Washington, Dec. 15.—A shortage of more than eighty million dollars internal revenue will result at the end of the next fiscal year according to the treasurer estimates, unless congress extends the emergency revenue law bill. The bill was reported favorably today and house leader Witchin declares it will pass by the end of this week.
