FORTY KILLED BY MISHAPS TUESDAY

Approximate Number Of Injured In July 4 Celebrations Number 250.

SAN ANGELO MAN DROWNS

Made Unsuccessful Attempt To Rescue Drowning Girl From The Swollen Concho River

(Undated) Approximately 40 persons were killed and more than 200 injured and more than two hundred and fifty injured throughout the nation in the Fourth of July celebrations, according to reports to the United Press today.

The cause of the deaths and injuries run the gamut from burns to premature explosions, resulting from careless handling by grown-ups to inexperience by youngsters.

New York led the number of casualties with eleven dead and forty-five injured.

SAN ANGELO July 5.—Guy L. Stanford, 35 years old, a shoemaker and Jewell Ball, 15, daughter of Sidney Ball were drowned in the North Concho river Tuesday morning, when Stanford made an unsuccessful attempt to rescue the girl from drowning.

The bodies were recovered this morning.

The girl, with other children, had been wading in the swollen stream when she stepped into deep swift water. Stanford leaves an invalid wife and four children.

FOURTH IS FATAL

Six Persons Drowned While Swimming on July 4th.—Four Girls.

HOUSTON, July 5th.—Six persons lost their lives while swimming on July 4th.

John D. Wiley of Dallas and R. M. Cannon of Eagle Pass were drowned while bathing at Galveston.

Wiley was drowned in water only one foot deep and doctors were of the opinion that heart trouble was primarily responsible.

Four young girls, the daughters of M. J. Anthony and I. Davis of Graham, were drowned in the Brazos river near Graham late yesterday.

PARIS, July 5.—Police reserves surrounded the Chamber of Deputies during a hot debate this afternoon, when Communist members attacked Premier Poincare, with the accusation that the premier was responsible for bringing on the world war. A great throng gathered in the vicinity of the building.

Within the crowded Chamber Communist members hurled questions at the Premier concerning his pre-war record and asserting that the contribution toward bringing about the war, Poincare faced his enemies bristling in defiance and stoutly defending his policies.

WHITE HOUSE IS TOURISTS MECCA

Hundreds Of People Wend Way Along Line To Shake Hands With President Daily.

VISITORS FROM ALL CLASSES

Foreign Nations Often Represented—Callers Are Tabulated In The Various Categories.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The White House is rapidly becoming one of the greatest tourist "meccas" in the country.

Every day now hundreds of people are in the line which winds its way past the desk of the President for a handshake. Long before the appointed hour, the crowd begins to gather on the plaza before the door.

The rush began in the spring and has never abated. Some days there have been, by actual count more than 2,000 in the line—the number being swelled by granting classes of high schools in various parts of the country. There are never less than 300.

Occasionally some citizen who has enjoyed the savor of public life and knows the burden of its requirements will ask in astonishment, "How does the President stand it?"

Yet there has been no indication that the custom will be suspended. As it is, President Harding is, perhaps, the most prolific handshaker that has ever occupied the White House. An estimate of the number of people who have passed his desk since March 4 1921, would probably be astounding. It probably is close to 150,000.

And there was never a more varied assemblage gathered in the outer courts of royalty than can be found in this body which comes daily—some for thousands of miles—to shake hands with the President.

Americans are there, from far west south, east and north. Foreign nations are frequently represented. Some day every race has its quota—white, black, yellow and brown.

A classification by trade and profession of those who have passed through the executive offices will show several different categories, politicians, statesmen, diplomats, editors, professors, teachers, students, professional baseball players, actors and actresses, midgets, tall men, circus performers, and many, many others. For all the President has a kind of greeting.

There is always prevalent among some of those present the sense of being in the presence of greatness—that attitude of hero worshiper, the envy of women is there, and you will see young girls fresh from board school take out their hand mirrors and tuck in their loose curls. Usually there is a sprinkling of young American boyhood—with more reverence for a secret service man than for the President—and he stands with mouth agape as one of the White House secret service force is pointed out to him.

ROBY CELEBRATES

Huge Crowd Attends July 4 Picnic And Rodeo—Sweetwater Band Furnished Music.

ROBY, Texas, July 5.—With the rising of the sun bright and early Tuesday morning, July the Fourth here began soon to picture Independence Day, as was suggested to be celebrated by Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin and John Adams way back yonder in the year 1776.

