The frequent and widespread publi ation of statements concerning the presence of ground glass in foodstuffs has led the Committee on Public In formation to inquire into the authen ticity of these reports. It has been advised by the Food Administration that thorough investigations of more than 200 of the cases has disclosed only one instance in which ground . glass was found in the foodstuffs in spected.

The case in which glass was found occurred at Fort Smith, Ark, A baker in that town had had trouble with his employees, one of whom, desiring to destroy his employer's business had filled with glass, a loaf of bread which was to be delivered to an orphanage When the bread was served to the im mates of the institution several of them suffered lacerations of their lips No more serious injuries resulted


