ROGERS IN FAVOR OF A. & M. SCHOOL

Candidate For Governor Bases Platform Upon Economy And Educational Features.

PLEDGES "SQUARE DEAL TO ALL"

Attacks Measures And Reforms Of Neff—To Open Campaign In Dallas And Vicinity

Arriving late in Sweetwater from Snyder, where he had spoken in the afternoon, unheralded only through Fagin county, candidate for Governor of Texas, spoke to a small and hastily assembled gathering in the Courthouse Tuesday afternoon.

Basing his platform upon economy of State Government and the Constitution of Texas, the improvement of the public school system, the location of an A. & M. college somewhere in West Texas, and bitterly attacked the measures and reforms of Pat M. Neff the present incumbent and candidate for re-election, and appealed to the voters of Texas to support him as the man who pledged himself to give a "square deal to everyone."

Mr. Rogers left Tuesday night for Dallas where he will begin a three-day speech campaign through that section of the state.

Mr. Rogers spoke in part as follows: "I am not a candidate of any faction or group of factions in the State, but for the interests of the people of the State as a whole, irrespective of the sectional geographical lines of the State."

"West Texas has been refused in the recent past the location of an A. & M. college, in a section of the State whose location makes such an institution an imperative necessity, but the campus grounds of the State University have been increased many fold by the present Administration at a cost of \$1,350,000 which was used for the purpose of bringing the play grounds of the University nearer the University buildings."

"The vetoing of the public school program in Texas accompanied the refusal of the present Governor in regard to a West Texas A. and M. there by causing the premature closing of the rural schools in Texas and being instrumental in placing Texas thirtieth in the educational rating of the Union."

The removal of the Pardon Board, reputed to be an immense saving to the State of Texas, erased only a small expenditure of \$10,000 a year, while at the same time the Highway Department of the State is filled with scores of unnecessary members, whose duties could be dispensed with at a saving of great value to the State. My first act if I am elected Governor of Texas will be to re-appoint the Pardon Board and I shall give my time to the resurrection and promotion of the school system of the State.

"As a method of assisting the farmer and stockman of the State to greater development, the idea of cooperative marketing must be promoted and my greatest assistance will be in that direction.

The lands belonging to the State penitentiary and tilled by the convicts within the institution are managed today by not practical farmers but politicians and persons who are unacquainted with the intricacies of the position. The removal of incompetent management and the installation of practical and experienced management would amount to a saving of a vast expenditure to the State in that department annually where now the proposition is a bad investment at its best."

SWEETWATER WOMAN FINED.

A splendidly dressed man and woman arrived in Market last Monday night, coming down from Sweetwater, according to their statement before court the next morning, on the midnight train, and no one being present enquired their way to one of the leading hotels from nightwatchman John A. Woodard, who at their appearance and manner became suspicious and decided to accompany them to the hotel, where he saw them register as man and wife. Hence when he went off duty the next morning he "tipped" the situation off to Marshal Winters, who after investigation found that the man in the case was a traveling salesman, who with the woman, had registered as man and wife under an assumed name. They were brought before Judge Wheeler, where they entered a plea of guilty and were assessed a fine of \$100. The man gave his home at St. Louis, and the woman stated that she lived in Sweetwater.—Market Mail.

TELLS OF ESCAPE

Wife Of Fugitive Chinese President Gives First Account In Exclusive To United Press.

SHANGHAI, June 28.—(copyright U. P.) The first eye-witness account of the storming of the President's palace in Canton, the flight of Sun Yat Sen, wife of the President of the South China republic, especially for the United Press.

The tale of the frightful suffering during the bombardment, while her loyal guard fell around her, some staying behind in order that she might escape, is told by the President's wife, who was educated at American College of Macon, Georgia.

Mrs. Sun Yat Sen fled from the President's palace and was wounded by rifle bullets of the insurgents. Later she was captured and faced death by torture, escaping in disguise and flinging herself upon a heap of corpses of the slain in order to avoid discovery. Later under cover of darkness she made her way to the homes of friends, who aided her in making her escape from the city.

EQUIPMENT ARRIVES

Outfitting Of Local Unit Of T. N. G. Will Be Distributed In A Few Days.

The equipment necessary for outfitting the Sweetwater unit of the Texas National Guard has arrived in Sweetwater and will be distributed as soon as the army has been completed, according to Lieutenant Dick Wood. The equipment consists of articles varying from tent pegs to a field kitchen, such as shirts, blankets, uniforms, shoes, raincoats, overcoats, etc.

The unit will be housed in its new headquarters across from the Post Office within a few days according to Lieutenant Wood. Individual lockers will enable each man to know where his belongings are at all times. Equipment for fifty-three men will be distributed with the move.

The company is making fine progress in drilling, according to its officers. The men are being exposed to the rigors of physical exercise and are crying for more. Enthusiasm for their work is helpful in whipping the men into such form in so few drill periods. The company will drill in conjunction with the Sweetwater band at Swatter Park Monday afternoon in preparation for the trip to Roby on July 4, when the band will play at the celebration there and the company will give an exhibition drill.

