Board Okays Bid For School Paving

WEATHER has always been a subject of great interest to yours truly. Having been born and raised in this country, reared on a farm, I have always been aware of the vital role that weather plays in regard to farming.

The drought that is plaguing the Midwest has been much in the news, and the irony of that situation is the fact that at least in the local area, we have received close to our normal amount of rainfall in 1988.

In fact, the long-range weather forecast puts our immediate area in a "wet" category, while leaving the Midwest to be continuing its drought conditions.

We noticed, for example, that Nashville, Tennessee, was 13 inches below its normal rainfall at this point in time, and neighboring Memphis was nine inches short of its usual measurement.

We happened to be in New Orleans this past week, and a story in Monday's New Orleans *Times-Picayune* stated that the Mississippi River is showing the results of the drought which has the Midwest in its grip.

The river was about three feet below its normal stage in New Orleans, and this figure varied up to five feet below normal at points upstream.

We crossed the Mississippi River at Vicksburg, Mississippi, on our return trip. It was the first time we had ever crossed the river at this point, but it looked as though there were far more of the red banks of the river exposed on both sides than there normally would have been.

As the river depth continues to fall, the boat traffic up and down the river may become affected. Some of the larger boats and barges require a minimum depth in the river in order to navigate safely.

Another irony in the fact that our area has received its normal amount of rainfall is the fact that with a lot of the area's acreage in the CRP program, there will be a lot less acres of crops planted and harvested in the local area, which perhaps will see some good yields based on the early rainfall totals.

It's too bad that the floods that hit some areas, such as the pastures of Eastern New Mexico and the farmland just west of Friona this week, could not have been spread out over parts of the Midwest, or even other parts of our own state which are below normal in rainfall.

But nature doesn't operate with everyone getting their "average" rainfall or anything else. That's what makes the business of farming such a risky one.

We salute our area's farmers, and hope that their year turns out to be a good one. If we can get a break from the weather the rest of the year, there is a chance we can have a good farming year.

And hopefully, those farmers in the Midwest will also get some relief, although for many of them it is coming close to being too late to help them for the 1988 crop, even if rain is received immediately.

Farmers have had their share of setbacks in recent years due to a variety of factors including an unstable market. This year, they have their old bug-a-boo, the weather, thrown in just to make matters worse.

Special Classes Set By School

Friona Independent School District will be offering a eight week summer school for all children who have been identified for bilingual services and will be in kindergarten or first grade when school starts.

The classes will be from 9 a.m. until 12 noon Monday-Friday beginning on Wednesday, June 22 and running until Tuesday, August 16.

All children desiring to attend should report to the north wing of the Primary Building at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, June 22.

Acceptance of a bid for paving the parking lot at the elementary school highlighted the regular meeting of the Friona School Board Monday, June 13.

A bid of \$25,540 from the Appian Corporation was accepted on the paving project, as recommended by Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

The board approved the hiring of four new teachers for the 1988-89 school year. They are Patsy Kingston, who will be an early childhood instructor; Kim Smiley, who will teach kindergarten; Ron Stevenson, an elementary school teacher; and Sid Whiteley, junior high math and boys coach.

Charles Turner discussed staffing needs for the school district for next school year, and

the board approved the hiring of two additional aides for 1988-89.

The board selected Fred S. James Company as the insurance carrier for student insurance for next school year.

