stitutionality of the zone law was upheld this afternoon by the Court of Criminal appeals in a majority opin ion, Judge Davidson dissenting.

10 MILE ZONE LAW

The ten-mile zone law around mill tary camps to protect soldiers in training for the United States army was set forth in a proclamation by Governor W. P. Hobby as the reason session February 26 last. The governor urged enactment of the law quoting letters and telegrams from Secretary of War Newton D. Baker to the effect that such legislative actions was needed, and desirable.


The Houses of the legislature acted for a dry zone of ten miles extent. The measure which finally was enacted was even more extensive than Governor Hobby had recommended in that its provisions applied to shipbuilding plants working on Govern ment contracts.

- The law became effective with the dawn of April 16 and upwards of 1200 saloons were banished. On the first day of its operation, however, G. H. Hollingsworth, of Fort Worth, was arrested on a charge of selling a quart of whiskey inside the ten-mile zor around the military camp there.

Violation of the law constituted felony and Hollingsworth was held without bail. The following day a habeas corpus suit was filed in the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin terest of the Orient railroad situation. and the court granted \$3,000 bail All along the line of the Orient towns pending a hearing on oral arguments and cities are sending representatives which was set for April 24.
