ONE OF OUR readers submitted an article from the AARP Bulletin which everyone should take time to consider.

Taxpayers in the 65 to 69-year age group have been complaining, and rightly so, due to an "earnings limit" imposed on them that reduces Social Security benefits by \$1 for every \$2 of earnings above \$8,400 per year for taxpayers in that age bracket.

AARP (The American Association of Retired Persons) strongly opposes the earnings limit. In a column last November, AARP Executive Director Jack Carlson called the earnings limit a "harmful device that discourages older persons from staying at work, and ultimately makes no sense at all."

However, Health and Humane Services Secretary Otis Bowen has appealed to President Reagan, himself an older worker, to push for repeal of the earnings law.

"The law imposes an unreasonable 50 per cent tax on the earnings of the elderly, and discourages productive labor," Secretary Bowen said in his memo to the president.

Social Security Commissioner Dorcas R. Hardy has also urged repeal of the earnings limit.

In his memorandum, Secretary Bowen conceded that his proposal could have substantial short-term costs, since benefits would rise for recipients with outside earnings. But over the long run, he said, the change would contribute to the reduction of the federal deficit because elderly people would work more, and thus pay more taxes.

The double-whammy on the earnings of people in the 65-69 age group is scored by our reader, who points out that this group is the one defined as "notch babies," and have already been discriminated against by Social Security.

"Surely this can be eliminated. If the United States has \$8 million to build a school in France for people who immigrated there 20 years ago, why can't age 65 to 69 taxpayers be treated fairly in the United States?" our source asks.

There are a lot of voters in this age bracket, it was pointed out, and all of those who feel the earnings limit should be struck down are urged to contact their congressmen and make their wishes known.

FOR SOME TIME now, various legal documents, including ballots, have been required to be printed in both English and Spanish in the state of Texas.

So, here's a newspaper produced especially for Spanish readers. If having material printed in both English and Spanish is such a necessity, wonder why this particular publication chose to print in English?

RUNOFF RESULTS

Williams, Phillips Are Demo Winners

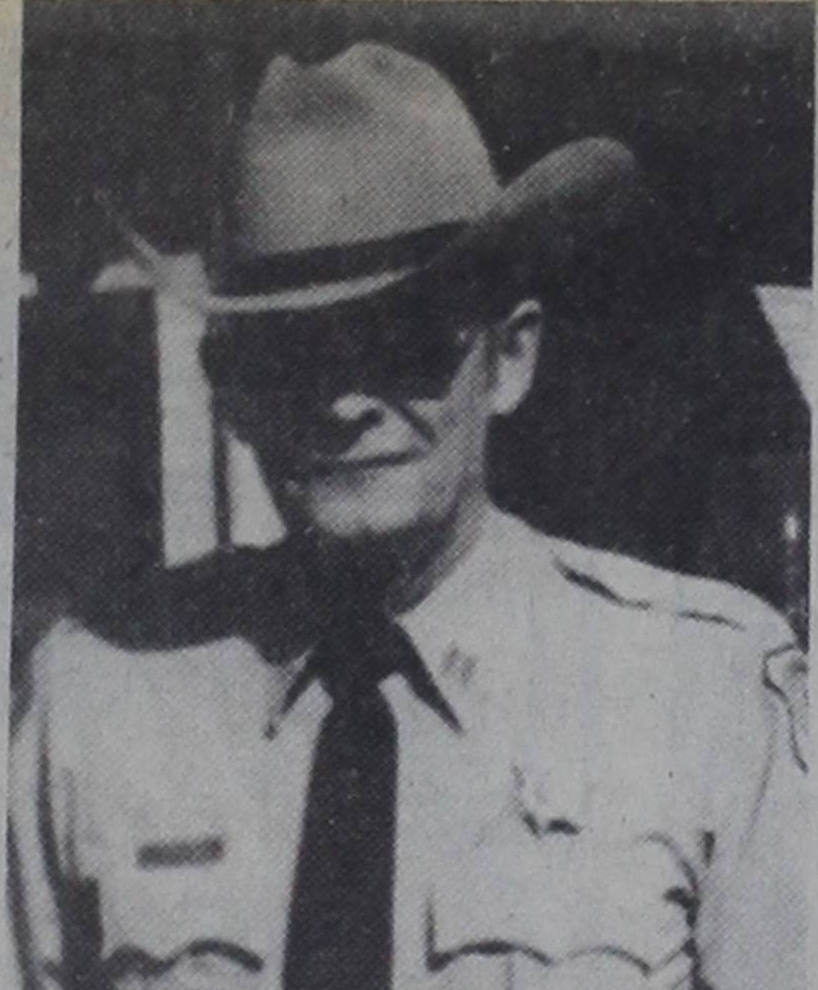
Rex Williams won the Democratic party runoff for County Sheriff in Tuesday's runoff, and with no Republican opponent, is virtually assured of being the county's next sheriff.

