Premier Poincare Calls French Cabinet In Extraordinary Session For Discussion of British Note.

PARIS, July 23 .- French Premier Poincare today summoned the French Cabinet in extraordinary session to meet tomorrow to discuss the British note on German repartions.

The French premier has an agreement with English Premier Stanley Baldwin that the contents of the note nor its tenor will be permitted to leak out. Consequently but little is known concerning the official attitude on the

Unofficially, however, its contents are said to contain three provisions, as follows:

An impartial commission to discover the German ability to pay reparations, France and Belgium to withdraw most of their troops from the Ruhr. Germany to cease its policy of passive resistance and get to work.
