22,000 SERBIANS PERISH FROM COLD AND HUNGER IN AN EXTENDED FLIGHT

Berne, Switz, Mch. 30.—Of an army of thirty thousand Serbian refugees who headed southward following the invasion of their country by the Teutons, only eight thousand reached Saloniki, all others having perished of cold and hunger on the way, according to reports received by the Swiss Red Cross.

8 Aeroplanes To Mexico

Washington, Mch. 30.—The immediate purchase of eight aeroplanes to be sent at once to General Pershing is being authorized by the war department today.

San Antonio, Mch. 30.—Altho military supplies will be offered to the management of the Mexican north western railroad at Juarez, for shipment to American troops in Mexico, the officers at the army headquarters here regard it as conditional if the use of the railroads will be granted, and the motor truck service will be continued from Columbus to the front.

If it is demonstrated that the supplies are being held up or interfered with on the way to the front, Funston is expected to urge again that permission be secured to place escorts on the trains.

War Summary, Mch. 30.—After pushing back the French lines along the Balancourt region northwest of Verdun, the Germans have desisted for the present from further efforts to advance there.

Further west the Germans made an infantry counter attack in the Avocourt wood, in an effort to retake the positions lost to the Allies. Paris declares the attempts have been fruitless.

German aeroplanes have attempted another raid on Saloniki but French airmen have repelled them.

DEATH IN WRECK OF PAST EXPRESS FATE OF FORMER LOCAL SAN ANGELO MAN

While en route to Chicago to have published a book entitled "The Cowboy and the Bible", material for which was gathered in San Angelo years ago, Luther Calvin Dupree, once a prominent citizen of Tom Green county, Friday met his death when a fast express train passed over his body. This was the information received in his former home yesterday.

Dupree was well known among the old-timers of San Angelo, where he lived for a number of years. He left San Angelo several years ago, according to John D. Nashworthy, who knew the victim of the accident quite well, and went to one of the counties west of Tom Green. There he took up land and settled down.

According to the information received in San Angelo yesterday, Dupree made his home at the time of his death at Colorado City, Texas. Before coming to San Angelo he was sheriff at Rusk, Texas. A son, who is a prominent physician, somewhere in the west is one of the surviving relatives.

A GOOD OPPORTUNITY.

While there has been no end of reasonable fault found with the manner in which the southern farmer sells his cotton, his system or lack of system in disposing of other farm products is even more open to criticism.

If he sells a few wagon-loads of shuck-corn in the fall, which is a poor time to sell corn, he takes what he can get; the buyer, besides allowing himself plenty of margin for the shrinkage, usually pays several cents under the market price realized from car-lot buyers.

If he has a few fat hogs to sell, the gap between what the local buyers pay and value in car-lots at the market centers usually is wide indeed. And so it goes throughout the list of things produced in less than car-lots—pigs, peas, poultry, and what-not.

In a recent talk with W. H. Ross, U. S. Farm Demonstrator for Dallas County, this subject came up and it was agreed "by and between" us that co-operation among the farmers to grow and sell would furnish remedy for a lot of such present trouble and loss.

Mr. Ross suggested that the establishment of local elevators, with shelving arrangement for corn either at the elevators or in country neighborhoods would make a long step in the way of progress, as both the bulking of the grain and its better shape for sale would induce a better class of buyers than are usually found for less than car-lots.

That the business people of the smaller cities and towns, who show ever increasing interest in the betterment of farming conditions, would aid morally and materially in promotion of such movement, is more than probable. In fact, their present attitude seems one of watchfulness, for opportunity to render such help, and the opportunity of Mr. Ross affords a good

opportunity.

THREE TRAINS COLLIDE; THIRTY PERSONS KILLED

By Associated Press.

Cleveland, O., May 29.—Twenty-one are known dead, and twenty-five seriously injured, some fatally, in a wreck three miles east of here in which three fast New York central trains, including the twentieth Century Limited, at Amherst, near here at four o'clock this morning.

The rescuers are working frantically to recover more of the dead and injured from the mass of the wreckage. Most of the killed were in the rear day coach of one train, which was crashed into by another train. The bodies of some were scantily clad and mutilated beyond identification. None of the limited's passengers were killed. One section of the east bound had stopped to take water, and due to the fog the second section crashed into the first from the rear, then the limited west bound came tearing through, crashing into the wreckage of both trains.

The identified dead were: Rev. Hustav Walyi, Detroit; Walter Easton, Philadelphia; Frank Gallagher, Brooklyn; Dora Rosenberg, Toronto.

Later reports state that the dead list is at least thirty and possibly larger. The exact number of deaths will not be known before night. Twenty-five bodies have been taken out at noon and at least five more are known to be in the wreckage.
