AUSTRIA CAN NOT FEED HER ABSENT SUBJECTS

Washington, Nov. 14.—Austria has asked President Wilson to use his good offices with the allies to secure a modification of the Turkish armistice terms so as to permit several thousand former Austro-Hungarian subjects now in the Ottoman territory to remain there instead of returning home to add to the already serious food problems.

HUNS RETREAT VERY RAPIDLY

WITH AMERICANS IN FRANCE, NOV. 14.—GERMANS OPPOSITE THE FIRST AMERICAN ARMY NORTH AND NORTH-EAST OF VERDUN ARE REPORTED TO BE GOING NORTHWARD RAPIDLY. PREPARATIONS BEGUN BY THE ENEMY SEVERAL DAYS AGO TO WITHDRAW IN FORCE ARE NOW BECOMING EFFECTIVE. THERE IS GREAT RAILWAY ACTIVITY REPORTED AT METZ AND OTHER RAILROAD JUNCTIONS.

RAINBOW REGARDER AS OMEN OF VICTORY

As the appearance of a cross in the heavens inspired Constantine the Great, during ancient times to deeds of valor, a rainbow in the sky on the western front early in October was interpreted as an omen of success by Americans in the Rainbow division.

This is the story told by J. Y. Robb of the 117th Supply Train in a letter to his brother, Lieut. Robb arrived at the front with a string of loaded trucks just as the drive started on Oct. 12. He ascended a hill to watch the progress of the battle. Just at that moment a rainbow, described by Lieut. Robb as the most beautiful he had ever seen, glowed in the sky and formed a complete arch over the boys in the Rainbow division. Every man saw it and the sight brought a cheer as they drove forward, their attack irresistible. Within a half hour prisoners were coming back by the thousands, and within eight hours the men advanced three times the distance of the objectives set for the first day.

TERMS OF ARMISTICE VIOLATED BY GERMANS

LAST THOUGHTS BEFORE BATTLE

With the American Amies in the Field, Oct. 15.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—When an American soldier goes "over the top" or when he receives a bullet or shrapnel wound he thinks of his mother. The French poilu thinks of his wife, and the British Tommy of his sweetheart.

This fact is borne out by the officers and doctors who have served in all three of the Allied armies. They declare that when the American soldier is wounded, the first word on his lips in almost every case is "mother." Even after he is removed to the hospital he calls constantly for his mother. His British cousin, however, seems chiefly absorbed in his sweetheart, and longs to see her "just once again," while his French compatriot thinks only of his "femme bien aimée."

The correspondent of the Associated Press at the American front asked a number of soldiers what thought was most on their minds when they first left their trenches to attack the Germans. In nine cases out of ten

the answer was, "Of home and mother."

There were a few, however, who said that as they entered the battle their minds were given over wholly to prayer, although they had never before been in the habit of praying. Some of them kept before them words of encouragement and counsel contained in letters from relatives. One soldier on the morning of the attack received a letter from his mother quoting the Scripture phrase, "Trust in the Lord and no enemy shall prosper against thee." The soldier went through one of the bloodiest battles of the war that day and came out unscathed.

REHABILITATION OF OUR WOUNDED.

The United States Government is resolved to do its best to restore every wounded American soldier and sailor to health, strength, and self-supporting activity.

Until his discharge from the hospital all the medical and surgical treatment necessary to restore him to health is under the jurisdiction of the military or naval authorities, according to the branch of the service he is in. The vocational training, the re-education and rehabilitation necessary to restore him to self-supporting activity, is under the jurisdiction of the Federal Board for Vocational Education.

If he needs an artificial limb or

mechanical appliance the government will supply it free, will keep it in repair, and renew it when necessary. If after his discharge he again needs

medical treatment on account of his disability, the Government will supply it free. While he is in the hospital and while in training afterwards the

soldier or sailor will receive compensation as if in service and his family or dependents will receive their allotment.

A wounded soldier or sailor, although his disability does not prevent him from returning to employment without training, can take a course of vocational training free of cost and the compensation provided by the war

risk insurance act will be paid to him and the training will be free, but no allotment will be paid to his family.

