ABOUT A YEAR AGO, congress was tearing into our income tax system, under the guise of "tax reform." We thought at the time that most taxpayers would be in for a rude shock, and so far we haven't seen or heard anything to make us think differently.

As one analyst said this week: "The new law, like the old one and every other income tax law ever enacted in the USA, is a patchwork quilt made up of the rules and regulations the most powerful lobbyists in Washington wanted--or were willing to settle for."

Jeff Rigenbach, writing in *USA Today* says "In essence, taxation is a form of robbery. It is the process by which government seizes from its citizens the money it needs to pay for its activities. In order to keep everything fairly civil and minimize the likelihood of armed resistance to the tax collector, the government negotiates with those it is robbing and agrees to follow certain rules and rob some more than others. But everyone is robbed to one extent or another. There is, therefore, no such thing as "fair" taxation. Robbery is never fair."

The worst part about the new tax set-up seems to be that it is more confusing to the rank and file taxpayer. More people than ever before are having to have professional help in filing their taxes in 1988.

We always thought that if something was "simplified," then it was made easier. Apparently this isn't the case when you let congress do the simplifying. It comes out sort of like the camel, which has been called "a horse put together by a committee."

If we were serious about being fair, one expert said, we would abandon taxation altogether in favor of voluntary methods of funding government services--like user fees and lotteries.

Another commentator says that the flat tax would take care of all the problems inherent in the income tax system.

"A 16 per cent flat-rate tax on personal and corporate income would have balanced the 1983 federal budget--the year of our first \$200 billion deficit. A 19 per cent flat rate would have balanced the budget and allowed the first \$6,000 of income to be exempt from tax, dropping the effective tax rate on a \$10,000 income to 7.6 per cent and that on \$20,000 to 13.3 per cent," says Paul Craig Roberts, another writer on the subject.

We're not sure what the answer is, but like last year, we're hesitant to turn the problem over to congress to solve.

We have always maintained that you shouldn't complain about the status quo, because a change could always be worse. By the time April 15 comes and goes, we'll all know whether or not this happened in regard to "tax reform."

## Runoff Election Is Set Tues., April 12

Parmer County voters will return to the polls next Tuesday for runoff elections in both the Democratic and Republican parties.

Highlighting the Democratic runoff in the county is the sheriff's race, where Rex Williams of Friona and John Armstrong of Farwell square off for the nomination.

In the March 8 primary, Williams led the voting with 41.5 per cent, and Armstrong came in second with 31.8 per cent.

In the other race, Mel Phillips and Bryan Poff face off for the nomination for the state senate.

Phillips, who has campaigned vigorously in the county, was favored in the March primary with 817 votes, or 56.5 per cent of the

vote. Poff received 362 votes.

Those voting in the Republican runoff will have three races.

One is the nomination for U.S. Senator between Beau Boulter of Amarillo and Wes Gilbreath.

Another is the Railroad Commission race between Ed Emmett and P.S. Ervin. The other is the Supreme Court Justice race

## Sugarbeet Acres To Show Increase

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today that the country's farmers intend to plant 1,290,600 acres to sugarbeets. The estimate was based on a nationwide survey conducted by USDA March 15.

The national planting intentions figure represents an increase of approximately 1.6 per cent from last year. Of that total, Texas and New Mexico growers are expected to plant 35,000 acres beginning in late March. That will be an increase of seven per cent over 1987.

Locally, the acreage for harvest next fall is expected to be 35,000 according to D.L. Printz, agricultural manager, Holly Sugar Corporation.

"The outturn from that acreage should approximate 760,000 tons," the spokesman said, with

probable total farm value of about 24 million dollars.

The sugarbeets will be processed at the Hereford plant where some 377 year-round and seasonal employees will help turn the crop into refined sugar having a wholesale value of about 38 million dollars.

Processing will not commence until September, Printz said, but in the meantime the plant is undergoing a stem-to-stern overhaul.

Sugarbeets and beet sugar have been an integral part of this area's economy for 24 years, Printz said.

"The grower-processor partnership in the beet sugar industry works well. Together we pump approximately 120 million dollars into the local economy."

"That makes cash registers jingle up and down Main Street."

## Star Gives Choice In Senate Race

The Friona Star heartily endorses Democratic candidate Mel Phillips in the runoff election for nomination to the state senate.

Phillips, a small businessman, has said that under no circumstances would he support a state income tax if elected. He has even filed a public notice to that effect.