People from every nook and corner of Fisher County and many from adjoining territories, made their appearance before noon.

The Sweetwater Band arrived on schedule time and were busily engaged in making music for the tremendous throng of people who had congregated here for the big free picnic and barbecue. The long list of numbers program furnished ample amusement, and not a dull moment was wasted in to mark the excitement and spirit of the occasion.

Among the big features on the program for the day included a wrestling bout, rodeo, races, ball game, addresses, vanguardist exhibition and a dance. Many other entertainments were afforded the big crowd.

The big feature of the celebration was the serving of barbecued beef and mutton to an uncontrollable congested stream of people. The plan was to set everything ready at the big tabernacle just a block off the square and then serve everyone free. This was to commence at about 11 o'clock and last until about 2 o'clock. When the first gourd at the barbecue dinner was undertaken, the crowd became confused, and became unmanageable, rushing in over the announcers and taking what was in sight. The committee in charge of the barbecued meat, were determined that every body eat some of it. Several men began bringing the barbecue to the tables by the tubful and pouring it upon the long line of tables. A personal interview was not secured from every individual at the dinner, but it's a two-to-one go that every one got a taste of the splendidly barbecued meats.

There were numbers of people who brought their "basket dinner" and failed to get in the rush for barbecue. These were the most enjoyed as community dinners were spread in many different parts of the business district also about the Court House Square.

"Ice cold lemonade, soda pop and ice cream," and other yells were the chief noise of the day. Many eating and cold drink stands were in evidence. Every one appeared to be pleased in which the celebration was conducted. Talk has already been started on another big celebration for July 4th of 1923. And it is planned to make the next celebration the biggest and best that this section has ever had.

PENITENTIARY AGENT HERE

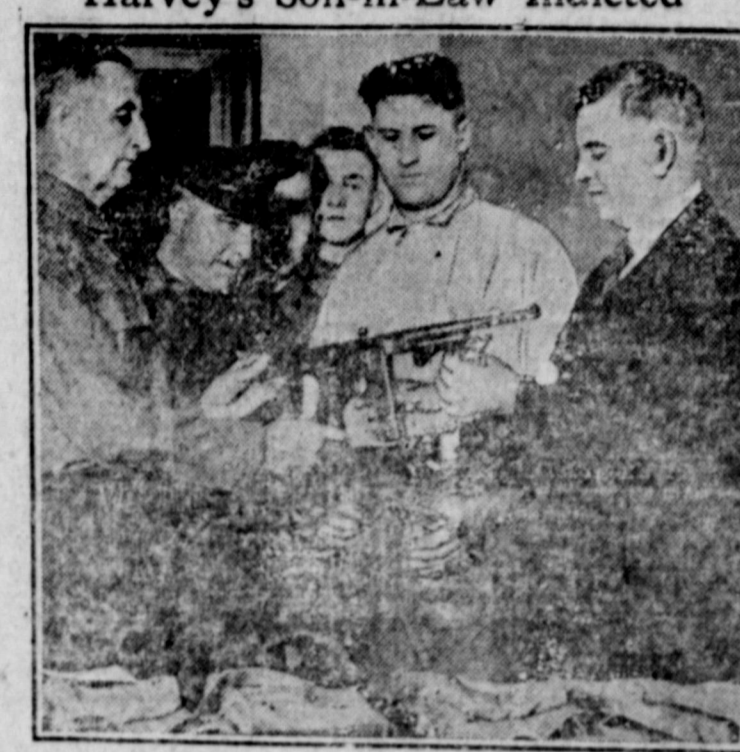
Returns From El Paso With Nine Prisoners—Picks Up Five.

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GET GANG THAT STOLE MILLIONS

Theft Of Five Million Dollars In Bonds From Postoffice Department Is Recalled.

"GENTLEMAN CROOK" ARRESTED

Agent American Express Company Impersonated Yegg For Nearly A Year To Get Him.

NEW YORK, July 5.—More than \$5,000,000 in loot stolen from the post office department here is near recovery and the gang headed by a "gentleman crook" was brought into court to face justice for their crime, which was considered one of the most sensational in the annals of the postoffice department.

