

WIN WAR PER-Philadelphia, May 17,-"If the Unit ed States is to maintain the position

of spiritual leadership acquired during the war and take ts rightful place in a League of Nations, it must stamp out sectional intolerance and racprejudice," said Dr. Leo S. Rowe, of Philadelphia, in an address today be fore the "Win the War for Permanent Peace" convention. Dr. Rowe, who is Assistant Secretary of the Treasury and a member of the Executive Committee of the League to Enforce Peace added:

"The problem confronting us is not merely to win a victory but to assist -yes, to lead-in creating a world situation which will make it imposible for the political philosophy which underlies the German plan to dictate or which follows this struggle shall be he peace that makes further demo cratic development possible and thu enables America to make her great

st contribution to civilization. "No one would, for a moment, place any faith in a revival of the 'balance of power' doctrine. We now see, as never before, that the normal develop ment of American institutions will be broken, their spirit radically changed and we will be led, as a matter of salfpreservation, into a form of political and military organization, which will mean that the promise of our 18th and 19th century development will not reach fruition.

"Germany's treatment of Russia and Rumania has made strikingly clear the nature of the menace with which we are confronted.

"It is clear that out of this strug a new world will emerge, but th ype of world will depend largely of America's unselfishness and on adfastness of her faith in inte onal right and justice.

"American ideals, elevated by var," asserted Dr. Rowe, "cannot tain their full developmeint, unless ecome an integral part of an interna ional organization determined at all costs to eliminate aggression from world affairs, to protect the rights of small and large nationalities, and to place ourselves in the service of high er standards of international justice and fair dealing."