The company will leave for Camp Mabry, Austin, on July 27 where Sweetwater will constitute a full unit. The men will receive the benefits of a fifteen-day encampment, where they will come in contact and contest with units from other towns and sections of the State.

FIRE SWEEPS MEVICAL

IRISH REBELS OUSTED

Free State Troops Drive Insurgents From Stronghold In Town

By The United Press. DUBLIN, June 28.—The Irish Republican insurgents were driven from parts of Four Corners this afternoon by the Free State troops, who stormed the rebel stronghold under a heavy artillery fire.

Several hundred insurgents were captured and have been herded in the open spaces of the town under heavy guard. Scores of residents of Four Corners have been injured in the desperate fighting, which has been raging intermittently in the town for several days.

Fifteen persons were reported dead at 6 o'clock this afternoon and many hurt. The insurgents were driven from the Four Corners buildings and took refuge in two hotels in the heart of the city where they have barricaded themselves and are continuing the fight.

COMMUNICATION LINES DOWN

LONDON, June 28.—Greatest confusion reigned in London today in regard to the civil war in Ireland. Telephone and telegraph wires are down between Dublin and London, giving rise to the rumors of heavy fighting.

VETERANS TO MEET

World War Veterans Of Eight Allied Powers To Re-Union At New Orleans At Early Date.

NEW ORLEANS, June 28.—A new chapter in the history of efforts to ward off war through peace will be written when representatives of World War fighters from eight allied powers meet in New Orleans, October 11, 12 and 13, at the annual convention of the Inter-Allied Veterans' Federation.

The convention will be held a few days before the fourth annual national convention of the American Legion here. One of the chief aims of the international fighters' organization is to promote world peace and the New Orleans gathering will be known as the Convention of Peace. To further this ideal the convention will decide upon means of obtaining representation for veterans at inter-allied and international congresses.

Headquarters of the Federation is now at work on the preparation of data on comparative legislation affecting ex-service men. The summaries will contain measures which have been taken in favor of veterans and to improve the lot of widows and children of disabled men.

The foreign delegates, who will be guests of the American Legion, will meet in Paris and sail from Le Havre on the same ship. Landing at New York, the visitors will proceed to Washington where ceremonies will be held at the tomb of the unknown soldier in Arlington Cemetery. Respects will be paid to the United States government and to the various diplomatic representatives of the countries participating.

Despite the fact that English was the language employed in the Washington disarmament conference, delegates to the New Orleans meetings will hold deliberations in French.

HOLT TRACTOR TO COUNTY

A 10-ton Holt caterpillar tractor which will be used in building Nolan county roads has arrived in the local T. and P. yards from Clinton, O. The machine was secured from the Federal Government and cost the county in the neighborhood of \$565 the cost of freight and a receiving charge. The machine will be unloaded and either unoad itself or as soon as the carburetor and magnets arrives from Austin.

The second floor of the building which was occupied by Bush and Temple sales men, collapsed burying the men in the debris.

Fire broke out in the wreckage following the explosion and raged for more than an hour despite the efforts of the fire department.

BRIGHTER SEASON FACES LEAGUE

Discussion Of Status Of West Texas Circuit Clubs Shows League in Fair Condition Now.

RANGER REPRESENTED BY PROXY

President Northern To Investigate The Player Personnel In Regard To Rookie Ruling.

The West Texas Baseball moguls, anticipating a stormy season journeyed to Abilene Monday with their spirits sharpened and prepared to battle the meeting, however, early developed into a love feast with the Dove of Peace hovering constantly over the double magnates. Complete harmony prevailed throughout.

The meeting was held in the country home of J. McAlester Stevenson, where the visiting club heads were well entertained.

With the exception of Ranger, every club was personally represented. D. T. Perkins, former president of the Stamford club had Ranger's proxy. Those present were: J. D. Tidwell and F. J. Neal, Sweetwater; H. T. Witherspoon, Amarillo; J. J. Jones Lubbock; D. T. Perkins (Proxy) Ranger; Frank Buchanan San Angelo; R. M. Bishop, Clovis; W. T. Bizzell, Stamford and J. McAlester Stevenson, Abilene Otto Melver Frank Halcyon former Ft. Worth first baseman Mark Thomas and Popboy Smith were also present and finished in the East League with a batting average of an even .1000.

Much discussion was entered into concerning the daily guarantee and after the \$75.00 daily fee guarantee was voted down the moguls voted in favor of allowing an exemption of 750 persons on all Sunday games with the \$75.00 guarantee to visiting clubs with a privilege of a split 25% cent per ticket on all men's general admission.

Probably the most important feature of the meeting was the enthusiasm exhibited by all present, the friendly feeling exhibited by all present, the friendly feeling and the unanimous desire to go through with the Second Half which begins Thursday June 29. Every one reports an infusion of new blood and a new race with everybody starting with an even percentage renewed interest was in evidence.

