The new company will be organized and controlled by home people, in other words it will be a home institution in the strictest sense.

**HARRY BONDIES URGES ADOPTION  
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 18**

**Gives Reasons why People Should  
Support Amendment With  
Their Votes.**

Every man of family, every tax payer, every patriotic citizen, should carefully and without prejudice investigate and consider the questions involved in the proposed amendments to Sections 49 and 52 of our State Constitution. These amendments will be submitted to vote of the people by Senate Joint Resolution No. 18. The election will be had on July 19th 1913. In order that they might be so submitted the Resolution was passed in the House of Representatives by a vote of 113 to 2 and in the Senate it was passed by a vote of 28 to 0. These amendments are vital. They concern you in your individual capacity and as a member of society whether you be a farmer, banker or what not. They relate to your pocket book, your children, the moral and mental stamina of our citizenship, the development growth and prosperity of our State. They involve business propositions whereby it is sought to attain certain ends through certain means. In justice to yourself and our common interests, you should inform yourself as to the ends to be attained and the means to be used to that end. You should approach the question as you would any personal, business proposition deliberately and free of bias.

When you have dispassionately viewed the ends you will inevitably conclude that the purpose had is born of our needs, that it is of the utmost importance to and for the joint benefit of every resident of the State, regardless of class. When you have studied the means to this end you will be forced to agree that it is the only practical manner of accomplishing the purpose had, that it is economically expedient and wise. The whole purpose and object of these amendments is for the common good. They do not seek to destroy anything but to build up and develop diverse and identical interest.

It is proposed by these amendments to permit the Legislature

to authorize the issuance of bonds for certain designated purposes, thus:

1. For the purchase of additional ground and to erect necessary buildings for the University of Texas.
2. For the construction of necessary buildings for State Institutions.
3. For the purpose of constructing buildings and making permanent improvements to our penitentiary system.

Then the Legislature is given power to provide for the issuance of bonds by political subdivisions of the State for the following purposes:

- (a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows and to permit of navigation thereof or irrigation therefrom, or in aid of such purposes.
- (b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation or in aid thereof.
- (c) The construction, maintenance and operation of bridges and macadamized, graveled, sandy-clay or clayed-sand or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof.
- (d) The construction, maintenance and operation of public warehouses or in aid thereof.

Now as to the manner in which these proposed debts will affect you; taking them up in the order numbered above thus:

1. These bonds are to be cared for out of the income derived from the present property holdings of the University of Texas. Hence they would put no burden upon anyone, but would make it possible for the University to exercise its proper functions as designed and enable it to care for those boys who desire to have its

training.  
2. These buildings for State institutions, such as the Agricultural & Mechanical College the Normal Schools, Institutions for the Insane etc., are sadly needed right now and must be erected within the next few years. Instead of having these buildings erected haphazard over the next two or three years and the burden of such work fall upon the tax payers of those years, it is proposed to issue bonds running for such length of time as will cover the use value of the improvements to be made. During this period of time it is proposed to levy a tax to provide for interest on the bonds and a sinking fund with which to pay them off at maturity. In this way instead of having the burden fall upon the tax payers of a few years, the burden is made to rest upon the many of say a 40 year period and upon those who are really to derive the most benefit therefrom. Again this clause will make it possible to provide a fund for creation of such buildings, on an orderly scheme, a thing practically impossible in our State Government before. This clause is not calculated to increase the burden of your taxes but to lighten it.

3. Large outlays are now necessary to be made in our penitentiary system. These outlays must be provided for by the tax payers of today of those extending over a period of time. The issuance of bonds will make it possible to distribute the burden over a period of years upon the people of those years rather than upon you of today.  
The other clauses noted above (a) (b) (c) (d) depend wholly upon local will, they enable you to act jointly for a certain purpose if you desire to do so and place no burden upon you unless you agree to assume it by a majority local vote.

