

In regard to gin sampling, we wish to mention a few things which have convinced us that samples properly taken at the gin will answer all purposes

1. The United States Agricultural Department after exhaustive tests says that samples taken at the gin will serve to answer all purposes.

2. The insurance premium on cotton that has not been cut, but in accompanied by a correct gin sample, has been reduced to an extent that hunsaved annually. The insurance com panies recognize the fact that when any portion of cotton is exposed by sampling or otherwise, the risk be comes greater and a larger premium must be paid.

3. When the gin samples is used as a basis upon which the grade is established at a warehouse, the true value of the cotton is known, and should the contents of a warehouse be destroyed by fire the insurance company is in a position to make a correct settlement a section of land within 3 miles at once based on the grade shown on companies have not been protected against misrepresentations as to grade value following fires. Statistics show our average grade is one-half grade below middling, but if the cotton is burned the insurance company must settle at a half grade above middling which means a loss to them of \$5 per bale. If the entire crop of Texas should burn, under the circumstances, the insurance company would have to pay an extra \$20,000,000. It is, therefore, easy to see why gin samples will re duce insurance rates.