Williams, given a tremendous boost by Precinct 1 and 4 voters, won over John Armstrong, 641-415. Williams polled 60.7 per cent of the votes to 39.3 per cent for Armstrong.

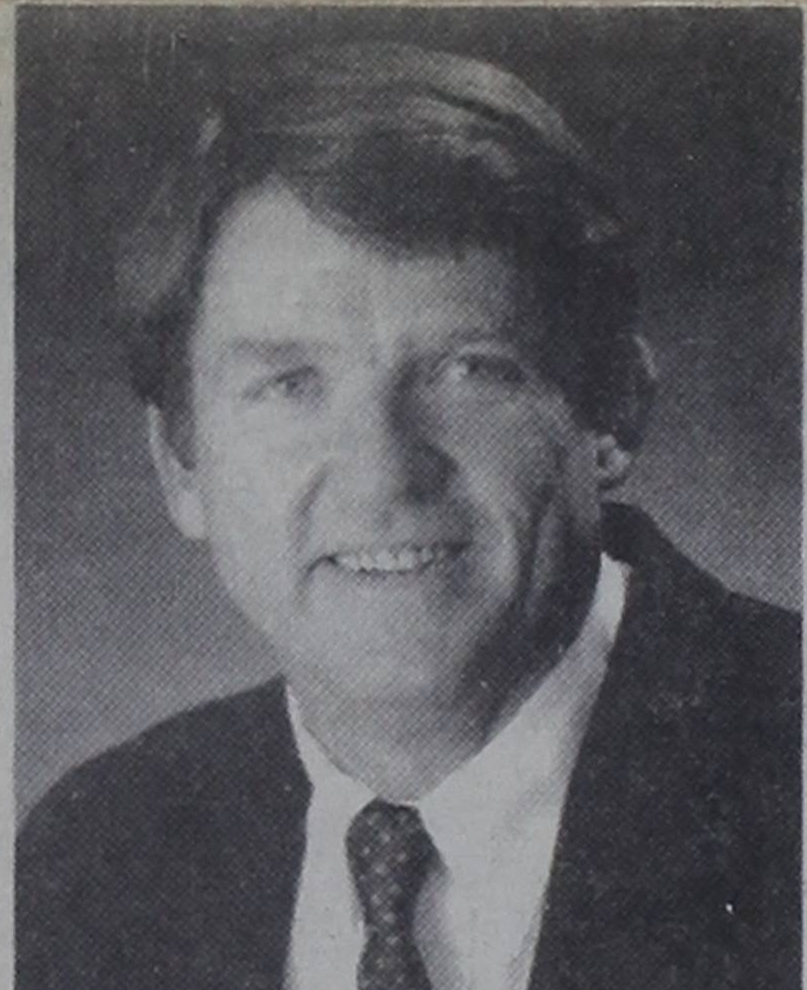
With Friona as the "hub," Williams received 467 of the 494 votes cast in the sheriff's race in Precinct 1. This was a whopping 94.5 per cent of the votes, and was enough votes to top Armstrong's total, thanks to a 50 per cent turnout of the voters in the precinct.

