ALLIES ARE WINNING IN BULGARIA

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS SUMS UP THE WAR SITUATION THIS MORNING AS FOLLOWS:

THE BULGARIANS HAVE EVACUATED ALL THE FORTS AT THE GREEK PORT OF KAVALA, WHICH THEY OCCUPIED A MONTH AGO. A PETIT PARIEN LEARNS FROM A SEMI-OFFICIAL SOURCE.

THE FORTS HAVE BEEN HAND-ED OVER TO THE GREEKS. THEY WILL BE OF NO MILITARY VALUE TO THE BULGARIANS AFTER THE ARRIVAL OF THE ENTENTE WAR-SHIPS.

THE NEW SUCCESSES FOR THE RUSSIANS IN CARPATHIANS ARE ANNOUNCED BY PETROGARD DISPATCH. SEVERAL HEIGHTS NEAR BUKOWINA BORDER, AND KAPUL MOUNTAIN ALSO WERE CAPTURED WITHIN NEARLY A THOUSAND PRISONERS.

THE FRENCH TROOPS ARE CO-OPERATING WITH THE BRITISH IN NEW OFFENSIVE ON STRUMA FRONT IN MACEDONIA AND HAVE CAPTURED A VILLAGE FROM THE BULGARIANS AND THE BRITISH TROOPS, WHICH HAVE CROSSED RIVER HAVE SEIZED THE BULGARIAN TRENCHES, ACCORDING TO A LONDON OFFICIAL STATEMENT.

PARIS OFFICE SAYS THE FRENCH, IN THE OFFENSIVE AGAINST THE BULGARIANS, HAVE CAPTURED THE POSITIONS ON TWO MILE FRONT TO A DEPTH OF EIGHT HUNDRED YARDS.

UNDER THE PRESSURE OF THE NEW OFFENSIVE, THE BULGARIANS ARE RETREATING, PURSUED BY THE ALLIES. SAYS AN EX-CHANGE TELEGRAPH ATHENS DISPATCH WHICH ADDS THE BULGARIANS HAVE SUFFERED SEVERE LOSSES IN THE BATTLE OF 36 HOURS.

BIG WOLF CHASE THIS MORNING

One of the Largest Lobo Wolves Ever Caught in This Section Was Killed in Scurry County This Morning.

One of the biggest wolf chases ever pulled off in this part of the state took place early this morning and as a result one of the largest Lobo wolves in Scurry County is dead, and L. J. Adams, of Mobile, Ala., is the proud possessor of his hide.

The party was organized yesterday with W. J. Adams, Dr. O. O. Stephenson of Sweetwater and L. G. Adams of Mobile, and J. T. Miller of Scurry county.

By agreement, the first three named parties left here at five o'clock this morning in a Reo "Six" automobile, which carried them to Mr. Miller's home in Scurry County, twenty-seven miles distant, in a very few minutes.

Soon after the party reached the home of Mr. Miller, his three fine stag hounds were gotten together and all four men and the dogs climbed into the big Reo which was standing ready, and on to the west they went a couple of miles before they entered a section of fenced land where the big wolf had been ranging for several years, and where it had killed, during the time many calves, yearlings and mule colts.

About seven o'clock this morning as the Reo was speeding across the pasture, which has but one tree in it, the wolf was discovered. A pretty race was first run by the wolf and the big machine to head him off from a certain direction in which he was leading.

When the car had reached a point within about two hundred yards of the fleeing animal and had succeeded in turning him in the direction desired, the auto was suddenly stopped and the three hounds were let out, staged in this section took place, pulled off in this section took place, with the wolf leading, the dogs second and the big auto, with the four men in it a close third. When the wolf had reached a point about one hundred yards from the residence of Mr. Miller, the dogs caught it. For several minutes a master fight took place, until the three dogs overpowered the wolf.

The animal was skinned so as to enable it to be mounted and the party reached home at ten o'clock this morning. Mr. Adams will take the hide back to Mobile with him and have it mounted for his office there.

