Paris, Nov. 27.—William Simms, the United Press staff correspondent with the French army at the Front, says, "After three weeks observation, I am fully convinced that the Allies are highly satisfied with the result of the war and the present situation. They are content to let Germany war herself to death. They claim that Germany's army is slowly bleeding to death. From notably trustworthy sources I gather that Germany is greatly dissatisfied with her present situation, but is unable now to either force the issue or concentrate her forces for one great decisive battle. She is growing weaker while the Allies are growing stronger each day. Owing to the extended lines the Germans are now unable to concentrate their forces to engage the Allies decisively.

SWEETWATER AND FREE MAIL DELIVERY

Postmaster R. C. Crane Discusses Free Mail Delivery and Requisites for Same.

To the Daily Reporter:

I noticed in yesterday's Reporter that the Sweetwater Commercial Club had determined to have free delivery established for Sweetwater, or know the reason why, etc.

Sweetwater has been entitled to free delivery for over three years, so far as income of the office was concerned. According to my information, no effort has been made to get this free delivery until some two or three months before I came into the office March 15th, 1914; why such is the case I do not know.

I came into the office in the belief that an application had been made and granted for its establishment on July 1st, 1914.

On May 14th, I learned for the first time that I and the other people who had been so informed, were perhaps mistaken, and on that day wrote to know about it—requesting at the same time to know what, if anything, need be done, so that I could see that it should be done. I was promptly informed that the application was refused because of the failure of the people to comply with the requirements of the department between the dates of inspection—three months apart. This information, I have from time to time given to the citizens of this place.

I understand that the main thing that stood in the way at that time was the lack of sufficient street lights at box locations; lack of street crossings; and lack of good continuous sidewalks in the residential districts, all things over which the postmaster of Sweetwater has no control. Since that time no effort at betterment has been made, but more lights will soon be put on, according to my information.

About the time that Sweetwater was turned down, free delivery was put on at Big Springs, so, that while the latter is no larger and has no more office income than Sweetwater, it has free mail delivery and Sweetwater has not.

Whether and when Sweetwater gets free mail delivery is peculiarly up to the citizenship—and the Commercial Club, if it has assumed the task.

I stand ready to help in all ways possible, but there are certain prerequisite conditions that every place must satisfy the department on before this service is established, and to do that on such points as above indicated, is up to the people and the Commercial Club.

FERGUSON ANNOUNCES APPOINTEES

Governor-Elect Makes Public Names of Members of His Official Family.

Temple, Texas, Nov. 21.—The uncertainty that has surrounded the matter of appointments to State offices, under Governor-Elect James E. Ferguson, was dispelled in part today, when the latter gave out from his office a list of appointees to a large number of offices within his disposal, there being a number of appointments to other offices to be announced later.

Mr. Ferguson was literally besieged in his office all day by applicants and their friends, and this has been by far the busiest day in that respect that he has spent, the number of visitors being the largest that has yet put in their appearance. Several Colquitt appointees are to be retained, according to today's list, which also includes the names of several others who have gained prominence in public life, but for the most part his appointees are men who are new to the glamor of officeholding.

As finally decided upon the list of appointees today includes the following:

Private Secretary, John L. Wroe, of Houston, previously announced.
Secretary of State, John G. McKay,

the Live Stock and Sanitary Commission the appointment of Dave H. Cunningham of Comanche as chief inspector.

C. B. Watters of San Antonio, who was very active for Mr. Ferguson was tendered a \$2,000 position in one of the departments.

Mr. McKay announced the appointment of Lon Brooks of Anson as Chief clerk and F. H. Hargon, of Llano County as the chief bookkeeper. He stated that he would announce his other appointments within the next two or three days.

What the Farmers Should Do.

They should plant blackeye peas between six foot corn rows, and see that the town puts in a dry kiln to render them immune from the weevil. They should plan to ship strawberries in car lots if their section is adapted to them, and likewise other things, co-operating in planting so as to load mixed cars.

It is getting a little bit late to sow oats, but not too late for wheat, which makes good winter pasture and cover. It also makes good bread, and cut in the dough stage makes almost, or quite as good hay as oats.

