GERMANY MUST WITHDRAW FROM INVADED TERRITORY

By Associated Press:

Washington, Oct. 7.—The official announcement of the attitude of the United States government for peace is still being withheld. But there is no abatement of the indication that if Germany seeks a negotiation leading to a round table conference and diplomatic quibbling the offer will fall flat. If Germany accepts without qualification the principles for peace as repeatedly laid down by President Wilson and accepted by all the belligerents the way is open for peace by the withdrawal of all German troops from the invaded territory as the first requirement.

HITCHCOCK SAYS DEAL WITH GER. PEOPLE

Washington, Oct. 7.—Discussing Germany's peace offer in the Senate today, Senator Lodge of Massachusetts said, "An armistice would mean loss of the war and all we have fought for." Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska advocated adding to the principles already laid down by President Wilson, an additional one providing that the Allies will deal only with real representatives of the German people.

M'CUMBER FOR DISARMING GERMANY

Washington, Oct. 7.—Senator McCumber of North Dakota introduces a resolution in the Senate today providing that before the United States agrees to any armistice, Germany must disband her army, surrender her navy, arms and munitions, pay for damage done to all cities and for the country devastated, restore Alsace-Lorraine to France and also restore the penalty exacted from France in 1870.

GERMAN NOTE DELIVERED TO PRESIDENT WILSON

Washington, Oct. 7.—The Swiss legation today received the German peace note to the United States. The note was translated immediately. It was delivered to President Wilson personally by Frederick Oberlin, an attachee of the Swiss legation. Delivery to the President personally gives rise to suggestions that the note came from Emperor himself.

AUSTRIAN NOTE DELIVERED TO SECRETARY LANSING

Washington, Oct. 7.—The note from Baron Burian, the Austro-Hungarian minister, was presented to Secretary of State Robert Lansing at ten-thirty this morning by Minister Ekengren of Sweden.

LONDON DIPLOMAT SAYS EVACUATE TERRITORY FIRST

By Associated Press:

London, Oct. 7.—No armistice will be granted the Central Powers before complete evacuation by them of all allied territory, with cessation of the destruction and burning of allied cities. This is the opinion of a foreign diplomat of high rank who has been questioned regarding the speech of the German Chancellor, Maximilian.

NEWSPAPERS DISCONTINUED IN GERMANY

New York, Oct. 5.—Since the beginning of the war 3,582 German newspapers and magazines have discontinued publication either permanently

or temporarily. This is officially announced by the German postal authorities, says the Berlin Tagblatt. In the same period 1,765 new publications were begun. The total number of newspapers and magazines in Germany was estimated at 9,000.

CONGRATULATIONS, SWEETWATER!

Late Saturday afternoon the Daily Reporter received the following Associated Press dispatch:

Washington, Oct. 5.—One billion dollars, or one-sixth of the Fourth Liberty Loan has been subscribed the first week of the campaign.

Today the Reporter publishes statements from all of the three banks of Sweetwater. These statements show liberal subscriptions by all of the banks and they show many additional subscriptions. Some of these subscriptions were made voluntarily but many of them were secured through the efforts of officers of the banks. The total of the lists from the three banks is \$36,850.00. This is more than 51 per cent of Nolan county's quota of \$71,800.00. While the nation at large spent one week in raising 16.23 per cent of the total loan, Nolan county in the same week raised 51 per cent of its quota. Nolan county therefore closed the first week of the campaign with a showing 35 per cent more creditable than that presented by the whole nation.

This much has been done through the Sweetwater banks alone. No report has been received yet from Blackwell and Roscoe. The banks at each of those towns are controlled by men of high patriotism. Liberal subscriptions from the Blackwell and Roscoe communities will undoubtedly be received later.

The lists published today do not include subscriptions from the railroad employees. Information from the freight office at noon today showed subscriptions had been made there in excess of \$2,000.00. Reports from the Santa Fe round house are that forty-two round-house employees had subscribed for \$4,550.00. The Reporter will endeavor to publish tomorrow a full list of subscriptions made by the railroad employees. They have never failed to respond liberally to the needs of America and the list will undoubtedly be a long one.

It seems safe to make the prediction that 75 per cent of Nolan county's quota will be subscribed by Tuesday night.

