SAN FRANCISICO, Dec. 3-Dis ag gement by the jury in the Fatty Arbuckle case loomed up this morning. Arbuckle is haggard from the long strain and disappointed because he was not speedily acquitted.

The court will meet again at 10 o'clock this morning for another report from the jury.

SAN FRANCISCO, 10 A. M .-Refreshed by a night's sleep the jury in the Arbuckle case returned to the jury room in the Hall of Justice shortly before 10 A. M. to resume deliberations. The jury, spectators, and Arbuckle paused for a moment to catch a glimpse of Marshall Foch parading up Market street at 10:15.

The jury has been out eighteen hours and the rumors are more varied than ever, some having it nine for acquittal. Many believed that the jury would agree this morning, but majority looked for a disagreement. Another trial jury may be kept in session over Sunday.

Arrangements have been made for the sterilization of cotton seed shipped from place to place for planting. By sterilization is meant treatin the EPWORTH LEAGUE seed n such manner as to kill all pink bollorm therein and not injure the

Our advice to farmers is not to buy any cotton seed for planting unless the Commissioner of Agriculture and the Chief Tntomologist and states that the seed have been sterilized.





She locates tuberculous patients and cares for them, and at the same time teaches the families how to prevent the disease from spreading to other members. She assists in school medical inspection of children and follows defective children into their homes to advise the parents and induce them to act on the advice of the school doctor. She watches over families in which there are contagious diseases, such as dyphtheria, scarlet fever, whooping cough and influenza, and teaches the families how to isolate the patient so

as to prevent infection. She takes care of the mother before the baby arrives and builds for the future by showing the mother how to care for her baby. She gives instruceven at times in questions of diet.

She is the closest point of contact between the great American Red Cross and the public.

There is a known shortage in the United States today of several thousand public health nurses and there is a greater shortage of hospital and private nurses. Many chapters in the Southwestern Division of the American Red Cross maintain public health nurses and conduct work of a greater or less scope through the agency of such a nurse. These chapters are de-pending upon the membership fees coming in from the annual Red Cross Roll Call to finance their public health nursing program for the coming year. The Roll Call will take place November 11th to 24th, according to announcement given out at the Jocal Red Cross headquarters.

MALNUTRITION IN AMERICA AMONG RICH AND POOR ALIKE

the plains section in the United States are normal, according to a survey re cently made by the American Red Cross and the United States Public Health Service jointly. A large per-centage of subnormal children are so because of malnutrition. Malnutrition is answerable for more ills in the child life of America than any other one cause, it has been ascertained, and this condition is found as frequently among the children of the rich as in the familles of the poor.

The Red Cross, through its nutrition classes and diet educational work, is endeavoring to correct the widespread condition of under-nourishment and to lay the foundation for a healthier next generation by bulling up the strength of the children. In the United States there are over 1,000 nutrition classes in which more than 22,000 children are enrolled. In addition to this there are 163 classes in Food Selection with over 1,500 stndents, all of whom either are in ad-

vanced school grades or are adults.

With a work of this magnitude, with an effort constantly to increase its scope, the Red Cross hopes in the next few years to feach American children what to eat, when to eat it, and how much of it to eat, so that under-nourishment will go longer be a menace to the health of the nation.
