Paris, Aug. 5 .-- Americans have taken Fismes. In hand to hand fighting the Americans covered themselves with glory. The fighting is said to have been the bitterest of the whole war. Prussian guards asking no quarter, were bayonetted or clubbed to death as they stood by their machine guns.

Allied pursuit of the Germans continues. Latest reports are that a few enemy troops remain on the south bank of the River Vesle. French patrols have crossed the Vesle at Bozoches and Jonchery, west and east of Fismes respectively. The Allies are meeting with stern resistance.

French Front, Aug. 5---Last reports on this front state that the Germans have crossed the Aisne River, destroying all bridges behind them. It is believed the Allies hold the entire Vesle line even having crossed on the extreme right wing near Rheims. They hold the bridge head on the north bank of the Aisne on the other extremity of the line near Soissons.

There was a lull in the battle along the Soissons-Rheims front last night. The breathing spell extended into this morning. Germans are being favored by weather conditions which have transferred the banks of the Vesle into swamps of morasses. Germans are making stiffer resistance here than was anticipated.


