Miller, Presiding Elder of the Stamford District; Rev. J. E. Stephens of Snyder and Rev. J. H. Hamblin, Pastor of the Methodist church at Hamlin.

Notwithstanding the inclement weather, a great crowd assembled to

show their esteem and appreciation of this noble character.

Mrs. Hardy was 46 years of age. She leaves a devoted husband, two sons, Sam and Louis; two daughters, Mary and Mabel Frances together with other relatives, to mourn her departure.

Services were conducted at the Dulaney home at 1.30 p. m. today, by Rev. J. T. Griswold, after which the body was conveyed to the City Cemetery, where interment was made.

He had never seen cotton before, and together with the process of separating the lint from the seed was most interesting to him. He was greatly amused at the prairie dogs he observed near town and had to take a few fancy shots at them.

## BRITISH FLEET WON BIG NAVAL BATTLE OVER GERMANS

London, Jan. 25.—The British fleet after engaging the German fleet in the North Sea has won an important victory. One big German cruiser was sunk and two other ships seriously damaged. Nearly all of the 885 men on the German cruiser were lost. A battle between the light cruisers and German destroyers has also occurred and is reported to favor the British. Other German ships escaped by flight. The battle lasted four hours.

**A MOST IMPORTANT ARREST SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT MAKES**

**Former Cashier of National Bank Taken into Custody by Police and Sheriff's Departments.**

Mention was made in Monday's Daily Reporter of the arrest of a man giving his name as Anderson who was wanted by the San Angelo officers on a charge of forgery.

The arrest was made by chief of police W. R. Johnson and members of the Sheriff's department. Chief of police Johnson decided that the prisoner was in all probability a much wanted man in some parts and got exceedingly busy on the case. By some clever detective work, he got into the man's confidence and the latter proceeded to give him his entire history.

**Was Former Bank Cashier.**

The man told Mr. Johnson that Anderson was not his name, but that his real name was A. McCowan, that he was formerly cashier of the Montesa National Bank, state of Washington. He said that about three years ago he with other officials of the bank absconded and since that time he had been on the dodge. He admitted that Police Johnson was the first officer to become suspicious of him and suspect that he was an escaped criminal. He said that he had held splendid jobs at various places since his flight, but had avoided remaining very long at any one place.

Mr. Johnson spent several hours at different times talking with him. He told his prisoner that he was sure that he wanted on serious charges and that he had the wires busy making inquiries about him. McCowan said that he was sure that he would be found out and proceeded to travel his history to the Chief of Police. The latter immediately wired the sheriff at Montesa about the man. The officer replied at once, stating that he was wanted there on serious charges and to hold him until he could come for him.

The Angelo sheriff came over from that place and took him back to answer the charge of forgery. There McCowan forged a check to a supposed National Bank at Covington, Texas, for \$50.00. The party at Angelo became uneasy and wired to find that no such bank exists.

It is not learned what reward, if any, is offered but in all probability the local officers will reap a handsome amount for their fortunate capture.

McCowan was a well dressed man and gave every appearance of high breeding.

The Police and Sheriff's departments are to be congratulated upon their important capture.