Williams also carried the Lazbuddie precinct handily, with 53 votes to seven for Armstrong, 88.3 per cent.

Combining the Friona and Lazbuddie precincts, Williams

tallied 520 votes to 34 for Armstrong, or 93.9 per cent.

Although Armstrong won his home box of Farwell by 279-27, this wasn't nearly enough to offset Williams' showing in the western half of the county.

The two candidates virtually split the Bovina precinct voting, as they had in the primary. Armstrong garnered 87 votes there, to 82 for Williams.

Armstrong won the absentee box, 15-12, so he actually won three boxes to Williams' two.

Williams said he was surprised by the margin, and by the good turnout in Precinct 1.

"This was my first experience in a runoff, but (County Clerk) Bonnie Warren said it was a good turnout for a runoff in the county," Williams said.

RE-SCHEDULED

AIDS Program Is Set Tuesday

The AIDS program that has been scheduled on two previous dates and has had to be cancelled will be held on Tuesday, April 19.

Dr. Arnold Isaacson, Region 2 Director for the Texas Department of Health, and Tommy Snell, Educational Specialist for Region 2, will present the informational and educational program on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) at a community-wide program in the Elementary-Junior High Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday evening.

Dr. Isaacson and Mr. Snell will present programs earlier in the day to the Junior High and High School students.

All citizens are invited and encouraged to attend this program. The AIDS epidemic is one of the greatest threats to mankind known today. There is no effective method known to man today to cure this dreaded disease. Education is the best and most effective answer known at this time.

Once the AIDS virus becomes active in man, death is inevitable. Almost 55,000 cases of AIDS have been reported in the U.S. and about 34,000 deaths at the present time. These figures are increasing daily. The virus is no longer isolated in New York and San Francisco, but moving at an alarming rate across the nation.

The Panhandle of Texas and Friona can no longer be considered to be exempt from this dreaded disease.

This program is being sponsored by the Friona Public Schools as the beginning of an education program for the students in the public schools as well as the community in better understanding AIDS and thus being able to combat this disease. Parents are especially urged to attend this program to be in a position to inform and educate family members about the virus.

Please set aside about one hour of your time and attend this meeting on Tuesday, April 19.

'Coon Sabatoges City's Power Supply

The city of Friona was hit with a power outage that lasted almost two hours late last Friday, April 9.

It was unusual in that it was the second time within a week that some city residents experienced a power outage.

However, the most unusual aspect of the most recent outage was its cause.

Southwestern Public Service spokesmen said that a raccoon apparently caused a short-circuit at the sub-station just south of Friona when he crawled from one insulator to another and touched both insulators.

The animal was believed to have climbed some 15 to 18 feet to his execution, which threw the entire city out of power. The electricity

went off at about 11 p.m., and was restored at about 12:45 a.m. Saturday.

Parmer County Community Hospital and Prairie Acres Nursing Home each was able to switch on their emergency power generators in order to maintain some light and power.

But for the rest of the city, it was either go on to bed, or switch to candles and flashlights.

Adding to the darkness on the city's highway section was the fact that there was no moon at all at the time of the outage.

New Extension Agent Is Named For County

An experienced county Extension agent for home economics has been named to fill Parmer County's vacant position. She is Rochelle White, who is moving here from Swisher County.

The appointment, effective May 15, was announced by Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts and Dr. Catherine Crawford, district director for home economics with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Ms. White will work with County Extension Agent Gary Patterson and Extension entomologist Michael Blanton in conducting Extension educational programs for Parmer County adults and youths.

Ms. White has two years experience as an assistant Extension home economist. As an Extension agent, she has worked with 4-H youth and their adult leaders in a large variety of project areas. She has worked closely with the Swisher 4-H and Youth Committee of the Extension Program Council, County Adult Leaders Association and the County 4-H Council. She has worked with Extension Homemaker Clubs and other adult

groups by presenting programs and assisting with the Extension Homemakers Council.