Phillips understands the needs of the rural area, and promises he will be responsive to the voters if elected.

Since announcing for the senate race, Phillips has campaigned extensively in Parmer County. In addition to other visits, Phillips has attended such things as the Sausage Fest in Bovina, the Farwell Chamber of Commerce Banquet and the Friona Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

He has shown a sincere interest in the welfare of the rural areas as well as his hometown of Amarillo.

Conversely, to our knowledge, Phillips' opponent in the runoff has not campaigned locally at all.

A good turnout on Saturday is vitally important in this runoff. As rural residents, we need to cast our vote for the man who has shown an interest in our area--Mel Phillips.

**POLLING SITES GIVEN**  
There are four polling sites for the Democrats for the runoff: The American Legion Hall in Bovina; Calvary Baptist Church in Friona; the Farwell Community Center in Farwell; and Lazbuddie High School.

Republican polling places are at City Hall in Farwell; Reeve Chevrolet in Friona; and Lazbuddie School Auditorium.

Voters may vote in the poll closest to where they live, but basically should vote in the poll located in their commissioner's precinct.

If you voted in the primary, you must vote in that party's runoff. However, if you did not vote in March, you may vote in the runoff primary of your choice.

## Fajita Fete Is Set April 15

Ben Konis and Gary Mingus, two of Amarillo's popular artisans, have close ties to Friona. These two will be the featured guests at a benefit dinner to be held next Friday evening at the Junior High Cafeteria, with proceeds going to help restore the old Santa Fe Depot building in the Friona City Park.

In the twenty years since he moved his family from New York to Amarillo, Ben Konis has become well-known across the country as a western artist. He has won national art awards and is featured in such galleries as the Southwest Art Gallery in Scottsdale, Arizona, the Talisman Art Gallery at Bartlesville, Oklahoma, and the Donlee Gallery in California. Local and area artists have participated in his annual workshops at the Carrizo Lodge School in Ruidoso, New Mexico each summer, and one in Amarillo each November.

Jinni works as the promotional manager for Konis, Inc., handling all the necessary public relations work and publishing the brochures for Ben's many art shows and workshops.

The couple has two daughters. Kelly Konis, age 21, is a junior student at the University of Texas at Austin, majoring in advertising. Jade Konis, age 19, is a freshman journalism major at WTSU in Canyon, where she will be a cheerleader next year.

