## FIVE MEN ARE LODGED IN COUNTY JAIL TODAY

Byron B. Perry, State Ranger, with the assistance of county officers of Fisher county made the arrest of four white men and one negro this morning.

Two of the white men were a father and son. The son was arrested for making affidavits as to his age and failing to register on registration day, June 5th. His father was arrested on a charge of advising his son not to register and helping to shield him.

Two other young white men were arrested on a charge of not registering.

A negro was also arrested on the same charge.

These parties all live in and around Roby and were brought to the jail here at noon today where they are being held pending instructions from Hon. Robt. L. Barnes, in charge of the Department of Justice at San Antonio.

Mr. Perry stated that there are other developments that will be revealed in this section soon, with the result that other arrest will follow.

## ONE-FIFTH RED CROSS FUND IS SUBSCRIBED

Washington, June 19.—Announcement was made at Red Cross headquarters at 3 o'clock this afternoon that approximately \$23,000,000, or more than one-fifth of the \$100,000,000 war relief fund sought in the seven-day campaign, had already been subscribed.

Of the total \$17,000,000 was subscribed in New York city, the remainder coming from various sections of the country. J. P. Morgan & Co. subscribed \$1,000,000.

## SEVENTEEN ARE UNDER ARREST

Dallas, June 20.—According to a complete list of prisoners indicted for seditious conspiracy in connection with the alleged activities of the Farmers and Laborers' Protective Association, twenty-nine of the fifty-five indicted have been arrested and eleven have been released on bond. The twelfth was released on his own recognizance, and the others are behind bars.

The lists made public this morning disclosed the fact that arrests have been made in several localities which were not announced today.

Seven men are held in jail at Abilene. They are E. B. Potter, W. W. Hood, Frank Bolt, T. H. Bates, Fred Smith, Ezra Cloud and Lon Hunter, A. A. Hernandez, J. H. Elliott and E. J. Trout are held at Wichita Falls. Luther Kenner and Ross and Sam Fee are in jail at Amarillo.

The three men held in jail here are D. P. Childress, W. B. Glass and George Dodson. William Glidwell, arrested at Denison, has made bond.

Charles Lamb, arrested at Tucumcari, will be brought here, it was announced today, when extradition papers are issued.

## THE COMMITTEE GOING HOME

The locating committee of the West Texas A. & M. College has finished its work and will reach Austin this afternoon.

The committee reached Fort Worth early this morning and from there will go direct to Austin. Nothing has been given out as to when the committee will make its final decision as to the location for the new school.

## En Route Home

Austin, June 19.—The governor and other members of the West Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college locating committee will reach Austin Wednesday afternoon, according to a telegram received today by Secretary of State Churchill Bartlett from Representative W. E. Thomason, secretary of the committee. The committee has concluded its tour of inspection of sites and is now en route to Fort Worth, from which place they come direct to Austin.

## WERE HELD WITHOUT BAIL

El Paso, June 19.—At the conclusion of preliminary hearing of the Thomas Lyons murder case here today Felix H. Jones of Fort Worth was held to the grand jury without bond and T. J. Coggin and Millard Coggin were each held on a bond of \$20,000. T. J. Coggin gave bond. His brother is expected to give bond tomorrow.

Lyons, a millionaire ranchman from New Mexico came here from Silver City, N. M., on the night of May 17 on business. He was met at the depot by a man alleged to have been Jones. This was the last seen him alive. His body was found the next day in a suburb.

## BRITISH SPEND MONEY IN U.S.

New York, June 20.—Great Britain's weekly war expenditures in the United States amount to between \$50,000,000 and \$60,000,000, Lord Northcliffe, head of the British department missions in this country announced tonight on his return from Washington. Lord Northcliffe issued this statement: "I have returned from a visit to Washington and was kindly received by the United States, British and allied government officials. I had an interesting audience with the President. The many members of the British missions here are being rapidly got together. A great deal is said about the loans to our government, but we are spending all this money here. Our expenditure on various forms of material here is at the rate of between \$50,000,000 and \$60,000,000 a week. In one day alone last week we placed one contract for \$40,000,000."

"I am not here to talk. I am engaged in a gigantic task of organization which precludes my accepting the countless offers of hospitality that have poured into me since my arrival. I hope to gather new ideas for transmitting to England and I shall be glad to answer any questions bearing upon the lessons to be learned from the many mistakes Britain and her allies have made since the time when they were so unexpectedly plunged into this horrible carnage."

## RED CROSS NEEDS YOU

Every man, woman and child in Sweetwater is urged to attend the Red Cross meeting at the Presbyterian church Thursday evening at 7:15.

The Red Cross Needs You Now If the American people are going to support their Red Cross in our national emergency, they must join it. In Japan one person in every twenty two is a member of the Japanese Red Cross, but in the United States only one out of every 291 persons belongs to the American Red Cross.

