### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS IN BUSY SESSION

Tax rate Fixed same as Last Year. Many Reports Examined and Approved.

The County Commissioners Court convened Monday and soon the members of that court were hard at work. The court is composed of the following gentlemen all of whom are present:—County Judge J. H. Cochren Jr., County Clerk E. E. Roy, Commissioners Focht, Lewis, Robertson and Witt. The regular routine of business has been carefully considered. The reports of the various county officials have been examined. The county tax rate has been fixed and serious questions have received earnest attention at the hands of the court.

The tax rate approximates the same as last year being 42 cts. on the hundred dollars valuation. The only changes made were in the general and jury funds. Instead of the jury fund being fixed at seven cents it was changed to three cents and the general fund instead of fifteen cents on the hundred dollars valuation was made 19 cents, making no change in the total amount of taxation.

By the wise management of the county and district judges in handling their respective courts a great saving has been made in the jury funds and at present there is more than \$4000 in that fund.

The commissioners expect to complete their work this week. invited to attend all services.

### NEW YORK GOVERNOR IMPEACHED

Governor Sulzer Charged with Fraudulent Use of Campaign Contributions.

Governor Sulzer of New York must face charges of fraud or misappropriation of campaign contributions on eight different counts. The Legislature by a vote of 79 to 45 passed a resolution impeaching the chief executive.

The Governor is charged not only with misappropriating funds contributed to his campaign, but made false statements and affidavits with reference thereto. That he also attempted to intimidate and prevent witnesses from testifying against him before the Frawley committee appointed to investigate his acts.

Governor Sulzer has signified his intention of refusing to abdicate his position and a lively scrap and sensational court proceedings are just ahead in New York State.

### NEW POOL HALL LAW VOID

The law recently enacted by the State Legislature providing that local option elections may be held to decide whether pool halls shall operate has been attacked and is claimed to be unconstitutional in that it does not provide for refunding the unused portion of the license purchase money.

A number of elections have been called and in several cases pool halls had already been voted out, but if the higher courts sustain the injunction granted by the District Judge, the law cannot be enforced.

### NOLAN COUNTY BOYS AT STATE UNIVERSITY

J. A. Focht, of Sweetwater in Honor Roll of this Big Institution

Austin, Aug. 9.—The attendance at the University of Texas, Main and Medical departments, for the past session was 2,361. The attendance in all departments was 3,334. An increase of approximately 500 students over that of the previous year. Of this number Nolan County furnished three. Their names and departments are as follows: O. K. Hobbs, freshman engineer, Maryneal; J. A. Focht, junior engineer, Sweetwater; F. M. Pope, freshman academic, Sweetwater. In a recently compiled honor list which contains the names of those students making excellent grades is found the name of: J. A. Focht, chemistry, civil engineering; Mr Focht is also a member of the university band.

The American Medical Association's official rating of the Medical department of the University of Texas is A, the highest possible grade. Of the institutions so rated, the University of Texas is one of four in the South attaining this distinction.

It has been found necessary to erect eight temporary frame structures on the campus of the University in order to provide for the increased enrollment. These structures, while not pretentious, are well lighted and heated, and are sanitary, and every means will be employed to make them comfortable for the students. The University will open Sept. 28th.

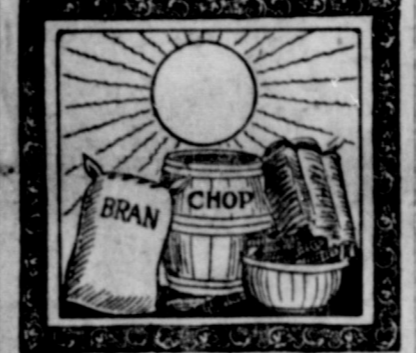

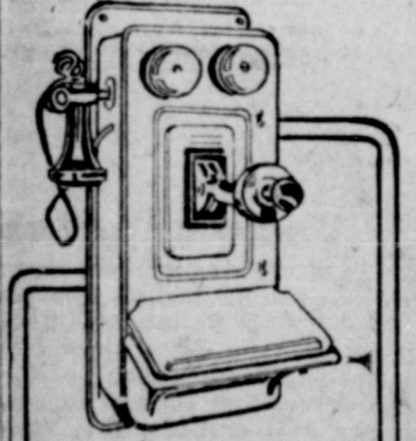

Downing are Defendants and the cause of action being alleged as follows: A suit on Vendor's Lien Note in the sum of \$6142 executed February 15th, 1907 by E. Q. Daniel payable to Jno. J. Ford, County Judge of Nolan County, Texas, and to his successors in office for the benefit of said County, bearing interest at 3 per cent per annum from date and providing for 10 per cent attorney's fees in case of suit. The note due forty years after date but providing that failure at any time to pay any installment of interest for 30 days after due, should mature the note.

Plaintiff alleges failure to pay installments of interest and consequent maturity of said note, and that same was placed in the hands of an Attorney for collection. **ABILENE IS ON HIGHWAY ROUTE**

**Abilene Chamber of Commerce has Closed Contract for the National Highway**

Abilene Daily Reporter.—Secretary Jesse Cannon, of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce handed out a piece of good news, and one that the citizens of this town will be glad to learn about, Saturday afternoon when he announced that Abilene had secured the location through this city of the Southern National Highway.

Col. Dell M. Potter, a man who has given much time and money to the location of this great highway and who is one of the men who is heading the movement, working in connection with the American Automobile Association for a Southern National Highway from ocean to ocean. Col. Potter lives in Arizona and is very wealthy. He went to New York and closed the deal there, this end being handled through E. J. Anderson, of Snyder and Thomas Trammell of

Sweetwater. It is our information that the route is from El Paso to Roswell, New Mexico, and from Sweetwater, Abilene and on to Ft. Worth.

The road is being logged by the American Automobile Association, aided by the United States Government, a Mr. Westguard, who is sent out by the government to locate the route now being at El Paso coming this way. Mr. Westguard started from Los Angeles, Calif., and his car is known as the pathfinder. On last Tuesday a proposition was submitted to Abilene which called for \$500.00 to be raised to pay for our part of the expense in location, which amount was assessed according to population and sent to parties in New York. On account of the demand for quick action five men: Messrs. J. M. Radford, E. B. Bynum, W. J. Fulwiler, W. L. Beckham, Jr., and Jesse Cannon, wired the money to Col. Potter and the people of the city are being asked to help pay the amount. \$346.50 was paid in Saturday and the balance will be raised Monday. This great highway will be worth much to Abilene and our people will doubtless gladly repay the gentlemen who put up the money that secured the road.

Chas. Motz, Jr., who is visiting his sister near New York City went to New York last week and called on Mr. Bruce of the American Automobile Association and received confirmation of the news that Abilene was on the route of the Southern National Highway as logged by that Association. The chamber of Commerce had been working on the locating of the road through this city for some time and the members of the Association feel mighty good that they have been able to close the contract and are now assured that the Highway will be logged through this city.

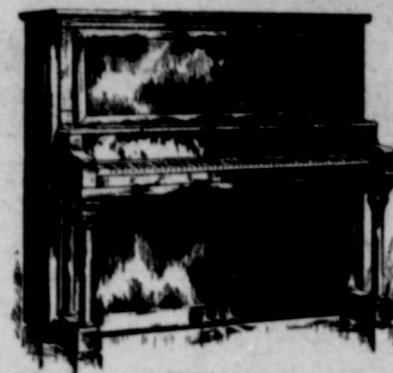