They should get together and agree on a breed of hogs for their section, purchasing sires of that breed, and then breed to load cars together, so that they may have uniform weight and color.

They should work into dairy cattle close to town, and beef cattle further away, uniformity as to breed being as important as in hogs and this is especially true in beef breeding. It would not be long until a home creamery would take care of the cream output.

They should enlist the aid of the town in securing the location of a sweet potato curing ware house of not less than 40,000 bushels capacity, and grow the sweets to fill it, if their section be a sandy land section.

They should plan together to grow and ship poultry in car lots, taking the women into partnership with them. They should, along the South in general, grow only enough cotton to be worth 20 cents per pound, and help to evolve a better market system for it than obtains at present.

Notice of Order Fixing Water Rates.

It appearing to the Commission that the water service rates as charged here tofore are unequal and that some persons are paying a much higher rate than is paid by others, it was on November 18, 1914 decided by unanimous vote to fix the following schedule of rates to apply to all persons, firms and corporations purchasing water from the city, to wit:

There shall be charged for the first 2000 gallons or less of water used per month a minimum of \$1.50, for the next 6000 gallons used a charge of 40 cents per thousand gallons; for the next 6000 gallons 30 cents per thousand gallons, and for all water in excess of 14000 up to 50000 gallons a rate of 25 cents per thousand gallons and for all water used in excess of 50,000 gallons a charge of 20 cents per thousand gallons. This rate to take effect and be chargeable to all users of water from and after December 1, 1914.

After being stunned, Mrs. Armour and three maids were held in a corner of the room at the point of a revolver, while confederates ransacked the house and escaped at leisure.