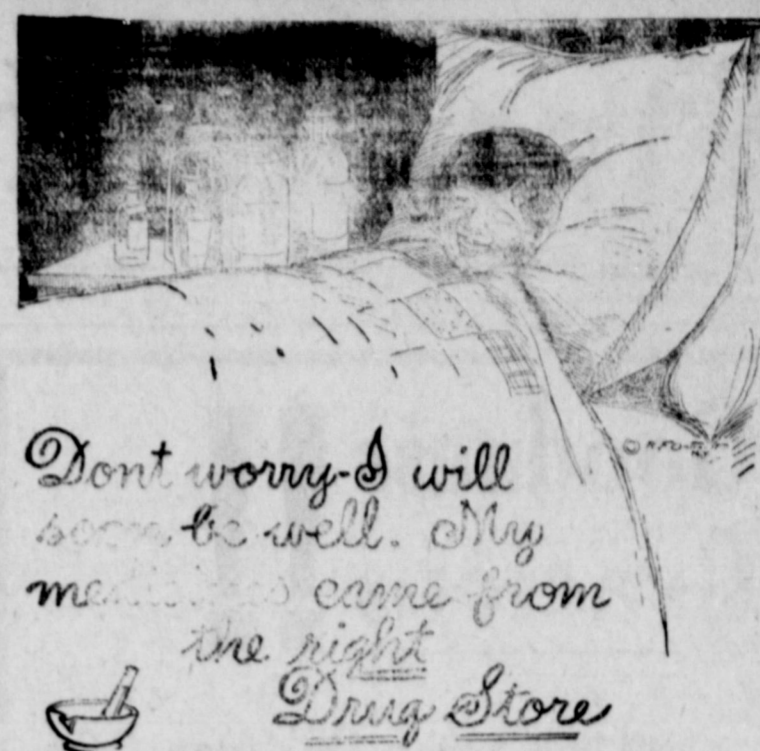

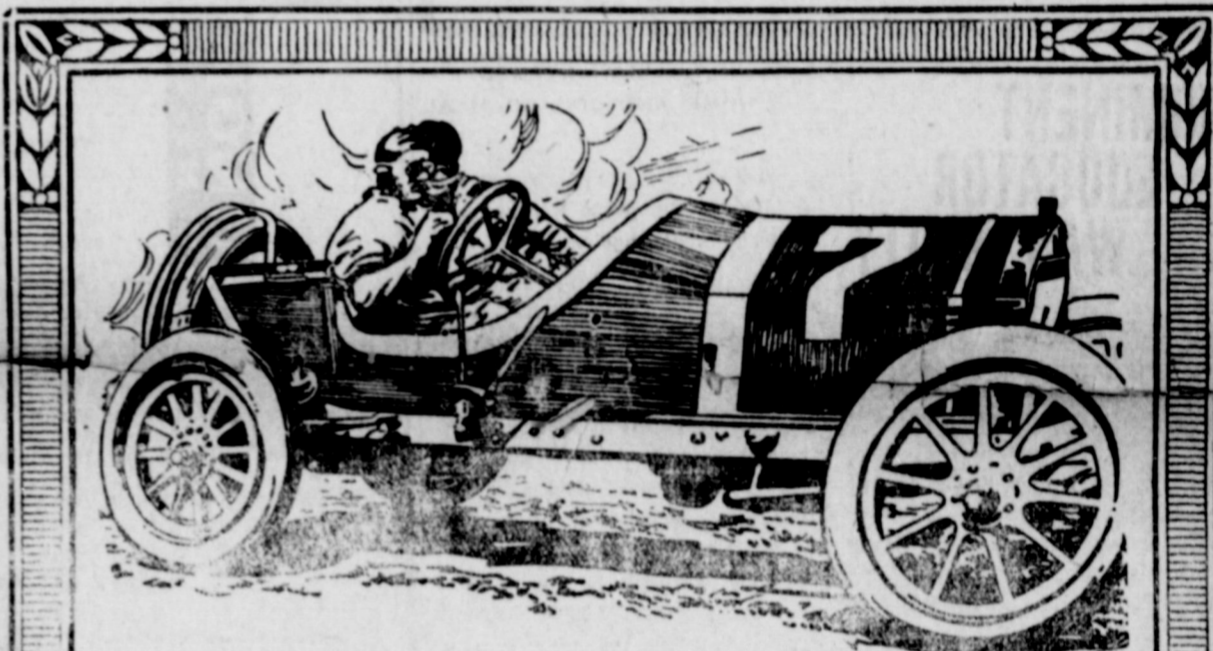

**NEGRO MAN IS FOULLY MURDERED IN CITY LAST NIGHT**

Found With Skull Terribly Crushed in Dr. Wimberly's Servant House Today.

George Greenleaf, a negro, about forty-five years of age was discovered by Dr. J. A. Wimberly this afternoon lying dead in his servant house.