Gordon McCarthy, human blood hound, brought the gang of Edward Bryce, alleged gentleman crook, into court. Bryce swaggered before United States Commissioner Hitchcock with a cane swinging on his arm, morose in his eye and ultra fashionable clothing. "The Count" as he was known to his band was awaiting arraignment on charges of rbbing the mails of \$2,000,000 in bonds.

Charles P. Heines and Charles Lambert who were charged with having participated in the daring mail truck robbery last October, were with Bryce. A woman known as Bryce's wife was also in the gang taken in by Mc Carthy.

Over half a million dollars worth of bonds were discovered buried under a tree in Long Island and the remainder found when Bryce's luxurious Gramercy Park apartment was searched.

McCarthy is an agent of the American Railway Express. He started at the bottom of New York underworld in his search for the thieves. He impersonated a yegg and acted the part of a "dip." Wormed out many secrets of crookdom and searched his way up from the bottom of society, finding his quarry at the top.

COMMITTS SUICIDE IN CELL

BERLIN, July 5.—Grogman, the Berlin butcher, who has been on trial for the murder of women he had seduced and later sold their flesh over the counters of his shop, committed suicide by hanging himself in his cell here today.

CONTRACT IS LET

Loralne Construction Company Gets Award Of Colorado Bridge—Bid Was \$44,327.31.

COLORADO, July 3.—The Brown Abbot Construction Company of Loralne was awarded contract to construct the new bridge across the Colorado river here Monday by the Commissioners court of Mitchell county. The bid was for \$44,327.31.

F. F. DuBose of Austin, assistant bridge engineer of the State Highway Commission of the structure, states that work will be commenced just as soon as the old bridge may be torn away and materials assembled on the ground.

The new bridge will be 326 feet, 6 inches in length, and including approaches the project is 1,200 feet in length. It will consist of six 81-foot concrete girders and one steel span 150 feet in length. The bridge will be 19 feet clear road way and one side walk four and one half feet wide.

Because of the fact that sand and gravel materials to be used in construction are available at the location the expense of moving these materials, usually to be met in bridge construction was saved to the county and highway commission, which are jointly financing the new bridge. The structure will be located at the foot of West Second street in Colorado and on the Bankhead Highway.

WEDS ROBY GIRL

George Conley Married Miss Jeanette Hambricht—Will Live Here.

George Conley, well known Sweetwater man, was married Monday morning at 7 o'clock to Miss Jeanette Hambricht of Roby. Immediately following the marriage ceremony, the newly weds motored to Sweetwater where they took the early morning train for San Antonio and points in South Texas on a honeymoon trip.

The bride is from one of the best families of Fisher County, where her parents have resided for a number of years and who are probably as widely known or more so than any other family in that county. She was reared and educated at Roby and has held a responsible position in the office of the District Clerk for some time.

Mr. Conley was reared at Luling, Texas, and came to Sweetwater several years ago. He has been employed at the Hubbard's Dry Goods Store for the past few years.

Following a months trip, over Texas, Mr. and Mrs. Conley will be at home in Sweetwater, where a large circle of friends will be waiting to welcome them.

FOURTH FATALITIES
A few years ago the 4th was a day to be dreaded until civic authorities awoke to the fact that high explosives entrusted to children and irresponsible persons was not exactly the thing and cities generally began to prohibit their use. It was then discovered that pageants and other community affairs were more effective in instilling patriotism.

Fourth of July fatalities in Texas this year seemed to be confined to growing accidents largely. There is death lurking under the rippling waters of nearly all rivers and lakes. Two things should be incorporated into the training of every child, boy or girl. One is a thorough knowledge of swimming. The other is a thorough training in the "prone pressure method" of bringing apparently drowned persons to life. The beauty of this method is that it works equally with persons apparently dead from electric shock, heart trouble and from apparent death from several other causes.

Death from accident or preventable disease seems so useless, unnecessary. Health drives of one sort or another, "safety first" campaigns have all done their part in bringing the death rate down. But there is still work to be done. Is any of it being done here?

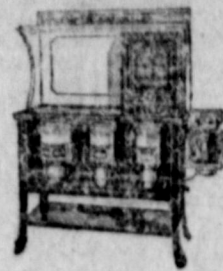