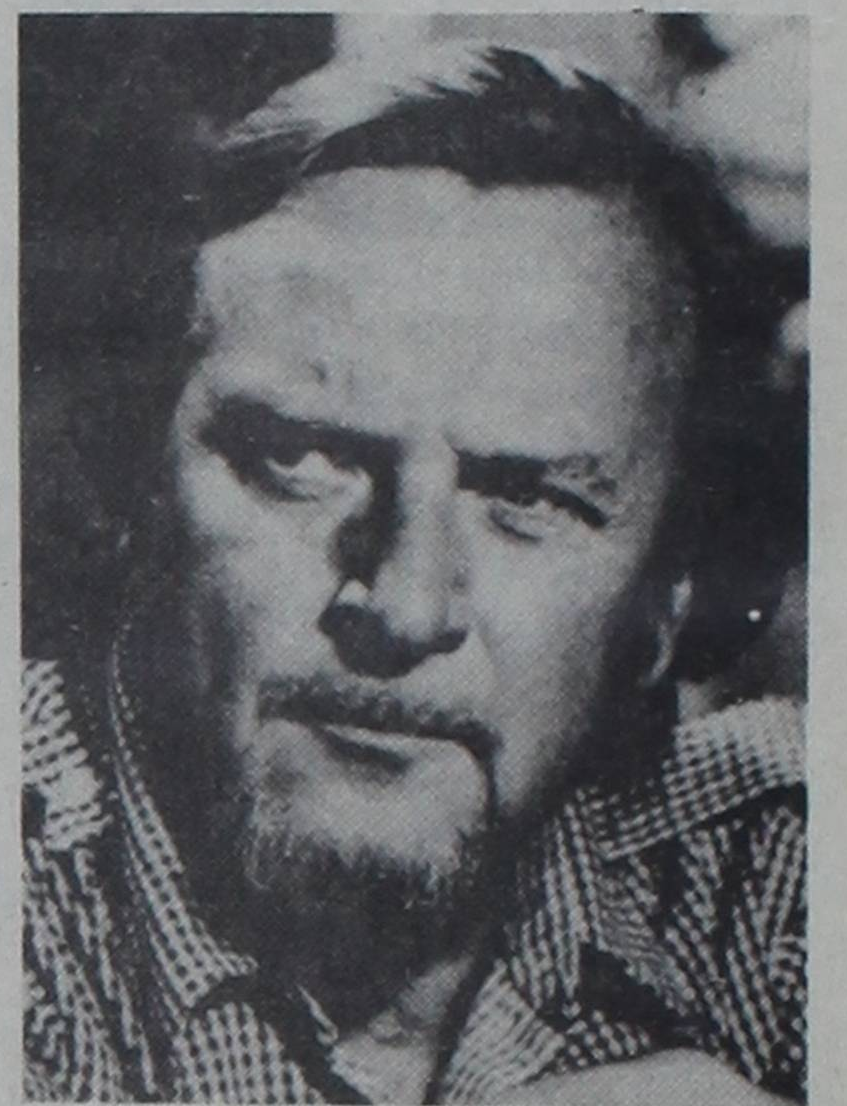

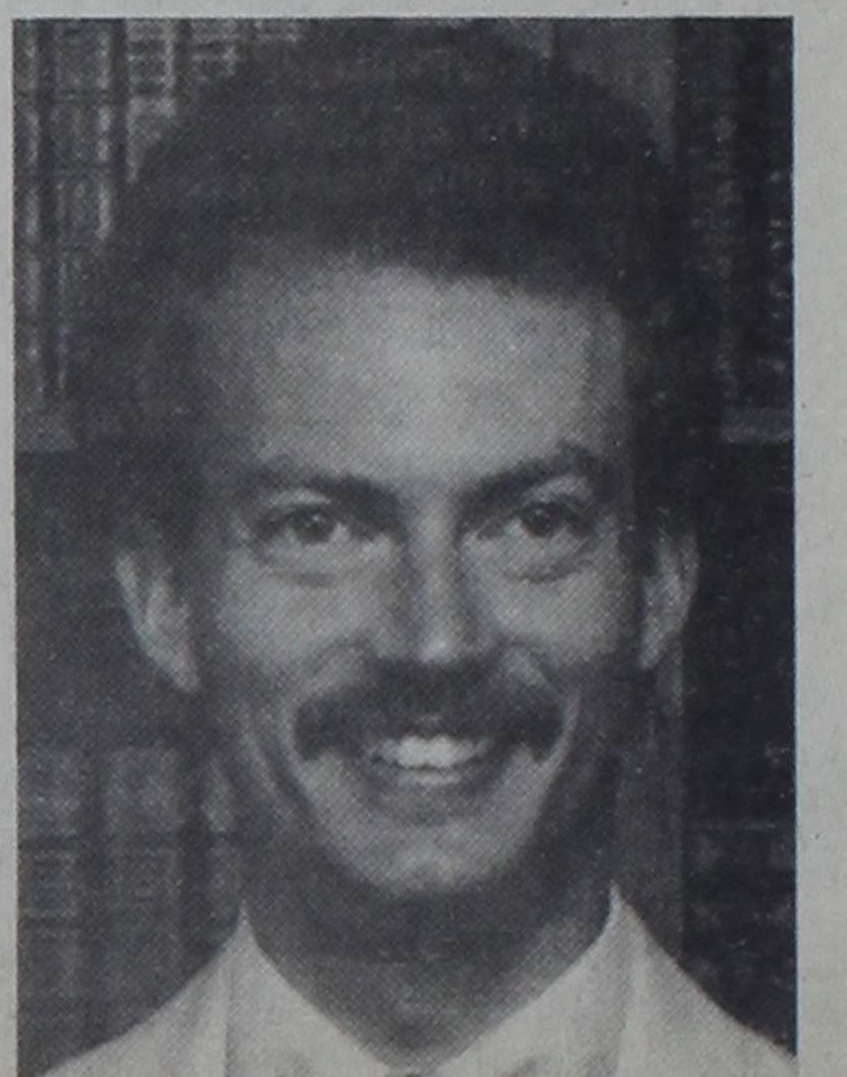

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

**60 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1928**

On Tuesday morning of this week, the town was aroused from its slumbers with the news that the Dixie Filling Station was burning. The entire building, which contained three compartments, housing besides the filling station the Woodell Produce and Restaurant, and the Highway Garage, was completely destroyed. S.M. Malone of Roswell owned the Highway Garage. Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Woodell owned the restaurant.