The building had been occupied by Greenleaf and another negro. The latter works at a cafe and often stayed at the cafe all night. In fact, when questioned today, he said that lately he had arranged a bed in the back of the cafe and scarcely ever went to the Wimberly place at night. He stated that he was there yesterday, however, going to pay his part of the rent for the week.

In fact, the officers are sure that he was attacked while asleep and never knew what struck him. Upon investigation a coupling pin was found in the ditch back of the house and was bloody, except the part held in the hand of the assassin.

The switching crew of the Orient from which the pin was taken said the car was spotted late yesterday afternoon and when they went to remove the car today they discovered that the pin was gone.

A large number of negroes have been rounded in and a rigid examination is being conducted by the officers and the assassin will, in all probability be located.

Greenleaf had been here for several months. He had been engaged at different hotels as dishwasher and at other work. During the holidays he held down Negro Anderson's shing stand in front of the Crawford Cafe.

**FUNERAL OF GOOD CITIZEN AT MARYNEAL YESTERDAY**

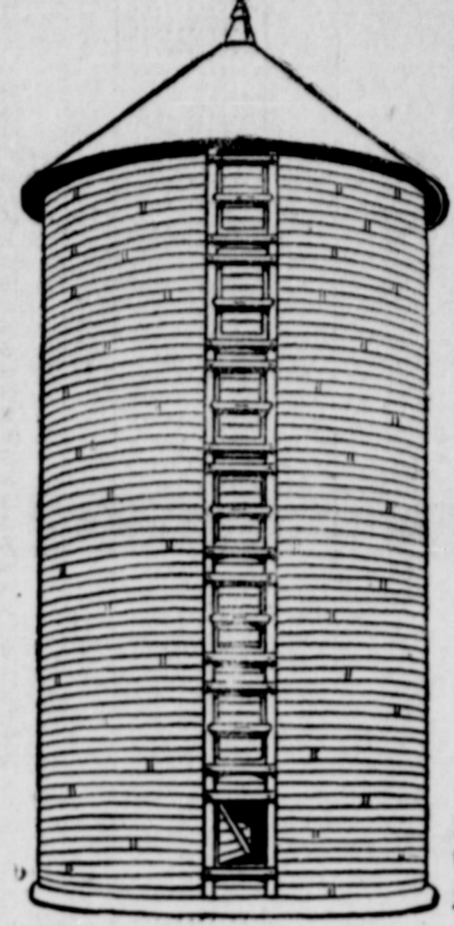

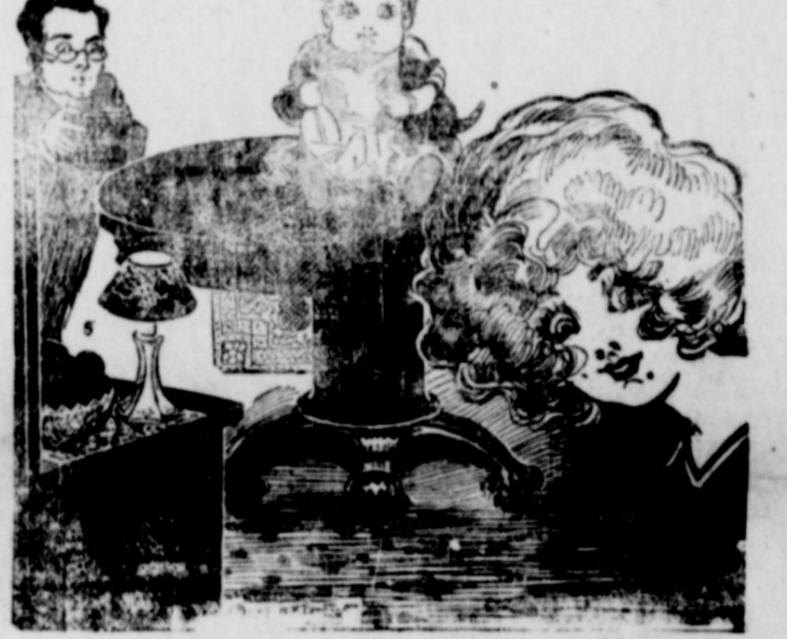