Last year, she was responsible for organizing and leading the 4-H and Youth Committee in planning and conducting a career fair at which high school students were able to learn about a variety of career areas, and visit with representatives of various colleges and vocational schools to gain a better understanding of what is required to enter certain fields of work.

Ms. White is a member of the Texas and American Association of Extension Home Economists, the Texas and National Association of 4-H Agents, the American and Texas Home Economics Associations. She is a Certified Home Economist.

Ms. White is a native of Wilbarger County. She attended public school at Vernon, graduating from Northside High School. Ms. White attended Vernon Regional Junior College and graduated in 1983. She transferred to Texas Tech University and received her bachelor's degree in home economics in May 1986.

While at Tech, Ms. White was active in student organizations and honor societies. She was recognized as the highest ranking senior student in the College of Home Economics at the 1986 graduation exercises.

In addition to her outstanding accomplishments as a student, she was president of the Home Economics Recruiters, vice president and program chairman of the Tech chapter of the American Home Economics Association, treasurer of Phi Upsilon Omicron-the home economics honorary fraternity, and was a member of Mortar Board.

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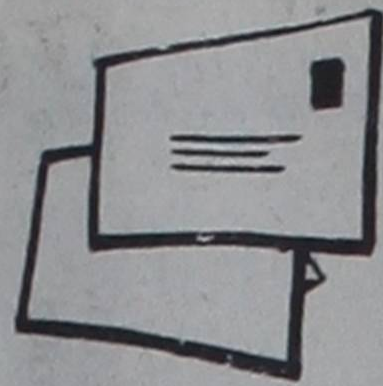
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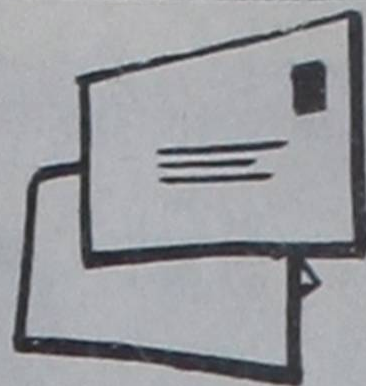
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Letters To The Editor

In recent days, several citizens of this area have contacted me concerning telephone solicitation made to them in behalf of SPECIAL OLYMPICS, including citizens of Friona. Therefore, I am writing this letter to give information concerning this matter.

According to the information given in the solicitation, it is stated that 67% of all the monies raised comes back to assist the local special citizens to attend Special Olympics.

I have worked with these special citizens through our public schools and through the Hereford Satellite Center for 20 years, which includes working closely with Special Olympic programs. I can assure you that, to my knowledge, never has the local schools or Satellite Center received any funding to assist in attendance at the State Special Olympic events.

I contacted the Texas Special Olympics Office in Austin, and was informed that this information is in error; that there was a contract for telephone solicitation with a firm in Fort Worth and the National Special Olympics Foundation, but to their knowledge, no funds were received back to the local community or to the state.

Therefore, I believe the people of our communities need to be aware of this, and I would like them to know if they wish to assist the local with financial support, this can be done, I am sure, through the Special Education Department of the local schools or through the Hereford Satellite Center in Hereford.

As the new Student Body President, I am concerned that the name of West Texas State University has become synonymous with controversy. The majority of the time that WT appears in the media, be it a newspaper, radio, or a TV newscast, "the controversy" is usually at the forefront of attention. Sadly, the Panhandle is only receiving coverage of one side of said controversy.

With a cry for Academic Freedom, only the views of a few upset faculty members have received extensive coverage. I neither know of nor have I heard of any violations of Academic Freedom on our campus. Were such violations present, public knowledge of any sort of controversy would be non-existent. Throughout the past year, the

Student Senate, along with various other campus leaders, has called for an end to this dilemma. I appeal to the residents of the Panhandle area to support the students of WT in their action-oriented stance. This can be done by stopping the rumor-mills-getting the facts on BOTH sides of issues--and focusing our energies on moving a unified West Texas State University in "The Right Direction."