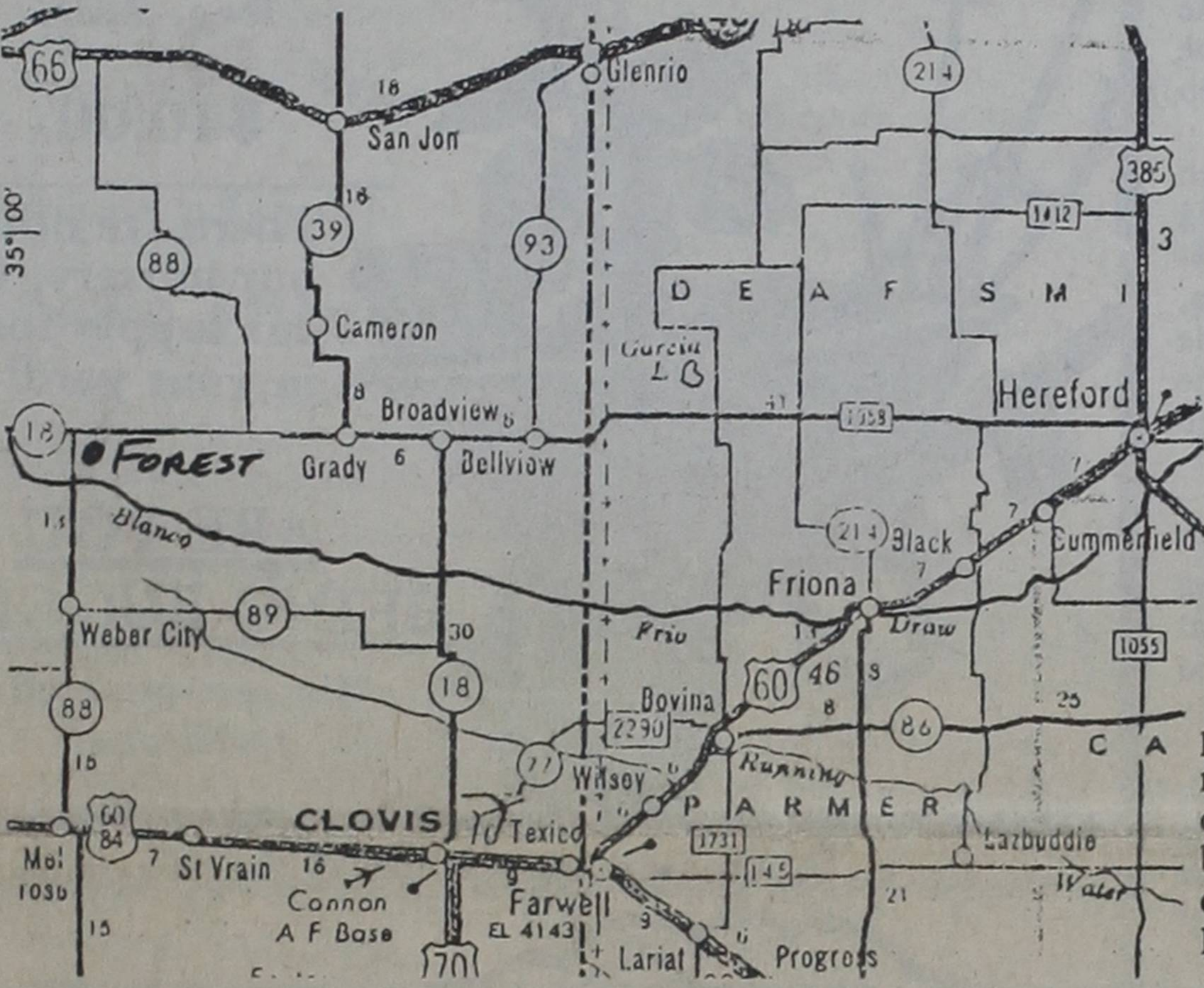
Sheryl Salyer gave a report on results of the school's T.E.A.M.S. and C.A.T. tests administered during the 1987-88 school term.

Hal Ratcliff reported that 81 percent of the Friona High School juniors who took the T.E.A.M.S. exit-level test last October passed both sections of the test.

Ratcliff said that in the entire Panhandle-South Plains area, Childress was the only class AAA high school which had a higher percentage of juniors passing both sections of the test, with 82 percent of their students passing.

Flooding Frio Hurts Some Area Farms

Frio Draw hit a 25-year high point this week, following massive rains in Eastern New Mexico that caused the draw to flow out of its banks, causing considerable damage to farmers to the west of Friona.

Wednesday, June 15 marked the first time since 1963 for the draw to have water flowing past the bridge on U.S. Highway 60, through the golf course at Friona Country Club.

(The water was not nearly as high at U.S. 60 this week as it had been in 1963, when the water came to within four feet of the bottom of the bridge, and covered five of the golf course's nine greens. None of the greens were covered by water this week.)

Some hail accompanied the rain of Monday night, and crop damage was experienced in the Friona area.

Jarrell Wright, who farms five miles west of town off FM 1731, said that the storm wiped out his cotton, a 70-acre patch that he said was "Looking real pretty Monday afternoon. We were getting ready to give it some fertilizer, but this finished it off."

Wright also lost about 50 acres of maize when the floodwater from Frio Draw washed through a field, and had a 30-acre patch of wheat that the water stood on all afternoon and night on Tuesday.