Premier Zamis Resigns Job

By Associated Press: LONDON, SEPT. 12.—A REUTER DISPATCH FROM ATHENS SAYS IT IS CONFIRMED THERE OFFICIALLY THAT PREMIER ZAMIS HAS TENDERED HIS RESIGNATION AND EVERY EFFORT IS BEING MADE TO PERSUADE HIM TO WITHDRAW IT.

THE POLITICAL SITUATION IN THE NEAR EAST IS OF NO LESS INTEREST TO EUROPEAN CAPITALS AT THIS MOMENT THAN THE MILITARY OUTLOOK, AS IT IS BELIEVED THAT IMPORTANT CHANGES ARE IMPENDING.

THE REASONS FOR ZAMIS' RESIGNATION IS NOT SET FORTH IN THE ATHENS DISPATCH.

IT IS BELIEVED HIS OFFER TO RESIGN IS DUE TO THE FACT THAT HE ACCEPTED THE POST WITH THE UNDERSTANDING THAT HE WAS TO MAINTAIN NEUTRALITY, AND IN VIEW OF THE BULGARIAN OCCUPATION OF GREEK TERRITORY, HE FINDS THIS NO LONGER POSSIBLE.

SEND MESSAGE TO PRESIDENT

By Associated Press: New London, Sept. 12.—The Mexican members of the joint American-Mexican commission, which is studying the best means for restoring order in Mexico will be given an opportunity to pay their respects to President Wilson, who is here at the bedside of his sister, Mrs. Howe, who is critically ill.

The meeting arranged was suggested in a message of sympathy by the foreigners to President Wilson, and transmitted by secretary Lane.

The meeting will take place on the Mayflower, which is anchored in front of the hotel where the commission is in session.

REPUBLICANS IN MAINE ARE LAND SLIDING

PORTLAND, SEPT. 12.—BULLETIN AT 2:30 P. M.—THE REVISED FIGURES FROM THE ELECTION IN MAINE YESTERDAY GIVE THE REPUBLICANS A SIGNIFICANT VICTORY, ELECTING TWO UNITED STATES SENATORS, FOUR CONGRESSMEN, A GOVERNOR, AN AUDITOR AND SECURING CONTROL BOTH HOUSES OF THE LEGISLATURE.

CARL MILLIKEN, REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR RECEIVED 79,902; CURTIS THE DEMOCRAT, 66,547.

Augusta, Maine, Sept. 11.—An unusually heavy vote was polled in all of the counties of Maine today, according to reports received at headquarters of the Democratic and Republican committees.

Maine is normally Republican, although the present governor, United States senator and one congressman are Democrats. Both parties are claiming majorities in today's election, but the Democrats insist that a scant Republican majority would still be an administration victory.

Local and state issues have been overshadowed by questions of national policy, more than 100 outside speakers having urged the voters to line up for or against Wilson administration. Seats in congress are also being bitterly fought for and the Democrats are hopeful of adding another congressman to their list. On the other hand, the Republicans are claiming the election of all four national representatives.

Portland, Maine, Sept. 11.—Returns from 113 precincts out of 635 in the state give for governor:

Milliken, Republican, 12,822; Curtis, Democrat, 9,972.

In 1914 the same precincts gave Haynes, Republican, 9,360; Curtis, Democrat, 8,985; Gardner, Progressive, 2,451.

For United States senator the same precincts gave Hale, Republican, 12,154; Fernald, Republican, 12,133; Johnson, Democrat, 9,951; Sils, Democrat, 9,821.

COTTON MARKET

The cotton market was about twenty points up today and as a result local street buyers were paying from 14.80 to 15 cents for the staple.

STREET CAR STRIKE IS SERIOUS

NEW YORK, SEPT. 12.—THE FIRST SERIOUS ACCIDENT, DURING THE PRESENT STRIKE, OCCURRED THIS MORNING WHEN A TROLLEY CAR, OPERATED BY A "GREEN" MOTORMAN, GOT BEYOND CONTROL ON A STEEP GRADE, JUMPED THE TRACK AT A CURVE AND CRASHED INTO TWO BUSES.

THE CAR KILLED TWO PERSONS AND SEVERELY INJURED THIRTEEN OTHERS OF WHOM FOUR MAY DIE. THE CREW WAS ARRESTED, PENDING AN INVESTIGATION.