**50 YEARS AGO--APRIL 15, 1938**

Lazbuddy School won high point honors in the Parmer County Interscholastic Track Meet held here on Monday afternoon. Lazbuddy won first place in the low hurdles, pole vault, and shot put. Friona will send two men to the district, Price Brookfield, winner of the half mile, broad jump, discus and javelin throw, and Martin Todd, winner of the mile run.

**45 YEARS AGO--APRIL 9, 1943**

Funeral rites for Clyde Seamands, Friona's outstanding pioneer cattleman and rancher, were held here Sunday afternoon at the Union Congregational Church. Rev. Paxton Smith, pastor of the church, was in charge of the services and preached the funeral sermon.

Mr. and Mrs. Dick Habbinga, who have been in Indiana since selling their farm here last summer, have returned to Texas, according to a card from them this week.

**40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 9, 1948**

In the annual school election here last Saturday, two trustees were elected from a slate of seven candidates. Jake Lamb, with 81 votes, and D.O. Robason, with 54, were elected. Others were Marvin Lawson, 26 votes, Leo McLellan, 34 votes, Ralph Wilson, 49 votes, Glenn Reeve, 12, and Carl Maurer, 28.

In the city election Tuesday, Mack Bainum was elected mayor, with Carl Maurer and Nelson

Welch elected as commissioners in a write-in vote which produced one of the liveliest city elections in years.

**35 YEARS AGO--APRIL 9, 1953**

Rev. George E. Meyer, who has served as pastor of Friona's Congregational Church the past three years, announced his resignation this week. Rev. Meyer said he planned to leave the ministry.

**30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 10, 1958**

An all-new building and plant to house and produce The Friona Star will soon be a reality, W.H. Graham, Jr., publisher, announces this week. Development plans call for completion on June 20, and first production work is anticipated July 1, he says.

Jones Construction Company got the contract for the construction of a 48x46 foot addition to the present school cafeteria for their bid of \$20,722 at Monday night's meeting of the board of trustees of the Friona Independent School District.

**25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 11, 1963**

The Friona Independent School Board was faced with 70 applications for the job of coach of the Friona Chieftains in its regular monthly meeting Monday night. Applications came from all parts of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

The annual spring meeting of the Texas Home Demonstration Assn.'s District I will be held in Friona today. Around 350 women are expected to converge on Friona from a 19-county area.

**20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 11, 1968**

Over 40 representatives of the press and area industrial leaders attended a special tour of the Missouri Beef facilities Monday, conducted by Missouri Beef's president, R.E. (Gene) Frye. The special tour was arranged to help publicize the new Friona plant's dedication and open house on April 20 and 21. The dedication ceremony, to which the public is invited, is scheduled for 2:30 p.m.

Saturday, April 20. State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon will act as master of ceremonies.

**10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 9, 1978**

Honor graduates for the Friona High School class of 1978 were announced this week by John R. Cook, principal. Bryan Johnston will be the class valedictorian, having a four-year average of 94.60. Perry Church will be salutatorian, with an average of 93.84. John Carson is the class historian, with a 93.94 average.

## Increase Is Noted In TSTI Enrollment

Texas State Technical Institute's Amarillo campus reports an increase of five per cent in its spring quarter enrollment. Ninth class day count shows a total of 911 students compared to 866 for spring quarter 1987. Programs reporting substantial enrollment increases include aviation maintenance, commercial art in advertising, computer science, drafting and design, diesel mechanics, feedmill and elevator, machining techniques, professional truck operations, technical office training and transport refrigeration. Boot and shoe operations, meat processing and marketing, and saddle and tack making also reported increased enrollments.

