RUSSIAN IS A VERY difficult language to learn...or so I hear. If the medium range nuclear missile treaty which was signed this past week by President Reagan and General Secretary Gorbachev goes the way of the two previous SALT treaties, then we will have made a monumental error and our future generations may be speaking Russian with an Amerikansky accent.

We all want so badly to believe that relations between the two super-power countries can be improved. But once burned, twice shy...or as Sir Douglas Home said, "Beware equally of a sudden friend and a slow enemy." Russia has been both to America.

If the two largest, most powerful nations on the earth could work through their differences and combine forces for the common good of all, just think what wonderful things could be accomplished. Advances in science and medicine, improved trade relations (including possibly more farm exports), and possibly even an end to terrorism in the world. But these things can come about only IF Russia holds true to this treaty. You might say this one is the final test.

Trade relations and cultural exchanges between the two countries have eased up quite a bit just in the past few years. Coca Cola, McDonald's and Pepsi have already made some inroads into the great communist nation. Blue jeans are popular attire for the young people in practically every nation around the world.

The Levi Strauss Company seems to have quietly, without a lot of media hype, moved in everywhere and covered the backsides of all races of people. (Off the subject, but did you ever notice those terrorist-types who go around with cup-towels wrapped around their faces while they burn American flags and throw rocks at the cameramen? They all wear Levis!)

The communist government in Russia controls every facet of the lives of its citizens. The people have so little say in their own existence. What they read, what they hear, what their children will be taught, etc. But their greatest loss is the freedom to enjoy religious beliefs of any kind, as Russia is an atheist country. That's unnatural! Man does not live by Big Macs alone. All members of the human race have an inborn need to seek guidance and solace from a greater entity...i.e. religion.

It appears that religious restrictions may be easing up just a bit in Russia, or perhaps some of these gestures were made merely because there were a lot of U.S. folks (including television news crews) in that country last week. The Rusky politicos have learned to play to the media just as much as our own presidential candidates do.

Of course we are all curious about one another. We wonder what the Russian people are really like. And we know that they have not always been given a flattering picture of what Americans are like. An open cultural exchange will do much toward helping this situation. We know that they have a rather dim view of capitalism in general. But sharing the "wealth" doesn't seem to have done a lot for the average Russian, does it?

One fact looms greatly from all of this. We must work extremely hard to preserve our freedoms in America which basically means keeping government interference out of our daily lives. We don't want to become another Russia. Russians don't look like they are enjoying themselves very much.

FUNNEL SPOTTED

Storm Leaves Path Of Hail Damage

The first bad storm of the season hit the Friona area Memorial Day evening, with hail damage being reported, and residents being subjected to a tornado alert after a funnel cloud was spotted.

Area residents were first alerted after a funnel was spotted south of Cannon Air Force Base near Clovis. That system moved into Parmer County, and brought with it the severe weather including rain, hail and funnel clouds.

At about 10 p.m., the tornado warning was sounded in Friona. The first report to the police dispatchers was that a funnel was spotted southwest of town. Later, the observer corrected the sighting as being ten miles east of town.

At any rate, many residents took shelter for a time Monday night, until the "all clear" signal was sounded by the local authorities.

The storm dumped 2.81 inches of rain on Friona, with about 1.6 inches coming between 8 and 10:30 p.m., and the remainder coming in the early morning hours on Tuesday.

The hail which accompanied the weather front caused damage that varied from one place to another. Some of the worst damage was in the Hub area. It was reported that Carroll Cook lost 200 acres of young cotton.

Neighbors to the Cooks, including Lawrence Jamerson, Bubby Marshall, Lloyd Gober and J.B. Barrett, also were hit. Also, the farm of Prentiss Pruitt, three miles west and one south of Hub, had its cotton destroyed and corn also was beaten up.

The Hub area received up to five inches of rain.

Marvin Jordan, who farms just southwest of Friona, also had his cotton, about 100 acres, ruined, with considerable damage to the wheat and corn. Wheat damage might run as high as 30 to 40 per cent, according to Mrs. Jordan.

Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, said that the cotton loss in the Friona area was probably around 1,000 acres. He said that the biggest percentage of these farmers were planning to re-plant their crops.

In fact, John R. Cook said Thursday that re-planting operations had begun for their cotton crop, with the actual planting slated for Monday.

Those re-planting cotton will be hoping for a better break from the weather the rest of the growing season.

