Sick, Wounded are Coming Home Soon Troops in Camps Now Being Disbanded

U. S. TROOPS ARE DESIRED TO KEEP ORDER

WITH AMERICANS IN FRANCE, NOV. 16.—OFFICIALS AND CIVILIANS IN THE VILLAGES IN THE GERMAN OCCUPIED TERRITORY ARE SENDING MESSAGES TO HEADQUARTERS URGING THAT AMERICAN TROOPS START TOWARD THE RHINE AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. IT IS FEARED AFTER THE GERMANS MOVE BACK THERE WILL BE TROUBLE CAUSED BY STRAGGLERS. MOST OF THESE MESSAGES HAVE BEEN SENT WITH FRENCH AND ITALIAN SOLDIERS WHO HAVE BEEN RELEASED FROM GERMAN PRISONS.

GERMANS FREE ROUMANIANS

WITH THE AMERICANS IN AL-SACE-LORRAINE, NOV. 16.—RUMANIAN PRISONERS BEGAN REACHING THE AMERICAN LINES YESTERDAY. THEY STATED THE GERMANS HAD FREED THEM RATHER THAN GIVE THEM FOOD OR PROVIDE TRANSPORTATION. RUMANIANS APPEAR IN GROUPS AT DIFFERENT PARTS OF THE LINE. THE AMERICANS ARE FURNISHING THEM WITH CLOTHING AND SUPPLIES. IT IS REPORTED THE GERMANS ALONG THE ENTIRE LINE ARE WITHDRAWING IN LARGE NUMBERS.

GERMAN MAYOR ASKS FRENCH TO HELP HIM

PARIS, NOV. 16.—A GERMAN AIRPLANE ARRIVED IN THE FRENCH LINES YESTERDAY MORNING BEARING A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR OF MULHAUSEN REQUESTING THAT A FRENCH REGIMENT BE SENT TO MAINTAIN ORDER. THE POPULATION, FULL OF ENTHUSIASM, HAS RISEN AGAINST THE GERMANS WHO ARE RETIRING IN THE MOST DISORDER.

"GERMAN ARMY AT YOUR MERCY"

PARIS, NOV. 16.—ALTHOUGH FOOD DIFFICULTIES PLAYED A PART IN THE DEFEAT OF GERMAN BY THE DETERMINING CAUSE OF THE GERMAN COLLAPSE WAS THE FACT THAT THE ENEMY'S ARMY WAS ON THE BRINK OF DISASTER. "THE FIRST WORDS THE GERMAN PLENIPOTENTIARIES SAID TO MARSHAL FOCH WERE IN SUBSTANCE, 'GERMANY'S ARMY IS AT YOUR MERCY, MARSHAL. OUR RESERVES OF MEN AND MUNITIONS ARE COMPLETELY EXHAUSTED, MAKING IT IMPOSSIBLE FOR US TO CONTINUE THE WAR.'"

ARRANGE FOR TAKING FLEET

LONDON, NOV. 16.—PRELIMINARY DISCUSSIONS CONCERNING THE HANDING OVER OF THE GREAT GERMAN FLEET WERE HELD TONIGHT BETWEEN ADMIRAL SIR DAVID BEATTY AND DELEGATES FROM THE GERMAN SOLDIERS AND SAILORS' COUNCIL AND GERMAN VICE ADMIRAL MEURER.

Washington, Nov. 16.—Orders have been issued to General Pershing to begin the return at once of all casual sick and wounded who can be moved and all convalescents. A steady stream of these men should begin immediately to cross the Atlantic. The camps at home will be cleared out to prepare for the return of the expeditionary forces and the process will be expedited. Owing to the unusual composition and brilliant record, the Rainbow division probably will be the first sent home. The return of the commissioned personnel of the army to civilian life will be effected by dividing the present list of officers into three classes. The classes are: those desiring commissions in the regular army, those willing to hold themselves available for future service as reserves, and those who desire honorable discharge.

Washington, Nov. 16.—Orders have been issued for the gradual demobilization of all troops now in this country, Provost Marshal General March announced today. Three million seven hundred and ninety thousand men are under arms in the United States. Demobilization orders for two hundred thousand men have already been issued and these men will be at their homes within the next two weeks.

Washington, Nov. 16.—When plans are completed for demobilization thirty thousand men will be discharged daily, says General March.