Every Liberty Bond holder who holds his bond is keeping up a part of this great work of restoring to health, strength, and usefulness the men who have suffered for their country.

Wayne Yoder, the son of E. G. Yoder, who enlisted in the tank corps four weeks ago, and has been stationed at Camp Colt, Gettysburg, Penna., was selected as one of six men out of 5000 men to go overseas at once. He left camp a week ago and is probably on his way to France by this time. This is another instance where one of our Sweetwater boys has made good.

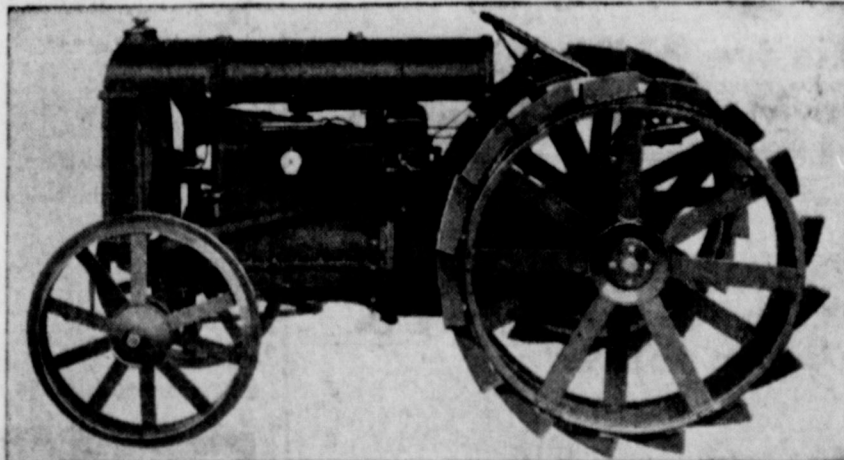

TOWN BUILT BY Y. M. C. A.

Paris, Oct. 15.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—When the American army wants a handy resort to which soldiers on short leave can go for recreation and rejuvenation, its commanders sometimes call on the Y. M. C. A. to provide the whole outfit.

This was done in a case at Nancy which is but a few miles from the German border and where the Y. M. C. A. has built a little town all for the benefit of the American soldiers. It is called a "short leave resort" where the soldiers who have a day or two off can go. A week was allowed to the Y. M. C. A. to prepare a place to receive units from the front, of 50,000 men. A Methodist preacher of Ridgewood, N. J., the Rev. A. C. McCrea, was directed to provide a chain of hotels, moving picture theatres, canteens, athletic fields, restaurants and warm baths. Within the week he was ready to receive the soldiers.

"Two thousand men a day have been using the baths since they began operations," said the Rev. Mr. McCrea. "As the men enter the baths their clothing was taken from them and sent to the laundry to be reclaimed. When the men emerge from the bath we provide clean, sanitary clothing. He becomes at once a new man." "This," he continued, "is typical of the demands that are made upon the representatives of the various organizations such as the Knights of Columbus, the Salvation Army and the rest."

HOW TO PREVENT TUBERCULOSIS

By Associated Press:

New York, Nov. 13.—Fearing a rapid rise in the death rate from tuberculosis, as a result of the influenza epidemic, the National Tuberculosis Association has issued a special statement warning the public of the danger. Experience in previous epidemics has clearly indicated, the association points out, that the death rate from tuberculosis may be expected to be increased by at least ten per cent within the next two years as a result of the present epidemic, unless proper precautions are taken. Influenza, it is stated, greatly reduces one's physical vitality, and lowers one's resistance to disease. This opens the way for tuberculosis.

The surest way to prevent tuberculosis as a result of influenza are summarized by the association as follows:

1. Stop working and go to bed immediately. Do not resume work until the attack of influenza is all gone.
2. Have nothing to do with patent medicines or drug store "treatment." Put yourself under a doctor's care at once, and continue under his care until cured.
3. Have your doctor examine you thoroughly to see if any signs of tuberculosis are present. You cannot tell without an expert examination.
4. If free from any trace of tuberculosis, keep so by sufficient rest during convalescence, and careful living then and afterwards.
5. If your "cold" hangs on, or there are other indications of tuberculosis, begin medical treatment without a moment's delay.