MUCH CONGESTION ON THE SUBWAYS AND THE ELEVATED ROADS IS PRONOUNCED.

New York, Sept. 11.—Ten strike breakers, most of them from Chicago who said they had escaped from one of the interborough Rapid Transit Company barns, presented themselves before Mayor Mitchell and the public service commission today and charged their employers, a strike-breaking agency, with forcing them to remain on duty at the point of pistols, the weapons in many cases being held by New York City policemen. The men complained that they had been misled as to pay and working conditions and begged the commission to aid them.

All trade unions in the city served by the interborough Rapid Transit Company today were considering the appeal for sympathetic strikers made last night by the strikers. The response must be decided by a vote of the members and it is expected to be several days before the result can be known.

The strike on the surface lines has spread rapidly although elevated and subway lines continued running today without apparent interruption.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, declined to discuss the probability of a general strike, but union leaders asserted that if necessary 50,000 union men could be called out within six hours.

At strike of stage employees, longshoremen, brewery workers, machinists, bartenders, moulders and printers in sympathy with the carmen was decided upon at a meeting of the heads of their unions last night, according to an announcement by Hugh F. Ryan.

Traction officials attributed the falling off in service on the subways and elevated roads today to the unprecedented increase in traffic caused by the stoppage of all the surface lines. Union leaders claimed, however, that the defection of heretofore loyal employees of the roads was responsible.

W. B. Fitzgerald, strike leader, in a statement issued today asserted that the "effort" of local traction interests to destroy the union is "the forerunner of a movement by capital to crush or organize labor throughout the country."

"President Wilson just enacted into law the principle of the eight-hour day," Fitzgerald said. "Organized capital does not intend that such legislation shall remain on the statute books."

President Shonts, head of the Interborough and "Green" surface systems, replied to this by saying: "Labor organizers came here to organize this town and if they succeed they will do to this city just what the railroad brotherhoods did to the government."

STATE REST IN WATSON CASE

WACO, TEXAS, SEPT. 12.—THE STATE RESTED IN THE CASE IN THE HABEAS CORPUS HEARING FOR BAIL FOR T. R. WATSON, INDICTED FOR KILLING JOHN S. PATTERSON, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE TESTIMONY OF SHERIFF BURLESON AND BANK EXAMINER SLAUGHTER.

GEORGE WRIGHT, AGED NINE, TESTIFIED HE SAW WATSON, ON THE AFTERNOON OF THE SHOOTING, TEAR UP SLIPS OF PAPER, WHICH PROVED TO BE MUTILATED NOTES.

J. D. MORE, RECEIVER OF WATSONS BANK TESTIFIED THE TORN NOTES, REPRESENTING ABOUT FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS EACH, WERE FOUND, BUT THAT THE SIGNATURES ON THE NOTES WERE NOT THOSE OF THE PARTIES OF SAME NAME HE HAD. DEFENSE BEGAN INTRODUCTION OF TESTIMONY THIS AFTER NOON.

Waco, Texas, Sept. 12.—The hearing of the T. R. Watson habeas corpus case was resumed before Judge Harper of the court of Criminal Appeals yesterday morning at 9 o'clock with State Bank Examiner Eldred McKinnon on the stand for cross examination by Pat M. Neff for the defense.

The witness was questioned closely concerning the incidents preceding the shooting at the Teague Bank and the actual shooting.

He said the Watsons had begged for a respite of three more days to give them time to procure money to place the bank in good condition.

State Bank Commissioner Patterson just prior to the shooting, McKinnon said, was standing outside the door with the thumbs of both hands in his belt and holding his pouch of papers in one hand. McKinnon said he did not see Patterson's hand after the shooting began.

Mr. McKinnon was on the stand until noon, when court recessed until 2 o'clock.

Cross-Examination

Under cross-examination he described every detail of the shooting at the bank which resulted in the death of Mr. Patterson. He said the defendants had begged Patterson for a little more time and were refused.

He said that T. R. Watson, the president of the bank, fired two shots at Patterson and one at the witness.