Country Caravan To Appear Here

Nostalgic country classics by such artists as Tammy Wynette and Ray Price and the current country hits of Reba McEntire and Randy Travis will highlight the 1988 edition of "Country Caravan," an unusual country music show scheduled for a performance Thursday, June 9 in Friona. Sponsored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce, the show begins at 8:30 p.m. in City Park. Admission is free.

A production of South Plains College, Levelland, "Country Caravan" features nearly 40 country music classics and current chartbusters in 90 minutes of non-stop country music fun. Cast members are a troupe of talented SPC students, selected for the show through highly selective auditions, and faculty in SPC's country and bluegrass music degree program.

"Country music is more exciting than ever, and as a result 'Country Caravan' is better than ever," says John Hartin, the show's general director who has been on the road with SPC's country music summer productions since they began in 1977. "We have a very talented group of singers, musicians, and dancers who will provide you with good old-fashioned family entertainment."

He feels that the 1988 version of "Country Caravan" reflects the country music industry trends going on in Nashville. "Current artists are reviving a lot of the country styles that were prevalent 15 or 20 years ago. And they are adding a different twist to the songs written and performed today. The songs we have come up with for the 1988 season represent major forces which have molded and built country music over the past 20 years."

But that's not all. "Country Caravan" also spotlights country gospels, the patriotic "Trilogy" by Loretta Lynn, and precision dancing with the return of the Caravan Cloggers. The Cloggers perform a traditional clogging

Because of increased interest among the younger set, the Friona Fine Arts Council is considering splitting the younger group for this year's Summer Drama Workshop.