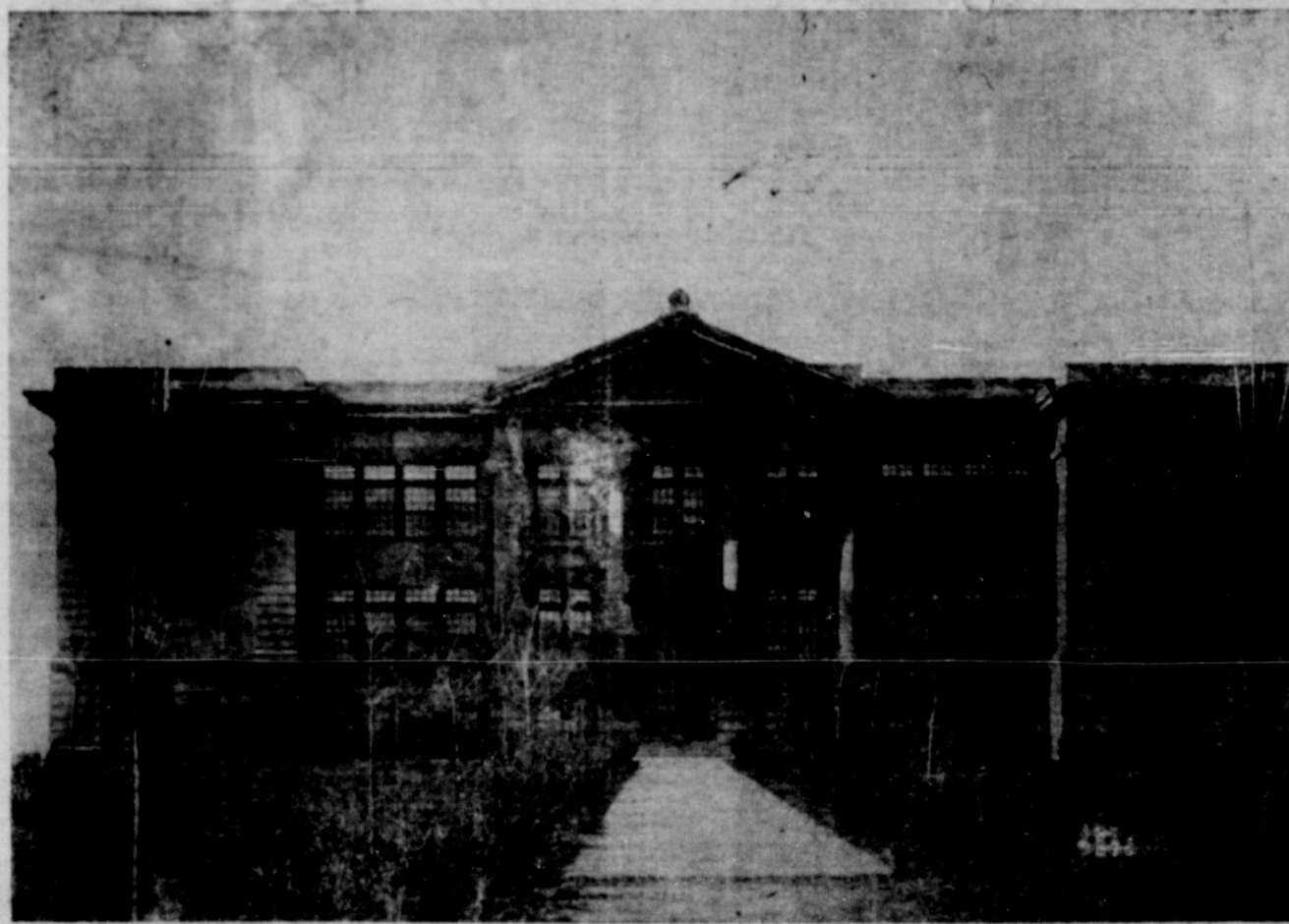

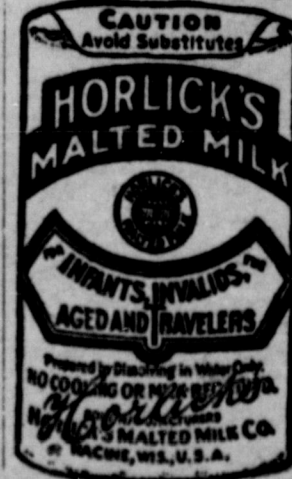

SWEETWATER AND NOLAN COUNTY--THEIR RESOURCES

Nolan County is located nearly in the geographical center of the state, and is nearly square, having an area of 828 square miles. The altitude is from 2000 to 2500 feet. The surface is rolling with a ridge of hills crossing through the country from northwest to southeast. There are several streams in the county, which furnish water for stock in abundance. There are also a number of springs in various parts of the county which furnish stock water and domestic purposes. Water may be had on the dry benches the year round by throwing a dam across them and catching the overflow when it rains, while water may be had in abundance in nearly all parts of the county by digging from 15 to 30 feet.

The topography of the county naturally divides itself into three or four divisions. The northeast portion is a vast valley of red sandy loam, ranging in depth from 5 to 30 feet. There is no richer land in the wide world than this section of the country. Beginning in the west and on the north the "divide" passes thru the county, ranging in width from 5 to 15 miles. These lands are black waxy and are from 2 to 15 feet deep with a limestone foundation underneath.

In the extreme southern part of the country the lands are a dark sandy, with often valleys of deep black lands.

There is a fine growth of mesquite timber all over the county, and along the streams plenty of elm, hackberry, cottonwood, wild china, and some pecan, while in the southern portion of the county liveoak and post oak are found in abundance.

There is an abundance of fire wood and timber for fencing in nearly every portion of the county.

Delightful Climate.

The summers are delightful while the winters are not severe. The evenings and nights during the summer are always cool and pleasant, while during the spring and autumn months the climate is simply delightful and exhilarating. The rains for the most part come during the spring and summer with an unusual fine season in November.

Agricultural Products.

Our farmers grow cotton, milo, maize, kaffir corn, corn, sorghum, wheat, oats, millet, barley, rye, ground peas, common field peas, melons, pumpkins, potatoes and garden vegetables in abundance. With intensive farming one may count on from one fourth to a bale of cotton, 10 to 30 bushels of wheat, 30 to 100 bushels of oats, and melons, peas, pumpkins, ground-peas, etc., in large quantities. It would be hard to find a place where melons, peas and pumpkins grow in greater quantities.

Truck Farming.

