Kelly, 531 West Beauregard avenue, the patient being the 3-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs

City Health Officer Cobb said there is no question but what it is a gen sine case of piliomoyelitis, and that a strict quarantine has been established, enter the Kelly home except the attend ing physician and nurses, and these only under the most sanitary precautions. Dr. Cobb sees no cause for for alarm. He thinks the case has been isolated to such extent spread of the disease is practically obviated. 