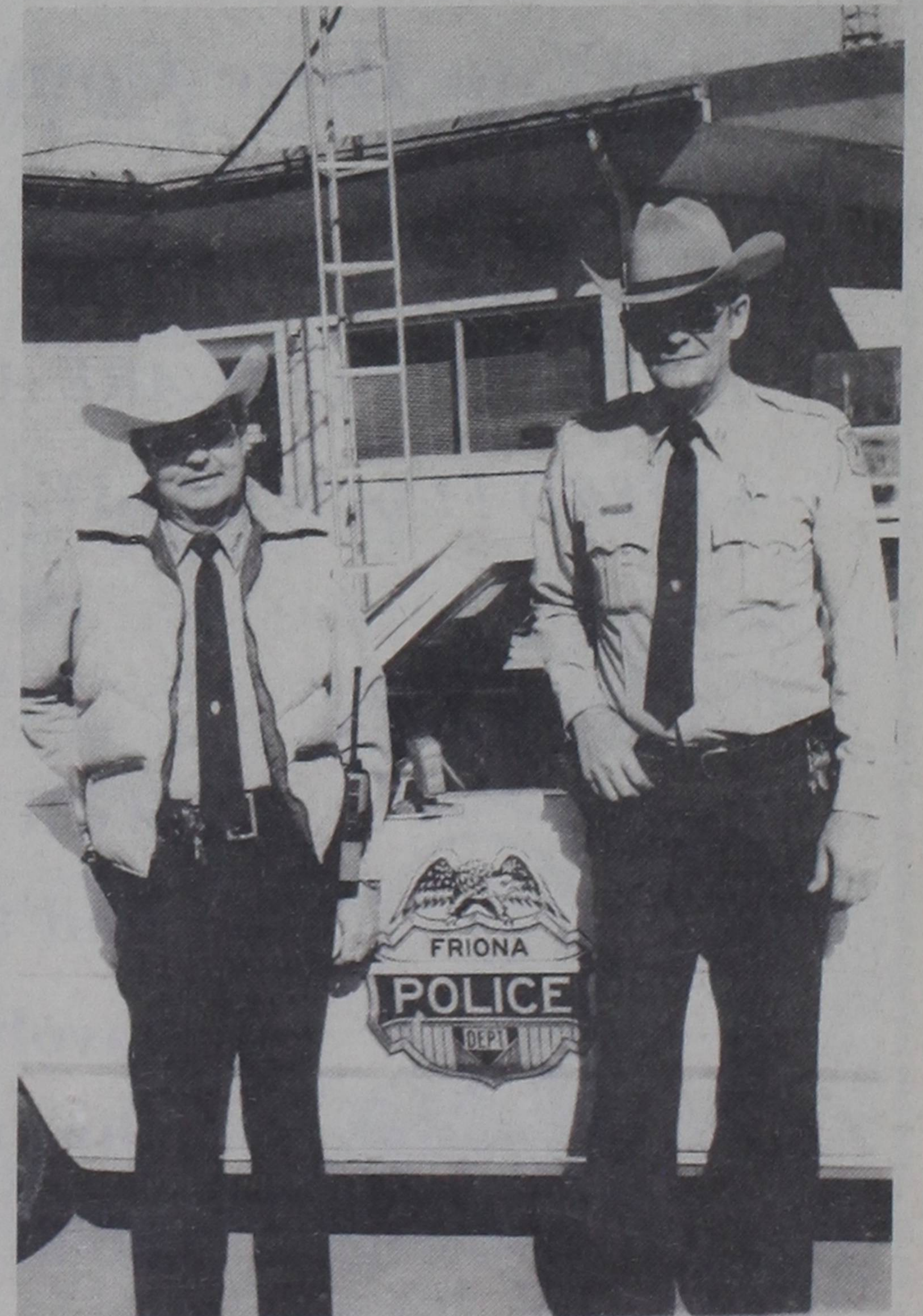

The workshop is scheduled for July 5-16.