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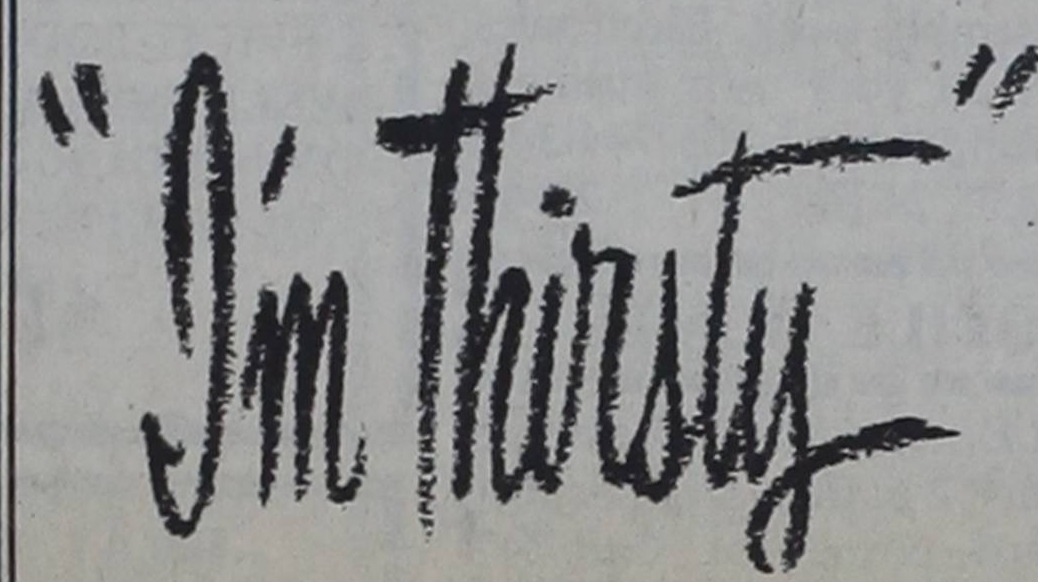


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While meeting the physical, play, and comfort needs, don't forget the need for "Living Waters." Take the family to church, where all may hear of, and be drawn closer to our loving Father.

The Friona Squaws had five point-winners at the Dimmitt Invitational Track meet last Saturday.

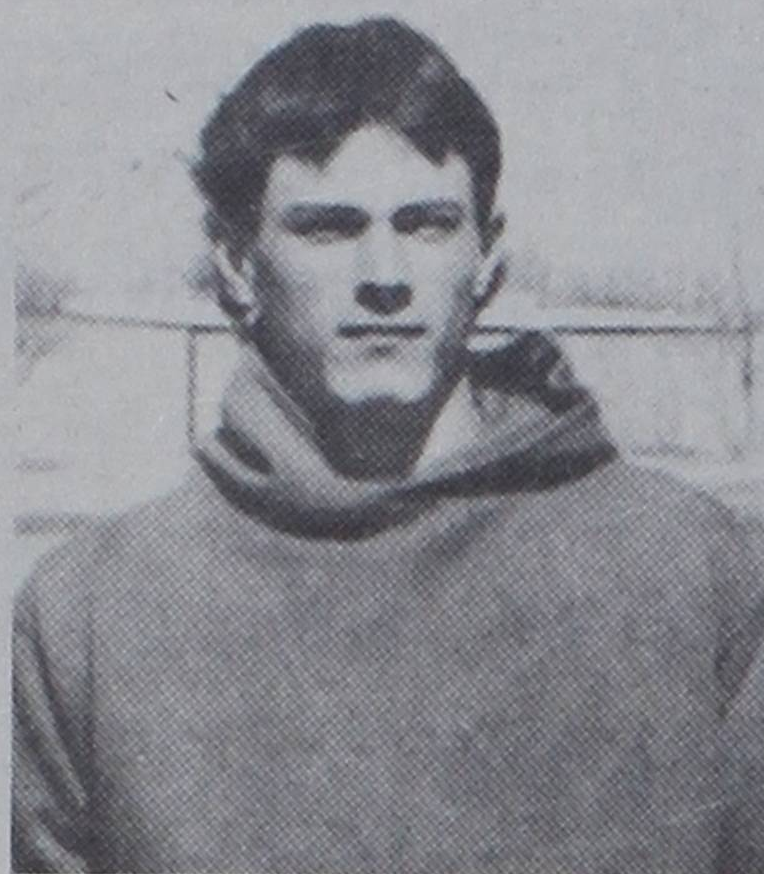
Michelle Echols placed fifth in the 400-meter dash with a time of 67.8.