He was a member of the Baptist

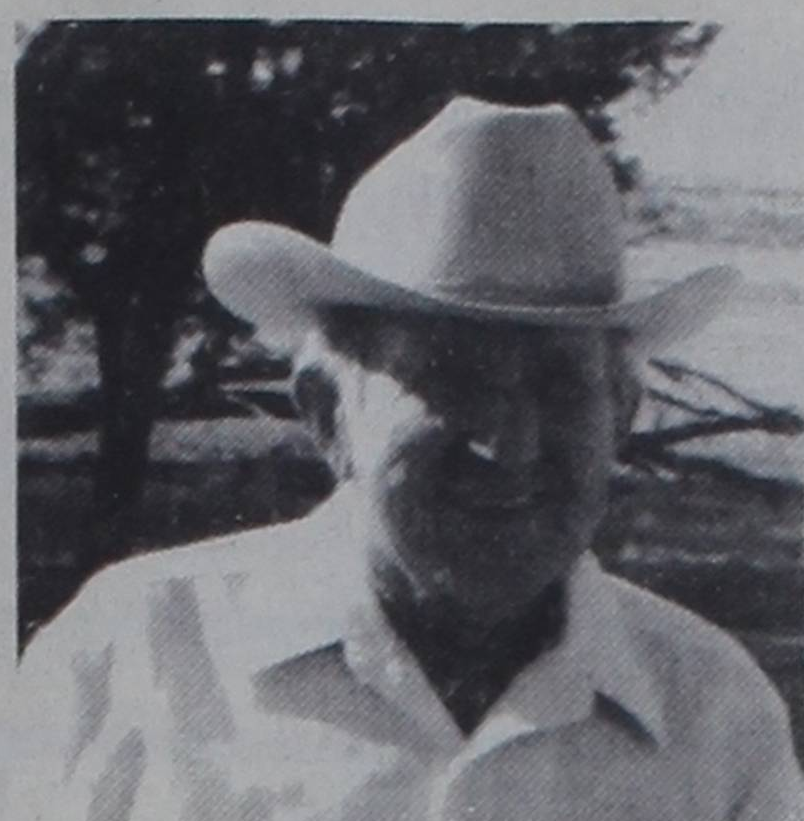
Church and the Masonic Lodge.

The Friona Police Department received 264 calls during the month of March, 1988.

