RAISE HUNTING DOGS.

Demand For Non-Pedigreed Hounds Cultivated By Texan.

DALLAS, Nov. 9.—A demand for non-pedigreed dogs forcoon and possum hunting has been created by Linton Rush, of Mount Calm, Texas, which now threatens to outstrip his supply.

Six years ago Rush started in the business with two dogs and by his own system of training has developed a high standard of hunting dogs.

Most of the dogs are trained by Rush and if after a period of two years the dog does not show an aptitude for training he is killed. Rush explained that this method was used to keep the breed pure. If the dog was given away it would bring discredit on other dogs of the same type. The dogs are a mixed breed developed by Rush with one quarter bloodhound and a like amount of Walker.

In the six years he has been in the business, Rush has sold over 200 dogs. His receipts last year totaled over \$1,500.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING ALL TENT SHOWS, EXHIBITIONS OF NATURAL OR ARTIFICIAL CURIOSITIES, CARAVANS, MUSICAL COMEDYS OR OTHERWISE MENAGERIES, CARNIVALS, DRAMATIC COMPANIES, COMEDY COMPANIES, MEDICINE SHOWS, OR OTHER AMUSEMENT ENTERPRISES OF A SIMILAR NATURE THAT GIVE THEIR PERFORMANCES UNDER TENTS OR OUTSIDE THEATRES PAYING LICENSE TAX, TO BE NUISANCES AND PROHIBITING THEM FROM GIVING EXHIBITIONS AND PERFORMANCES IN THE CITY OF SWEETWATER, EXCEPTING SHOWS THAT DO NOT EXHIBIT OR PERFORM FOR MORE THAN ONE DAY AND CHAUTAUQUAS, AND SIMILAR ORGANIZATIONS, PROVIDING THAT EACH DAY CONSTITUTES A SEPARATE OFFENSE AND PROVIDING PENALTY AND CONTAINING EMERGENCY CLAUSE.

Be it ordained by the Commission of the City of Sweetwater: That all tent shows, exhibitions of natural or artificial curiosities, caravans, musical comedys, or otherwise, menageries, carnivals, dramatic companies, comedy companies, medicine shows, or other amusement enterprises of a similar nature that give their performance under tents or outside of local theaters, the annual occupation tax upon which has been paid to the said City of Sweetwater, but within the corporate limits of the City of Sweetwater, are hereby declared to be a nuisance and it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation or association of persons or agent thereof, to exhibit or give a performance of any show as above described, within the corporate limits of the City of Sweetwater.

Provided, however, that the above provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to any show whose stay in the City of Sweetwater for the purpose of exhibition or performance does not exceed one day.

Provided further, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to chautauquas, or other religious or instructive organizations of a similar nature.

Each and every day that the provisions of this ordinance are violated shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

All ordinances, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Any person, firm, corporation, or association of persons or agent thereof, violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than \$100.00 and not more than \$200.

The fact that there are several shows of the class described in this ordinance now contemplating entering the City of Sweetwater for the purpose of giving their performances, constitutes an emergency and an imperative necessity, that the rule requiring that ordinances be read at two several meetings of the Commission be suspended, and the same is hereby suspended and it is hereby ordered that this ordinance take effect immediately, upon its passage and publication.

Passed by a unanimous vote of the Commission this the 2nd day of November, A. D. 1922.

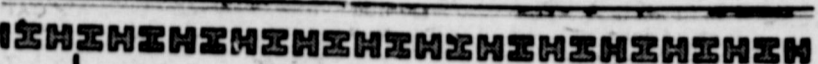
TO JAIL ALL RECKLESS DRIVERS.