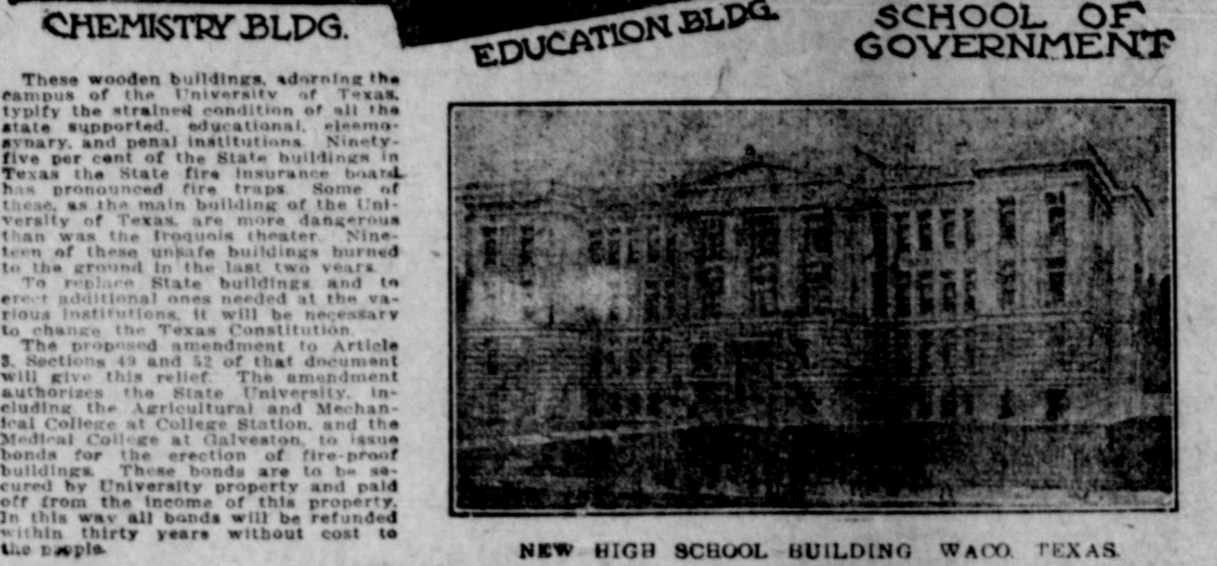
Recently the Ballinger Ledger-Ledger got out a special edition consisting of 32 pages commemorating the 27th anniversary of its home town. The paper contained a complete history of the progress and development of the town, highly illustrated with views of various kinds. The Ledger-Ledger is one of the papers that makes good every week in getting out a good paper, but on this occasion they did great credit to themselves and to the town in which it is published.

Eisewhere in this paper appear our common interests, you should read an article written by our own John Foelt strongly urging the adoption of the amendment clothing the State Legislature with the power to issue bonds to aid the State University in securing needed equipment. Our young friend, Mr. Foelt, is a student of the University a close observer and doubtless has given the subject much earnest study. It would be well for our readers to read the article and give this important proposition careful consideration, regardless of whether you at present favor or oppose the amendment.

At the recent big anniversary celebration over at Ballinger something new for the west in cooking meat was tried out which proved a great success. The meat amounting to several thousand pounds was placed in fireless cookers at Ft. Worth and while it was intrinsically cooked nicely and arrived steaming hot ready for use. It is said that the innovation proved a great success in every respect and Armour, Swift Co. who supplied the meat were warmly congratulated upon the successful achievement. Doubtless in future this method will take the place of the old plan of barbecuing meat and the only sad feature connected with it will be the jobless professional cook who takes such great pride in keeping watch all through the night while the meat is simmering and cooking over the pit.

**SHACKS HOUSE TEXAS UNIVERSITY STUDENTS**



These wooden buildings, adorning the campus of the University of Texas, typify the strained condition of all the state supported educational, eleemosynary, and penal institutions. Ninety-five per cent of the State buildings in Texas the State fire insurance board has pronounced fire traps. Some of these, as the main building of the University of Texas, are more dangerous than was the Iroquois theater. Ninety-four of these unsafe buildings burned to the ground in the last two years.

To replace State buildings and to erect additional ones needed at the various institutions, it will be necessary to change the Texas Constitution. The proposed amendment to Article 3, Sections 49 and 51 of that document will give this relief. The amendment authorizes the State University, including the Agricultural and Mechanical College at College Station, and the Medical College at Galveston, to issue bonds for the erection of fire-proof buildings. These bonds are to be secured by University property and paid off from the income of this property. In this way all bonds will be refunded within thirty years without cost to the people.