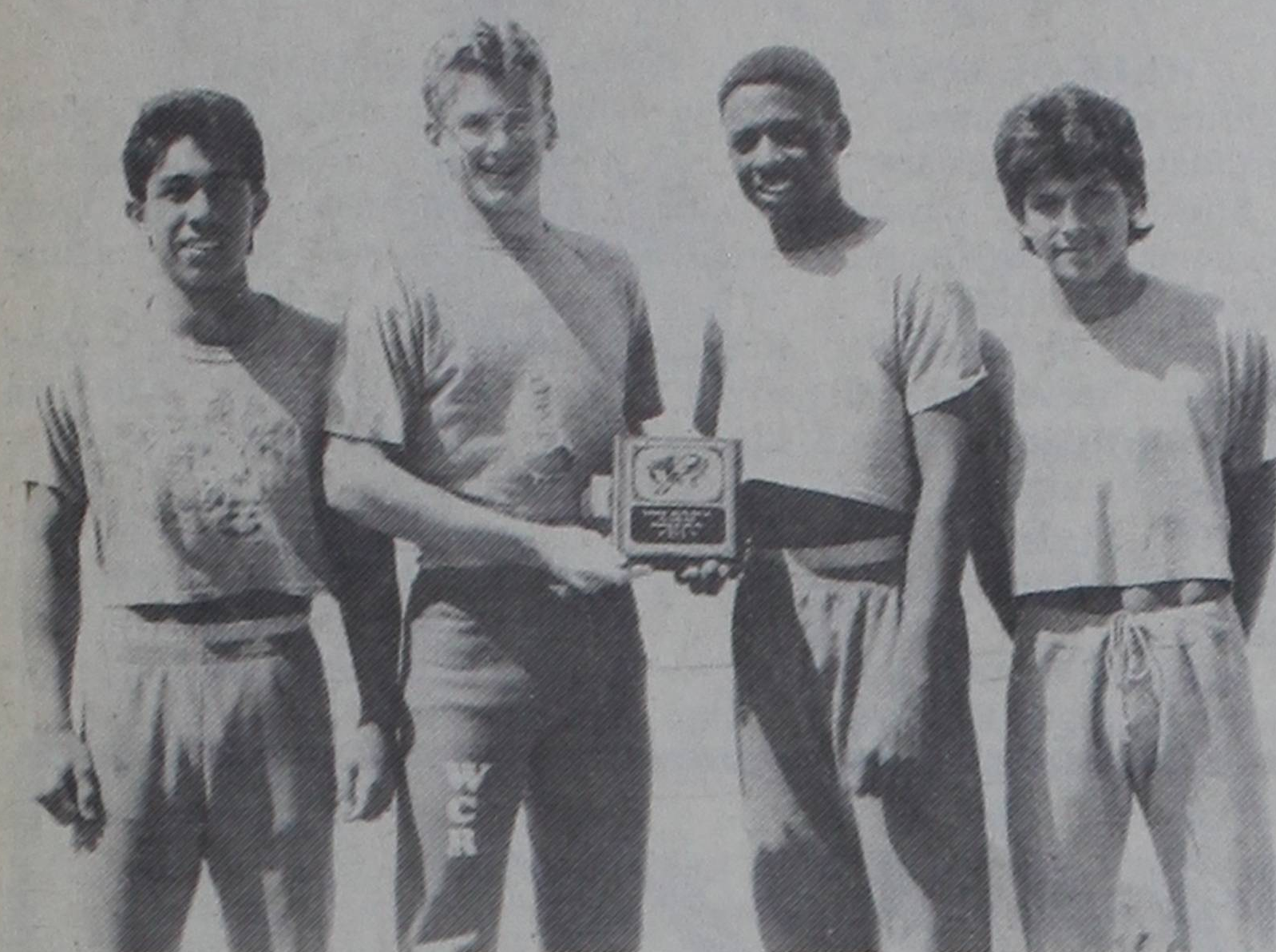

--I can share the excitement of new Library technology with our retired librarians.

--I can help a Scout group earn a merit badge.

--I watch the Story Hour children finding Easter eggs at Prairie Acres.

--I receive a copy of a 1903 Chicago newspaper story from a paper which originally cost 2¢--the copy cost \$2.50.

--One of our Library books goes interlibrary loan to Oregon, Florida, or Austin, Texas.

--Someone uses the Library for their first time--be they 6 or 60.

--I hear a first grader say, 'I can read that!'

--People think LIBRARY when they want to know something.

I guess it all boils down to helping others or pleasing them in some special way which makes it all worthwhile.

Statistics for February 1988 included 2,208 items loaned to 1,062 patrons with 16 new readers registered, 102 children attending Story Hour, 48 interlibrary loan books borrowed and 15 loaned, 15 adult basic education tutoring hours.

In March 1988 we loaned 2,113 items to 1,046 patrons with 14 new readers registered, 106 children attending Story Hour, 25 interlibrary loan books borrowed and 19 loaned, and 24 ABE hours tutored.

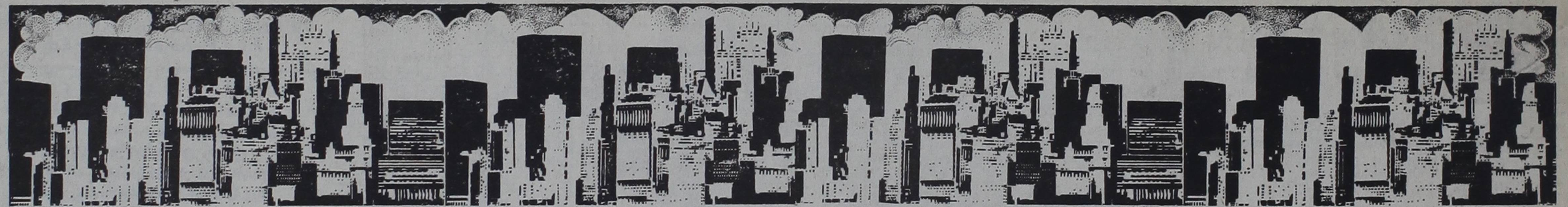

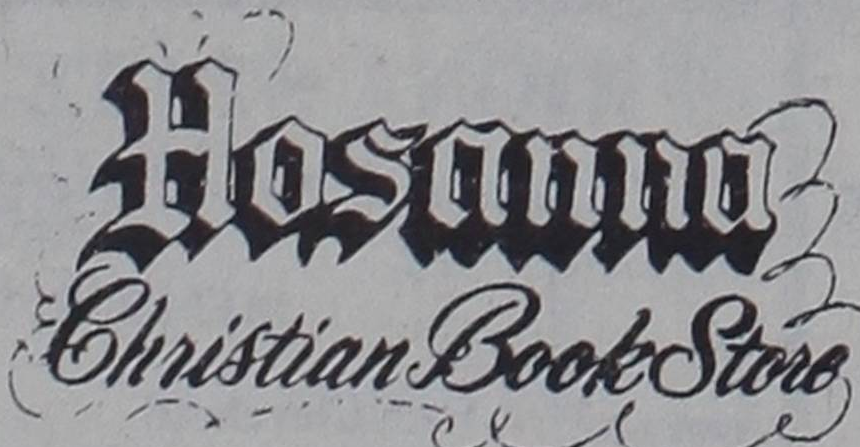
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# S. Maynard, R. Gillespie United In Church Ceremony

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