BUCHAREST TO BE ENTERED

PARIS, NOV. 16.—ALLIED FORCES ARE EXPECTED TO ENTER BUCHAREST ON SUNDAY. THE ALLIES CROSSED THE DANUBE ON NOV. 9 AND EASILY OVERCAME SUCH RESISTANCE AS WAS OFFERED BY THE GERMAN FORCES THERE. THE BRITISH TROOPS HAVE ENTERED CONSTANZA, A RUMANIAN SEAPORT ON THE BLACK SEA.

SOUTH NOLAN GOES OVER TOP EARLY MONDAY

Blackwell, Nov. 15.—The south end of Nolan County has gone over the top once more.

This was the manner by which the great victory was celebrated. From the time that the word was given us by our central telephone operator Monday morning until ten that night the town and community was full of rejoicing. The school was given a holiday and at once preparation was made for a parade. The parade began at the school building and marched through the main street of the town to the depot and back to the Farmers' Hardware Co., where the halt was made. During the parade the children sang our national anthem and the "Star Spangled Banner."

When halted they gave fifteen rabs for "Our Fathers, Our Mothers, Our Boys, and for Victory." The report for the school on the War Work Campaign was given and then fifteen rabs for "Our School" was given by the town. The challenge was then thrown to the town to meet the school. This was no sooner done than the red-blooded citizens were on tiptoe and called out amounts so rapidly that three secretaries were kept busy. After the subscriptions were made (not a pledge was given) the citizens resorted to the top of the hill just east of town where avil shooting was indulged in for some time.

The total for the day's campaign was \$606.99 for the town of Blackwell, which has been added to during the week until it now nears the seven hundred mark. It was all raised in less than twenty minutes from subscriptions. One subscription of fifty dollars was made and six of twenty-five

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 15.—"To hell with the Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs," the slogan proclaimed by Henry Watterson in the columns of the Louisville Courier Journal and which somewhat startled the country, Sept. 3, 1914, has been answered sooner than its author had expected. "The Courier Journal's prophecy," said Mr. Watterson, now editor emeritus, in a statement shortly after Emperor William abdicated, "that in thirty-five years there would not be a crowned head in Europe will also come true. 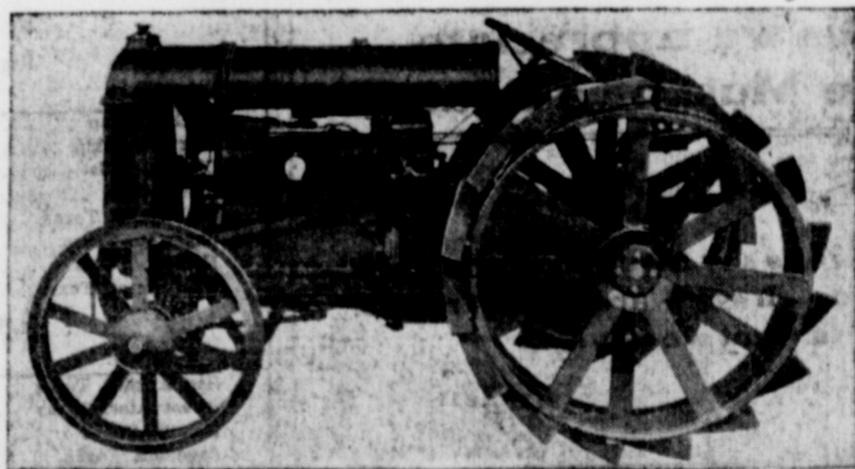

MEXICAN PAPER IS SUSPENDED

Mexico City, Nov. 16.—Recently "A. B. C.", a semi-weekly political paper suspended publication. It was the most influential and had the largest circulation of any of the few pro-ally papers in the capital which opposed the policies of the present government.

Prior to the suspension General Juan Merigo was charged with attacking Attorney Eduardo Pelleres, the chief editorial writer of "A. B. C." in the offices of the paper, following an attack on the Mexican military system, written by Senor Pelleres. Shortly afterward, Luis Zamora Pinos, director of "A. B. C.", reported that he had been threatened with death if he allowed his paper to pursue its political policy. Then "A. B. C." gave up the ghost.

Puebla, Mexico, Nov. 15.—Fifty-four persons met death when Zujata's bandits in their latest atrocity, dynamited a passenger train proceeding from this city to Atencingo at LaGalzarza, near Atencingo.