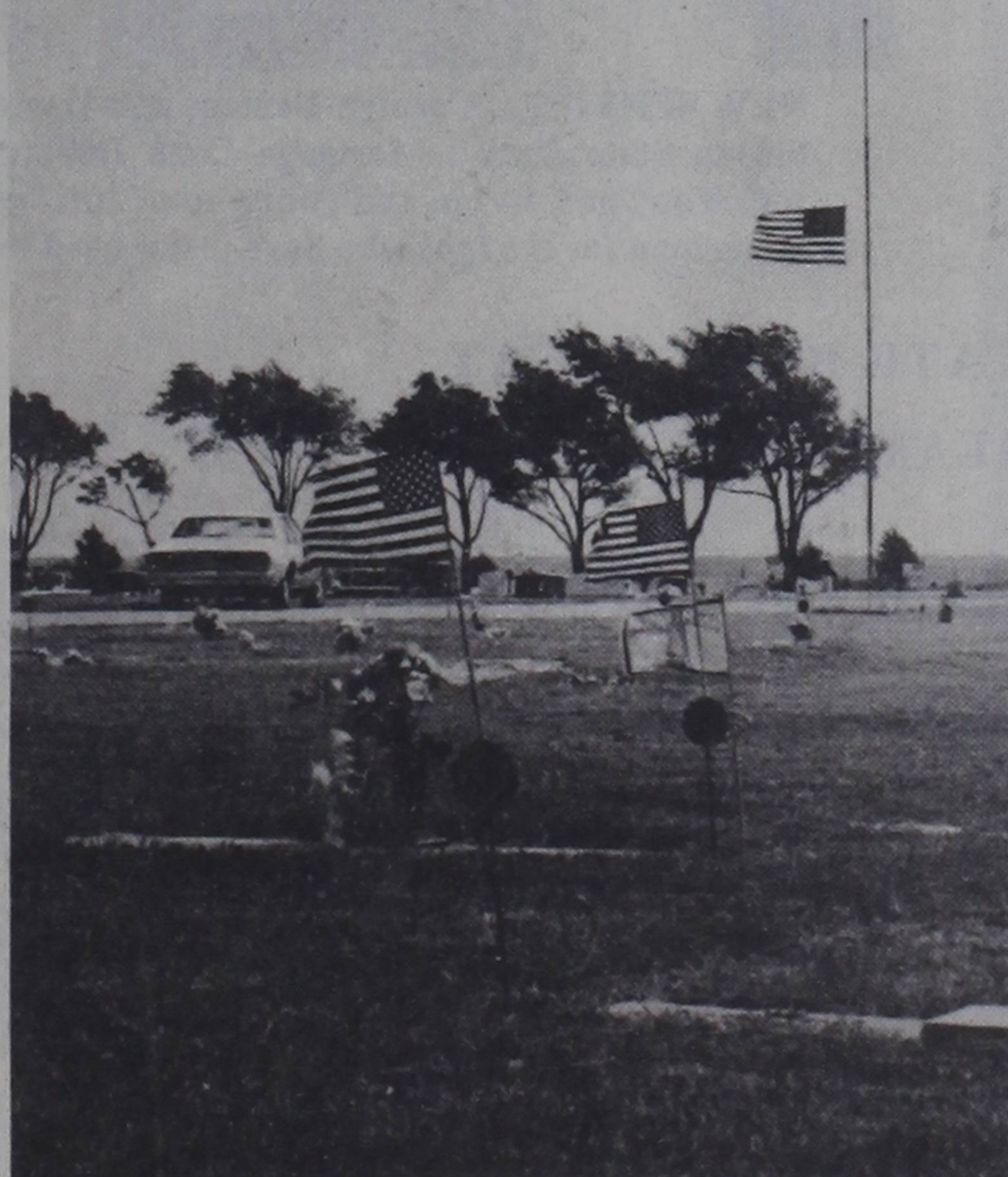

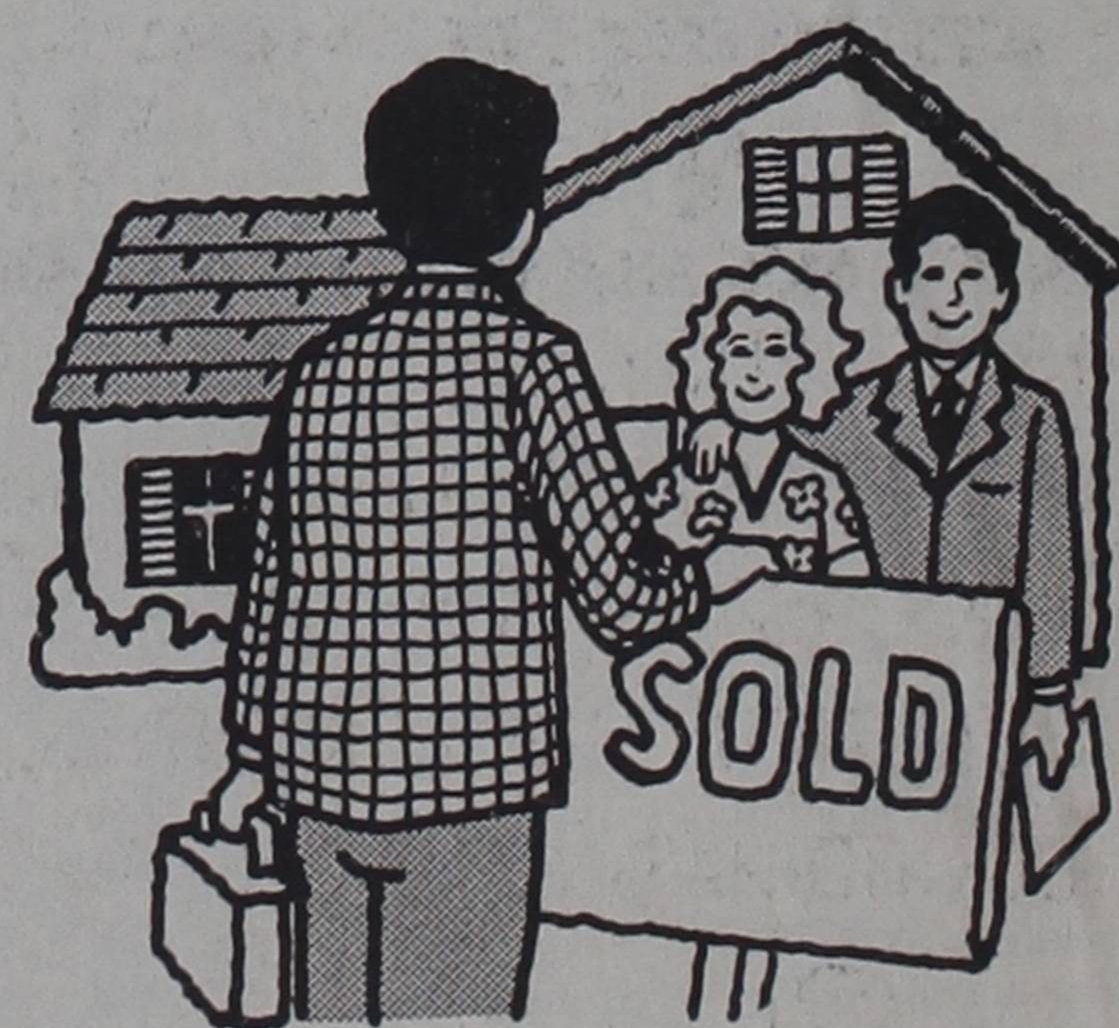

9-9:20 a.m.--Chemigation; EPA Laws and Safety, Dr. Pat Morrison, entomologist, TEXS, Lubbock.