"We had gone to town about noon on Tuesday, and there was some water in the bar ditches, that's about all. After lunch, we looked out to the southwest, and there was just a sheet of water covering everything," Wright said.

Although the draw is located about a quarter of a mile south of the farm-to-market road, the overflow completely covered the highway, and also covered most of the Wrights' property.

In addition to the crop damage, Wright said that his main concern was the possible loss of an irrigation well, which was completely covered for several hours, as water ran into the well.

Wright explained that if silt runs into the well, it can seal off the water and ruin the well.

"We've been pumping the runoff water out, and hope that the well isn't damaged, but we don't know for sure yet," Wright said.

As to the crop loss, Wright said, "That's just a part of farming. As soon as we can get into the fields, we plan to plant some dryland or limited irrigation type maize. However, on the field that washed so bad, we probably won't be able to work it up in time to replant.

We'll use it for a wheat crop next fall," said Wright, who has farmed in the area since 1958.

Louis Welch, who farms to the east of the Wright place, said the water was the highest he had ever seen it from his place back west, and he has lived there since 1953.

The floodwater ruined Welch's hay crop, and also flooded a field of haygrazer. The hail of Monday night shattered his wheat. Welch said the hail was about pea-sized. Welch said he received about 2.5 inches of rain.

"A good rain in this country usually helps more than it hurts. But this was the highest I ever saw the water. I had some hay stacked on the ground that I never saw under water, and it was a foot under water," he said.

The draw also filled up a lake on the George Jones place north of Parmerton. The draw is diverted into the lake, and it fills up the lake before proceeding downstream. The lake covers at least a quarter-section of land. "We used to water ski on that lake when it would have water in it," Welch commented.

Floyd Reeve, who farms just east of the Welch place, said the hail stripped up his corn crop to some extent, but he was hopeful that the crop would come out of it. He measured 1.7 inches of rain, Reeve said.

Reeve told a story related to him by an aunt, about a time several years ago when as a child she had been playing near the draw on the old Reeve place. All of a sudden there was a loud noise like an explosion, and a six-foot wall of water came rushing down the draw.

This may have been the time when the flooding of Running Water Draw caused four deaths due to drowning. Four members of the "Doc" Waddell family drowned when their vehicle was swept off the highway near Bovina in August of 1932, at a point where Catfish Draw joins Running Water Draw.

Late Tuesday afternoon, the floodwater completely covered FM 1731 from the Wright place west past the ten-mile corner to where the road turns toward the Rhea community. "You couldn't tell where the road was," according to one source.

"Tiny" Moore, Maintenance Foreman for the Highway Department, said that the flood gauge on the draw showed it to be two feet above the road at the point where the highway bridge crosses the draw on FM 1731.

Two or three cars flooded out trying to cross the current while it

was at its highest, and had to be pulled out.

The flooding caused damage to the pavement across the bridge at the ten-mile corner, and Moore said that if it had dried sufficiently, patching would be done on Friday.

Cause of the large amount of water coming down the draw was a five to seven-inch rain in the Forest, N.M. area, at the head of the draw, some 60 miles from Friona.

In addition, the Rhea community had about three inches of rain, and added to what flowed into Parmerton County, built up the volume of water allowing the draw to reach Friona.

An oddity of sorts was the fact that the draw had reached a point just north of the Ray Landrum place by about 6:15 a.m. on Wednesday morning, but it took another six hours for it to reach the Highway 60 bridge—a distance of only about 1.5 miles. The water continued to flow until an early hour on Thursday.

The official measurement in the city of Friona for the period was 1.33 inches. The rain started at about 10:30 p.m. on Monday. Much of the moisture fell in a heavy shower between the hours of 2 and 5 a.m. Tuesday.