Then, the witness said, T. E. Watson seized the weapon and fired two more shots at him (McKinnon) as he fled out side the door and down the street to the hotel.

The witness said he saw Mr. Patterson cross the street and go into a drug store. He did not then know that Mr. Patterson was wounded.

The theory of the defense that T. R. Watson shot in self-defense was indicated during the examination when the witness was asked by Mr. Neff to describe how Mr. Patterson was holding his hands when the shooting began, and to tell what he did with his right hand.

Mr. McKinnon said that Mr. Patterson had the thumbs of both hands in his belt and was holding his pouch of papers in his right hand when the first shot was fired, but he did not see his hands after that, as he (the witness) was hurriedly getting out of a side door which was closed.

The condition of the Farmers and Merchants Bank at Teague was inquired into at great length. Examiner McKinnon testified that Mr. Patterson had recommended that it consolidate with the First State Bank of Teague, but, the witness said, he had told Mr. Patterson that it would be impossible to effect such a consolidation.

He said that the three Watsons, in asking for more time had assured Mr. Patterson that Taz Watson, a member of the family and banker was coming to the rescue of the bank by depositing \$10,000 in cash, and Mr. Patterson had replied he did not see what good that would do, as he asserted the money might be drawn out the next day.

"Didn't the Watsons tell you and Patterson that if granted a little time they could straighten up the bank's affairs? Didn't they say they had handled half the cotton brought to Teague this season?" the witness was asked.

"They said they had handled some cotton, but I don't know how much," was the reply.

"How many times did T. R. Watson ask Patterson that evening to grant him more time?" asked Mr. Neff.

"I can't say how many times, but the three Watsons were begging him not to close the bank."

They were sure begging him, weren't they, as humbly as any man could," asked Mr. Neff.

Primary Election Today

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 12.—Democrats of Georgia, Louisiana and South Carolina are holding state primaries today to select candidates whose later election is assured, with few exceptions, by lack of second party opposition.

In Georgia a governor, twelve representatives and all state officials are to be nominated. Governor Nat E. Harris is opposed for renomination by Hugh M. Dorsey of Atlanta, Dr. L. G. Hardeman of Commerce and Joseph E. Pottle of Milledgeville.

Louisiana congressional nominations are to be made and only two contests have developed. Mormor Governor J. Y. Sanders and Amos L. Ponder are rivals for the place now held by Representative L. L. Morgan. Representative Ladislas Lazaro is opposed for renomination by T. K. Edwards and A. M. Barbe. In the final election Democrats will have opposition in one district, the Third, where Representative W. P. Martin, Progressive, is a candidate for re-election.

In South Carolina secondary primaries are necessary because no candidate for the gubernatorial nomination got a majority of votes cast in the first primary two weeks ago. Governor Richard I. Manning and former Governor Cole L. Blease will contest again.

ONLY TUBE OF RADIUM IN ARKANSAS IS LOST DURING AN OPERATION

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 11.—A \$5,000 tube of radium containing forty milligrams, was lost in an operation at the city hospital here Sunday. Dr. Dewell Gann, operative, said he believed the tube was stolen, although police were inclined to believe that it was dropped in a sewer.

An electroscope probably will be brought here in an effort to locate the missing radium. The tube contained the only quantity in this state.

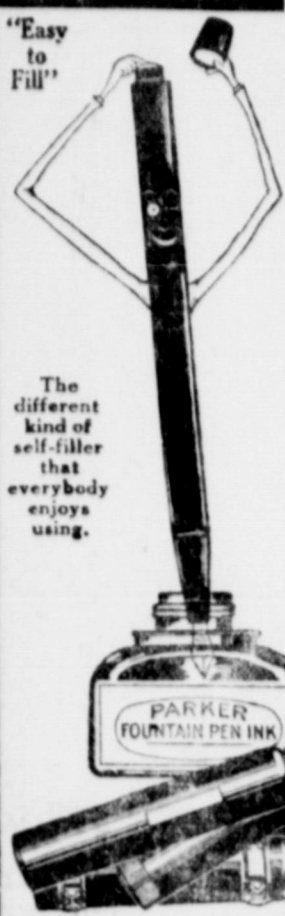