Any farmer who will farm intensively and diversify will make money in Nolan County. Stock of all kinds do well and will winter with little or no shelter and very little feed if they have pasture to run on. A farm cut up into small divisions and peas and ground peas and sorghum planted afterward turning in the hog will always bring a fine result in dollars. A few cows and hens added to this will pay the expenses of the farm and put money into the bank. Eggs will sell for 15c to 40c the year round and butter will bring 30 cents and every gallon of sweet milk will bring 30 cents if delivered to the city or creamery. Not only this but every turnip, melon, pumpkin, onion and other vegetables will always bring a fancy price.

The valley lands near the county line lying in the deep red belt can be brought from \$15 to \$40, and some several miles can be had for \$12 to \$15.

These lands are suited to the growth of any kind of field products while potatoes and melons and peas will produce immense crops. These lands are just as rich and even richer than the lands of Illinois, Kansas, Missouri, the Virginias, the Carolinas, etc., that sell for \$100 an acre or more. The soil is several times as deep and will last much longer. The same kind of farming here as there will always give

great results. Then, too, one good hand here with a good team can easily cultivate from 50 to 75 acres, which is some item. The black land belt is just as fertile as Kansas or Oklahoma lands and will produce immense wheat and oat crops and all other field crops. An abundance of fine water can be had anywhere on the "divide" by digging a few feet. With these facts, why would a man worry over old worn out lands in the east when he could get the very best lands for a small price and on long time? These fine black lands can be bought from \$10 to \$40. These same lands three or four years ago sold from \$3 to \$20, and three or four years hence they will sell from \$20 to \$100. Some lands in the valley belt sold three or four years ago for \$10 and during the last year they sold for \$75, and what is true of these lands is true of all the county, in the same proportion in price.

The county has good roads and is just now spending vast sums on its roads that the farmer may easily haul heavy loads to market. Besides this the county has three big trunk line railroads crossing the country and entering the county seat.

Nolan county has a splendid system of public schools, lasting on an average of seven months, and where the people supplement the State fund and desire if they may run for nine months in the year. The schools are all graded and a district that has enough children to employ three or four teachers may have appropriated to it \$500, or more; if it has a course of study meeting the requirements it may get \$1000 to \$2,000 from the State to supplement what the State already gives. This means that any district may have as good schools as the cities have, if they want it.

When you read this remember that our lands are just as productive, one half to one tenth in price, and much longer lasting than the lands in the "Old States", also that unless you get these lands in the next few months or years at the furthestmost that they will be just as high as lands there. Also remember that there are thousands of acres along the creek valleys that can and will be irrigated when the farmer gets hold of it in dead earnest. This can and will be done by a few farmers at a small expense. Dams will be thrown across the streams and the overflow of water stored up and used on the fields for alfalfa and garden products; then that same land will sell for \$100 to \$250 an acre.

SWEETWATER PUBLIC SCHOOLS OPEN SEPT. 13.

Next Monday morning at nine o'clock, the public schools of the City will open for the session of 1915-16 and it is requested that all pupils of the district be present for the organization and classification.

The wards of the district have been arranged as follows: South Ward, all the district south of the T. & P. R. R. West Ward, all the district west of Oak Street and North of the T. & P. R. R.

East Ward, all the district East of Oak Street and North of the T. & P. R. R.

All the high school grades and the seventh grade will be cared for at the high school.

If for any reason patrons desire to transfer from the district in which they live, transfers will be granted by the Board of Trustees if reasons submitted are regarded as vital to interests of the schools. All requests for transfers should be submitted in writing to the superintendent, J. H. Bright. Patrons are requested to attend to this matter at once that the organization of school may be completed at an early date.

All teachers will meet the superintendent at the high school building on Saturday afternoon at 3:30 for instructions and assignments.

All pupils desiring classification for next session will report at their respective wards or buildings on Tuesday and Friday of this week. This applies to all pupils who desire to be classified from other schools or who left school last session without having taken all examinations or those who have by work during the summer made up any work.

Classes will meet their teachers Monday morning and be organized. Lists of supplies and books will be issued by teachers, and pupils sent home. It is urgent that all pupils be equipped as per the lists given them and returned to school Tuesday morning for regular work.