Ex-Resident's Rites Held In Fort Worth

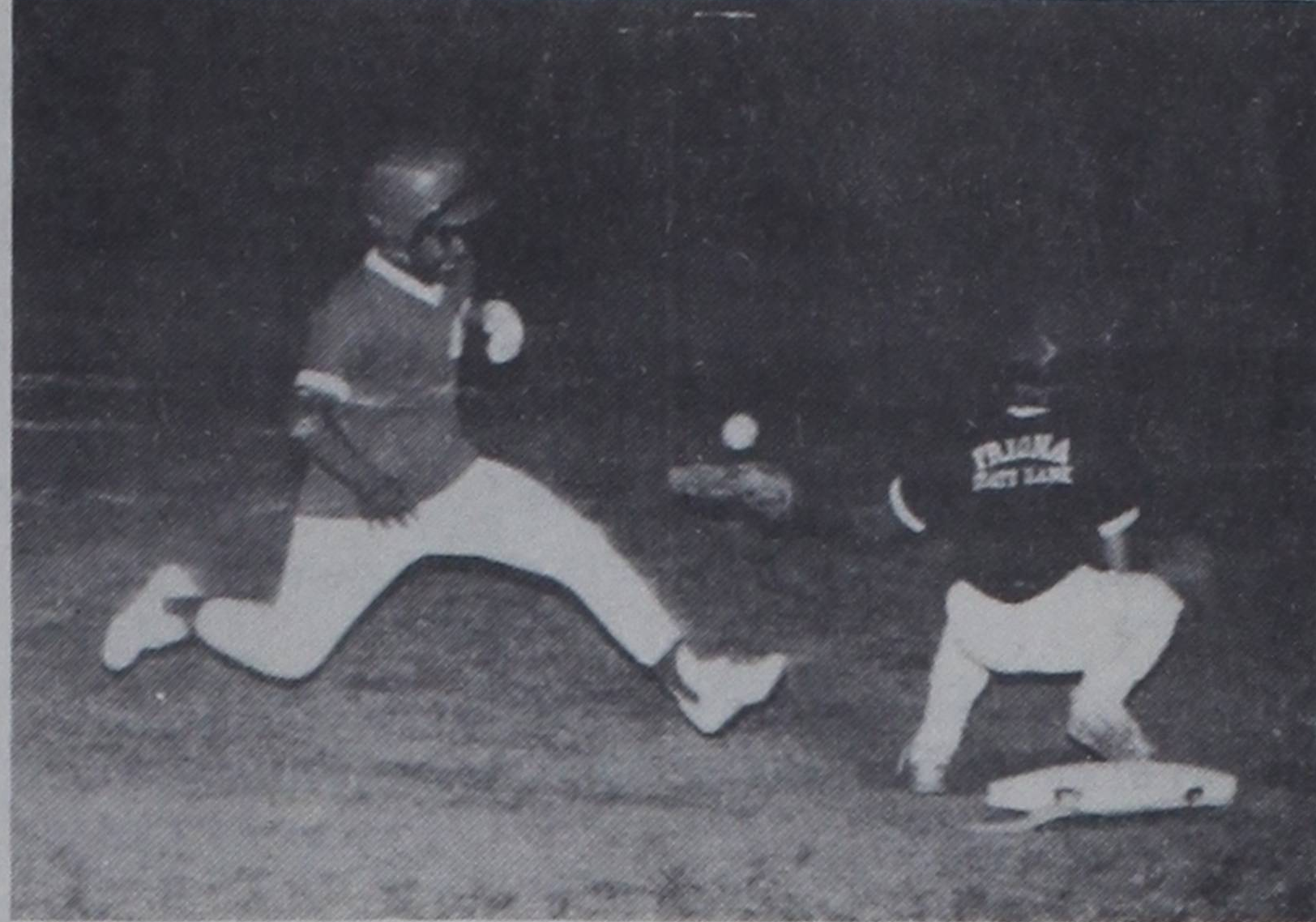

Bagworms Can Be Controlled

Bagworms are best controlled by insecticides in early June, says Parmer County extension agent for entomology, Mike Blanton.

Insecticides include Sevin, Dursban, Diazin, Malathion, Dylox and Orthene. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important, Blanton said.

Adding a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will help because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs.

FmHA Committee Election Is June 30

Farmers in Parmer County will have an opportunity to choose one person from among two candidates running for the Farmers Home Administration county committee in the June 30 election, FmHA County Supervisor, Weldon Rainey, said this week.

Ballots for the election are published in the State Line Tribune, Friona Star and Bovina Blade and also are available at the FmHA county office at 207 Avenue D, Farwell, Texas. If they cannot be returned to the county office in person, ballots may be mailed in, Rainey said.

Among other duties, county committees help determine whether an applicant is eligible for a FmHA farm loan. Two of the three members are elected by county farmers, and the third is appointed by FmHA.