In order for the league to start the second campaign with a clean financial slate it was agreed to prorate the existing indebtedness among the eight clubs and instead of a straight assessment, it was unanimously decided to liquidate said indebtedness out of the Fourth of July receipts. After the War Tax has been deducted from these receipts the entire gate receipts of all eight clubs will be forwarded to President Northern who is requested by Tidwell of Sweetwater to thoroughly investigate the player personnel of every club and make a report at the earliest possible date.

The league, as shown by Northern's financial statement is in far better financial state than at this time last year and every club representative stated that his town was determined to proceed entirely through the season.

After the usual routine business had been disposed of the assembled magnates adjourned and proceeded to the Ball park, where to the astonishment of every body in general and Bishop in particular the cellar champions walloped the daylights out of the Clovis Buzzers.

SOUNDED 'TAPS' OVER MCKINLEY

Veteran Bugler Drowned At Time Of Retirement—Refused Commission

By The United Press. MANILLA, P. I., June 28.—Private Tom Lewis, old time bugler of the United States Army, a member of the 31st Infantry stationed in Manila, was drowned here while his company commander was searching for him to present him his honorable discharge with retirement pay.

Private Lewis went to A. W. O. L. for three days, following his arrival in Manila from the United States. In the three days retirement papers were made out. He had served more than a year over his required period.

Lewis was the bugler who sounded taps over the grave of President McKinley.

He repeatedly refused promotion to a non-commissioned grade because he had "always been a bugler and wanted to die a bugler."

MORE FISH TO CONCHO.

SAN ANGELO, June 27.—A large consignment of fish from the government hatchery at San Marcos is expected here shortly to restock the Concho river and their tributaries, according to Walter Yaggy, secretary of the Board of City Development. During the drought of 1917-18 thousands of fish were killed. The government looked upon the request with much favor when it was presented. The Conchos have a reputation for being among the best streams for angling found in West Texas.

MORE ABOUT OZONA

From the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Somehow we can not get our mind off of Ozona. There is so much for us all to learn from those 37 women who make up the Ozona Women's Club 40 miles from a railroad.

In their report at the Sixth District meeting which was held in Ranger in April, their delegates never mentioned the fact that they lived in a little town. The thought you gleaned from their report was that they lived in a great open country, a big, big county, where there were so many things to be done for their homes and town and county and all its people. Ozona, the only town in a county covering 3,004 square miles of Texas. Why, those women are so busy building up their homes and school and town and taking care of their cemetery that they never have time to think of the things other women have in the cities. They are not so gorged with entertainments and fine preaching and classical music and fine arts and libraries, that they never appreciate anything. But instead, they appreciate everything, and enjoy everything that comes to their town because THEY have very little thrust upon them. THEY choose most of their entertainments or produce it themselves. The Ozona Women's Club brought the lyceum to their town. They sent to C. I. A. and had the State Art Exhibit sent to them. Instead of spending their time running around to everything that strikes even the least

their poll tax. But the Se fixed that.

And did you notice that Ozona women have time to clean their town every three months lead of every year as most of us. And did you notice who helped them in their cleanup campaigns? The COUNTY COMMISSIONERS. Do you know of another town in Texas where the women go ahead and do the things they think their town needs and the county commissioners come along and pay the bills? This is an example of real county co-operation, between the men and the women of the county. There is a lot of faith reflected in those statements. And the stock law as passed three years ago through the work and woe of the women is enforced to the letter. Which means that all the people are willing to observe the laws, their town relative to the beauty and comfort of their town.

And did you notice the kind of piano the club bought for the school? No, they did not go to some grand hand store to try to get a bargain. They wanted a piano or their school instead of a bargain for the club,

and therefore bought and presented to the school a baby grand piano. This one club, with the co-operation of their town, is looking after the best interests of the school, they are doing the city housekeeping, they are caring for the city of their dead, and they are meeting the responsibility of Americanization among the Mexican children of their county. They have organized a story hour for the Mexican children. Can you think of anything more beautiful in spirit than that? And beside all this the district president, Miss Minnie Cunningham, knew just where to find good workers for her district and they are doing the district work in child welfare, a forestry and art. One club with 37 members and three district chairmen. These women are Mrs. H. B. Cox, Mrs. B. B. Ingham and Mrs. Blake Mauldin, all of Ozona, of course. There is nowhere else to be from in Corckett County. The best of all their dreams is their dream of a county community home, which they have started on.

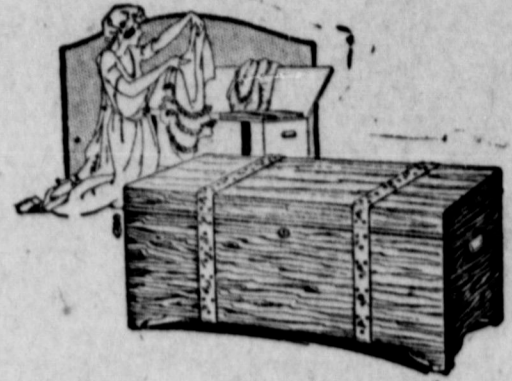