It is an evident fact that the University needs better equipment and it looks like bad policy to invest money in temporary shacks and equipment that it not lasting and at the same time is a disgrace to a great state like Texas. If the revenue received from assets of the University will not take care of the bonds, as is claimed that it will do by many advocates of the measure, it would be far better it appears to us to supplement the amount and make it possible to secure equipment that will be lasting and at the same time will put the great capstone of our public school system in a position to become the pride of all Texas. These are our sentiments and while we are free to confess that it is our candid opinion that the proposition could have been placed before the people in a more simplified manner, still the measures have merit sufficient to justify the adoption of the amendment.

**LEGAL QUESTIONS ANSWERED**

Question.—What is the State Industrial School for Boys, and under what circumstances are boys confined in this institution?

Answer.—A bill was passed by the Legislature of Texas on Mar. 29, 1913, and approved by the governor on April 2, 1913, amending the Juvenile Court Law of Texas, and providing that when an indictment is returned by the Grand Jury of any county charging any boy under the age of seventeen years with the commission of a felony, the parent, guardian, attorney or next friend of such boy, or the boy himself, may file a sworn statement in court set out by the age of the boy so

indicted at any time before announcing of ready for trial is made in the case. When such statement is filed, the judge presiding shall hear evidence on the question of the age of the defendant, and if he be satisfied that the defendant is less than seventeen years of age, the judge shall dismiss the prosecution, and shall proceed to try the defendant under the provisions of the Juvenile Court Law, as amended. If the boy be found guilty, he shall be committed to the State Industrial School for boys for an indefinite length of time, the commitment not to be enforced after he shall reach the age of twenty-one years.

The detention in the State Industrial School for Boys does not deprive the boy of any of the rights of citizenship as is the case under a sentence to the penitentiary.

The State School aims to correct the evil traits of character shown by the boy confined there, the statute itself declaring "This act shall be liberally considered to the end that its purposes be carried out, that is, that the interest of the child and its restitution to society shall, at all times be the object in view of proceeding against it."

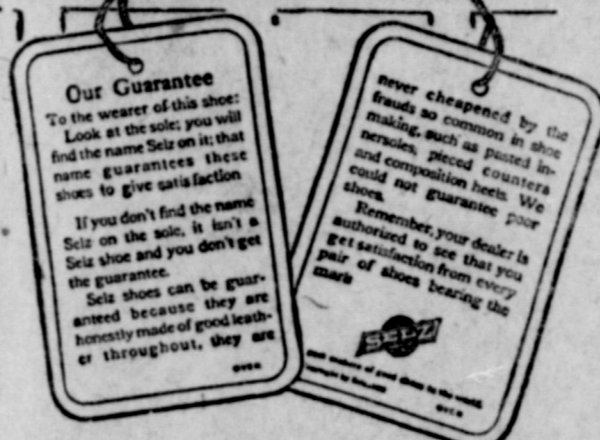

#### RIGHT USE OF ADJECTIVES

Some Authors Employ Them Excessively, Others Sparingly but With No Loss of Strength.

Did Cobbett say: "When a man comes to his adjectives, I tremble for him," or did he tremble at the thought of a writer using the word "it"? The only book by Cobbett now on hand is his "Tour in Scotland," in which he says dreadful things against potatoes and shouts the praise of brose, oatcakes and oatmeal, a book delightful by reason of its vituperation, as when he described the Globe newspaper as "that rumble tumble of filth and beastly ignorance" and Denmark as the "dirty bill of indictment drawer" for the Broughams and the Greys. Probably the saying is in Cobbett's English grammar. We were reminded of it by reading about John Walter, the founder of the London Times. That journal was at first printed logographically; that is, a number of words and phrases were cast entire, to save compositors the trouble of collecting type. Thus these phrases were on a single block: "Dreadful robbery," "atrocious outrage," "fearful calamity," "interesting female." There are writers today who always join the same adjective to certain nouns, just as it is easy to fall into the trick of characterizing a person or qualifying a thing by applying three adjectives, as the Irish lady was described in her epitaph as "bland, passionate and deeply religious." They say that Kinglake, writing "The Invasion of the Crimea," worked for a number of hours and left spaces for adjectives. He then rode on horseback, meditated the fitting adjectives, and on his return inserted them. Was it not Daudet who said that the adjective should never be the legitimate wife of the substantive? Look through "Gulliver's Travels," mark the sobriety in the use of words, and note the strength and authority thus gained. Lafcadio Hearn's description of the Windward islands is in striking contrast—the style is as fresh as the tropical vegetation; the reader should don colored spectacles. Yet with a few adjectives Poe and Coleridge could work wonders, and Walter Whitman was often fortunate, as when he spoke of the "gorgeous, indolent sun;" the sun "so calm and haughty;" "mad, naked summer night."—Phillip Hale, in Boston Herald.