Postal Hike To Cost Taxpayers

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday this week's hike in postal rates will cost the state an additional \$8.6 million during the current budget.

"When the cost of stamps goes up, housekeeping costs to the state go up just like they do for everyone else," Bullock said.

He said that more than \$2.7 million in additional postage will be needed to cover state postage costs through the end of the fiscal year in August and about \$5.9 million will be needed for additional costs next fiscal year.

The new postal rates will increase the state's first-class costs by 13.6 per cent, first class pre-sort costs by 16.7 per cent and third class costs by about 24 per cent.

The overall cost to the state should average about 17 per cent during the next 17 months.

"The cost of doing business for the state has just gone up and there won't be any relief from these postage increases," Bullock said.

He said that during fiscal 1987 the state spent about \$35 million on postage.

Farmers Home Will Elect New Members

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) began accepting nominations April 5 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Weldon C. Rainey said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Rainey said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Rainey said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Rainey said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 207 Avenue D, Farwell, Texas, Rainey said.

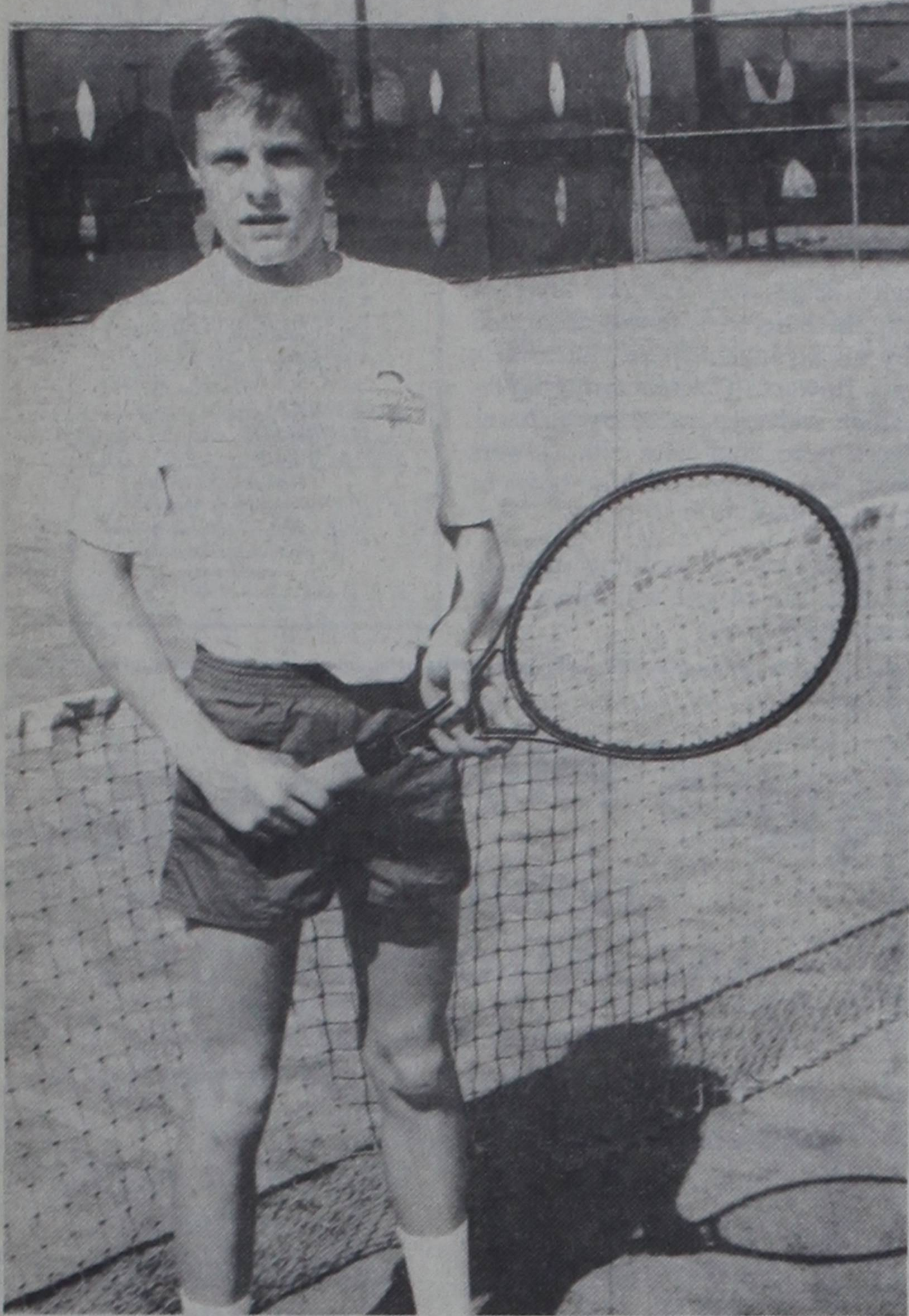

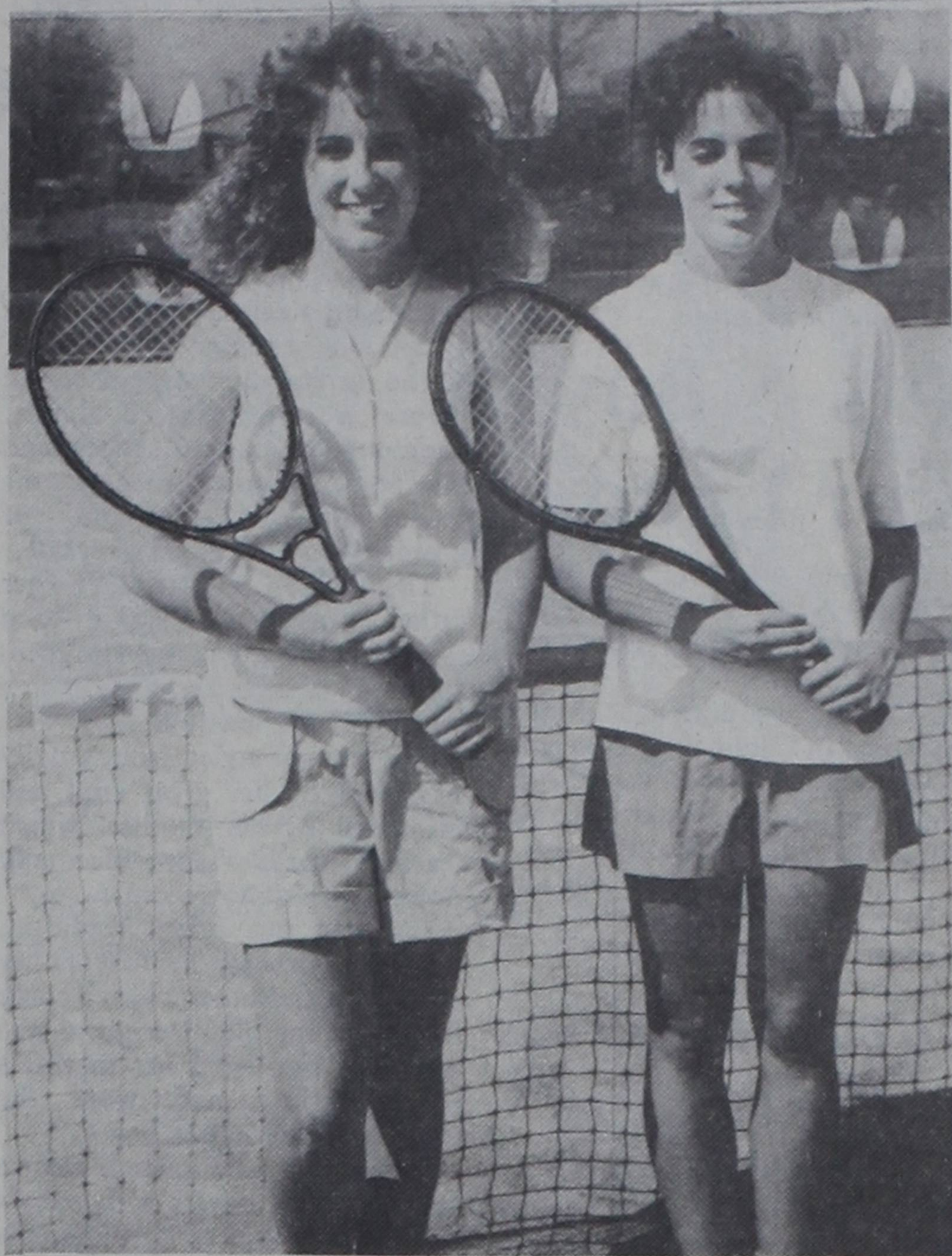

Wednesday afternoon and plans to return to Albuquerque early next week.

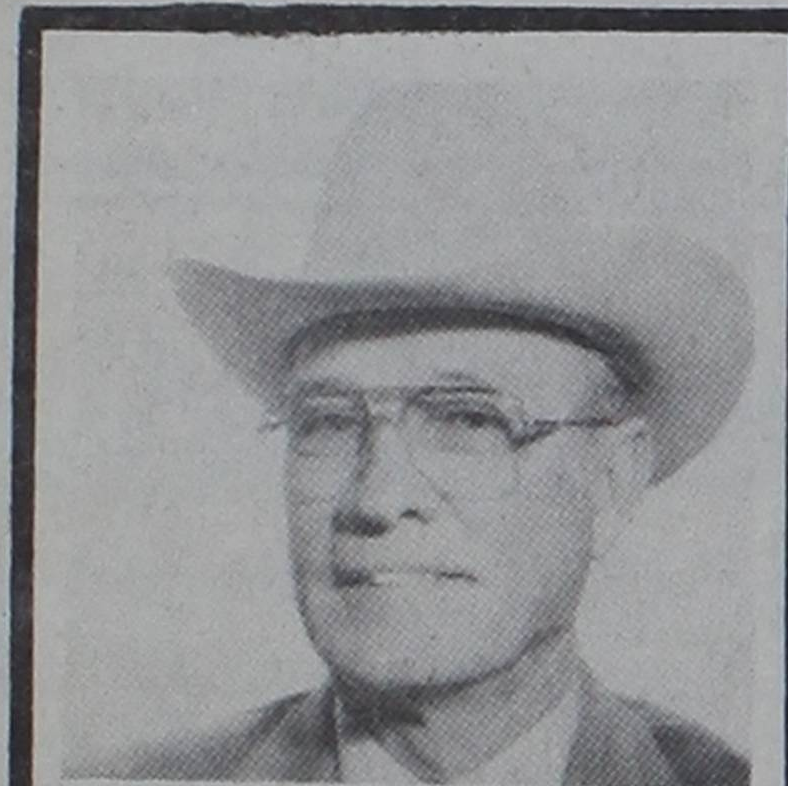
Marie Hinds of Hereford, a former resident of the Black community, spent Wednesday afternoon visiting relatives and friends here.
