NEW BRUNSWICK, Sept. 18.—Detectives mingled with mourners at the biers of the Reverend Edward W. Hall and Mrs. James Mills here today in hope of finding a clue in the act ions of some of those present.

The investigation reveals that the urder of the Rector of the Episcopal Church of St. John the Divine and Mrs. Mills, a choir singer, probably took place in the city of New Bruns wick Thursday night and that the bodies were taken to a grove on a wooded farm: where they were found Saturday, according to the police.

The motive of the crime remains undiscovered. Several persons are under surveillance, but no arrests have been made.

BOARD OF EDUCATION IS ASKED TO ERECT A NEW EAST WARD SCHOOL

Business Men Attend Special Meeting Of School Board Following Fire Which Endangers Lives Of Over 300 Children Early Monday Morning-Its Use Is Barred.

WILL ASK BOND ISSUE TO DEFRAY COST OF NEW HOME

Teachers Are Commended For Coolness With Which Children Were Removed From Burning Building-Patrons of East Ward School Emphatic About Not Sending Children.

Sentiment for the prompt submission of a bond issue to the people to rebuild the East Ward school which narrowly escaped destruction by fire Monday morning was strong at a mass meeting of business men which was called at 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon at the office of the Board of City Development presided oved by R. M. Simmons. On motion by Rufus Wright which called for the rebuilding of the school at the earliest possible moment, pledging every possible assistance to the School Board and which was voted unanimous ly, the meeting adjourned to meet with the School Board. A special meeting of the latter body was called to-order in the rear of the First National Bank building and R. M. Chitwood acted as spokesman.

"This group of citizens have asked me to say to you that they will render you full support to relieve the present school situation. Our opinion is that the East Ward School should not be repaired, but be wrecked and then a new building erected just as soon as the legal formalities can be complied with and a bond issue submitted to the people,"

"I might say further that the patrons of the East Ward School represented here and others are most emphatic in their statement that they will not send their children to the East Ward School either in its present condition nor if repairs should be attempted.




