter cold. causing ice to form over the fire hoses, pinning them to the ground. Some of the firefighters sustained frostbite to their ears while working on the fire.

What motivates firemen to keep fighting fires for so long? Most firemen describe it as a sense of service to

their community. Ruben Taylor summed it up sayaing that when the fire alarm goes off, to him it is saying, "Hey, Ruben, I need some help." As a fireman, Taylor has done his share of the helping.

Even though he has retired from the force. he still helped out at a recent fire, advising, directing rookies, feeding work-weary firemen in the dark.

It is apparent that a man cannot fully retire from doing what he loves to do. It is good to see the spirit of volunteerism in practice here in Friona.





#### Enrollment **Period Starts** In January

People who failed to sign up for Medicare medical insurance, or who once had this protection but dropped it, will have a chance to get this important protection during the 1988 general enrollment period, January through March 31, Carl Thompson, Social Security manager in Clovis, said recently.

Medical insurance is that part of Medicare that helps pay for doctor bills, outpatient hospital services, and many other medical items and services not covered by hospital insurance.

Protection for people who sign up during the general enrollment period will start July 1, 1988.

Medical insurance is financed by monthly premiums paid by those who have the protection and the Federal Government from general revenues. Presently, the Federal Government pays three-fourths of the cost. The basic monthly premium in 1988 is \$24.80.


Generally, people who sign up during a general enrollment period may pay a higher premium, Mr. Thompson said. This is because the premium is increased by ten per cent for each full year a person could have had this protection, but did not.

More information about the medical insurance general enrollment period can be obtained at the Clovis Social Security office. Free publications are available there that give more information medical insurance about protection. The office is located at 912 Parkland and the telephone number is 762-4595.


