# LIBERTY LOAN PASSES

For the past week the Liberty Loan subscriptions in Nolan county have been on the upward trend. The citizens of the county are investing their morey in the Liberty Bonds even if it has not rained in West Texas. Yesterday capped the climax. When the Liberty Loan Special stopped here the speakers began to appeal to the public the subscriptions rose to \$6,-750 fifty dollars more than we reported yesterday.

In addition to this the Santa Fe people have been pushing the bond proposition among their employees as the other railroads entering this city have done and the amount subscribed by the Santa Fe employees in Sweet water aggregates six thousand dollars. They have attained the 100 per cent standard along with some other businesses of this city.

L. T. Youngblood, the banker of Blackwell was in the city yesterday and stated that Blackwell could be counted on to subscribe as much as \$5,000 before the campaign closes.

The three banks of this city now have a total of \$20,200,00 and the amount is growing daily. According to the best information obtainable the entire amount of the county is \$32,-

The bank at Roscoe has to date sold one thousand dollars worth of the Liberty Bonds.

One \$5,000 Subscription The largest subscription in the county thus far was made by J. K. P. Hairriss of Maryneal. Mr. Hairriss is a prominent ranchman of that com munity and stockholder in the Continental State Bank of Sweetwater. He has bought five thousand dollars worth during the Third Liberty Loan.