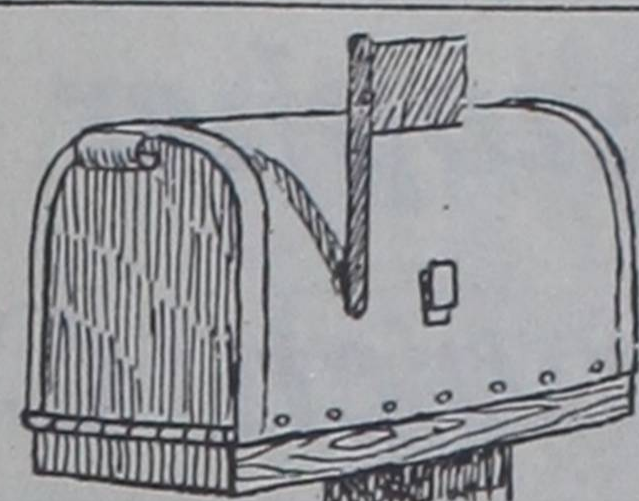
9:20-9:40 a.m.--Application of Fungicides and Insecticides, Dr. Allen Knutson, entomologist, Castro County.

Letter To The Editor

To The Editor:

Most insurance companies consider any place over twenty years old, and over five miles from a fire department too great a risk to insure.

We live in a thirty year old wood frame house eight miles from the nearest fire department. In the past three years our insurance premium has increased from \$350.00 a year to \$850.00, with steadily reduced coverage.

We have never filed a claim in the eighteen years we have lived here, but are down to only one company that will offer us any insurance. If this company decides not to renew our policy next year, the Federal Land Bank will probably demand the balance due on our loan on the house.

I have written the chairman of the State Board of Insurance, the chairman of the House Committee on Insurance and my state senator for help in reversing the trend for rural insurance.

I have suggested to them that a rural home owner's insurance pool be established similar to the pools for high risk automobile drivers or workmen's compensation coverage. If a policy holder does not file any claims for some period of time--say five years--the premiums could be reduced as an incentive not to abuse insurance coverage.

With the insurance industries' position on rural coverage, I would not build a new home in a rural area and will advise anyone else not to. They may insure a new home now, but they are presently free to drop coverage whenever they think the risk is too great.

I urge all rural residents to write Austin in support of the insurance pool or suggest your own ideas to improve the rural insurance dilemma. Two important addresses are:

Griffin, a music major, is the son of Mickey and Linda Griffin of Friona.

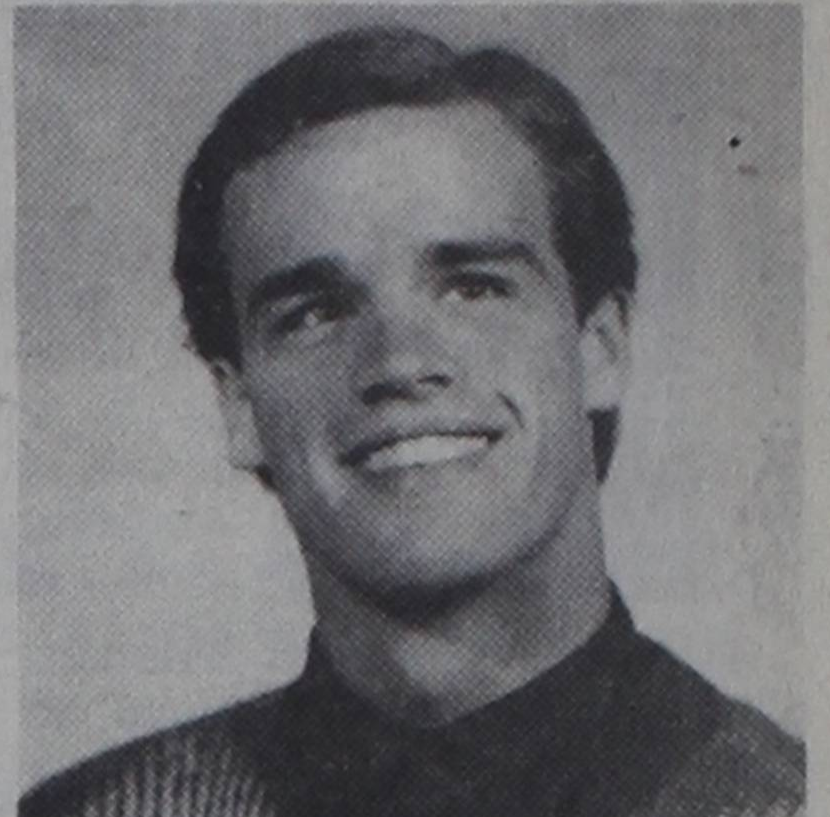
Echols Is Honored By FTO
