## W. M. BRADFORD DIES IN DALLAS

Death Resulted From Paralysis-Had Been Sufferer For Several Years.

CAME HERE FROM TENNESSEE

Has Held Prominent place in Masonic Lodge—Regarded As "Blue Lodge" Authority.

A wave of sorrow passed over the city this morning when it became known that William Martin Bradford. another of Sweetwater's pioneer citi-zens had died at 4:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, at the home of his son, William Bradford, in Dallas. He will

William Bradford, in Dalias. He will be brought to the city on this afternoon's train for burial, in the family lot at the City Cemetery.

Mr. Bradford would have been 69 years old had he lived until May 13th. He was born near Maryville, Blount County, Tennessee in 1853, moving from there to Pulaski, Tennessee in 1866, where he made his home until 1889, when he and his family moved to Sweetwater.

He was married to Miss Eliza Hol-ley in Giles County, Tennessee, about the year 1876. To this union nine chil-dren were born. Two of whom died when children and seven survive

West Texas Chamber of Commerce And Interested Citizens to Meet For That Purpose Soon.

ROAD IS GREAT CATTLE CARRIER

Thirteen Counties Touched By The Road—Six Will Be Without Ser-vice If The Oriest is Stopped.

Determine efforts will be made by the people of West Texas to preserve the people of West Texas to preserve the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railway from the threatened discon-tinuance. The Orient road is in re-ality the only north and south road operating through Sweetwater and is the connecting link between Sweet-water and the southern West Texas

The West Texas Chamber of Con The West Texas Chamber of Commerce and groups of interested citizens and shippers along the line will hold meetings in a short time in regard to the preservation of the line, according to William T. Wheeler, assistant manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Officials of the railway will be invited to attend and it is hoped to mapout a plan whereby the threatened suspension can be averted. The time and place of the meeting will be announced in a short time. Wheeler said.

Continuing deficits in operating and the failure of the road to obtain from the Interstate Commerce Commission and the United States Railway Labor Board certain concessions asked by Orient officials as a means of averting the necessity for suspension are given as the causes for the announcement just made by A. DeBernart, vice president and general manager of the line, that the road will have to go out of business by July 1 unless relief can be had.

The Orient line traverses or touches directly thirteen Texas counties, and if it ceases operations at least six of these counties will have no railroad service whatever. The territory through which the Orient line includes Hardeman County. runs includes Hardeman County, where it enters Texas from the north Foard, Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Jones, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Tom Irion, Reagan, Crockett and Some of the towns receiving service from it include Quanah, Crow ell, Krox City, McCaulley, Longsworth, Sweetwater Bronte San Angelo, Eldorado Sonori and Del Rio.

Some months ago shippers met with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce officials, and officers of the railway at San Angelo and at time all towns south of Sweetwater were represented at the meeting. A committee was formal to Washington to Intercede for the road. Shortly before the committee arrived E. P. Byars, then traffic manager for the West Texas Chember of Commerce, was in Washington and conferred with the finance committee of the Interstate Commerce Commission with a view to getting a loan for the road. 


