Washington, April 6-Machinery for gathering and reporting the millions of subscriptions to the Third Liberty Loan was in smooth working order when the campaign opened today on the anniversay of the nation's entrance into the war. Campaign oranizers have perfected a system by which subscriptions today will be tab plated in each federal reserve bank onight, reported to Washington and nade public there tomorow. Delays and approximations of the first and econd loans will be avoided, so that he nation may know daily the exact prograss of fts big money drive the

day before National and state banks are the principal original collectors of subcription reports, since soliciting com graph its reports to the Liberty Loan branch of the district federal reserve bank, and these in turn will report their tabulations to Washington

As an example of the tremendo task involved, loan directors point out that the New York federal reserve bank has rented two entire floors in a big office building to accommodate to manage Liberty Loan reports.

This work acounts for a large par of the expense of gathering the big national credit. London, April 6 .- Premier Lloyd George teleghaphing today to Lord Mayor of London on the occasion of a luncheon given to celebrate America's entry into the war said: "During the next few weeks American troops will give the Prussian military junta the surprise of their lives."

ONLY ENGLISH CAN BE

TAUGHT HEREAFTER

By Associated Press: Austin, April 6.—Children in German settlements in Texas will have to study English when the schools open next fall. A law passed at the last special session of the legislature pro vides that only the English language shall be taught in the public schools below the High Schools,

At present there are a number o schools in Texas where German is taught in the primary grades, in some of the primary towns the children learn Spanish in their first school years, while in some Bohemian settle nents Bohemian is first taught.

The new law will not be effective in the present sessions. It carries a per alty for its violation Teachers found guilty would be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$200 for teaching any language other than English.

dollars is the approximate cost to the United States of one year of war, More than one-half has gone in loans to allies and will be repaid eventual ly: over one-third has been spent for the army and military establishments, one-tenth for the navy and one-fifteenth for shipbuilding.

Just one-sixth of this big war cost has been raised by taxation and other ordinary sources of revenue and the balance has come from sale of Liberty bonds and certificates of indebtedness.

Enormous as these war expenditures may seem to a country whose Government in peace times costs between \$700,000,000 and \$800,000,000, they are less than Great Britian's and are only about two-thirds of estimates made by officials less than a year ago. Slow programs of the ship-building pro gram and the retarding of the outpouring of war supplies are regarded by officials as the chief reasons why expenses did not equal estimates