DELIVERANCE OF RHEIMS IS COMPLETED TO-DAY

Paris, Oct. 7.—French troops crossed the Suipe river eastward of Orainville and reached the outskirts of Bazancourt and Bousuisippe. After severe fighting at Clement-A. Arnes heavy losses have been inflicted upon the enemy who is retreating in disorder.

Today's fighting completed the deliverance of Rheims. The Commander of the Eleventh Bulgarian division has surrendered his force to the Allied troops in Macedonia. The division was composed of two brigades and with it a large quantity of war material fell into the hands of the Allies.

CONTINUE WORK OF DESTRUCTION. With the British in France, Oct. 7.—British forces occupied many towns today in their advance after the retreating Germans along the sector of front extending from Cambrai to Lens.

The Germans continue their work of destruction. Additional fires are being observed in Haubourdin in the neighborhood of Lille.

AMERICANS MAKE SLIGHT ADVANCES. Washington, Oct. 7.—Slight advances yesterday by the Americans between Meuse and Bois Des Agons in heavy infantry fighting are reported today by General Pershing. He also reported increased artillery activity everywhere on both sides.

VATICAN REFUSES AUSTRIA'S REQUEST TO START PEACE MOVE

Paris, Oct. 7.—Austria-Hungary recently again insisted that the Vatican undertake steps toward peace. This is reported at Rome. According to a Havres dispatch the Vatican rejected the demand.

WILSON'S PRINCIPLES ACCEPTED ONLY FOR NEGOTIATION. Washington, Oct. 7.—The newest peace proposal of the German Government as quoted in dispatches from Amsterdam differed from the proposition that emanated from Vienna in tone and wording but not in substance. Both governments accept Wilson's principles not as a basis for peace but simply as a basis for negotiations.

VON HINDENBURG RESIGNS AFTER ROW WITH THE KAISER

London, Oct. 7.—A Central News dispatch from Amsterdam says Field Marshall Von Hindenburg has resigned as chief of the German General Staff. The resignation followed a heated interview with Emperor William in which Hindenburg declared a retreat on a large scale was impossible to avoid.

Wilson in addressing Congress August 1, this year and in his New York address September 27, had proposed a program for general peace which Germany and her Allies could accept as basis for negotiations.

Berlin, Oct. 6.—The Kaiser in proclamation to the army and navy, says he has decided to offer peace again, but will accept "only an honorable peace."

London, Oct. 6.—German Imperial Chancellor has asked Switzerland to request President Wilson to communicate with other belligerents in an effort to establish peace with Wilson's addresses of August 11 and September 27 as basis for negotiations.

Berlin, Oct. 6.—Emperor William in proclamation to the German army dated October 6th says: "Macedonian front has crumbled, our front has not been broken and will not be. I have decided in accord with my allies to again offer peace but it will be only honorable peace for which we extend our hand."

London, Oct. 6.—British have captured the towns of Montbrehain and Beaufort, northeast of St. Quentin.

AMMUNITION PLANT IN DANGER FROM FLAMES

By Associated Press: Rock Island, Ill., Oct. 7.—Fire of unknown origin broke out at the Walsh construction camp near the Rock Island arsenal this morning. The largest TNT plant owned and operated by the Government is endangered by flames. Help has been called for from the fire departments from Rock Island, Davenport and Moline. Fire at the arsenal is reported to be making rapid headway.

BEFORE CALLED GET READY

Men soon to be called into service can practically insure themselves against probable disease in the army by a simple system of precautionary training while they are awaiting enlistment. This is the advice offered by medical authorities of the "Cactus Division" at Camp Travis, Texas.

Reports reaching this place are that many young men expecting to be selected are prone to take "a last fling" at home and during this "fling" commit all kinds of indiscretions, among which might be mentioned smoking too much; keeping late hours; over-eating, etc. Nothing could be worse, say the medical authorities. By the time the draftees reach the camp they are in such a run down state that their systems offer a festive field for disease.

Just what sort of exercise to take and just how to build up the system is very important, and this information is willingly given by the army physicians. Above all things the beginner should not overdo his exercising. A schedule of light calisthenics; a short walk or ride daily, and plenty of fresh air baths, and sunshine are all that are needed. The amount of exercises should of course be increased as the body becomes accustomed to it.

Among the exercises the medical experts suggest are deep breathing, body bending to get rid of any excess fat around the abdomen, vigorous leg and arm movements, and any training that will develop "wind."