Joining the Red Cross is not enlisting for field service, it is but doing your "bit" toward aiding suffering and distressed humanity.

It is in the home country that most of us will find our opportunity to serve the Red Cross. It is from the interior that the vast quantities of medical supplies and comforts certain to be needed must come. To prepare them and move them forward energetic groups of workers are necessary in all parts of the country. The number of those who can thus serve the Red Cross, and through it our soldiers and sailors, is limited only by patriotism and willingness to serve. Nothing less than the organized, united effort on the part of those of us who remain at home will suffice to meet the needs of the situation.

What The Red Cross Is The American National Red Cross is the only volunteer in the United States which our Government has authorized to render aid to our land and naval forces in time of war.

The Red Cross operates under a charter granted by Congress, supplemented by Presidential proclamation. Its purposes are:

To furnish, on call by the Secretary of War or the Secretary of the Navy, volunteer aid in time of war to the sick and wounded, and to add to the comfort of all soldiers and sailors.

To act in matters of voluntary war relief and in accord with the military and naval authorities as a medium of communication between the American people and their fighting forces.

The Red Cross is international in the sense that its duties and functions are recognized by all civilized nations, and it had its origin in an international conference in Geneva.

The President of the United States is President of the American National Red Cross. Representatives of the State Department, Treasury, the Army and the Navy are included in the membership of the Central Committee which directs the operations and management of the Red Cross.

## You And The Red Cross

The immense mission of the Red Cross is to help. But in order to give the full measure of help it must have assistance in its turn. You must help the Red Cross if the Red Cross is to help our men when they are wounded, when they are sick, when they are worn and weary from the work of war in which so soon they will be plunged.

Try to see just one soldier with the eyes of your imagination. Some young man with his life before him, some older man who has laid aside the life so carefully built up and so dear to him to go out to this service; both young and older, working for us at the bitterest work on earth. See him, bleeding from some terrible wound, staggering from the trench, or lying lost in No Man's Land. See him suffering untold pain for the lack of an anesthetic. See him bleed to death for lack of a bandage. See him left unbound to die because there was no automobile ambulance to seek him.

And think this: If you had helped the Red Cross the Red Cross could have helped, might have saved him.

It is just that. Whatever you do, is done for some suffering man or woman or child. The Red Cross takes it and uses it where the need is greatest. Behind the Red Cross it is you who binds the bandages, who sets the broken bone, gives

Will you not sacrifice ease, a little money, a little time, when you understand that by so doing you save some fine boy to live his life sound and strong, after his months of struggle and suffering, will restore to some man his health will heal his shattered body, and bring him back to the sweet life he gave up for the sake of his country. When you realize that what you do, what you give, will save a starving child and its mother, will you not do and give all you can?

Minneapolis, Minn., June 19.—Department of Justice officials announced here today that 2,000 arrests will be made on the Mesaba Iron Range of men who, they say, have refused to register. Two hundred now are under arrest and the jails of the district are overflowing.

T. W. W. officials, according to advices received here, have called a strike in the mines as a protest.

They immediately entered the train and left for their new home in New Mexico.

**NEW AUTO LAWS**

The new Texas highway law will go into effect July 1 and all owners of automobiles and motorcycles must secure new license numbers.

The last legislature made some radical changes in the auto speed laws and in addition placed a heavy tax on all motor driven vehicles. To begin with, each driver is held responsible for the manner in which he runs his machine; it must be done in a careful way so as not to endanger the lives of others and property.

The speed limit for all country roads is fixed at 25 miles per hour. The speed limit for closely built up portion of country roads and suburban streets is fixed at 18 miles per hour. In the business districts of small towns, the limit is placed at 15 miles per hour, but caution must be used in all cases. A registration fee of \$2.00 will be assessed against each machine for the remaining part of this year, then on January 1, 1918, and each year thereafter, each owner must pay an annual fee of \$3.00. In addition to this, each owner must pay a tax of 35c per H. P. but in no case is the tax to be less than \$7.50 for each car. This tax is to be used to build up and to keep up the country roads.

### "Neglected Wife" to Open at Sweetwater Theatre Soon.

#### AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING STOCK TRESPASSING ON PULVIC PARKS OF THE CITY OF SWEETWATER.

Be It Ordained By The City Commission of the City of Sweetwater:

Art. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to stake, hobble, herd or to permit to be staked, hobbled or herded or be at large and stock of any kind, including horses, cattle, sheep, goats, jacks, and jennets in or on and public park or any park of the City or in the City of Sweetwater, and any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

Art. 2. The pound keeper, when finding any stock in violation of this ordinance shall deal with same in the same manner as when found in any other part of the City, it being the intention of this ordinance to provide the same manner with reference to stock as the provision of other stock ordinances of the City.

The fact that stock are trespassing on parks of the City creates an emergency and imperative public necessity that the rule requiring ordinance to be read on to several meetings be suspended and the same is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication.