#### Says Chinese Are Heroic.

C. H. Chu, evidently a Chinese student of Columbia university, New York, writes the New York Sun to contradict certain statements that have appeared in newspapers since the Titanic disaster, to the effect that among Chinese in similar circumstances...

Mr. Chu asserts that "the teachings of Confucius all favor self-sacrifice, the helping of others than yourself. Confucius says that a man who in peril steals his own life instead of dying under duty's call is less than a man." "There is nothing in Confucianism," continues Mr. Chu, "justifying any man who saves himself by letting a woman or a child lose life." "The experience in China is that many, many times the noble rule is followed: 'Women and children first.' Sometimes of course the men neglect the higher law, and are severely blamed by the people in general if they do."

#### New Process for Making Rubber.

In a lecture before the Society of Chemical Industry in London, Prof. W. H. Perkin of Manchester University described a process for the production of rubber in the laboratory which has been widely commented upon in technical and other papers in the United Kingdom. It was stated by the lecturer that the synthetic production of rubber offers the probability of a profit at a price of 60 cents per pound, with a possibility of its production at 25 cents per pound or less. There has been rivalry between England and Germany in the effort to make synthetic rubber, and priority of discovery is claimed by each country. It was contended by Professor Perkin that the English had anticipated the Germans by about three months.

#### A Sea Mowing Machine.

The first sea mowing machine has been launched at San Diego. It will be used for cutting the millions of tons of kelp and seaweed that grow along the coast. A gasoline launch, has been fitted with a horizontal jack, shaft revolving at right angles to the keel. Two vertical shafts are fitted with four-foot blades that revolve at high speed ten feet below the surface. The mowed kelp floats ashore, is taken out and dried, and later is hauled to a factory to be converted into fertilizer.

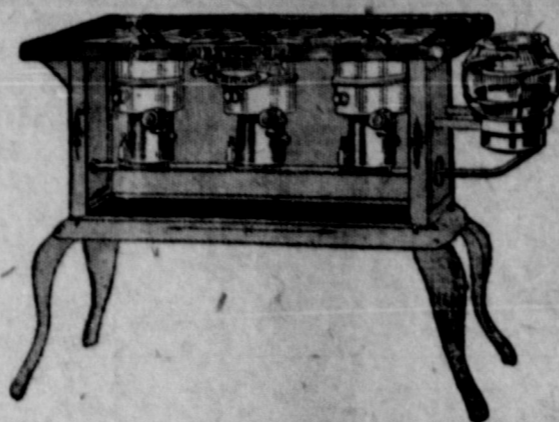

**ENERGETIC BOOSTER PRAISES HOME TOWN**

R. B. Elmore Good Roads Advocate and Industrial Promoter Tells of Sweetwater's Many Advantages.

Sweetwater is a city of good streets and Nolan county is a county of good roads, according to R. B. Elmore, secretary and industrial commissioner of the Sweetwater Chamber of Commerce, who passed through Fort Worth Wednesday night enroute to Corpus Christi, where he will speak at the Texas Good Roads congress Thursday.

He declared the people of Sweetwater were determined to have the best road system in the country. Sweetwater was one of the best improved cities of its size in the state, Mr. Elmore stated also.

"The Sweetwater precinct comprises seventy-five square miles," he said, "and has voted \$100,000 in bonds and are now selling them at a premium. Our county surveyor personally supervised the work with the result that we have thirty-five miles of graded and built up crushed rock roads.

"Our people feel they have gotten big value for their money. In fact, they boast that the expenditure of the money has proven itself an investment, inasmuch as it has gone further than any like amount appropriated for similar work in this section of Texas.

"Besides the expenditure of the precinct, the people of Sweetwater have expended out of street improvement appropriations and private funds, about \$300,000 for paving and alleys.