Doctors advise that the amount of smoking should be reduced previous to entry into army life in order that the lungs may be in the best condition and this is doubly necessary at this time of the year. Pneumonia and Spanish Influenza are two of the most prevalent camp diseases and both have to do with the respiratory system. Travis thus far has managed to prevent the appearance of the virulent

Type of Influenza and has reduced Pneumonia to a minimum, but with the constant influx of recruits the danger is always imminent.

The United States Department of Agriculture has announced the appointment of the following men to act with the district draft boards of Texas as advisers regarding agricultural needs:

G. H. Alford, Dallas, Texas—Agricultural adviser to district board for the Northern District, with headquarters at Fort Worth, Texas.

Judge Charles Rogan, Austin, Texas—Agricultural adviser to district board for the Western District, with headquarters in the Federal Building, Austin, Texas.

H. B. Marsh, Tyler, Texas—Agricultural adviser to district board for the Eastern District, with headquarters in the Federal Building, Tyler, Texas.

Dr. W. R. Elchardt, Webster, Texas—Agricultural adviser to district board for the Southern District, with headquarters at Room 622, Binz Building, Houston, Texas.

The agricultural advisers are not to be members of the district boards, but are to furnish to the boards facts relative to farm labor requirements, not only of their own districts but of the entire country. Such information will be supplied to the advisers by the Department of Agriculture. The advisers also may concern themselves with individual cases before the district board. County agents of the Department of Agriculture have been supplied with questionnaires to be sent out for the purpose of securing facts about the farm labor needs in the counties.

CLASS DISTURBANCES AMONG THE JAPANESE

By Associated Press:

Tokio, Sept. 28.—Japanese reformers, stirred by the recent food riots in which the "eta" or outcast class of society took a prominent part, are advocating the abolition of the caste regulations which hedge about these people on the ground that the restrictions are distinctly out of consonance with the spirit of modern Japan.

The "eta" might be compared to the pariahs of India. They number more than 1,000,000 and are said to be the descendants of Korean captives brought to Japan during the wars of the sixth century. Others trace

their origin to the introduction of Buddhism in Japan in the eighth century when the taking of animal life was looked upon by adherents of the new faith with abhorrence and disdain. From the earliest days the "eta" have been slaughterers of cattle and other livestock and today the majority of these people obtain their livelihood as butchers and tanners.

Legally the "eta" have the same rights as other Japanese but socially they are outcasts. Forbidden to mingle with high-class Japanese or to marry outside their own caste, the abattoir workers and their families live together in towns and villages in western and southern Japan. Included in their number are many radicals who see in the growing spirit of democracy an opportunity to end forever for themselves and children the social ostracism to which for centuries their forbears have been subjects.

The rice disturbances gave the "eta" the opportunity to show their disapproval of existing conditions. Many of their women in the city of Osaka led attacks upon food dealers and property. With the settlement of the trouble Japanese editors and publicists suggest the "eta" should be brought out of their settlements and encouraged to live and associate with their so-called betters as a part of the plan to more thoroughly democratize Japan.

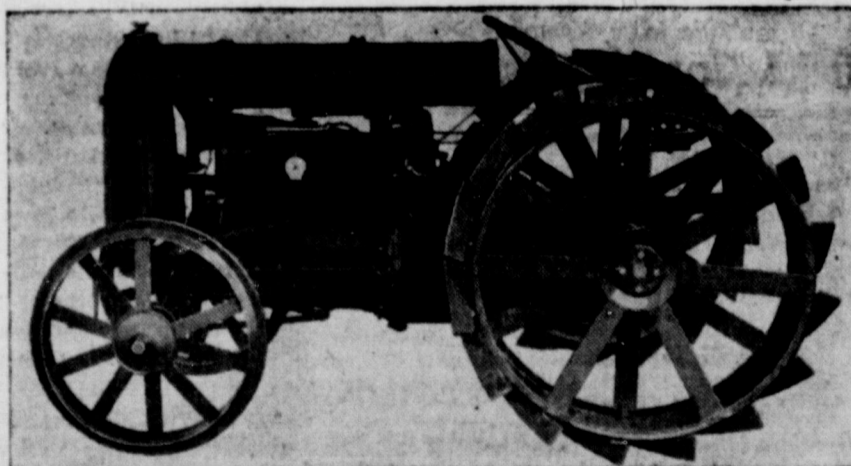
Inspect the tube in your tire regularly. The tube is the heart of the tire and the motorist should pay as much attention to the quality of the tube as he does the tire.
