65 DEAD 200 INJURED IN GREAT COAST STORM

Baton Rouge, La., Oct. 1.—The death list resulting from the great hurricane which was sweeping the New Orleans section and the Mississippi Coast region Wednesday is expected to reach sixty-five or seventy, while the property loss will amount to many millions. In New Orleans fifteen are dead and two hundred are injured. On the Mississippi coast thirteen are dead and two hundred are injured. In the Mississippi coast thirteen are dead, scores injured or missing. In Frenier, La., twenty are dead, and more than that number injured. Heavy damage has been done to railroads. Ample warning of the storm are believed to be the cause of no greater loss of life.

Receipts Show Great Increase

It is generally considered that the receipts of a Post Office give a good indication of the conditions existing in the community where that office is located. If this is to be taken as any criterion, conditions in Sweetwater for the past six months have been over 36 per cent better than they were for the same six months in 1914.

Yesterday ended the second quarter of the U. S. Postal department's business year, which begins April 1st, and Postmaster Crane has given out the information that the cash income of the Sweetwater Post office has been for this six months over 36 per cent greater than it was for the corresponding period of 1914. This income is from box rents and from the sale of stamps and stamped paper.

It may be remembered that there was an increase of 17 per cent and over, in the income of the office for the year ending March 31st, 1915, over the same period of the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1914.

It is understood also, that the increase in income from receipts from box rents alone during the past six months has been considerably over 11 per cent. When it is understood that the great majority of boxes rent at 60 and 75 cents per quarter, and consequently that this does not mean merely ten per cent more boxes rented; and that probably as many people get their mail at the general delivery window as in rented boxes, some idea may be had of the increase in number of people transacting their postal business at Sweetwater.

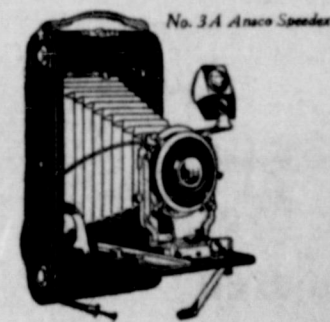

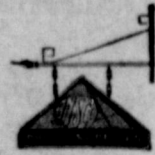

\$4,750,000 TO BE SPENT THIS YEAR IN DEMONSTRATION

The Smith-Lever agricultural extension act of May 8, 1914, provides for a permanent national system of agricultural extension work to be carried on with federal and state funds through the state agricultural colleges in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture, by means of instruction and practical demonstrations in agriculture and home economics to persons not attending the colleges.

The Smith-Lever act appropriates money as follows:

- (1) \$10,000 of federal funds annually to each of the 48 states.
- (2) In addition to the \$480,000, the act appropriates for 1915-1916 \$600,000 of federal Smith-Lever funds. This sum will be increased annually by \$500,000 of federal Smith-Lever funds until 1923, when the annual government appropriation will be set at \$4,580,000. The additional appropriation is divided among the states in the proportion that the rural population of each state bears to the total rural population of the states. Any state, however, to share this extra federal Smith-Lever fund must appropriate and spend in extension work at least an equal amount of money from sources within the state. The money from the state will bring the joint demonstration fund to \$1,680,000 in 1915-16.

In addition to the Smith-Lever funds, however, the department of agriculture during 1916 will expend, from its own appropriations for farmers' cooperative demonstration work and for other direct field instruction in special subjects, over \$1,025,000.

The purchase of this land is in accord with the move to get the pen farms away from the Brazos bottoms and about 700 or 1000 men will be worked on the Eastman Farm—Huntsville Post-Item.

The Hill referred to in the above is a brother-in-law of F. G. Robertson of this city. He was a member of the last legislature and he has worked untiringly in getting the state farms out of the overflow, and malaria districts of the Brazos bottoms.
